# **Organization**

Saunders 2018–2019 Strategies for Test Success: Passing Nursing School and the NCLEX Exam contains three parts and 20 chapters. The chapters in Part I describe the test-taking strategies and include several sample questions that illustrate how to use each test-taking strategy. The sample questions represent all types of question formats, including multiple choice and alternate item formats. In addition to the sample questions in the chapters, a total of 1200 practice questions accompany this book. In Part II of the book, there are 200 practice questions, and the accompanying Evolve site contains the 200 practice questions from the book along with an additional 1000 practice questions. All of the practice questions reflect the framework and the content identified in the most current NCLEX test plans. The practice questions in this resource relate to each Client Needs category and each Integrated Process of the NCLEX exam. The Client Needs categories include Safe and Effective Care Environment, Health Promotion and Maintenance, Psychosocial Integrity, and Physiological Integrity. The Integrated Processes include Caring, Communication and Documentation, Culture and Spirituality, Nursing Process (Clinical Problem-Solving Process), and Teaching and Learning.

# **Part I: Study and Test Preparation**

#### **Chapter 1: Preparing for Nursing Examinations**

The information in this chapter focuses on the exams that you will take during your nursing program and provides you with information on how to prepare for these exams. Topics include the purpose of nursing exams, what you can expect on nursing exams, how nursing exams are different from other exams, and the types of questions on nursing exams. Additional topics include preparing for a nursing exam using your syllabus, textbook, classroom notes, flash cards, study guides, and study groups.

### Chapter 2: Developing Study Skills

This chapter discusses several topics related to study skills and study habits. It provides you with information on how to develop or refine study skills and how to develop good study habits so that you will be well prepared for your nursing exams. Included are the top 10 Pyramid Points and study habits. Also, study skills such as listening, note-taking, reading, remembering content, and critical thinking skills are discussed.

#### Chapter 3: Reducing Test Anxiety

This chapter focuses on the important points related to test anxiety. In this chapter, you are provided with self-assessment points to determine if you experience test anxiety. Additionally, the causes of test anxiety, how to prevent test anxiety, and how to control test anxiety before an exam are discussed. Points about maintaining a positive attitude and what you can do when you experience test anxiety are presented in this chapter.

## **Chapter 4: NCLEX® Preparation**

This chapter focuses on preparing for the NCLEX exam—the exam that you must take and pass after you graduate from nursing school in order to become a licensed nurse. This chapter emphasizes the important point that NCLEX preparation begins the moment you enter your nursing program. Specific to the NCLEX, it provides you with the steps for preparing for the NCLEX, self-assessment points to determine your readiness, and a plan for preparation.

# **Part II: Strategies for Success**

#### **Chapter 5: Alternate Item Formats**

Alternate item format questions are designed to test competency in nursing skills and abilities. This chapter describes the various types of alternate item format questions that you may encounter on the NCLEX examination and on nursing school examinations and provides you with test-taking strategies to answer them correctly. These alternate item format types include fill-in-the-blank, multiple response, prioritizing (ordered response), figure or illustration (hot spot), chart/exhibit,

graphic item options, testlets (case studies), and audio and video.

#### Chapter 6: How to Avoid "Reading into the Question"

One of the pitfalls that can cause a problem when answering a question is "reading into the question." This means that you are considering issues beyond the information presented in the question. This chapter describes the strategies to use when answering a question to prevent this from happening and includes topics such as how to read a question, using strategic words, identifying the subject of the question, determining if an abnormality exists, focusing on the client of the question, considering available resources, and using nursing knowledge and the process of elimination.

#### **Chapter 7: Positive and Negative Event Queries**

This chapter describes the differences between a positive and a negative event query in a question. Reading the question carefully and noting the type of query used are important to assist in answering a question correctly. This chapter also identifies the strategic words or phrases that indicate whether the question contains a positive or negative event query.

#### **Chapter 8: Questions Requiring Prioritization**

Some of the test questions on your nursing exams and on the NCLEX will require you to use the skill of prioritizing nursing actions. These types of questions can be difficult because when a question requires prioritization, all of the options may be correct, and you will need to determine the correct order of action. This chapter describes the test-taking strategies that you can use to answer prioritizing questions correctly. Some of these strategies include the ABCs—airway, breathing, and circulation—Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory, and the steps of the nursing process (clinical problem-solving process). Also included in this chapter are the strategies for determining the need to contact the health care provider.

#### Chapter 9: Leading and Managing, Delegating, and Assignment-Making Questions

Some test questions that you will need to answer will relate to the nurse's responsibilities regarding delegating care and assignment-making and the supervisory role of these responsibilities. This chapter reviews the guidelines and principles related to delegating and assignment-making, two very important roles of the nurse as a leader and manager. It also provides you with information about the tasks and activities that can be delegated and assigned to unlicensed assistive personnel (UAP), licensed practical/vocational nurses, and registered nurses. Guidelines for time management are also reviewed, because managing time efficiently is a key factor for completing activities and tasks within a given time period.

#### **Chapter 10: Communication Questions**

Communication is a process through which information is exchanged, either verbally or nonverbally, between two or more individuals and is an extremely important role of the nurse. This chapter reviews the guidelines to follow when answering communication questions and identifies various cultural aspects to consider when communicating and caring for clients. Additionally, therapeutic and nontherapeutic communication techniques are presented.

#### **Chapter 11: Pharmacology, Medication, and Intravenous Calculation Questions**

Pharmacology is one of the most difficult nursing content areas to master and feel comfortable with. One reason that it is so difficult is because of the enormous number of medications available. Another reason is that there is a vast amount of information to know about each medication. It is important for you to spend ample time studying and reviewing pharmacology in preparation for your nursing exams and for the NCLEX and to use this knowledge to answer pharmacology questions. However, you may be presented with pharmacology questions on your exams that present medications you are unfamiliar with, in which case you will need to make an educated guess to answer the question. This chapter provides you with the strategies and general guidelines to use for making an educated guess to answer pharmacology questions correctly. This chapter also includes medication and intravenous calculations strategies and examples.

## **Chapter 12: Additional Pyramid Strategies**

This chapter reviews additional helpful strategies that will assist in answering a test question correctly. Also included in this chapter are strategies that are useful for answering questions related to laboratory values, client positioning, and therapeutic diets. Strategies that will be helpful when answering questions related to disasters are also presented in this chapter.

#### **Part III: Practice Tests**

Part III is composed of eight practice tests that provide you the opportunity to practice answering exam questions using various test-taking strategies. These tests include Chapter 13, Fundamentals of Care Questions; Chapter 14, Adult Health Questions; Chapter 15, Mental Health Questions; Chapter 16, Maternity Questions; Chapter 17, Child Health Questions; Chapter 18, Pharmacology Questions; Chapter 19, Delegating/Prioritizing Questions; and Chapter 20, Leadership/Management Questions. The correct answer, rationales for correct and incorrect options, a test-taking strategy, a tip for the nursing student, question codes, and a reference text with a page number are provided for each question.

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# CHAPTER 1

# **Preparing for Nursing Examinations**

# When and Why Are Nursing Exams Administered?



Nursing exams are administered at various points throughout each nursing course. Your nursing faculty administer these exams to you to test your knowledge of the content taught in a course and to test your ability to analyze, apply, and synthesize concepts learned to care for clients in various situations. The exams you take in your nursing courses are also designed to prepare you for the NCLEX® exam, the examination that you need to take and pass after you graduate to become a licensed nurse. Additional purposes for administering exams are listed in the following box.

# Purposes for Administering Exams

- 1. To test knowledge of the content taught in a course
- 2. To test the ability to analyze and apply concepts learned to care for clients in various situations
- 3. To ensure the development of a professional nurse who can safely and competently care for clients served in the profession
- 4. To ensure the development of a critical thinker who can make sound clinical judgments and decisions based on evidence-based practice
- 5. To make certain that the student is a successful NCLEX exam candidate who will pass the NCLEX exam on his or her first sitting

# The Beginning Nursing Student: What Should You Think About?

What Is a Beginning Nursing Student?



If you have just completed your support courses (e.g., anatomy and physiology, microbiology, chemistry, pathophysiology, nutrition, genetics, others) and are entering your first nursing course, then you are a beginning nursing student. Your first nursing course is most likely titled "Fundamentals in Nursing" or something similar, and in this course you will learn all the safe and basic concepts necessary for caring for a client.



# The NCLEX Exam: Why Do You Need to Think About It

You may think that the NCLEX exam is far off, and it is; however, it is critical that you think about it the moment you enter your first nursing class. You may ask, "Why is this important?" To be successful on the NCLEX exam, you need to become as familiar as you can with what this exam is all about as early as possible in the nursing program. You need to know that taking the NCLEX exam will be a reality once you graduate and that this exam must be passed to become a licensed nurse. Often, students are concerned with the "here and now" of what they want and need to accomplish and are not concerned about the future, the NCLEX exam. Students say, "I will worry about the NCLEX exam when the time comes." At this point, it is much too late. So think about this exam early; visit the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) Web site at <a href="https://www.ncsbn.org">www.ncsbn.org</a>, and download the detailed test plan for the NCLEX exam. This test plan provides a wealth of information about the exam and lists the content areas that will be tested on it. Use these lists as your study guides for preparing for exams for each nursing course. By doing this, consider

that you are not only preparing for your nursing exams but also preparing for the NCLEX exam at the same time. You will be ready when the NCLEX exam becomes a reality for you!

# Study Tip

#### Student-to-Student

It may seem impossible to think about the NCLEX early on while you are in nursing school because of all of your course commitments. But remember that the NCLEX tests you on all the same concepts you are being tested on during your nursing courses. So, think NCLEX!



# Planning: Why Is It So Important?



Much of your success in nursing school has to do with how you plan and organize your time. You will have a very busy schedule and will need to plan ahead to best prepare for your exams, clinical experiences, and other assignments. Get an organizer with a calendar or another type of calendar that you feel will suit your needs, and use this as your planning guide for everything that you will need to do. Oftentimes, the e-mail account linked to your institution has an electronic calendar that accompanies it. With this calendar, important events can be marked for the entire group, and invitations can be sent using this platform. In addition to this, social media accounts are commonly used as an organizer for student and school events. Make notes about both your short-term goals and your long-term goals. For your short-term goals, note your classes and times, school meetings and appointments, study session times, assignment due dates, date and exam times, and any other obligations related to school. For your long-term goals, note what you plan to accomplish each year until your projected graduation date. Look at your calendar daily to meet any day-to-day obligations, and look ahead at your long-term goals to be sure that you are ready for graduation.



# Study Tip

## Lifestyle Planning

When building a plan to address your long-term and short-term goals, remember to allow time for activities that are not related to school, such as exercise, rest, relaxation, and fun. You need to have balance in life to be successful in a challenging academic program.

When you enter your first nursing course, you need to remember that your exam experience in college up to this point has related to testing in support courses, such as anatomy and physiology, microbiology, chemistry, pathophysiology, nutrition, and genetics. In these courses, test questions on exams have been primarily at the cognitive level of knowledge or understanding. These support courses have required not only a great deal of reading but also memorization in order to answer the exam questions correctly. So basically, your test-taking skills to this point may be quite good but are based on knowledge, some understanding, and memorization.

Nursing exams differ greatly from the exams that you have been used to taking. Memorization alone will not get you through a nursing exam. Some memorization, such as memorizing certain laboratory values or memorizing formulas for calculating a medication dosage or an intravenous flow rate, is necessary in nursing. However, the exam questions on a nursing exam are at a higher cognitive level than memorization and will require you to analyze or synthesize information and apply it to a situation. You will not be able to rely only on recall skills to answer test questions on a nursing exam. Instead, you will need to understand pathophysiology related to certain nursing content and disease processes and use critical thinking skills and clinical reasoning to apply to clinical scenarios. Do not let that first nursing exam "blow you away" or "throw you for a loop," as some may say. Be ready for it, and you will do great and pass!

# Study Tip

## Student-to-Student

The best way to prepare for a nursing exam is to review the "need to know" content and then practice answering as many questions related to the content as possible. What better way to study for an exam that requires application, analysis, and synthesis than to answer practice questions designed at these higher levels of cognitive ability?

# What Types of Questions Can You Expect on Nursing Exams?

## NCLEX® Exam Tip

Prepare for the NCLEX exam by answering as many practice questions in the alternate item format as possible. A high percentage of questions on the NCLEX are in this alternate format.

Most questions you will encounter on nursing exams will be multiple choice, which consist of a question and four possible options. You are probably very familiar with these types of questions from your support courses, but again, what you need to remember is that nursing exam questions will require you to think critically and to use clinical reasoning. Other types of questions, known as *alternate item formats*, may be included on nursing exams because these alternate types of questions are used in the NCLEX exam and also require higher-level thinking. They include multiple response, fill-in-the-blank, prioritizing (ordered response), chart/exhibit, graphic item options (images as the options), questions that include a picture or illustration, audio questions, and possible video questions. See Chapter 5 for specific information about alternate item formats. The total number of questions on a nursing exam varies, depending on various factors, such as instructor's preference, the amount of nursing content being tested, and the amount of time for testing. Your nursing instructor determines the number of questions that will be included in an exam.



# **Are Test-Taking Strategies Important?**


Test-taking strategies are important skills that will help you determine what the question is asking, how to select the correct answer, or how to narrow your choices when you must make an educated guess at an answer. Use of test-taking strategies is critical when taking a nursing exam because in many of the exam questions, all options may be correct, but depending on the way the question is worded, you may need to prioritize to select the correct answer. In addition, many times you may be able to narrow your choices down to two options and then you may struggle with making a selection. In these situations, the use of test-taking strategies is essential. Therefore, it is important to become skillful in the use of test-taking strategies. Chapters 5 through 12 of this book provide specific test-taking strategies for answering nursing exam questions. In addition, a guide to test-taking strategies for answering nursing exam questions can be found on the inside back cover.

# Study Tip

#### **Preparing for Clinical**

For most nursing courses, a clinical is an additional requirement. Clinical objectives will need to be achieved to pass the course. Be sure to look at your theory and clinical objectives. Seek out learning experiences in clinical that will complement the material you are covering in your theory course. This will assist you in preparing for nursing exams because you will be able to relate to real-life encounters when answering exam questions.

## Your Course Syllabus: Why Is It Important?



Your course syllabus is your map of the course. It provides your course objectives, course and program policies and procedures, required readings and other activities, class schedule (including your exam schedule), and other information related to the course. Your course objectives are the goals that you need to meet to pass the course, so be sure to read and understand them. They are also important because they are mapped specifically to program outcomes and other guiding standards, including the NCLEX exam. They serve as a road map in navigating your course content. In addition, your exam questions directly reflect your course objectives. Your required reading and other activities and your class and exam schedule are important to note because you need to plan ahead and prepare for these requirements. So be sure that you pay attention to what is stated in your course syllabus, as there is a link between everything noted that in the long run will help you become a professional nurse.



# **How Can You Best Use Your Textbook to Get**

## **Ready for a Nursing Exam?**

**Required Reading** 



In a nursing program, you can expect that you will need to do a tremendous amount of reading. Your course syllabus lists the required reading, and it is important to do the reading before the scheduled class. For example, if a class is scheduled and the content listed is "Standard and Other Precautions," you need to read the associated reading assignment before class. Reading the material before class is vital for a number of reasons. First, faculty expect you to read the material before coming to class so that you are prepared for any in-class activities. Next, reading before class provides you with the opportunity to identify areas that you do not understand and can ask about during class. So jot down questions that come to your mind as you are reading, and bring this list of questions to class. Finally, many faculty will give pop quizzes, which are unannounced quizzes administered at the beginning of class that include questions about the material that was to be read. Finally, many faculty now use the "flipped classroom" technique and other techniques such as problem-based learning and team-based learning. These techniques require students to have an introduction to the material being covered in order for the teaching method to be effective. So to be best prepared, read before class!

Do not fall behind with your reading assignments! They are vital to achievement of your learning outcomes while in class, and your level of preparation will also be reflected in your exam scores.

It is important to keep current with your reading assignments because if you fall behind, it will be very difficult to catch up. During a reading session you may find that you are having difficulty focusing and concentrating. In other words, you read a page of a textbook, get to the bottom of the

page, and cannot even remember what you read. This happens to everyone because of not focusing. This is the time when you need to stop reading and take on another activity. Get up out of your chair, move around, and take some deep breaths. Taking a walk or some other form of exercise will help clear your mind and get you back on track so that you can focus. You will learn what your individual concentration tolerance is and what activity helps get you back on track; use this as a guide for planning your reading sessions. If you find that after 45 minutes your concentration level diminishes, plan on breaks and a different activity every 45 minutes.

## Study Tip

#### Lifestyle Planning

It is important to plan days that are dedicated entirely to personal relaxation and well-being. Plan days in which you are not required to read and study and can only focus on having fun. This will help you achieve your goals on days that you dedicate to focusing on school work.

As you read your chapters, try to identify what you think will be asked on your nursing exam. Note the chapter headings and bolded vocabulary, and read the information in boxes, charts, and graphs located throughout the chapters in your textbook. In addition to highlighting key points, make margin notes for yourself for study.

## Reading the Preface of the Textbook

Many times students skip the preface of the textbook because they are anxious and excited to learn new information. It is understandable that you are excited to get going on learning all about nursing, but remember that you have an enormous amount of reading in your textbook and that you need to make the best use of your time to accomplish everything that you need to. The preface of your textbook is going to provide valuable information about how to best use the book. It will also provide information about the special student resources available to you for preparing for exams. You may find that a Web site is available that provides practice exam questions that correlate with each chapter in your textbook. Other types of resources commonly used include adaptive learning and quizzing technology, case studies, animations, and virtual excursion experiences or simulations that will enhance your understanding of new material. Take advantage of these valuable resources to prepare yourself for your exams. Practice as many study questions as you can in preparation for the exam, and look at any reports provided to you on your level of preparation. This will give you data on where your strengths and weaknesses are.

## Study Tip

#### **Scope of Practice**

Remember that while you are reading and preparing for nursing exams, you are also preparing to care for a client in the clinical setting. Be aware of the differences in policies and procedures with specific agencies versus national guidelines. Nursing exams and the NCLEX exam are based on national guidelines; therefore, be aware of agency-specific policies and procedures that may not be adopted on a national basis and avoid choosing these options as answers to exam questions.



## **Practice Exam Questions**


The questions on nursing exams are written in very identifiable and structured ways, which are outlined in later chapters of this book. Remember that "practice makes perfect!" So practice as many questions as you can in preparation for your exams. Simply knowing how the questions are structured and becoming familiar and comfortable with what you will encounter will assist you in passing an exam. Get your hands on as many study questions as possible because this will help you be successful not only on nursing examinations but also on the NCLEX exam!

Many nursing textbooks provide practice exam questions at the end of a content chapter and

provide a Web site that contains practice exam questions, so be sure to look for these in your textbook and practice answering these questions. Next, be sure to check the preface in your textbook to locate the Web site for access to additional practice questions. Finally, use your NCLEX review book, and review the content and practice questions that correlate with what you will be tested on. An additional key point to keep in mind after you answer practice questions is to be sure to read the accompanying rationale and test-taking strategy for each question to understand the content and the logical path for answering correctly. Review any reports generated after taking a practice test so you can gauge your progress as you learn new content.

Practice makes perfect!

## **Highlighting Key Points in the Chapter**



As you read, highlight key points. Key points include any information in the text that has to do with the nurse caring for the client. For example, key points would include signs and symptoms of a disorder and nursing interventions. Highlighting key points is especially helpful when it is time to review before an exam because you can reread only what you have highlighted rather than the entire chapter. Highlighting is also helpful to identify points that may require clarification from your instructor.

## Study Tip

#### **Scope of Practice**

When preparing for nursing exams, recall that all answers you choose will be *nursing related*. Note that as the nurse, it is beyond the scope of practice to prescribe treatments or medications or to alter current prescriptions. Keeping this in mind while taking nursing exams will assist you in eliminating incorrect options.

#### **Flash Cards**

Once you have highlighted key points, make some flash cards. Flash cards serve as a study guide, are portable and easy to carry in your backpack, and will help you with studying and reviewing for

an exam. For example, you can list signs and symptoms of a disorder or various laboratory values on a flash card. You can also make electronic flash cards and review them on a smartphone or tablet. Be aware that you may need an Internet connection to review them electronically.




## **Classroom Notes: How Can You Best Use Them?**

#### **How to Take Notes in Class**



Taking good notes is an important part of preparing for an exam. How you take notes in college may differ greatly from how you took them in high school. For example, you may be accustomed to copying notes from a blackboard because this was one way that information was presented. This will differ in college, where notes are not written on a blackboard for you to copy. Now you need to take note of the significant points made by your instructor during in-class activities. Some instructors may provide various types of handouts or other materials to be used as guides during class; even so, these do not replace the need for you to take notes during a class. However, regardless of whether handout materials are provided, one important point to remember is that you will not be able to write down every word that the instructor says, so work at developing your own personal method of shorthand and abbreviations that you will understand. Some faculty may allow you to record the class. This is helpful, but be sure to get permission first. Reading your textbook assignments before class will be extremely helpful with the note-taking process because you will be familiar with the significant points. Some teachers also record lectures ahead of time for students to listen to before class. If this is available, be sure to listen to the lecture before coming to class, after reading your assigned chapters. During class, you can take notes on the significant points made by your instructor, and you will know what these points are if you read the assigned content before going to class. You also will be able to participate more effectively in the in-class activity if the preparation is done beforehand.

## **Using Nursing Class Notes to Prepare for an Exam**



After your class, read and organize your class notes. Combine your class notes with the reading notes that you made when you read your chapters. You will better understand the information if you merge the key points. You can make flash cards for any content area that seems difficult for you; for example, make a flash card that lists the steps in a procedure or the signs and symptoms of a disease. The worst thing you can do is to put your class notes aside until it is time for an exam. You need to read your class notes on a daily basis so you are learning and understanding as the course progresses. Plan a time to have your own mini–study sessions each day to read your notes. One week before the exam, spend more time in your mini–study sessions so that you will be ready. You never want to cram content into your head the night before an exam!

## **Study Guides**

Three possible types of study guides may be available in nursing courses. The first is an ancillary book that accompanies your textbook. This study guide correlates with the chapters of your textbook and provides all sorts of practice exercises and questions designed to reinforce content from the textbook. You may be assigned to complete these chapters in the study guide, and it is important that you do even if your course instructor does not monitor completion of them and even if you do not receive any credit for completing them. Remember, completing the study guide will reinforce content from the textbook. In addition, often some questions and information in the study guide will be placed on your exams as test questions. So take the time to complete your study guides.

## NCLEX® Exam Tip

Use the NCLEX Test Plan as a study guide. Highlight the NCLEX Test Plan content that you have learned and mastered as you proceed through your nursing courses.

The second type of study guide that may be available is one provided by your course instructor. This type of study guide is extremely helpful and lists content areas that you need to be sure you understand. In nursing studies, you will receive a vast amount of information from class handouts, class notes, and the chapter(s) of your textbook. You need to understand all this information. It can be overwhelming to weed through all the information and determine what is important. Therefore, study guides can be most helpful in preparing for an exam because they provide you with a focus or direction of study. So be sure to review the points listed on the study guide. If your instructor listed a certain point in the study guide, then it must be important!

If your course instructor does not provide a study guide, then make your own. As you read the assigned chapters in your textbook, list the important points that you are highlighting. Also, as you review your class notes, add the important points to your self-created study guide. These will be the points that your instructor emphasized or may have said in class, "Be sure that you remember this!"

The third type of study guide is based on electronic learning, through adaptive quizzing or an alternate type of questioning resource that provides you with a report to indicate your progress. The reports generated from these types of resources can be very helpful to both faculty and students to understand where students need to improve. Work with your instructor to best utilize these resources in reinforcing content and learning new content, as well as exam preparation.

## **Study Groups**

Study groups are very helpful for some students, but not for all students, so you need to think about whether they will be helpful to you. The type of learner that you are will guide you in deciding whether a study group will work for you. You may be the type of learner who requires quiet and alone time to absorb the material, or you may be the type of learner who learns best by reviewing content aloud with others. One strategy that you may want to consider is to do your quiet and alone studying, and once you feel that you have mastered the content, then join a study group to reinforce information. Just be sure that you meet your needs, and do not be persuaded to join a study group if it will not work for you. Whether you study alone or with a group, try to anticipate what the instructor may ask on the exam. Also, it is helpful to create your own exam questions for review.



## Standardized Testing: Why Is It So Important?

You may be given a standardized test at the end of each nursing course. This depends on the preference of your nursing program. These tests are administered primarily to assess your mastery of the content you learned in the nursing course. Another valuable purpose of a standardized test is that it provides a detailed report of your strengths and weaknesses and content areas you need to improve on. These reports will help you plan both short-term and long-term goals and provide you with valuable information for planning for the NCLEX exam. Some standardized exam proprietors have conducted research and demonstrated that scores on standardized exams are predictive of NCLEX success. So take these standardized exams seriously and prepare for them, even if they carry no weight with regard to course grading. These are your personalized and individualized study guides for future nursing courses and the NCLEX exam. So get a three-ring binder, label it "My NCLEX Study Guide," and place all your detailed standardized reports in this binder. When it comes time to focus on future exams, primarily the NCLEX exam, you will have what you need to begin and direct your review and study.

## CHAPTER 2

# **Developing Study Skills**

## What Are Good Study Skills?

Having good study skills means you have developed conscious and skillful study habits, devised a consistent study schedule that incorporates methods for learning and understanding nursing content, and established a routine that promotes use of clinical judgment and synthesis of client information. Good study habits develop through time management and discipline. It is important to remember that success comes from working hard, so you should think beyond the task of studying; instead, incorporate study into your daily routine. Time management is an important factor in developing good study habits and skills. In the nursing program, you will be very busy with classes, simulation and skills lab, and clinical experiences. You will need to complete a great deal of reading and assignments and take and pass exams. There are only 24 hours in a day, and you will have a limited number of hours in each day to spend on studying, so you need to use this time as effectively and as efficiently as possible. To help you get started, this chapter discusses some important points for developing these habits and skills. Chapter 1 gives additional study habits and skills as they relate specifically to nursing exams.


## Study Tip

#### Lifestyle Planning

Work hard at staying organized. Keep all of your class notes, binders, papers, and flash cards dated and neatly organized. Taking 5 to 10 minutes every other day to make sure this is done can really help your study habits in the long run. If you use a smartphone, tablet, or other electronic device, be sure you have a way of keeping it charged and connected to the Internet if needed.



## **How Do You Identify and Plan Your Study Times?**



An important part of identifying time for study is using a calendar. The calendar can come in the form of an electronic calendar or the more traditional paper type of calendar. Choose the type that best fits your needs, and let it be your academic life-guide.

At the beginning of each semester, enter your class schedule into your calendar. Once you receive your course syllabus for each course, read it carefully and pay close attention to due dates for assignments and exam dates. Enter these dates in the calendar. In addition, enter into your calendar any other important dates, such as extracurricular activities or other personal activities you have scheduled. Carry your calendar with you when you go to class. The instructor may change an assignment due date or an exam date, so you want to be sure that you can make that change in your calendar. Once all this information has been added to your calendar, you can plan your study times.

## Study Tip

#### **Preparing for Clinical**

Be sure to account for time you will need to prepare for clinical assignments. Also allow time for travel to and from clinical sites and time to complete clinical assignments such as case studies or care plans. Preparation can be time consuming and may take away from study time if it is not properly built into your schedule.

Your calendar or academic life-guide is critical to your success in effectively managing your time and developing a study plan for the semester. Be sure to look at your calendar every day to plan for the following day. Look ahead to the next week, and note what is scheduled (e.g., an exam) or due (e.g., an assignment). If you are diligent about entering your semester schedule and course requirements into your calendar and reviewing your calendar daily, you can easily manage your time in a busy semester.



## What Study Habits Do You Need to Develop?

A habit is a pattern of behavior an individual establishes through repetition of the behavior. Habits can be good or bad, and you need to focus on developing good habits for studying. If you develop good habits and stick to them, you will be successful in the nursing program. You can develop many study habits for yourself, and you may already have some study habits in place you developed while in high school. If you do, and if these worked, integrate these study habits into your college study plan. In addition, use the following top-10 pyramid points and study habits to help plan your study sessions.

## Study Tip

#### Lifestyle Planning

Developing good habits goes beyond attending class, completing assignments, and studying for exams. You also need to have good lifestyle habits, including eating well, getting enough rest, exercising, and having fun. Make sure the fun you have is good, healthy fun and will not cause interruption in your weekly routine.



## **Top-10 Pyramid Points and Study Habits**

#### Pyramid Point and Study Habit 1: Plan Daily Specific Times for Studying

Look at your calendar to identify daily times that are free of any other commitments, such as class or clinical obligations, and make these your study times. Block these times off in your calendar as your study times. If you have breaks between classes, use them for study. For example, if you have a class from 8:00 am to 10:00 am and do not have another class until 1:00 pm, block out the time between these classes as study time. Set regular study time sessions for each day because this will help establish a routine that becomes part of your school life, and remember that it is acceptable to revise your study time sessions if necessary. In other words, if you find a particular study time is not working, select another time to take its place. During your study time be sure your time is spent on something related to your nursing course work.

#### Pyramid Point and Study Habit 2: Try Not to Do Too Much Studying at One Time

It is better to plan more than one study time per day rather than to plan a lengthy block of study time. In other words, plan more than one study session daily. If you try to do too much studying at one time, you will easily tire and you will not be able to concentrate and retain the information. Your study time will be more effective if you space it over shorter periods of time. Always maintain a positive attitude that you will be successful; you are studying and adequately preparing.

#### Pyramid Point and Study Habit 3: Set Goals for Your Study Time

Think about what you want to accomplish during each study time. Set your goal in writing. This will help you keep focused and concentrate on your task at hand. Then work at meeting your goal. If for whatever reason you are unable to meet your set study time goal, do not become discouraged. Just look at where you left off, revise your goals for your next study session, and keep moving forward on your plan!

#### **Pyramid Point and Study Habit 4: Avoid Procrastination**

Stick to your study schedule, and start studying as you planned to do. It is very easy to get off track and procrastinate because "I just do not feel like studying" or "the content or assignment is difficult" or "I would rather be doing something else." If you procrastinate, you will not meet your goals and will need to rush at a later time to complete your work. This places unnecessary stress on you and then you will end up having to cram, so start studying when you planned to. You will feel

great after your study session knowing you accomplished a goal.

# Pyramid Point and Study Habit 5: Study the Most Difficult Material When You Are Most Alert

Some students do best with studying in the early-morning hours, some do better during the daytime hours, and some do best during the evening hours. You need to determine which time is best for you and when you are most rested, are alert, and have the most mental energy. Once you have determined this, use this time to work on your most difficult material. If you have the mental energy and stamina, this difficult material will be easier to grasp.

# Pyramid Point and Study Habit 6: Find a Special Study Place That Is Free of External Distractions

Your special study area should be quiet and comfortable. It can be your dormitory room, a study lounge, the library, a special room at home, or any other quiet area that works for you. Do not plan to study in a crowded or noisy room, such as a student social lounge, cafeteria, or cafe. Find your special area of tranquility, and post a "do not disturb" sign. Be sure that your cell phone is off and that any other phone or the television is off or far enough away from you so that you will not be distracted. Your study area should be adequate and roomy enough to support your necessary books, notes, and other essentials required to make the study session a success. The lighting in your special study area should be soft and provide the right amount of light to allow easy reading. Remember that temperature control is also critical to your comfort. If it is too hot, you may become sleepy. If it is too cold, you may begin to shiver and have difficulty concentrating. So find a room temperature that is comfortable for you. Remember that your special study area should be quiet and comfortable.

# Pyramid Point and Study Habit 7: Seek Help When You Do Not Understand the Material

If you are having difficulty understanding the material, seek help. Remember that in many cases "two heads are better than one." You can ask another student to help explain a difficult content area that you do not understand, but do not ever hesitate to ask your instructor to explain the information to you. During your study session, if you are "stuck" and are not able to understand the information using the resources that are immediately available to you, move on to the next topic. Do not waste your valuable study time. Make note of the information that you do not understand, and seek clarification later. Start the next topic to make the most of the study time you have planned. Make your own "flash cards" to help you remember that difficult-to-learn information.

## Study Tip

#### Student-to-Student

When studying, if you find something you are having difficulty understanding, highlight it and make a note of it so you can ask your instructor for clarification during the next scheduled class or clinical time. In addition, take advantage of scheduled office hours for meeting with your instructor if you need extra help.

#### Pyramid Point and Study Habit 8: Plan Study Breaks

Study breaks are important to keep your mind fresh and alert. All people differ in terms of the length of time that they can sit and study and maintain focus to concentrate, so don't compare your study needs to those of other students. How will you know when you need a study break? If you are having difficulty focusing and are moving through content but are not grasping the material, then you need a study break. If you read a page of content but at the end of the page you do not remember what you read, then you need a study break. If you are experiencing "mind chatter" or are thinking about things other than the task you are supposed to be focusing on, then you need a study break. If you are feeling sleepy or hungry, you need a study break.

#### Pyramid Point and Study Habit 9: Eat a Healthy Diet, and Exercise Regularly

Eating a healthy diet will build and maintain your energy level and your stamina to meet your set goals. Did you know that eating fatty foods will slow you down? Yes they will; so you need to avoid fatty foods. As you will learn in nursing school, nutrition is important for the functioning of every cell in your body. A nurse is also a teacher, and you will be teaching your clients about the importance of eating healthy. So practice what you will be preaching!

Breakfast is an extremely important meal because it starts your day with the fuel that you need to think and perform all the activities ahead of you; however, be sure to eat a *healthy* breakfast. Stay away from bacon, sausage, and high-sugar syrups. Instead, for example, eat a bagel or toast with some peanut butter, cereal, or fruit, and drink some juice. Eat lighter meals and eat more frequently to keep your body fueled and energized. Include complex carbohydrates and protein in your diet for energy. In addition, carry snacks in your backpack for between meals or for your study breaks, but again, be sure that these snacks are healthy ones. Also, be careful not to include too much caffeine in your daily diet. Caffeine will make you jittery and nervous and cause you to have difficulty focusing and concentrating. Remember that a motor vehicle needs gas or it will not run; so think about your body as the motor vehicle needing healthy food to move along and progress efficiently through the day!

Exercising regularly is another extremely important habit to develop. Exercise will enhance or maintain your *physical fitness* and strength and your overall *health*. Regular physical exercise also boosts the immune system, helps prevent disease, and improves your mental health. So get into the habit of exercising regularly. As with healthy eating, you will be teaching your clients about the importance of regular exercise. Again, practice what you will be preaching! What type of exercise should you do? That depends on what you like to do. It can be anything from walking or running to working out at a gym. Even simply getting into the habit of walking to class rather than driving to class will help. Exercise is also a great outlet when you take a study break; take a walk during your break. This will get your circulation flowing, and you will find that your mind will clear and you will be able to focus and concentrate.

## Study Tip

#### Student-to-Student

It is sometimes difficult to build exercise into your daily routine when you are a busy nursing student. Find a time during the day that works best for you to build in even 15 to 20 minutes of physical exercise of some form. If you want to exercise on a higher intensity level, plan to do so on fewer days. For example, if you are exercising intensely for longer periods of time, plan this form of exercise on 2 to 3 days out of the week. If you are exercising mildly or moderately, exercise every day but for shorter amounts of time. It is helpful in planning a routine to exercise at the same time every day. Adopting 1 of these habits will ensure that you are able to fit exercise into your busy schedule.

#### Pyramid Point and Study Habit 10: Get an Adequate Amount of Sleep Every Night

Sleep is like food, air, or water. You need it to think and function adequately, and you need it to survive. Lack of an adequate amount of sleep will cause mental, emotional, and physical fatigue and irritability. Think about it—do you want to go into a classroom to take an exam feeling irritable or mentally, emotionally, or physically fatigued? Of course not, because then you are placing yourself at risk for failure. If you develop a schedule for studying and stick to it, then you will not have to worry about being up all night preparing for an exam the next day. One of the worst things that you can do is to cram the night before an exam and stay up all night studying. If you do this, it will be very difficult to focus and concentrate while taking the exam. If you have developed a structured study plan and stuck to it, the night before the exam will require simply a review of the content. So get into the habit of going to bed at night at a specific time that will provide you with an adequate amount (6 to 8 hours) of quality sleep.

Do you have difficulty falling asleep? If you do, this is probably because you are lying in bed thinking about all sorts of things, such as everything that you need to get done over the next day, the next week, and the remainder of the semester; or you may have other sorts of things on your mind. Whatever it may be that is keeping you awake needs to be eliminated from your mind. How

do you do this? This may be a trial-and-error sort of task that will require implementing various measures or strategies to help you fall asleep until you find the one that will work for you. Remember that a measure that works for someone else may not work for you; however, if you determine what will work for you and get into the habit of implementing this measure repetitively, you will find that you will easily be able to fall asleep at night. Some measures to help you fall asleep are listed in the following box.

## Measures to Promote Sleep

Develop a time schedule for when you will go to bed at night.

Avoid taking naps during the day.

Avoid consuming caffeine-containing drinks and foods.

Eat healthy and exercise regularly (avoid exercise within 3 or 4 hours of bedtime because activity increases metabolism and alertness for a few hours).

Avoid eating heavily close to bedtime.

Adjust the room temperature to meet your physical needs; a cool environment is best.

Keep the lights off in the room at bedtime.

Ensure a quiet environment; place a "sleeping" sign on your door, and use comfortable earplugs if necessary.

Turn your clock around or place it in a drawer so that you cannot see it.

Perform a relaxation technique, such as reading; slow, deep breathing; or meditating.

Use a natural sleep remedy, such as drinking a cup of warm caffeine-free tea.

#### NCLEX® Exam Tip

When you graduate from nursing school and are preparing to take the NCLEX exam, remember that you have been successful up to this point. Therefore, the study habits and study skills that you used during your nursing education were effective. Use these same study habits and study skills to prepare for the NCLEX exam!

## What Study Skills Are Important?



Effective study skills develop once you have your study schedule in place and begin to implement your plan of study. Effective study skills also develop from good study habits. You may already have effective study skills in place that you developed when you were in high school; if you do and these worked for you, continue with these study skills during your nursing education. Remember that everyone is different, and what may work for someone else may not work for you. So it is important to know what works for you! This chapter provides some of the many study skills that you can implement.



## **Good Listening Skills**

It is vital to your success that you become a good listener. Listen, and get to know your instructor. Listen carefully for verbal indicators made by your instructor that will alert you to what is important to note. Some verbal indicators are statements that begin with the words: "Never forget ...," "Please understand ...," or "This is definitely on the NCLEX exam." Listen to the inflection of your instructor's voice, and if he or she suddenly accents some content area, take that note. If your instructor becomes more animated during part of the lecture, pay attention and take note of that content. Finally, whatever the instructor reviews in class is worth highlighting because it will likely be on the next exam as an exam question.

If you are going to succeed as a good listener, you must get your mind prepared before arriving to class. You must leave the daydreaming and "mind chatter" at home and come to class ready to pay close attention to every word the instructor speaks. You may not always find the content being discussed interesting, but keep in mind that you will be tested on the material, and it is your

responsibility to listen and learn.

Always pay attention to what your instructor may write on a classroom board or provide in a handout. If the instructor takes the time to write or diagram something on a board or in a handout, you can be fairly certain that this information will turn up on the exam as an exam question.



## **Effective Note Taking**

Be sure to bring everything you need, such as your notebook, pens, pencils, highlighters, computer, or tablet. Your notebook should have index inserts so you will be able to label sections as necessary, and the binder needs to be secure enough to hold the notebook and any handout material that the instructor distributes to the class. Highlight any key points during the lecture. You may be allowed to bring your laptop computer to class for taking notes. If so, be sure that your computer battery is fully charged and you have easy access to an electrical outlet for recharging. Many teachers will provide PowerPoint presentations. You can take notes in the notes section of the PowerPoint as it is covered during class. If the teacher doesn't use PowerPoint presentations or doesn't lecture during class, notes should be taken during in-class activities such as case studies, group discussions, or simulation.

Good note taking is a talent that requires practice and good listening skills. First, remember that you are taking notes, not writing a novel. You cannot write down every word that the instructor says. Develop a personal shorthand that will help you transcribe the important points of your instructor's lecture. For example, the instructor may say, "The signs and symptoms include nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea." Your shorthand note could read, "S&S=N/V/D." With practice you can develop an abbreviated note-taking style that will work successfully for you. Also, most students find that rewriting their notes after class is a good study habit because it clarifies and reinforces what they have read and learned in class. You may find this strategy valuable to add to your study regimen. Some additional points related to effective note taking are provided in Chapter 1.

## Study Tip

#### **Scope of Practice**

As a nursing student, you will be documenting in the medical record on your assigned clients. Remember that when documenting in a medical record you can only use acceptable agency abbreviations. Always follow agency guidelines for using abbreviations when documenting.



## **Reading Skills**

In nursing, reading involves active involvement with your textbook. Plan to do detailed reading to extract information accurately. In other words, do not scan or skim the content in the textbook chapter. In addition, always have a medical/nursing dictionary with you when you study; when you come across a word that you never heard of (e.g., edema, which means swelling), look it up and make note of it in your notebook as a new vocabulary word. Chapter 1 provides strategies to implement when you are reading your textbook. Some additional strategies include the following:

- 1. Read one section at a time under each major heading. Highlight the key points. Develop some questions that come to mind, and write these questions in your notebook. Find the answers to the questions, and if necessary, plan to bring the question to class for further clarification.
- 2. After you finish reading some of the sections under major headings, look again at the questions that you developed and think about the answers. If you were not able to recall the answers, review these sections in the text again. Then continue reading the chapter.
- 3. After you have read the entire chapter, review all the highlighted key points and any notes that you made, and review the questions that you have developed to see if you can answer them. If you cannot, then review these areas in the chapter again. It may also be helpful to make a flash card for any information that is difficult.



## **Interactive Learning**

Many textbooks are bundled with electronic interactive learning resources. It is recommended that you read the chapter first, then use the interactive learning and quizzing resources to reinforce what was learned. These resources typically utilize a questioning format and produce results reflecting student progress. Students can use this report to determine if more studying is required and what content they should focus on.



## **Remembering Content**

Remembering what you have listened to in class and remembering what you read and study are essential for your success in passing exams, success in future nursing courses, and success on the NCLEX exam. If you are unable to remember what you learned, then you will be unable to apply the information in future nursing courses, in the clinical setting, or on the NCLEX exam. Some strategies for remembering content include rewriting class notes, reading your class notes every day, doing the required reading before coming to class, highlighting key points in your textbook as you read, completing study guides provided for you, and creating flash cards for the material that is difficult for you. Chapter 1 provides points related to these strategies.

An additional strategy that you can use to remember content is to develop an acronym; a mnemonic device; or easily remembered letters, words, or phrases for difficult information. Many times your instructor will identify ways to remember difficult information, but you can develop these on your own or with your classmates. Three examples of these are regular and NPH insulin, decorticate versus decerebrate posturing, and MAOIs.

## Regular Insulin and NPH Insulin-RN

*RN*—When mixing regular and NPH insulin in the same syringe, draw up the *R*egular insulin first, followed by the *N*PH insulin. Remember the acronym *RN* when mixing both these types of insulin in the same syringe.

Tip for the nursing student: Insulin is a medication that is prescribed for some clients with diabetes mellitus. Many times it is necessary to administer both regular and NPH insulin, and these insulins may need to be mixed in the same syringe. There is a procedure for mixing these insulins, and it is important to draw the regular insulin into the syringe first. You will learn about this procedure when you study medication administration. You will also learn about this procedure in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study endocrine disorders.

## Decorticate Posturing versus Decerebrate Posturing

In decorticate (flexor) posturing, the upper extremities (arms, wrists, fingers) are flexed on the chest. In other words, the upper extremities are brought to the *core* of the body; whereas in decerebrate (extensor) posturing, the upper extremities are stiffly extended with internal rotation and pronation of the palms. Therefore, when trying to distinguish the characteristics of each type of posturing, remember that in decorticate, the upper extremities are brought to the *core* of the body.

*Tip for the nursing student:* Posturing is an abnormal position assumed by a client with a neurological disorder and indicates deterioration in the client's condition. You will learn about posturing in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study neurological disorders.

## Monoamine Oxidase Inhibitors (MAOIs)

MAOIs are antidepressants and include the following medications: *P*henelzine sulfate *T*ranylcypromine sulfate *I*socarboxazid *S*elegiline

Remembering the acronym *PTIS* as meaning *P*lease *T*ake *I*t *S*eriously will assist in remembering the medications that belong in the MAOI classification.

Tip for the nursing student: MAOIs are medications that are used to treat depression. Adverse effects are associated with this classification of medications, and clients must follow specific dietary measures when taking them. Therefore, it is important to know which medications are in the classification of MAOIs. You will learn about MAOIs in your pharmacology and your psychiatric/mental health nursing courses.

## Study Tip

#### **Scope of Practice**

As a student in the clinical environment, you will create your own acronyms to use in certain situations, such as an acronym for an electrocardiogram (ECG) pattern and its interpretation. These acronyms will assist you in nursing practice, but remember that these cannot be used for documentation unless they are acceptable for use by the clinical agency.



# **Critical Thinking Skills**

Critical thinking skills involve an intellectual process of actively analyzing information. It is essential that you develop good critical thinking skills because you will be making very important decisions in the clinical setting when you care for clients. In the clinical setting, you will gather information and then will need to analyze, synthesize, and apply this information, make decisions, and evaluate the outcome.

Critical thinking skills take time to develop, but if you are mindful of the fact that you need to develop these skills, you can set some goals for yourself regarding becoming a critical thinker. So what can you do to develop critical thinking skills? One strategy that you can begin with is curiosity. Consistently ask yourself questions as you read nursing content. Write these questions in your notebook and then present them in class for discussion. This discussion will generate critical thinking among your classmates. Another strategy to develop critical thinking skills is to learn content from an analytical perspective. In other words, be creative. Look at a collection of information that you are learning, and instead of simply learning the facts, think about the information in an investigative manner. For example, if you are learning about standard precautions (a basic level of infection control that should be used in the care of all clients all of the time to reduce the risk of transmission of microorganisms), do not simply remember that handwashing must be done before and after contact with a client or that gloves are worn when coming in contact with blood or body fluid excretions and secretions. Think about this content critically, and question why these procedures need to be followed. Critical thinking takes more time and energy than simply learning facts and content, but it is an essential part of the learning process in nursing. So work at it, and make it a habit to be curious and creative and think about things critically.

# Study Tip

#### **Preparing for Clinical**

An integral part of your success as a student in clinical is your ability to think critically. You will be assigned to care for a client (or clients) and will be required to interpret pertinent information regarding the client's status and determine the important nursing considerations with regard to client care. Gather all of your client's information before the clinical session and think critically by determining why certain medications and treatments are prescribed for the client and why the client may have a certain laboratory result or diagnostic finding.



## When Should You Start to Study for an Exam?

Studying for an exam begins the moment your course begins and you start reading your textbooks, attending class, and taking notes. Always pay close attention to the syllabus for upcoming test dates and use the syllabus as a planning guide. Plan and schedule daily study sessions for yourself, and read your class notes taken up to that point, with a particular focus on your new notes, the notes taken that day. This is an important part of preparing for an exam so that you will not be faced with cramming the night before. Procrastinating and waiting until the last minute to prepare for an exam are two of the worst things that you can do because these place unnecessary pressure on you and set the stage for developing test anxiety. So start preparing right away. One week before a scheduled exam, increase the time that you spend in your study session. The amount of time that you need to plan for your study sessions depends on the type of learner that you are and how quickly you are able to grasp the new content and material. A guideline that you may want to use to begin scheduling your study sessions is to plan 1 hour of study for every 3 hours of class time. So, for example, if your nursing class is scheduled for 3 hours, then plan for a 1-hour review of your notes after the class. Then 1 week before the exam, increase the time that you spend in each study session to 2 hours of study for every 3 hours of class time. This is only a guideline to help you think about planning and is not a rigid rule that needs to be strictly followed. Remember that everyone is different when it comes to learning needs, so think about what works best for you and plan accordingly. Chapter 1 provides additional information regarding using your class notes to prepare for an exam.

## Will a Study Group Work for You?

This question is one that only you can answer. If the idea of studying in a group environment has worked for you in the past and you feel comfortable with this type of study arena, by all means continue this way of studying. If you are the type of learner who needs to be alone to study in order to master the content, then a study group will not work. Some combination of alone study time and group study time may also be an option for you. In other words, you can plan to study on your own, and once you are comfortable with the content and think that you have mastered it, join a study group to help reinforce content.

Study groups can be very helpful when preparing for an exam, but the study team needs to be motivated and stay on track with regard to the goal of the group. A study group can easily get off track and waste time discussing "outside of study" issues. If this happens, then the goals of the group may not be met. Be sure to join a study group that has the same goals as you, and be sure that your study partners have personalities that are compatible with yours so that you can easily work together. This will help with motivating and driving each other to meet group goals.

The size of the study group should be between three and five, and every group member needs to come to the study time prepared to participate. When the study group is initially created, group goals and expectations should be developed. Each study session should have established goals and work to achieve the study goals within the study time. Each group member should accept a task with regard to the contribution or role he or she will take as a member of the group. For example, if the content for a scheduled exam includes the medical-surgical areas of angina, myocardial infarction, and heart failure, then each group member should accept a topic area or a part of it for presentation at the study group session. At the end of each study session, the group members should decide when the next study group session will be, what the goals for the session will be, and each member's assignment. Remember that study groups are made of individuals and each individual is a part of the team. If each team member contributes to the study session as planned, then the team will succeed. Chapter 1 provides additional information about study groups.

# CHAPTER 3

# **Reducing Test Anxiety**

## What Is Test Anxiety?

Test anxiety is a psychological condition that can cause a significant amount of stress related to preparing for and taking an examination. Test anxiety is a type of performance anxiety because the individual is under pressure to do well in order to pass. A person with test anxiety experiences tension and stress before, during, and possibly after finishing an exam. Test anxiety can block the thinking processes and cause poor performance with testing, regardless of the amount of preparation for the exam. This chapter provides some tips and strategies to help you prevent test anxiety and to reduce the anxiety if it occurs. However, if you feel that your test anxiety is so overwhelming that you are unable to focus or concentrate, seek assistance. As a starting point, you may want to contact your advisor to discuss your test anxiety experiences.



# **How Can You Know If You Have Test Anxiety?**

You have attended all your classes, you have done all your reading assignments, you have participated in class discussions, and you followed your study plan. Then the day of the test arrives, and you feel so nervous that you freeze up and are unable to focus, think, or concentrate. It is normal to feel a little nervous and stressed before a test, and actually a little anxiety can keep you sharp and alert during testing. But if the anxiety is overwhelming and you cannot control it, your thinking processes will be blocked, you will have difficulty focusing and concentrating, and you will forget the material that you learned.

Anxiety related to taking an examination can cause various symptoms. Test anxiety can bring on a feeling of "butterflies in the stomach," a stomachache, nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea. Test anxiety also can cause headaches, excessive sweating, a rapid heart rate (feeling like the heart is pounding), and rapid breathing. Some students may describe their physical feelings related to test anxiety as "I feel like throwing up" or "I feel like I might pass out." Test anxiety can also cause overwhelming feelings of helplessness and a sense of feeling out of control of the situation.

## Study Tip

#### Student-to-Student

When you arrive at the place where you will be taking a test, do not discuss your methods of preparation, what you studied, or the content that you think may be on the test with other students. Other students may bring up content that you feel as though you didn't prepare enough for, causing your anxiety to increase.

## What Causes Test Anxiety?

Taking a test can be stressful because you know that you need to perform well to pass the exam. Physiologically, when you feel stressed your body releases a hormone called *adrenaline*, which prepares you for the stressful situation. This is called the *fight or flight response* and is the same physiological response that occurs when someone encounters a dangerous situation. When the adrenaline is released, the physical symptoms of sweating, the heart pounding, and rapid breathing occur.

Someone who worries about everything or who thinks that he or she needs to achieve a perfect test score is likely to experience test anxiety. This person, who may be termed a *perfectionist*, may find it difficult to obtain anything less than a perfect score and may experience test anxiety because of the great pressure and stress being placed on oneself.

A person with negative thoughts about how he or she will perform promotes test anxiety. Previous experiences, such as poor performance on a previous test, can affect how one might feel about testing. Negative experiences can affect self-confidence and the belief that one can be successful. Focusing on the negative takes a lot of energy and drains the individual of energy needed to perform because it causes fatigue and makes the individual feel worse. This pessimistic view of how one might perform creates more intense feelings of anxiety and distracting thoughts, setting the stage for failure on the exam.

## Study Tip

#### Lifestyle Planning

Planning your time and ensuring there is enough uninterrupted time allotted to preparing for exams will help avoid the experience of test anxiety. Look as far ahead as possible in the semester in planning life commitments and obligations, and ensure that you plan accordingly around exam dates.

Another cause of test anxiety is a lack of preparation for the exam. If you are not prepared for an exam, then you will be worried about passing, and this will produce anxiety. Anxiety from lack of preparation occurs as a result of failing to organize and manage your time, poor study habits, not studying enough, or feeling tired because of being up all night and cramming for the test.



# **What Will Help Prevent Test Anxiety?**

One important way to prevent test anxiety is to be as prepared as possible for the exam. Time management and a structured study plan also prevent test anxiety because you are planning ahead and working on preparing for a test and other assignments well in advance of the scheduled date. You cannot procrastinate. Procrastinating places unnecessary pressure on you, creating test anxiety or making test anxiety worse. If you study daily rather than cramming at the last minute, you will know the content well enough so that you can recall it even if you are stressed. Preparation also builds your confidence because you will feel more comfortable about knowing the material. Refer to Chapters 1 and 2, which provide specific tips and strategies on study habits, study skills, and time management that will help you prepare for an exam. Incorporating these tips and strategies on test preparation into your academic life will help prevent test anxiety.

# What Can You Do When You Are Experiencing Test Anxiety?



Relaxation techniques can help when you experience test anxiety because they relax you and help you gain control. Several types of relaxation techniques that you can use include resting your eyes, muscle relaxation/tightening exercises, meditation, or breathing exercises. Use whatever technique works for you. Breathing exercises are a commonly used technique that can be done at any time, including during your testing. These exercises will not only help relax you but also oxygenate your body. Think about it: you would ask a postoperative client whose pulse oximetry reading is low to take slow, deep breaths. When the client takes the breaths, what happens? The pulse oximetry reading rises. This same effect will occur for you if you take slow, deep breaths, which will increase oxygenation throughout your body and tissues and help you relax and control your anxiety. In addition, the slow, deep breaths will give your body and brain an oxygen boost. And wouldn't you want your brain to be as oxygenated as possible when taking the exam?



Now how do you effectively take slow, deep breaths? If you become anxious before or during the exam or if you are having difficulty sleeping the night before the exam, sit or lie in a comfortable position, close your eyes, relax, inhale deeply through your nose, hold your breath to a count of 4, exhale slowly through your mouth, and, again, relax. Repeat this breathing exercise several times until you begin to feel relaxed and free from anxiety. During the exam, if you find that you are becoming anxious and distracted and are having difficulty focusing, sit back, close your eyes, and perform your breathing exercises to help relax and get oxygen moving through your body. Remember that the slow, deep-breathing exercises will help you relax and gain control of the moment.

## Study Tip

#### **Scope of Practice**

Whenever a client experiences anxiety related to his or her condition, an upcoming procedure, or other event, the nurse is the person who is there to help the client work through the anxiety. Think about what you tell your clients to make them feel more at ease and implement the same strategies on exam day. To relieve your own anxiety, use trial-and-error techniques to find what works best for you.

## **Breathing Exercises**

Sit or lie in a comfortable position.

Close your eyes.

Relax.

Inhale deeply through your nose.

Hold your breath to a count of 4.

Exhale slowly through your mouth and relax.

Repeat until you begin to feel relaxed and free from anxiety.


## What Is Positive Pampering, and Why Is It Important?



Positive pampering means that you take care of yourself from a holistic perspective. It helps maintain an academic and nonacademic balance as you prepare for any examination, which in turn will help alleviate some anxiety. You need to care for yourself by including physical activity, fun and relaxation, and a balanced and healthy diet in your preparation plan. You can implement several measures, identified next, to be sure that you are caring for you. Specific interventions for these measures are described in Chapter 2 under the heading "Top-10 Pyramid Points and Study Habits." Be sure to read this section to help you incorporate positive pampering strategies into your daily academic life.

# Remember, pamper yourself to maintain balance!

Just as you have developed a schedule for studying, you need a schedule that includes some fun and some form of physical activity. It is your choice—aerobics, running, weight lifting, bowling, a movie, a massage, going to the beach, or whatever makes you feel good about yourself. Time spent away from a hard study schedule and devoted to some form of fun and physical exercise pays its rewards 100-fold. You will feel more energetic and less anxious about your upcoming exam with a schedule that includes these activities.

Establish a balanced diet and healthy eating habits if you have not already done so. Eat lighter and well-balanced meals, and eat more frequently. Include complex carbohydrates and protein in your diet for energy. Avoid caffeine because it will make you jittery and anxious, and avoid eating fatty foods because they will slow you down and make you feel sleepy. # What Should You Do the Night Before the Exam?

Remember to avoid cramming the night before the exam because this will increase your test anxiety. Prepare ahead, and rest your body and your mind. Remember that the mind is like a muscle, and if it is overworked, it has no strength or stamina. Therefore, on the night before the exam, as long as you have prepared well and followed your study plan all along, put your textbook and notes away and get to bed early. At bedtime perform deep-breathing exercises and listen to soothing music to help you relax and fall asleep. Set your alarm clock, and plan to get up 15 to 30 minutes earlier than usual to have some time to wake up and eat a healthy breakfast. If possible, walk to class on the day of the exam to get the circulation and oxygen moving throughout your body. Remember that you have prepared yourself well for the challenge of the day.

## Study Tip

## Lifestyle Planning

Finding someone with whom you can exercise on a regular basis will help ensure that you incorporate this important aspect into your daily schedule. You will find that exercise will help you better focus when you study and ultimately will contribute to your success as a nursing student.



# **How Can You Control Your Test Anxiety Before**

## the Exam?

Before the examination you may become anxious and think, "I am not ready!" As a nursing student, it is important to remember that it is very difficult to feel 100% prepared for an exam. This feeling is not necessarily caused by inadequate preparation and is usually caused by test anxiety. First, stay away from peers who are experiencing anxiety before the exam. These peers may be discussing content and what might be asked on the test, and this is going to cause confusion and fear about preparing well enough, contributing to anxiety. Next, stop whatever you are doing and reflect on all that you have accomplished in your preparation plan. Sit quietly somewhere where you can concentrate on relaxing and tell yourself that you indeed prepared adequately for the test and are ready. Smile, brush those negative feelings away, do your breathing exercises, and keep repeating to yourself, "I am going to do well. I am prepared." Repeating this statement will build the extra confidence that you need by helping you maintain a positive attitude, relax, and focus before the exam.



# **How Can You Control Your Test Anxiety During**

## the Exam?

During the exam if you begin to experience any anxious feelings, sit back in your chair, close your eyes, and perform a relaxation technique, such as breathing exercises. These will help relax you. The breathing exercises are also helpful if you begin to feel your mind wandering, if you feel distracted, or if you are unable to concentrate on the test question. Oxygenating your body will help you focus and concentrate on the exam question.

## Study Tip

### Student-to-Student

When looking at an exam question, always remember that with most question types, the correct answer or answers are there in front of you. Using the process of elimination and narrowing down your options using nursing knowledge and test-taking strategies will help you select the correct answer(s).

Develop a structured sequence for approaching and taking the exam to help control anxiety, and use this pattern with each exam that you take. What happens if you are presented with a difficult question and have no idea what the answer should be? You become anxious, you feel as if you did not prepare well enough, and your self-confidence diminishes. To avoid this, follow the structured sequence outlined next.

## Structured Sequence for Taking an Exam

Place your name on the test and on any other required testing documents.\* Read the directions.

Skim through the pages in the test so that you have an idea of how to pace yourself.\*

If you are allowed to write on the test, jot down data that you needed to memorize and may need as a reference, such as a laboratory value. Remember though that you will not be able to do this when you take the NCLEX. Jotting down data is known as *brain dumping* and is not allowed when you take the NCLEX.\*

Read each question and all options slowly and carefully.

Take your time when answering a question.

Use nursing knowledge and test-taking strategies to help you answer the question.

Skip any questions that are difficult.\*

Answer all the questions that you know and that are easy for you to answer.\*

Once you have answered all the easy questions, go back to the questions that were difficult.\*

# NCLEX® Exam Tip

On a pencil-and-paper nursing exam taken in nursing school, 1 strategy is to skip questions that are difficult and go back to them once you have answered as many as you can. On the NCLEX exam, you need to remember that you will not be able to skip a question and then go back to it. On the NCLEX exam, you must answer the question on the computer screen in front of you or the test will not advance. So be prepared for this type of testing when you take the NCLEX exam.

## That Positive Attitude: How Can You Maintain It?



Maintaining a positive attitude will lead to success. It is natural to be a bit apprehensive about the path before you, especially if you are a beginning nursing student; but it is critical to your continued success that you believe in yourself and your ability to confidently conquer the challenges in your nursing program. Surround yourself with positive thoughts and positive people, and remember that your self-confidence in your ability to succeed is critical to your continued success.

# Study Tip

## **Preparing for Clinical**

It is normal to become anxious before going to clinical. Actions you can take to decrease this anxiety include researching your client's condition, any related diagnostic tests, laboratory results, and prescribed medications and treatments. Researching in advance will best prepare you, thus making the experience less anxiety producing. If you are not anxious or nervous, you will be able to perform at your best, so use these tips to reduce your anxiety when preparing to care for clients.

### "Yes, I can do this."

When you start to fall into the trap of negative thought, stop! Control the moment, and believe in who you are! Step out of the negative and into the positive, and do not allow anything to stand in your path to success. The one phrase that should become your mantra is "Yes, I can do this." When you open your eyes in the morning and need to face a difficult day, this positive phrase should be your first thought. Use visual reinforcement to help maintain your positive attitude. On a piece of paper write the words "Yes, I can do this," and keep this with you always. When you face a difficult challenge or need to take an exam and have test anxiety, place these written words in front of you so that you can see them. You will constantly be reminded of your self-confidence and ability to be successful.

# **CHAPTER 4**

# **NCLEX®** Preparation



# Where Does Preparation Begin?


NCLEX preparation began the moment you entered your nursing program. Your nursing courses, clinical experiences, reading and other assignments and activities, and any standardized examinations that may have been required to be taken prepared you for the NCLEX exam. In addition, all the practice questions that you reviewed from your course textbooks and NCLEX review book have reinforced content, refined your knowledge base and critical thinking and reasoning skills, and provided practice with test-taking strategies and how to answer a test question correctly. When you become an advanced student nurse and in your final year of nursing school, NCLEX preparation will become your highest-priority focus. At that time you need to fine-tune your nursing knowledge base, critical thinking and reasoning skills, and test-taking skills. You may feel overwhelmed and just not sure where to begin preparing for the NCLEX exam. You may even become more overwhelmed when you look at all the boxes of class notes that you have accumulated and all the textbooks that you have read during nursing school. Now you are saying to yourself, "Where do I start?" Let us look at some points about the NCLEX exam and your plan for preparation!

## Study Tip

### **Scope of Practice**

When preparing for the NCLEX exam, as you begin to practice questions, always remember that the answer will most likely be something nursing related and within the scope of nursing practice. However, it is important to be familiar with the scopes of practice of other members of the interprofessional team so that appropriate consultations can be made; you may encounter questions on the NCLEX regarding consulting and making referrals.

# The NCLEX Test Plan: Why Is It So Important?



An important strategy for success is to become as familiar as possible with the NCLEX test plan. You can experience a significant amount of anxiety as you face the challenge of this examination. Knowing what the examination is all about will assist in alleviating your fear and anxiety.

The test plan for the NCLEX exam is developed by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN). This test plan is developed based on state laws and regulations, including nursing practice acts, and research studies done with newly licensed nurses to determine the nursing activities that they perform. Once this information is identified, the NCSBN formulates the test plan, and the test questions for the NCLEX exam are written. All the information that you will need about the test plan can be located at the NCSBN Web site at www.ncsbn.org. In fact, when you access this Web site, you are able to download a copy of the current test plan for your use. The test plan identifies the framework of the NCLEX exam and lists content areas and nursing activities that you will be tested on. This is an extremely valuable resource and can be used as one of your study guides for preparing for the NCLEX exam. Pearson Vue is the agency that delivers the examination provided by the NCSBN. Through this agency, you will schedule your NCLEX test date and testing center. An additional fee must be paid to Pearson Vue before testing can occur. See the following boxes for the NCSBN contact information and Pearson Vue contact information.

# Study Tip

## Lifestyle Planning

When you download the NCLEX test plan, keep in mind that it is very lengthy. Download this test plan early on in your nursing program so you can plan your time around addressing all of the topics identified in the plan. You can make out a study calendar that will work for you to be sure that you address all areas.


In addition to the test plan, the NCSBN Web site provides information about the examination process, registering for the NCLEX exam, scheduling a test date, the testing center, and processing results. A tutorial is available to provide you with the experience of answering questions on the NCLEX exam. Multiple-choice questions and alternate item format questions are also available for practice. So take the time to visit the NCSBN Web site and find out everything you need to know about the test plan and the testing experience. Remember that you want to face this challenge with as much information as possible, and knowing what the test is all about will help alleviate your anxiety!

# Study Tip

## **Preparing for Clinical**

Accessing the NCSBN Web site and reading the NCLEX test plan as early as possible in your nursing program can be of great benefit to you. Look at the learning activities listed in the test plan, and prepare to seek out these activities during your clinical experiences. This will also help prepare you for the NCLEX exam.

# **Step 1: Your Self-Assessment**

The first step in preparing for the NCLEX exam is a self-assessment. Your self-assessment is important because it will guide your development of a structured and individualized preparation plan. Open your "My NCLEX Study Guide" binder, and review any notes that you have taken about your strengths or weaknesses. Also review any detailed reports from standardized tests that you have taken, because these reports provide extremely valuable information about your areas of strength and the areas that you need to particularly focus on. If you have not yet set up your binder labeled "My NCLEX Study Guide," you want to do so to begin your preparation for the NCLEX exam. If you do not have copies of standardized test results or did not take standardized tests in your nursing program, then use your NCLEX review book to perform a self-assessment. Access the accompanying Web site in your NCLEX review book to take a pretest assessment exam or a 100-question comprehensive exam. Print out the results, place the printout in your "My NCLEX Study Guide" binder, and identify your areas of strength and weakness to assist you in determining your preparation plan and goals.

## Study Tip

### **Preparing for Clinical**

Maintaining client confidentiality, build a portfolio of the clients for whom you cared and their diagnoses, noting the important aspects of nursing care you provided. You can then use this as a resource when preparing for your exams and for the NCLEX.

## **Step 2: Your Preparation Plan and Goals**

Your self-assessment is an ongoing process. Your next step in your preparation plan and goals is to answer some specific self-assessment questions. The Top-10 Self-Assessment Questions are listed next with some pyramid points to consider as you develop a plan of preparation and goals.

### The Top-10 Self-Assessment Questions and Pyramid Points

# Question 1: What do I feel are my strong and weak areas in nursing content, and what strong and weak areas were identified in standardized testing or other assessment tests that I took?

Prioritize your plan of study, listing your weakest to your strongest area(s). You want to plan to begin your NCLEX preparation by reviewing your weakest content areas first; once you have demonstrated improvement in your weak area(s), proceed to review your stronger area(s).

### Question 2: How do I normally study for exams: alone or in groups?

Study groups are very helpful for some students, but not for all students. So you need to think about whether they will help you. You may be the type of learner who requires quiet and alone time to absorb the material, or you may be the type of learner who learns best by reviewing content aloud with others. Continue to do what you have done during your nursing program. If you studied alone, then this is what you should do to prepare for the NCLEX exam. You need to meet your needs, so do not be persuaded to join a study group if it will not work for you. You have been successful thus far, so keep doing what you were doing!

## Question 3: Where is my special study place?

Think about how you have normally studied for your nursing exams and where you have studied. If you normally study alone in the early morning, then plan to study at this time. If you have a special study place, then continue to use it. Do not change these study habits, because they have worked for you in the past. Do what you normally do, and stick to that special study place that you use throughout nursing school!

### Question 4: Am I comfortable with using a computer?

Most nursing students are quite comfortable using a computer. If this is not the case, then you need to use a computer so that when you take the NCLEX exam, any anxiety related to testing on a computer is eased. If you do not have a computer, then locate one that you can use, such as at your nursing school, school library, or a public library. Use the Web site that accompanies your NCLEX review book to begin studying by practicing test questions. In addition, while using the computer, access the NCSBN Web site and do the tutorial and any other NCLEX-related practice sessions provided.

### Question 5: Do I complete exams within the allotted time?

You will have 6 hours to complete the NCLEX-RN exam and 5 hours for the NCLEX-PN exam. The maximum number of questions that need to be answered on the NCLEX-RN is 265, and the maximum number on the NCLEX-PN exam is 205. Therefore, if each question on the NCLEX exam was individually timed, you would have approximately 1.35 minutes for each question on the NCLEX-RN exam and approximately 1.46 minutes for each question on the NCLEX-PN exam. If you did not have a problem completing exams within the allotted time in nursing school, then you will probably not have a problem completing the NCLEX exam within the allotted time. If you had

a problem completing exams on time in nursing school, then you need to work on picking up your speed with answering questions without jeopardizing the quality of how you are thinking through the question and answering it. You may ask, "How do I do this?" Practicing is the answer! Use an alarm clock, or set an alarm on your cell phone. Access the Web site that accompanies your NCLEX review book and select a 100-question exam. Allow approximately 1.35 minutes or 1.46 minutes for each question, depending on which NCLEX exam you are preparing to take. For example, if you are preparing for the NCLEX-RN exam, set the alarm to ring in 135 minutes (or 2.25 hours). When the alarm rings, note how many questions you have completed. If you did not complete the 100 questions in the allotted time, note how many were unanswered. Then you need to work on picking up speed. Keep practicing until you are able to complete a 100-question test in the allotted time without jeopardizing the quality of how you are answering the questions.

# Question 6: Do I have balance in life; do I exercise, have fun, relax, and eat a balanced and healthy diet?

Balance in life is extremely important if you want to be successful. Remember that all work and no play is not healthy. You cannot spend every hour of every day preparing for the NCLEX exam. You need to develop a study plan and stick to it, but you also need time to relax, have some fun, and eat healthy, because a healthy diet will build and maintain your energy level and your stamina to meet your set goals. Chapter 2 provides specific strategies related to exercise and eating healthy.

### Question 7: Do I have test anxiety, and how do I control it?

Controlling your test anxiety is a must. Some anxiety is useful because it keeps your senses sharp and alert, and you definitely want to feel sharp and alert on the day of the NCLEX exam. However, overwhelming anxiety can block your thinking and become an obstacle. So think about what you did when you had to take exams during nursing school, and use these same strategies. Also, be sure to read Chapter 3 for strategies to reduce your test anxiety.

### Question 8: Am I able to focus and concentrate during an exam?

If it is difficult to focus and concentrate during an exam, sit back in your chair and close your eyes. Inhale deeply through your nose, hold your breath to a count of 4, exhale slowly through your mouth, and relax. Repeat this breathing exercise four or five times, and then go back to the questions on the exam. These breathing exercises will fill your body and cells, including your brain cells, with oxygen. This will help you regain control, and you will be better equipped to focus and concentrate.

### Question 9: Am I able to practice self-discipline and stick to a study plan?

Self-discipline is the ability to get yourself to do what you planned, such as adhering to a study plan, regardless of how you feel. It is very easy to get off track with your study plan because "I just do not feel like studying," or because "I would rather be doing something else." If you do not practice self-discipline, you will not meet your goals. Remember that every successful person works hard and has a great deal of self-discipline. If you want to be successful, practice self-discipline and stick to your study plan. You will feel great after your study session knowing that you accomplished your goal.


### Question 10: Do I have a positive attitude?

A positive attitude will lead to success. You must stay positive about your ability to pass the NCLEX exam. Do not for one moment ever think that you will fail—no negative thoughts! On a large piece of paper write your name in large letters across the top. Now underneath your name, in large letters, write the letters RN or LPN, depending on what your credentials will be when you become licensed. Now doesn't that piece of paper with your name and credentials on it look great? Keep this with you always, especially during your study sessions. This visual will change any negative thoughts that you may have into positive ones!

# NCLEX® Exam Tip

After you graduate from your nursing program, plan to spend at least 2 hours daily preparing for

the NCLEX exam. Open your calendar, and mark off days that you have obligations or commitments and will not be able to spend any time on NCLEX preparation. For the remaining days, set a 2-hour time schedule for NCLEX preparation time that will work for you considering your family and personal responsibilities. This is your time and needs to be uninterrupted, so shut off your cell phone and close off the world. This will help you concentrate and make the most of your preparation time. Remember, though, that you need to maintain balance in your life, so during your off-study hours, exercise, relax, and have fun.



# Study Tip

### Lifestyle Planning

When scheduling your study time, involve your family and friends in this planning. Make them aware of the fact that at this time you need their support in preparing for your exam. If they are involved in planning your study schedule, they will be supportive, and you will likely be better able to meet your goals successfully.

# Your Preparation Plan

Do not change your study habits.

Review your weakest areas first.

Plan a 2-hour daily study session.

Practice a minimum of 4000 questions before taking NCLEX.

Review all rationales and test-taking strategies accompanying your practice questions.

Learn ways to control your test anxiety.

Eat healthy and make time to relax, exercise, and have fun.

# **Step 3: Scheduling a Testing Date**

Many nursing graduates ask the question, "How long should I wait to schedule an exam date for the NCLEX exam?" There is no easy or cut-and-dry answer to this question. This is a very individualized decision based on how much preparation you need to do, your goals, your preparation plan, and your time frame for implementation of your plan. You definitely need to prepare for this exam—this is critical. However, it is also extremely important that you do not wait

too long. So, depending on your individual preparation needs, how much preparing you need to do, and how much time you have to prepare, schedule a date within  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 months after graduation. Then, after graduation, get working on implementing your preparation plan. So get yourself ready and take that exam!

## NCLEX® Exam Tip

If for any reason you need to change your appointment to test, you can make the change on the candidate Web site or by calling candidate services. Refer to the NCLEX Examination Candidate Bulletin for this contact information and other important procedures for canceling and changing an appointment.

## **Step 4: Implementing Your Preparation Plan**

Do not for a moment think that the way you will prepare for this exam is to read all your class notes and textbooks cover to cover. This is not the way to prepare for the NCLEX exam, and just the thought of doing this can exacerbate your sense of being overwhelmed. Place your boxes of class notes in a closet out of your sight. The information in them is much too detailed to assist in your preparation. Use your textbooks as a reference to review content areas that you find difficult when you are answering your practice test questions.

## Study Tip

### Student-to-Student

Getting an NCLEX review book early on in your nursing program is important. You can review your course textbook and class notes to prepare for nursing exams, and then polish up your test preparation by using your NCLEX review book to answer as many practice questions as you can related to the content area that you will be tested on. This practice will ultimately help you in preparing for NCLEX as well!

### Practicing answering test questions is a must!

Practicing answering test questions is a must, and the best way to prepare for the NCLEX exam is to practice question after question after question on a computer. Practicing answering test questions yields a two-fold reward: (1) you will strengthen your knowledge base of nursing content, and (2) you will become skillful in the use of test-taking strategies. The more you practice, the more prepared you will be for this exam. You should practice answering a minimum of 4000 NCLEX-style practice questions before taking the exam. This is very individualized, and to be proficient and skilled with answering exam questions correctly, many graduates need to practice answering even more than the minimum and need to practice between 4500 and 5000 NCLEX-style questions before taking the exam. You also need to score at least an 85% on your practice tests; if you do not obtain this score, then you need to review the relevant content and again answer practice questions in your area of difficulty until you can achieve at least an 85%. It is important to remember that you also need to read the rationales and test-taking strategies that accompany each practice question because this will help you refine your nursing knowledge and critical thinking and reasoning skills. Remember that NCLEX questions will be presented at the cognitive levels of applying, analyzing, synthesizing, evaluating, and creating. Reading the rationales and test-taking strategies will improve your critical thinking and reasoning skills for answering future questions. Now you may ask, "What do you mean by cognitive levels?" Table 4.1 provides a description of each level and an example.

### Table 4-1

Level	Description and Example		
Knowledge	Recalling information from memorizing.		
_	Example: A normal blood glucose level is 70 to 110 mg/dL (4 to 6 mmol/L).		
Understanding	Recognizing the meaning of information.		
	Example: A blood glucose level of 60 mg/dL (3.4 mmol/L) is lower than the normal reference range.		
Applying	Carrying out an appropriate action based on information.		

	Example: Administering 10 to 15 g of carbohydrate, such as a half-glass of fruit juice, to treat mild hypoglycemia.		
Analyzing	xamining a broad concept and breaking it down into smaller parts.  xample: The broad concept is mild hypoglycemia and the smaller concepts are the signs and symptoms of mild hypoglycemia, such as hunger, irritability, weakness, eadache, and blood glucose level lower than 60 mg/dL (3.4 mmol/L).		
Synthesizing	Examining smaller parts of information and determining the broad concept. Example: The smaller concepts are manifestations such as polyuria, polydipsia, polyphagia, vomiting, abdominal pain, weakness, confusion, and Kussmaul respirations. The broad concept is diabetic ketoacidosis (DKA).		
Evaluating	Making judgments, conclusions, or validations based on evidence.  Example: Determining that treatment for mild hypoglycemia was effective if the blood glucose level returned to a normal level at 110 mg/dL (4 to 6 mmol/L).		
Creating	Generating or producing a new outcome or plan by putting parts of information together.  Example: Designing a safe and individualized plan of care with the interprofessional health care team for a client with diabetes mellitus, which meets the client's physiological, psychosocial, and health maintenance needs.

You may have obtained a comprehensive NCLEX review book during your nursing program, and this book most likely contained both content review and practice questions. You can continue to use this book for NCLEX preparation, but you should also consider selecting a second resource that contains only practice questions. Be selective when deciding on a review book. Also, the preface of this book describes several different NCLEX review products available that will ensure your success on the NCLEX exam.



# Study Tip

### **Scope of Practice**

When answering nursing course exam questions and when practicing questions from your NCLEX review book, remember that the answer is something that is within the scope of nursing practice. Usually, the answer that indicates notifying the primary health care provider is not the correct choice unless the situation presented is a life-threatening emergency. Your exams and the NCLEX exam seek to determine your ability about what you, as a nurse, would do in the presented client situation.

# Selecting a Review Book

Make sure that your resource provides at least 4000 practice questions.

Check to see if each question is accompanied by a rationale that provides an explanation for both the correct and incorrect options and a test-taking strategy.

Find out what other information accompanies each question, such as test plan codes and a reference source for the question.

Be sure that a Web site with additional practice questions accompanies the book.

Check to see what options for content selection are available for the practice questions on the Web site.

Note the modes for testing on the Web site, and look for a book that provides a study mode and exam mode.

Be sure that you are given detailed printouts of your performance on your practice tests.

Now that you have your NCLEX resource, start practicing questions. Begin selecting content areas that are your weakest, and then select the study mode. The study mode will generate all possible available questions on the Web site in the content area selected and also provide the correct answer, rationale, and test-taking strategy as soon as you submit your answer. This is an important mode to use when you start your preparation, because you will learn as you go along. When you find that you have difficulty with answering a question, note the problem area in your binder, and after you have completed your study session, review this content in your textbooks or your NCLEX review book. Once you feel that you have strengthened your weak area by using the study mode, move to the exam mode and take an exam to note your improvement. This mode differs from the study mode in that it provides feedback after you answer all the questions rather than after each question. Continue with this pattern of review, moving from your weak areas to your strong areas.

## **Step 5: Determining Your Readiness for the NCLEX Exam**

Remember that you are ready to take the NCLEX exam and that you were ready when you completed your nursing program. However, preparation for the NCLEX exam after graduation is a critical piece in being successful on this exam. At this point you have implemented your preparation plan, and now you need to determine your readiness and refine any remaining weak areas while waiting for your scheduled NCLEX date. How will you do this? Using the Web site accompanying your NCLEX review book, select the exam mode (100 practice questions) and select all content areas so that you generate an integrated content exam. Review your results, and brush up on any weak areas. Continue to take these 100-question exams and follow this pattern until it is time to take the NCLEX exam. Remember that it is important to maintain momentum and a pattern when getting ready for this exam, so continue to practice questions every day.

It is time to take the NCLEX exam. Are you ready? Of course you are! As long as you followed your preparation plan and worked at strengthening any weak areas, you are ready for the challenge!

# CHAPTER 5

# **Alternate Item Formats**

## Introduction

An important strategy for success during your nursing program and for the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX®) is to become as familiar as possible with the types of questions that may appear on these examinations. Facing the challenge of NCLEX may cause a significant amount of anxiety. Knowing what the examination is all about will help alleviate your fear and anxiety. This chapter describes the various types of alternate item format questions that you may encounter on the NCLEX examination and nursing school examinations and provides you with test-taking strategies to answer them correctly.

## NCLEX® Exam Tip

Practice answering questions on the computer as often as you can to become familiar with this testing method. When your test day arrives, your anxiety will be lessened if you are used to taking tests on the computer!

# What Is an Alternate Item Format?



Alternate item format questions are presented in a format other than a 4-option multiple choice. You will encounter these types of questions on your nursing school examinations and on the NCLEX exam. Therefore, it is critical to be familiar with these types of questions and the test-taking strategies for answering them correctly.

# Alternate Item Format Questions

Fill-in-the-blank
Multiple response
Prioritizing (ordered response)
Figure or illustration (hot spot)
Chart/exhibit
Graphic item options
Audio and video
Testlet (Case Study)

A **fill-in-the-blank** question requires that you use the computer keyboard to type in a numerical answer. In a **multiple response** question you will need to use the computer mouse to click in a small box in front of the options to select the correct answers. In a **prioritizing (ordered response)**, you will be asked to use the computer mouse to "drag and drop" the options from the left side of the screen (unordered options) to the right side of the screen in order of priority (ordered responses). In a **figure or illustration** question, you may be asked to "point and click" (using the mouse) on a specific area (represented by a circle and also known as the *hot spot*). In a **chart/exhibit** 

question, you will need to use the computer mouse to click on designated exhibit buttons and tab buttons to read the information in order to answer the question. In a **graphic item option** question, images will be presented as options, and you will need to select an image as an answer. The **audio** or **video** questions may require you to use a set of headphones. You will click on an icon to play the sound and/or video and then answer the question based on the content presented. You will be able to listen to the audio or watch the video as many times as you need to.

## Study Tip

### Student-to-Student

Before a pencil-and-paper exam, make sure you have materials you may need, such as pens, pencils, scrap paper, and a calculator. For computerized exams, an on-screen calculator should be available for your use. Being prepared will help decrease your test anxiety!

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) provides specific directions for you to follow with alternate item format questions to guide you in your process of testing, and it is very important to read these directions as they appear on the computer screen. The NCSBN also provides a tutorial at the start of the examination to assist you in answering these types of questions. However, by using this resource you will already be familiar with these question types, which will save you time during testing and, of course, relieve some anxiety. # **Answering Fill-in-the-Blank Questions?**

Fill-in-the-blank questions will ask you to perform a medication calculation, calculate a flow rate or infusion time for a specific intravenous solution, or calculate an intake or output record on a client. You will need to type in your answer, and the answer will be in a numerical format.



# Test-Taking Strategies: Fill-in-the-Blank

Always follow the directions accompanying the question.

Use scrap paper (erasable noteboard on NCLEX) to perform the calculation.

Read the question and set up the formula you will use to solve the problem.

Be alert to the need to perform conversions.

Perform the calculation.

Verify your answer using a calculator (on-screen calculator for computer tests).

Record the answer using 1 decimal place or a whole number if asked to do so.

If rounding is necessary, perform at the end of the calculation.

In a medication calculation question, you need to record only the numerical component of the answer. In other words, if the answer to a question is 1.4 mL, type only 1.4. Additionally, a medication calculation question may ask you to record your answer using one decimal place. If it so indicates, you must record the answer using one decimal place in order to answer correctly. For example, if the answer to a medication calculation is 2.33 and you are asked to record the answer to one decimal place, then you must type in the answer as 2.3.

In an intravenous flow rate or intravenous infusion time question, the directions may indicate to round the answer to the nearest whole number. If this is indicated, then you must type in the answer as a whole number. For example, if the answer is 21.4 drops per minute, type the answer as 21. Remember that it is not possible to infuse 4/10 of a drop.

In an intake and output calculation question, be sure to read the data carefully. These types of questions may require that you convert ounces (oz) to milliliters (mL). If you read the data carefully, you will note specifically what the question requires and will answer correctly.



# Sample Question:

## Fill-in-the-Blank

A client drank 6 oz of juice and 8 oz of tea for breakfast, 4 oz of water to swallow medications at 0900 and 1300, and 8 oz of milk and 8 oz of coffee for lunch. The nurse determines that the client consumed how many mL of fluid?

**Answer:** 

\_\_\_\_ mL

**Answer:** 

1140 mL

## **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **subject**, a fill-in-the-blank question that requires that you calculate the total intake. Read the data in the question carefully, and note that the client drank 4 oz of water at both 0900 and 1300. Also note that the question uses data expressed in ounces, and you are required to convert ounces to milliliters. Use the erasable noteboard to add the total ounces and verify the amount using the on-screen calculator. Next convert the total amount of ounces to milliliters, recalling that there are 30 mL in 1 oz. Therefore, 6 oz of juice, 8 oz of tea, 4 oz of water at 0900, 4 oz of water at 1300, 8 oz of milk, and 8 oz of coffee total 38 oz. Next, to convert ounces to milliliters, multiply 38 by 30 to yield 1140 mL.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

As the nurse, you will be required to monitor intake and output on clients, and you will need to demonstrate this skill before entering clinical. Intake and output measurements are used for a variety of reasons in the care of clients, including monitoring renal (kidney) function. The kidneys are primarily responsible for ridding the body of waste and play a major role in maintenance of fluid balance in the body. If a client's intake is proportionately different than his or her output, it can provide information about what is going on in the body and what disease processes may be occurring. You will learn more about medication calculations and intake and output measurements in your fundamentals nursing course.

# Study Tip

### **Preparing for Clinical**

Read your assigned client's medication list before clinical and determine if a calculation will need to be performed before administering the medication. When in clinical, be careful when administering medications. Be certain that the correct dose is administered to your client.

# **Answering Multiple Response Questions?**

In a multiple response question, you will be asked to select or check all of the correct options that pertain to the question. These questions require you to use the computer mouse and click in a small box placed in front of the options that you select. Multiple response questions are used for various nursing content areas, including but not limited to, nursing interventions, expected assessment findings, intended medication effects, medication side effects or adverse effects, or expected responses to treatment. You need to do exactly as the question asks, selecting *all* of the options that apply. No partial credit is given for some correct selections. Remember, *all* correct options must be selected for the answer to be correct. If you do not select all of the correct options or you include an incorrect option in your selections, then the answer to the question is incorrect.

## NCLEX® Exam Tip

Expect to encounter several questions in the multiple response format on the NCLEX exam.

## Test-Taking Strategies: Multiple Response

Always read the data carefully in the question.

Determine exactly what the question is asking (subject of the question).

Identify strategic words.

Note whether the question contains a positive or negative event query.

Use nursing knowledge and clinical learning experiences.

Think about the pathophysiology associated with the disorder, if a disorder is presented in the question.

Visualize and form a mental image of the situation in the question and think about what applies. Read each option to yourself one at a time. If it applies to the situation, say "Yes" to yourself and select the option. If it does not apply to the situation, say "No" to yourself and do not select the option.

# Sample Question:

### Multiple Response

The nurse is caring for a client receiving intravenous (IV) therapy who is exhibiting manifestations of circulatory overload. What interventions should the nurse take? **Select all that apply.** 

- 1. Remove the IV.
- 2. Monitor vital signs.
- 3. Prepare to administer oxygen.
- 4. Prepare to administer a diuretic.
- 5. Place the client in an upright position.
- 6. Notify the primary health care provider.

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

This multiple response question requires that you select *all* interventions in the care of a client with circulatory overload, which is the **subject** of the question. As you read each option and say "Yes" or "No" to yourself, think about the pathophysiology associated with circulatory overload and recall that it results from excess fluid in the circulatory system. Visualize and form a mental image of the situation to help you determine that removing the IV is an incorrect action because IV access is needed to administer emergency medications.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

Circulatory overload means that there is an increased amount of fluid in the body, known as

*increased blood volume.* This condition results in difficulty breathing and an elevation in the blood pressure. Circulatory overload is commonly caused by intravenous therapy and can result in complications, such as heart failure or pulmonary edema (swelling in the lungs). This is a critical situation requiring notification of the primary health care provider, and the goal of treatment is to rid the body of excess fluid. You will learn more about circulatory overload in your fundamentals and medical-surgical nursing courses when you focus on fluid and electrolyte imbalances.

# **Answering Prioritizing (Ordered Response) Questions?**

In a prioritizing (ordered response) question, you may be asked to use the computer mouse and to "drag and drop" the answers presented in order of priority. These questions usually ask you to prioritize nursing interventions or steps in a procedure. Information is presented in a question, and based on the data, you need to determine what you would do first, second, third, and so forth. Three helpful test-taking strategies that are important for questions requiring prioritizing include the ABCs—airway, breathing, and circulation; Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory; and the steps of the nursing process. Refer to Chapter 8 for additional information on strategies for answering prioritizing (ordered response) questions.

## The ABCs

The ABCs indicate airway, breathing, and circulation and direct the order of priority of nursing actions. Airway is always the first priority in caring for any client. When you are presented with a prioritizing (ordered response) question, use the ABCs to assist in determining the correct order of action. An exception to using the ABCs to direct the order of nursing actions is if the question asks to prioritize when administering cardiopulmonary resuscitation. In this situation, you would follow the CAB guidelines: *C*, circulation, *A*, airway, and *B*, breathing.

## **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs Theory**

Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory is a helpful guide to use to prioritize client needs. When you are answering prioritizing (ordered response) questions, physiological needs are the priority and require your immediate attention. Safety needs are the next priority, followed by psychosocial needs.

# Study Tip

## Lifestyle Planning

When caring for your client, think of Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory. Consider what lifestyle needs of the client may take precedence over others, and apply these principles to client care and when answering test questions!

# The Steps of the Nursing Process

The steps of the nursing process are usually followed in sequence with assessment (data collection) being the first step and evaluation being the last. The steps of the nursing process can be used as a guide to help you answer prioritizing (ordered response) questions. The only exception to the rule of selecting an assessment (data collection) action as the first action is if the situation in the question presents a life-threatening emergency. If the situation in the question presents a life-threatening situation, read carefully; an intervention may be the first action.

# Test-Taking Strategies: Prioritizing (Ordered Response)

Use the ABCs—airway, breathing, and circulation.

Use Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory.

Use the steps of the nursing process.

Look for strategic words.

Determine if the question identifies a positive or negative event query.

Visualize and form a mental image of the client or clinical event.


Use teaching and learning principles; determining the client's readiness to learn is a first action. Hands are always washed first before any client contact.

Treatments and procedures are always explained to the client before implementation. The nurse checks for a signed informed consent before any invasive procedure. Documenting a client's condition and response to treatment is done after care and implementation of treatments.



# Sample Question:

### **Prioritizing (Ordered Response)**



### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Focus on the **subject**, a prioritizing (ordered response) question that requires you to list in order of priority the steps and instructions in teaching a client how to use a metered-dose inhaler. Two strategies are important to consider when answering this question. First, use teaching and learning principles, recalling that it is important to first determine what the client knows about this medication administration system. Second, visualize the procedure and form a mental image as to how this medication system should be used; this will direct you to the correct order for its use.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

A metered-dose inhaler is used to treat certain respiratory diseases, such as asthma or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). The device provides a specified amount of the prescribed medication and disperses it into the lungs on inhalation. You will learn more about metered-dose inhalers in your pharmacology nursing course.



# What Test-Taking Strategies Are Helpful for

# **Answering Figure/Illustration Questions?**

In a figure/illustration question, you are provided with a visual item, and you need to answer the question based on that item. Some examples of figures/illustrations that you may note on the NCLEX examination include rhythm strips, orthopedic or other assistive client devices, anatomical areas of the body, or medication labels. Some figure/illustration questions are in a multiple choice format. In other words, you are presented with a visual item and a question, and based on this information, you need to answer by selecting one of the four presented options. Other figure/illustration questions may be in a fill-in-the-blank format and require that you type in an answer. For example, you may be provided with a medication label and a question that requires a medication calculation and typing in the answer. The important concept to remember is that a figure/illustration question could be presented in any format, including multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank, multiple response, prioritizing (ordered response), or chart/exhibit.

## Test-Taking Strategies: Figure/Illustration

Read all of the data in the question carefully and focus on the figure/illustration.

Think about what the figure/illustration is representing.

Ask yourself, "What is the question asking?"

Focus on the subject of the question.

Look for strategic words.

Determine if the question identifies a positive or negative event query.

Use nursing knowledge and clinical learning experiences.

Focus on the question format (fill-in-the-blank, multiple response, prioritizing [ordered response], chart/exhibit), and use the test-taking strategies for answering that type of question.



# Sample Question:

### Figure/Illustration

Clarithromycin oral suspension 250 mg twice daily has been prescribed for a client with pharyngitis. How many milliliters (mL) should the nurse prepare to administer 1 dose?

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Focus on the **subject**: a figure/illustration question in a fill-in-the-blank format that requires performing a calculation. In other words, you are required to focus on the figure/illustration of the medication label, perform a calculation to determine the amount of milliliters to administer in 1 dose, and type in the answer. Use nursing knowledge of the formula for medication calculation doses. On a pencil-and-paper test, perform the calculation on scrap paper and verify the amount using a calculator. On NCLEX, perform the calculation on the erasable noteboard, and verify the amount using the on-screen calculator. The formula and calculation are presented here.

### Formula:

$$\frac{\text{Desired}}{\text{Available}} \times \text{mL} = \text{mL per dose}$$

$$\frac{250mg}{125mg} \times 5mL = 10mL$$



## Tip for the Nursing Student

Medication calculations are performed to determine the volume or amount of medication to be administered based on the dosage prescribed and the amount or volume that the nurse has available in the medication bottle. You will most likely be required to pass a medication calculation test before entering your first clinical rotation, depending on the policy at your nursing school. You will learn more about medication calculations in your fundamentals or related math courses before you enter the clinical setting.



# **What Test-Taking Strategies Are Helpful for**

# **Answering Chart/Exhibit Questions?**

A chart/exhibit question will most likely provide you with data from a client's medical record and ask you a question about that data. These types of questions also may provide you with an exhibit of some type, such as a primary health care provider's prescription form with written prescriptions or a laboratory result from listing results from various laboratory tests. These questions will most likely be in the multiple choice format, but they also may be presented in other types of alternate item question formats.

## Test-Taking Strategies: Chart/Exhibit

Read all of the data in each tab in the chart or exhibit.

Avoid "skimming over" the information presented.

Focus on the subject of the question.

Identify a relationship between the subject of the question and the data provided.

Look for strategic words.

Determine if the question identifies a positive or negative event query.

Reread the data provided, and use nursing knowledge and clinical learning experiences to answer correctly.

Note the question format being presented, and use the specific test-taking strategies for that type of question.



# Sample Question:

### Chart/Exhibit

Prednisone is prescribed for a hospitalized client with severe rheumatoid arthritis. Which daily laboratory result should the nurse monitor **most** closely?

- 1. Lipase level
- 2. Chloride level
- 3. Uric acid level
- 4. Blood glucose level

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

This chart/exhibit question provides you with a multiple choice question and data from a client's medical chart. Note all of the **data in the question** and the client's chart. Note the **strategic word** 

"most" and focus on the **subject** of the question: the laboratory test to monitor for the client taking prednisone. Use nursing knowledge about the interactions and effects of prednisone to assist in answering. Recalling that this medication may increase the blood glucose level will direct you to the correct option. Also note the relationship of the client's history of diabetes mellitus and the correct option.



# **Tip for the Nursing Student**

Rheumatoid arthritis is a debilitating disease that has an autoimmune (self-attacking) component that causes inflammation and sometimes deformities of the joints. It is a disease that is marked by remission and exacerbation, with painful symptoms during exacerbation of the disease. You will learn more about rheumatoid arthritis in your medical-surgical nursing course.



# What Test-Taking Strategies Are Helpful for

## **Answering Graphic Item Option Questions?**

A graphic item option question will provide you with a written question and images as the options. This type of question will most likely be in the multiple choice format. An example question may contain normal versus abnormal physical assessment findings, requiring you to discern between them as the question may ask.

## Test-Taking Strategies: Graphic Item Options

Look for strategic words.

Note the format of the question presented.

Use nursing knowledge and relate clinical experiences to the subject of the question.

Once you have determined the subject and identified what the question is asking, examine each graphic option to choose the best answer.





## **Test-Taking Strategy**

This question provides you with a graphic for each option and asks you to identify the option that illustrates Buck's traction. Therefore, the **subject** of the question is Buck's traction. Use nursing knowledge and relate clinical experiences to the **subject** of the question. Recall that Buck's traction is a type of skin traction, then look at each graphic in the options to answer correctly.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

Buck's traction is used to immobilize, position, or align a lower extremity. It is most commonly used when a person sustains a hip fracture and is awaiting surgery. It is also used to treat a contracture or disease of the hip or knee. It usually uses ropes, weights, and pulleys and a frame at

the foot of the bed to apply the necessary weight. You will learn more about Buck's traction in your medical-surgical nursing course.

# What Test-Taking Strategies Are Helpful for Answering Audio or Video Questions?

An audio or video question requires you to wear a set of headphones. You are instructed to click on the icon to play the sound or run the video and listen or watch the content. A question is presented based on the content. The format of the question will most likely be a multiple choice or multiple response type. An example of an audio question may be basic lung sounds, heart sounds, or bowel sounds, requiring you to identify the correct sound being heard in order to answer the question. A video question may present a question about a nursing procedure, and you will need to watch the video in order to answer.

## Test-Taking Strategies: Audio or Video Questions


Click on the icon to play the sound or video; you may replay as many times as necessary. Focus on the subject once you determine what the question is asking. Note the format of the question you are answering.

Use nursing knowledge and relate clinical experiences to the subject of the question.



## Sample Question:

#### Audio





## **Test-Taking Strategy**

This question type provides you with the question, an icon to listen to the sound the question is asking about, and your options. This question type will most likely be in multiple choice format. Click on the icon to replay the sound; you can play the audio recording as many times as necessary. Use nursing knowledge and clinical skills to relate to the **subject** of the question: the breath sound heard in a client with emphysema. These types of questions commonly ask about physical assessment findings.




## Tip for the Nursing Student

Breath sounds are auscultated, or listened to, using a stethoscope. These sounds are assessed to determine the presence of alterations or complications in the lungs. You will learn more about the types of normal and abnormal breath sounds in your health and physical assessment nursing course.



# Sample Question:

## Video



## **Test-Taking Strategy**

This question type provides you with the question, an icon to view the video, and your options. This question type will most likely be in multiple choice or multiple response format. Click on the icon to play the video; you may replay as many times as necessary. Use nursing knowledge and relate clinical experiences to the **subject** of the question—performing a wound irrigation—and what the question is asking.



## **Tip for the Nursing Student**

Wound irrigation is performed by rinsing a wound with a prescribed solution, such as a medicated solution, water, saline, or an antimicrobial liquid preparation. This procedure is done to prevent and/or treat wound infection. You will learn more about wound care in your fundamentals and medical-surgical nursing courses.

## Study Tip

## **Scope of Practice**

Audio and video type questions ask you about a subject or content area that is within the nursing scope of practice. Audio questions require you to listen to breath sounds, heart sounds, or bowel sounds representing a component of a nursing assessment. Video questions will most likely present nursing activities and procedures that you will encounter in the clinical setting.

# **Answering Testlet (Case Study) Questions?**

Testlet (case study) questions include a client scenario and several accompanying practice questions that relate to the content of the scenario. These accompanying practice questions can be in any format such as multiple choice, multiple response, fill-in-the blank, ordered-response, figure/illustration, chart/exhibit, graphic option, audio, or video. Sample testlets can be located on the accompanying Evolve site.

## Test-Taking Strategies: Testlet (Case Study)

Read all of the data in the case scenario.

Avoid "skimming over" the data presented.

Note the question format being presented, and use the specific test-taking strategies for that type of question.

Review the case scenario for each presented question.

Use nursing knowledge, critical reasoning skills, and clinical learning experiences to answer correctly.

# **CHAPTER 6**

# How to Avoid "Reading into the Question"

One of the pitfalls that can cause a problem when trying to answer a question correctly is "reading into the question." This means you are considering issues beyond the information presented in the question. Some strategies you can use to prevent this include the following:

- Identifying the ingredients of a question
- Reading the question carefully and looking for strategic words or phrases
- Focusing on the data in the question
- Focusing on the client of the question and ensuring client safety
- Identifying the subject of the question and what the question is asking
- Determining if an abnormality exists
- Considering all available resources
- Avoiding the "What if?" syndrome
- Using the process of elimination

## Study Tip

## Student-to-Student

When approaching a test question, visualize the scenario that is presented. Do not imagine anything beyond what is actually being described in the question. This strategy will assist you in avoiding the "What If?" syndrome and reading into the question.

# **Clinical Reasoning**

Clinical reasoning is also known as *clinical judgment* and is a process employed when a health care provider considers the details of a clinical situation and is able to identify relevant factors and make sound clinical decisions in the disposition of client care. As a nurse, it is important to understand the client's baseline data and background to effectively apply clinical reasoning to client care. This is a skill that is built and refined over time. Also, use clinical reasoning when answering test questions. When applying this skill to test questions, it will help if you can determine the significant factors in the information presented in the question.

## **Ingredients of a Question**

## What Are the Ingredients of a Question?



Each multiple choice question contains a case event, a question query, and four options. It is important to identify the ingredients of a question as you read it because this will help you sort out the facts and determine what the question is asking.

#### What Is the Case Event?

The case event is the "heart" of the question. It provides the information that you need to think about to answer the question.

## What Is the Question Query?

The question query is a statement that generally follows the case event and asks you something specific about it.

## What Are the Options?

The options are all the answers presented with the question.

## Study Tip

## **Scope of Practice**

Many figure/illustration or "hot spot" questions are physical assessment questions. When answering these types of questions, remember that the questions and answers are within the nursing scope of practice. If you know what you, as the nurse, are required to understand when performing a physical assessment, you will be better able to answer these questions.

Examples of some types of questions that may appear in your nursing exams or on the NCLEX exam and the specific ingredients of the questions are provided in this section. The answers to these example questions and the test-taking strategy also are provided. Additionally, Chapter 5 provides information about the various question types that will be in your nursing exams and the NCLEX exam.



# Ingredients of a Question:

## **Multiple Choice**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is reviewing the laboratory results of a client who is receiving magnesium sulfate by IV infusion and notes that the magnesium level is 3.5 mg/dL (1.44 mmol/L).

## **Question Query:**

Based on this laboratory result, the nurse would **most likely** expect to note which finding in the client?

## **Options:**

- 1. Tremors
- 2. Hyperactive reflexes
- 3. Respiratory depression
- 4. No specific findings because this value is a normal level

#### **Answer:**

3

## **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic words** *most likely*. Knowing that the level identified in the question is elevated will assist in eliminating option 4. Next, eliminate options 1 and 2 because they are **comparable or alike**. Remember to use nursing knowledge, **focus on the information** in the case event, identify what the question is asking (the **subject**), note the **strategic words**, read carefully, and use the process of elimination.



## Tip for the Nursing Student:

You need to know that the normal magnesium level is 1.3-2.1 mEq/L (0.65 to 1.05 mmol/L); therefore, the magnesium level presented in the question is elevated. Next you need to know the signs and symptoms indicative of an elevated magnesium level. You will learn normal laboratory values in your fundamentals of nursing course. Learn the normal magnesium level and the signs and symptoms of a magnesium imbalance.



# Ingredients of a Question:

## Fill in the Blank

#### **Case Event:**

The primary health care provider prescribes an intravenous (IV) antibiotic to be administered in 50 mL 0.9% normal saline and to infuse in 30 minutes. The drop factor for the IV tubing is 15 gtt/mL.

## **Ouestion Ouery:**

The nurse should set the flow rate of the infusion at how many drops per minute? **Fill-in-the blank.** 

#### **Answer:**

25

## **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Note the words *set the flow rate* in the query. Read the question carefully, focusing on the **subject**, drops per minute. Note that 50 mL fluid is to infuse in 30 minutes and the drop factor is 15. Use the formula for calculating an IV infusion to answer the question. Always double-check the calculation, make sure that the answer makes sense, and verify your answer using a calculator. Remember to use nursing knowledge, **focus on the information** in the case event, identify what the question is asking (the **subject**), and note the words in the query.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

In this question, you need to know the formula for calculating an IV flow rate. You will most likely learn about medication calculations and IV flow rates in your fundamentals of nursing course. The formula and the calculation for this question are as follows:

$$\frac{50 \times 15}{30} = 25$$

## NCLEX® Exam Tip

Use the formula for calculating an IV infusion. Perform the calculation on the noteboard provided to you, and use the computer on-screen calculator to verify your answer. Read carefully because in calculation questions you may be asked to round the answer to the nearest whole number or to one decimal place. If rounding is necessary, perform at the end of the calculation.



# Ingredients of a Question:

## **Multiple Response**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse enters a hospitalized client's room and discovers that the client is having a tonic-clonic seizure.

## **Question Query:**

Which actions should the nurse implement? Select all that apply.

## **Options:**

- 1. Call a code.
- 2. Check airway patency.
- 3. Establish an IV access.
- 4. Protect the client from injury.
- 5. Restrain the client's extremities loosely.
- 6. Document the characteristics of the seizure that the client exhibits.

#### Answer:

2, 3, 4, 6


## **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Read each option carefully and note the **subject**, the nursing actions in the event of a seizure. In this type of question, it is helpful to visualize the event to assist in determining the nurse's actions. Remember that a patent airway and client safety are your priority. Use nursing knowledge, **focus on the information** in the case event, identify what the question is asking (the **subject**), read carefully, and use the process of elimination.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

You need to know that a seizure is an abnormal sudden excessive discharge of electrical activity within the brain. You also need to know what you would do if a client has a seizure. What you need to remember is that a patent airway and client safety are your priorities. You will learn about seizures when you study neurological disorders.





# Ingredients of a Question:

## **Prioritizing (Ordered Response)**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is preparing to change an abdominal dressing using sterile technique.

## **Ouestion Ouery:**

What is the order of **priority** that the nurse should take to perform this procedure? **Arrange the** actions in the order of priority that they should be performed. All options must be used.

## **Test-Taking Strategy**

Read each option carefully, and note the **strategic word** *priority*. In this type of question, it is helpful to visualize the event to assist in determining the nurse's order of actions. Remember to use nursing knowledge, read carefully, **focus on the information** in the case event, identify what the question is asking (the **subject**), and note the **strategic word**.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

You need to know the principles that are related to asepsis and the technique for changing a sterile dressing, which you will learn in your fundamentals of nursing class. Learn these principles and techniques because they are critical in preventing infection in the client.

## NCLEX® Exam Tip

For a prioritizing (ordered-response) question on the NCLEX exam, you will need to use the computer mouse to drag and drop the options in order of priority.



# Ingredients of a Question:


## Figure or Illustration

## **Case Event:**

The nurse is checking the arterial pulses on an adult client.

#### **Question Query:**

Select the area where the nurse would palpate the carotid pulse. **Refer to figure.**

#### **Answer:**

The answer is indicated by the circle marked with the X.

## **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **subject**, the location of the carotid pulse. In this type of question, it is helpful to visualize the pulse points for assessment of arterial pulses to identify the correct answer. Remember to use nursing knowledge, read carefully, **focus on the information** in the case event, and identify what the question is asking (the **subject**).



## Tip for the Nursing Student

You need to know where the arterial pulse points are located. Use what you learned in anatomy class to assist in answering this question. You will also learn these pulse points in your fundamentals of nursing class and in your physical assessment class. Be sure to learn these pulse points for assessment of arterial pulses.

## NCLEX® Exam Tip

On the NCLEX exam, you will be asked to use the computer mouse to point and click on the correct area in a figure or illustration. These types of questions are also known as "hot spot" questions.



## Strategic Words or Strategic Phrases

Always read every word in the question carefully. As you read, look for strategic words or strategic phrases in the case event and query of the question. Strategic words or strategic phrases focus your attention on specific or critical points that you need to consider when answering the question.

Some strategic words or strategic phrases may indicate that all the options are correct, in which case you will need to prioritize to select the correct option. Remember, as you read the question, look for the strategic words or strategic phrases; they will make a difference with regard to how you will answer the question.

## Study Tip

## Lifestyle Planning

Lifestyle balance is extremely important in success on exams. Be sure that you eat healthy, get enough exercise and sleep, and have some fun. Good organizational skills are needed to maintain balance, so begin working on these skills now!

## Study Tip

## Student-to-Student

You will find that your nursing exams are quite different from exams that you took in previous courses, such as anatomy and physiology or microbiology. Those exams required memorization of facts, which helped you answer questions correctly. Nursing exams are different because of the use of strategic words and phrases that may indicate that all options are correct. Therefore, it is critical that you learn what these strategic words and phrases are and that you work at using nursing knowledge, critical thinking skills, and test-taking strategies to answer questions correctly.

## **Preparing for Clinical**

When working in the clinical arena, you need to be able to prioritize client care; this is why prioritization is such a major focus on nursing exams. Dedicate a lot of preparation time to sharpening your prioritization skills, which will help you be successful both in clinical and on your exams!

## Use of Strategic Words or Strategic Phrases in a Question

You may be asking yourself: "How are these strategic words or strategic phrases used in a question?" Following are some examples of question queries that contain strategic words:

What is the *best* nursing action?

Which is an early sign of hypoxia?

Which is a late sign of shock?

The nurse determines that the treatment is *effective* if which is noted?

Which item is *essential* in the care of the client?

Which is the *immediate* nursing action?

What is the *initial* nursing action?

The nurse should take which action *first*?

Which client need is the *highest priority?* 

Which action should the nurse take *next*?

The client is *most* at risk for which complication?

Which response to the client is *most appropriate?* 

Which nursing action is *most important?* 

The client is *most likely* at risk for which disorder?

Which assessment finding indicates the need for follow-up?

Which client statement indicates the *need for further teaching?* 

What is the *primary* clinical manifestation of diabetes mellitus?

Which nursing action is the *priority?* 

Which measure is *vital* to achieve a positive outcome?

## Study Tip

#### Student-to-Student

When answering exam questions, be sure to look for strategic words. These words make a difference in how you will answer the question.



## What Is the Subject of the Question?



The subject of the question is the specific content that the question is asking about. It is important to read every word in the question. As you read and note the strategic words or strategic phrases, determine what the question is asking. Identifying the subject of the question will help you eliminate the incorrect options and direct you to the correct option.

## Study Tip

## Student-to-Student

The questions on nursing exams cover subjects that you have learned in your nursing course. Focus on these subject areas when preparing for a nursing exam. If your instructor gives you a study guide for the exam, review all subject areas on the study guide.

## NCLEX® Exam Tip

There are hundreds of subjects that you could be asked about when you take the NCLEX exam.

This is understandable, especially when you think about all the information that you needed to learn in nursing school. A test question may ask about any Client Needs area of the NCLEX Test Plan, any content area of nursing, or anything that has to do with the role and responsibilities of the nurse. Therefore, the list of subjects that could be tested is never ending. It is extremely helpful to obtain a copy of the detailed NCLEX Test Plan, which is published by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN). This Test Plan, which identifies some of the content that will be tested on the NCLEX exam, can be obtained at no fee at the NCSBN Web site (www.ncsbn.org). Be sure to download the detailed Test Plan.



## Sample Question:

## The Subject of the Question

#### **Case Event:**

A client with metastatic cancer is receiving a continuous intravenous (IV) infusion of morphine sulfate to alleviate pain.

## **Question Query:**

The nurse should monitor the client for which adverse or toxic effect of the medication?

## **Subject:**

In this question, note that the client is receiving morphine sulfate and that the question asks about an adverse or toxic effect of the medication. Therefore, the subject of this question is an adverse or toxic effect of morphine sulfate.

#### **Options:**

- 1. Nausea
- 2. Sedation
- 3. Dizziness
- 4. Skeletal muscle flaccidity

#### **Answer:**

4

## **Test-Taking Strategy**

Read every word in the question, and specifically determine what the question is asking. The **subject** of the question is the adverse or toxic effect of morphine sulfate. Nausea, sedation, and dizziness are side effects of morphine sulfate that the client may experience, but they are not adverse or toxic effects. Remember to focus on the **subject** and on the **information in the question** and what the question is asking!



## Tip for the Nursing Student

You need to know that morphine sulfate is an opioid analgesic and that it causes depression of the central nervous system. Next, noting that the question is asking about an adverse or toxic effect will assist in answering correctly. You will learn about morphine sulfate in your nursing courses, and it is important that you are very familiar with the side effects and adverse and toxic effects of the medication. In addition to skeletal muscle flaccidity, a major concern is that the medication causes respiratory depression. Learn the side effects and adverse effects of this medication.

# Using Nursing Knowledge and the Process of Elimination

## Why Is Nursing Knowledge So Important?

Nursing knowledge is needed to assist in answering test questions because the knowledge provides information that you need to process and think about critically to answer the question. If you can use your nursing knowledge to answer the question, then by all means do so!

## What Does It Mean to Use the Process of Elimination?

The process of elimination involves reading each option for a question and removing the options that are incorrect and do not address the subject of the question. Using the process of elimination is extremely important when you are reading the options to a question and trying to determine the correct answer. Do not hastily select an option because it sounds good. Always read every option carefully before selecting an answer.

Some students read a question, and before looking at the options, they determine a correct answer. This is a helpful strategy for answering a test question, because you are using nursing knowledge to help answer the question correctly. The problem with this strategy is that you may have an answer to the question in mind, but when you look at the options, your answer is not there. This can be very frustrating and anxiety provoking. Let's look at an example.

## NCLEX® Exam Tip

On the NCLEX exam, do not be surprised if you are given questions that contain content with which you are totally unfamiliar or are only vaguely familiar. This happens to many who take this examination. When it does happen, read the question carefully and focus on the subject.

Sometimes you do not even need to know much about the content to answer the question. In addition, with some of these unfamiliar questions, you may be able to use nursing knowledge from a different content area to answer the question. Do not become alarmed and anxious if you receive a question with unfamiliar content. Sit back, take a deep breath, read carefully, focus on the subject, and use nursing knowledge from a different content area and test-taking strategies to answer the question.



## Sample Question:

#### The Process of Elimination

#### **Case Event:**

A client who has type 1 diabetes mellitus describes shakiness and hunger 2 hours after receiving a dose of regular insulin.

## **Question Query:**

The nurse determines that the client is having a hypoglycemic reaction and prepares to give the client which **best** item from the dietary kitchen to treat the reaction?

After you read this question, you may immediately think, "Orange juice! Yes, orange juice is the best item! I know the answer to this question." Then you look at the options and find the following:

#### **Options:**

- 1. Milk
- 2. Diet soda

- 3. Sugar-free gelatin
- 4. Sugar-free cookies

#### **Answer:**

1

## **Test-Taking Strategy**

Your answer, orange juice, is not there! So now what do you do? You need to use your nursing knowledge and think about what thought processes led you to identify orange juice as the answer to the question. Note the **strategic word**, best. Remember that a food item that contains 10 to 15 g carbohydrate is used to treat a hypoglycemic reaction. Now look at your options and use the process of elimination. In this question you can eliminate options 2, 3, and 4 because these items are **comparable or alike** and do not contain carbohydrates.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

You need to know that diabetes mellitus is a chronic disorder of impaired carbohydrate, protein, and lipid metabolism that is caused by a deficiency of effective insulin. You also need to know that hypoglycemia is a complication of diabetes mellitus, and you need to know the signs of hypoglycemia. You will learn a great deal about diabetes mellitus during your nursing courses because it is a major health disorder. In this question you can use medical terminology skills to determine that *hypoglycemic* means a low blood glucose level. When the blood glucose is low, glucose needs to be provided to the client. The only item in the options that will provide a form of glucose is milk. Learn about diabetes mellitus, the signs of hypoglycemia, and its treatment.

## Study Tip

## Lifestyle Planning

When planning study times for exams, look at the content that you will be tested on and plan to spend at least 2 to 3 hours per content area, in addition to your daily preparation of reviewing class notes and highlighted text.



## **Determining If an Abnormality Exists**

Determine if an abnormality exists. Look at data in the question and in the responses and decide what is abnormal. Pay closer attention to this information as you answer the question.



## Sample Question:

## **Determining If an Abnormality Exists**

## **Case Event:**

The nurse is caring for a client who is taking digoxin and is monitoring routine laboratory values.

#### **Question Query:**

Which laboratory value requires the **need for follow-up** by the nurse?

#### **Options:**

- 1. Sodium 138 mEq/L (138 mmol/L)
- 2. Potassium 3.4 mEq/L (3.4 mmol/L)

- 3. Phosphorus 3.0 mg/dL (0.97 mmol/L)
- 4. Magnesium 1.3 mEq/L (0.65 mmol/L)

#### **Answer:**

2

## **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic words**, *need for follow-up*. The first step in approaching the answer to this question is to **determine if an abnormality exists**.

The client is taking digoxin. The laboratory values noted in the options are all normal except potassium. Recall that the potassium level must stay consistent while the client is taking digoxin in order to prevent adverse effects from occurring. Remember to **determine if an abnormality exists** in the event before choosing the correct option.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

Digoxin is a medication that has positive inotropic actions, which means that it helps the heart pump more effectively. Digoxin has a very narrow therapeutic index, which puts the client at risk for digoxin toxicity. Therefore, serum digoxin levels are monitored routinely. In addition to this, a consistent electrolyte balance (particularly potassium) is needed in order for the digoxin to be effective in management of the disease process it is prescribed for. You will learn about diabetes mellitus and its complications in your nursing courses when you study endocrine disorders.



## Focusing on the Data in the Question and Ensuring Client

Focus only on the data in the question, read every word, and make a decision about what the question is asking. Reread the question more than one time; ask yourself, "What is this question asking?" and "What content is this question testing?"



## Sample Question:

## Focusing on the Data in the Question and Ensuring Client Safety

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is providing discharge instructions to a client with diabetes mellitus. The client's HgbA1C level is 10%.

#### **Question Query:**

How should the nurse inform the client?

#### **Options:**

- 1. "Increase the amount of vegetables and water intake in your diet regimen."
- 2. "Change the time of day you exercise because it may cause hypoglycemia."
- 3. "Continue with the same diet and exercise regimen you are currently using."
- 4. "Utilize a high-intensity exercise regimen and decrease carbohydrate consumption."

## **Answer:**

1

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Focus on the **data in the question**, an HgbA1C level of 10%. This is above the recommended range for a client with diabetes mellitus and indicates poor glycemic control. Choose the option that addresses the **data in the question** and **ensures client safety**.

Option 1 is a safe recommendation to make to a diabetic client and will help reduce the HgbA1C level. Changing the time of day for exercise and continuing with the same diet and exercise regimen will not address the problem in the question. Utilizing a high-intensity exercise regimen and decreasing carbohydrate consumption could potentially result in a hypoglycemic reaction and does not ensure client safety.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

Diabetes mellitus is a condition where carbohydrate metabolism is affected, and it can result in high blood glucose or low blood glucose levels. There are two types of diabetes mellitus and various contributing factors to this disease process. One method of monitoring diabetes mellitus is to measure the HgbA1C level, which is a blood test that provides information about glycemic control over the past 2 to 3 months and provides information that is helpful in tailoring the client's treatment regimen. You will learn about the laboratory tests used to monitor diabetes mellitus when you study endocrine disorders.



## Focusing on the Client of the Question

Focus on the client in the question. At times, other people are discussed in the question that also affect how the question should be answered. Remember the concepts of client-centered and family-centered care.



## Sample Question:

## **Focusing on the Client**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is caring for a terminally ill client. The client's wife, who has served as the caregiver, is at the bedside. She states, "I really hope my husband can just get better so we can go home."

## **Ouestion Ouery:**

What statement should the nurse make to the client's wife?

#### **Options:**

- 1. "Has the doctor spoken with you about your husband's plan of care?"
- 2. "It sounds like this is difficult for you. What do you know about your husband's condition?"
- 3. "I hope your husband gets better too. It would be wonderful for you to be able to take him home."
- 4. "I know this is a difficult situation. I've seen this many times before. The spouse always has a hard time."

## **Answer:**

2

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Focus on the **client of the question**, which in this case is the client's spouse. Also, use **therapeutic communication techniques**.

The correct option acknowledges the spouse's feelings and asks for further information to

determine her understanding of the situation. Option 1 does not acknowledge her feelings. Option 3 may offer false reassurance and false hope. Option 4 does not address the spouse's feelings and may cause further emotional distress.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

When a client is terminally ill, oftentimes nurses need to consider the care of the client as well as care of the family members. Family members may be active in providing care to terminally ill clients and are at risk for caregiver strain and burnout. Respite care is one option that should be offered, if possible, for caregivers and family members of a terminally ill client. You will learn about therapeutic communication techniques and care to a terminally ill client in your fundamentals of nursing course.



# Considering All Available Resources

Consider available resources as you answer the question. When you answer a test question, remember that you have all available supplies and equipment needed to care for the client at the bedside. You do not need to leave the client to obtain supplies from a treatment or supply room. Remember that you will have all resources you need to provide quality client care.



## Sample Question:

#### **Consider All Available Resources**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is called to the room to assist a client with a chest tube. The client states it felt like the tube pulled out. The nurse assesses the client and finds that the tube has dislodged and is lying on the floor.

## **Question Query:**

What action should the nurse take **next**?

#### **Options:**

- 1. Obtain a pair of sterile gloves.
- 2. Contact the charge nurse for help.
- 3. Submerge the dislodged tube into sterile water.
- 4. Cover the insertion site with an occlusive dressing.

#### **Answer:**

4

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word**, *next*. When providing care to a client, particularly in emergency situations, **consider available resources** and keep in mind that all of the resources needed to provide client care will be readily available. Most students would eliminate options 1 and 3 first, knowing these actions are not necessary in this scenario. From the remaining options, you may think, "I don't have an occlusive dressing with me in this situation, so let me call for help first." Remember, you have everything you need wherever and whenever you need it!



**Tip for the Nursing Student** 

A chest tube may be needed if the client has fluid build-up in the lung (pleural effusion) or has a collapsed lung (pneumothorax). These complications can occur as a result of injury or various disease processes. As the nurse managing care of the client with a chest tube, it is necessary to anticipate the possible complications and monitor the client closely. You will learn about chest tubes and the care involved when you study respiratory disorders.



## What Do You Do If You Eliminate Two Options and Are


## **Unsure of the Final Two?**

As you use the process of elimination to rule out the incorrect options, it is likely that you will be able to easily eliminate two of the four options in a multiple-choice question. Now what do you do with the last two options, and how do you proceed to select the correct one? Follow these helpful steps when you are trying to decide which of the last two options is correct.

- 1. Read the question again.
- 2. Identify the case event from the query of the question.
- 3. Look for the strategic words or strategic phrases.
- 4. Identify the subject of the question.
- 5. Ask yourself, "What is the question asking?"
- 6. Read the options again.
- 7. Eliminate the options that do not apply or relate to the situation.
- 8. Make your final choice by focusing on what the question is asking, using nursing knowledge, and implementing test-taking strategies.



## What Is the "What If?" Syndrome?



## STAY ON TRACK!

The "What if?" syndrome occurs when you read a test question and instead of simply focusing on the information in the question, you start asking yourself, "Well, what if?" You need to avoid asking yourself this question because this leads you right into the dreaded pitfall of "reading into the question." Read the question carefully, identify strategic words or strategic phrases, and focus on the subject of the question. You may need to think critically to answer the question, but stay on track! Asking yourself "What if?" moves you off track with regard to what the question is asking. Let's look at two questions and then examine the ways to avoid reading into them.



## Sample Question 1

## **Case Event:**

The nurse is changing the tapes on a tracheostomy tube. The client coughs, and the tube is dislodged.

## **Question Query:**

What is the **initial** nursing action?

- 1. Grasp the retention sutures to spread the opening.
- 2. Call the primary health care provider to reinsert the tube.
- 3. Call the respiratory therapy department to reinsert the tube.
- 4. Cover the tracheostomy site with a sterile dressing to prevent infection.

Now you may immediately think, "The tube is dislodged, and I need the primary health care provider!" Read the question carefully. Note the strategic word *initial*, and focus on the information in the question—the client's tube is dislodged. The question is asking you for an *initial* nursing action, so that is what you need to look for. This will direct you to option 1. Use nursing knowledge and test-taking strategies to assist in answering the question.

#### **Answer:**

1

## **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word**, initial, and focus on the **information in the question**. Eliminate options 2 and 3 first because they are **comparable or alike** and will delay the immediate intervention needed. Eliminate option 4 because this action will block the airway. If the tube is accidentally dislodged, the initial nursing action is to grasp the retention sutures and spread the opening. In addition, use of the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation—will** direct you to the correct option.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

A tracheostomy is an opening into the trachea that is created surgically for the purpose of establishing an airway. You will learn about the care of a client with a tracheostomy tube when you learn about nursing care for a client with a respiratory condition; but the important thing to remember for any client is that maintaining a patent airway is the nurse's priority. In this question the only nursing action that will open the airway is the action identified in option 1. You will learn about tracheostomy care and the nurse's responsibilities in the care of the client when you study respiratory disorders.



# Sample Question 2

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is caring for a hospitalized client with a diagnosis of heart failure who suddenly reports shortness of breath and dyspnea.

## **Question Query:**

The nurse should take which **immediate** action?

- 1. Administer oxygen to the client.
- 2. Prepare to administer furosemide.
- 3. Elevate the head of the client's bed.
- 4. Call the primary health care provider.

Now you may immediately think that the client has developed pulmonary edema, a complication of heart failure, and needs a diuretic. Although pulmonary edema is a complication of heart failure, there is no information in the question indicating the presence of pulmonary edema. The question simply states that the client suddenly reports shortness of breath and dyspnea. Read the question carefully. Note the strategic word *immediate*, and focus on the subject—the client's symptoms. The question is asking you for a nursing action, so that is what you need to look for. This will direct you to option 3. Use nursing knowledge and test-taking strategies to assist in answering the question.

#### **Answer:**

3

## **Test-Taking Strategy**

Focus on the **information in the question.** Note the **strategic word** *immediate*. Think about the client's symptoms, and look for the *immediate* nursing action. Although the primary health care provider may need to be notified, this is not the immediate action. A primary health care provider's prescription is needed to administer oxygen. Furosemide is a diuretic and may or may not be prescribed for the client. Because no data in the question indicate the presence of pulmonary edema, option 3 is correct.



## Tip for the Nursing Student

Heart failure is an inability of the heart to maintain adequate circulation to meet the metabolic needs of the body because of an impaired pumping ability. Pulmonary edema is a serious complication of heart failure in which fluid accumulates in the pulmonary system as a result of the impaired pumping ability of the heart. You will learn about heart failure and pulmonary edema when you learn about cardiac disorders. One thing to remember is that with all clients, airway is the priority, and that as the nurse, you need to take an immediate action that will assist the client to breathe easily. In many questions that ask for an immediate action, the action that identifies a client position is usually the immediate action, as long as the position is a correct one. For clients with respiratory or cardiac problems, elevation of the client's head will assist with breathing. Learn about heart failure and pulmonary edema, the signs and symptoms, and immediate nursing actions to take.

# CHAPTER 7

# **Positive and Negative Event Queries**

The questions presented on the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX®) are written to include either a positive or a negative event query. Primarily, the questions are written as positive event queries; however, you need to be prepared for either type.



# Study Tip

## Student-to-Student

One of the first things you should do when reading a test question is identify whether the query is positive or negative. If you do this, you will look at the scenario in the appropriate context, and this will increase the likelihood of answering the question correctly.

## **Positive Event Queries**



# What Is a Positive Event Query?

A positive event query asks you to make a decision and select the option that is accurate or correct with regard to the data presented in the question. How will you know that the question includes a positive event query? Read the question carefully, and focus on the query of the question. The query contains words or phrases that indicate the question includes a positive event query.

Positive event query: Select an option that is positive or correct!

## What Words and Phrases Are Commonly Used in Positive Event Queries?

Remember to read the question carefully and focus on the query of the question because the query contains words or phrases that indicate the question includes a positive event query. Several examples of queries and sample questions that indicate the question includes a positive event query are listed next.

## Sample Question 1

#### **Case Event:**

A client with suspected active lung tuberculosis is being scheduled for diagnostic tests.

## **Positive Event Query:**

The nurse anticipates that which diagnostic test will **most likely** be prescribed to confirm the diagnosis?

- 1. Chest x-ray
- 2. Skin testing
- 3. Sputum culture
- 4. White blood cell count

#### **Answer:**

3

## **Test-Taking Strategy:**

This question identifies an example of a positive event query. Note the **strategic words** *most likely*. Additional noteworthy words are *active* (noted in the question) and *confirm* (noted in the query). Focus on the diagnosis presented in the question and the associated pathophysiology to assist in directing you to option 3. Remember that tuberculosis is an infectious disease caused by *Mycobacterium tuberculosis*, and the demonstration of tubercle bacilli using bacteriology is essential for establishing a diagnosis. It is not possible to make a diagnosis solely on the basis of a chest x-ray, and a positive reaction to a skin test indicates the presence of tuberculosis infection but does not show whether the infection is active or dormant. A white blood cell count may be increased, but it is not specifically related to the presence of tuberculosis. Remember to note the wording in the query and focus on the **strategic words!** 



## Tip for the Nursing Student

Tuberculosis is an infectious disease of the lung caused by the acid-fast bacillus *Mycobacterium tuberculosis*. It is generally transmitted by the inhalation or ingestion of infected droplets and usually affects the lungs, although infection of multiple organ systems can occur. It is a major public health concern because of its infectious nature. Because of the presence of the acid-fast bacillus in the lung, the way that the infection is confirmed is by its presence in the sputum. You may have already learned about this disease during your microbiology course, but will learn more about it when you study the respiratory system and infectious diseases. Be sure to learn about this infectious disease.

## Study Tip

#### Scope of Practice

As the nurse, you will not be prescribing diagnostic tests, but you must understand preprocedure preparation and postprocedure care and the associated client teaching points. Nurses play an active role in the treatment process of assigned clients and are integral in the management and delivery of quality care.

## Study Tip

## **Preparing for Clinical**

As a nursing student, you will be expected to deliver safe care to your assigned clients. Be sure to

know if your clients are on any type of transmission-based precautions, and institute these precautions in the care of your clients. This is important because it relates to infection control. Your clinical instructor will be observing to ensure that you follow these precautions!



### Sample Question 2

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is preparing to administer digoxin 0.25 mg orally. The label on the medication bottle reads "digoxin 0.125 mg per tablet."

### **Positive Event Query:**

How many tablet(s) will the nurse plan to administer to the client?

#### **Answer:**

2 tablets

### **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Focus on the **subject**, calculating a medication dose. Note the words *plan to administer*. Focus on the **information in the question** and that a dose of 0.25 mg is prescribed. Use the formula for calculating a medication dose to answer the question. Always double-check the calculation, and verify your answer using a calculator. Remember to use nursing knowledge, focus on the **information in the question**, and identify what the question is asking (the **subject**).



### Tip for the Nursing Student

In this question you need to know the formula for calculating a medication dose. You will learn about medication calculations in your fundamentals of nursing course. The formula and the calculation for this question are as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Desired}}{\text{Avilable}} \times \text{Quantity} = \text{number of tablet(s)}$$

$$\frac{\text{0.25mg}}{\text{0.125mg}} \times \text{1 tablet} = \text{2 tablets}$$

# Study Tip

### Lifestyle Planning

To be successful in nursing school, you must be organized. Whether you are preparing for an exam, clinical, or other related assignment in nursing school, make sure you know what your instructor is expecting of you and plan ahead so you can meet these expectations!



# Sample Question 3

### **Case Event:**

Which nursing interventions apply in the care of an infant after a cleft lip repair (cheiloplasty)?

### **Positive Event Query:**

### Select all that apply.

- 1. Position the child on the abdomen.
- 2. Observe for bleeding at the operative site.
- 3. Keep elbow restraints on the infant at all times.
- 4. Cleanse the suture line gently after feeding the infant.
- 5. Institute measures that will prevent vigorous and sustained crying.
- 6. Assist the mother with breastfeeding if this is the feeding method of choice.

#### **Answer:**

2, 4, 5, 6

### **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Focus on the **subject**, nursing interventions after a cleft lip repair. Eliminate option 3 first because of the **closed-ended word**, *all*. Next, visualize each intervention, and think about its effect on the surgical repair to assist in selecting the correct interventions. Remember to focus on the **subject** and the surgical procedure!



### Tip for the Nursing Student

A cleft lip is a craniofacial malformation that results from the incomplete fusion of the embryonic structures surrounding the primitive oral cavity. It may be unilateral or bilateral. Closure of the lip defect is usually done between 6 and 12 weeks of age as long as the infant is free of any oral, respiratory, or systemic infection. Interventions in the postoperative period are directed toward protecting the operative site, preventing infection, and maintaining nutrition. Keeping these goals of care in mind will assist in answering the question correctly. You will learn about disorders of the newborn and infant in your newborn care and pediatric nursing courses. Learn about cleft lip repair and the important nursing interventions.

### NCLEX® Exam Tip

Think about the goals of care for a client after a surgical procedure. Remember that interventions in the postoperative period are directed toward maintaining a patent airway, protecting the operative site, preventing infection, and maintaining nutrition. Keeping these goals of care in mind will assist in answering questions regarding care to the postoperative client.




# Sample Question 4

### **Case Event:**

The nurse is performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation on a 6-month-old infant.

### **Positive Event Query:**

Which anatomical area would the nurse palpate to assess circulation?

### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Focus on the **subject**, assessing circulation in a 6-month-old infant. Visualize the body structure of a 6-month-old infant, and recall that the very short and fat neck of the infant makes the carotid pulse difficult to palpate. In an infant younger than 12 months, the brachial pulse is used to assess circulation. Remember to focus on the **subject!** 



### Tip for the Beginning Nursing Student

You need to know where the arterial pulse points are located, but you also need to note that this question focuses on the 6-month-old infant. Use what you learned in anatomy class, fundamentals of nursing class, and physical assessment class. You will also learn more about the infant in your newborn care and pediatric nursing courses. Think about the anatomical structure of the 6-month-old infant, and remember that in an infant younger than 12 months, the brachial pulse is used to assess circulation.



### Sample Question 5

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is caring for a client who suddenly develops pulmonary edema.

### **Positive Event Query:**

Arrange the nursing interventions in the **priority** order that they should be performed. **All options must be used.**

### **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Focus on the **subject**, care for the client with pulmonary edema. Think about the pathophysiology associated with acute pulmonary edema. This will assist in determining that positioning the client in high-Fowler's position would be the first action so that breathing will be easier for the client. Next, use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**—to guide your selections. This will assist in determining that administering oxygen to the client would be the next action, followed by placing the client on a cardiac monitor and pulse oximetry. Next check the lung sounds, because this is an assessment or data collection procedure, and you would want to evaluate the status of lung sounds so that you will be able to determine the response to furosemide when it is administered. The urinary catheter is also inserted so the urine output can be assessed as a response to the furosemide. If there is no response to the treatment, then finally the client may need intubation and mechanical ventilation. Remember to focus on the **subject!** 



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Pulmonary edema is a life-threatening event that can result from severe heart failure. In pulmonary edema, the left ventricle of the heart fails to eject sufficient blood, and pressure increases in the lungs because of the accumulated fluid. The client has severe dyspnea and struggles for air. Therefore, interventions are aimed at alleviating this severe dyspnea and removing the excess fluid from the body. You will learn about pulmonary edema in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiovascular disorders. Be sure to learn the signs and symptoms of heart failure and pulmonary edema and the associated interventions.

### Study Tip

### **Preparing for Clinical**

When in clinical, make sure you understand and implement prioritizing guidelines. When caring

for a client who is in the acute stage of a disease process, your instructor will expect you to be able to care for the client safely in terms of nursing actions to take in the event of an emergency.

NCLEX® Exam Tip
Positive event queries are primarily used in questions on the NCLEX exam.



### What Is a Negative Event Query?

A negative event query asks you to make a decision and select the option that is inaccurate or incorrect with regard to the data presented in the question. How will you know that the question includes a negative event query? Read the question carefully, and focus on the query of the question. The query contains words or phrases that indicate the question includes a negative event query. Generally, negative event queries are used in evaluation-type questions and evaluate the effectiveness of a treatment, procedure, medication, or teaching.

### Study Tip

### Lifestyle Planning

Nursing school is very difficult. Surround yourself with people who are supportive and who will help you achieve your goals!

### NCLEX® Exam Tip

Negative event queries are used less frequently on the NCLEX exam than positive event queries, but you need to be alert in noting these types of questions.

Negative event query: Select an option that is incorrect or inaccurate with regard to the data in the question!

### What Words and Phrases Are Commonly Used in Negative Event Queries?

Remember to read the question carefully and focus on the query of the question because the query contains words or phrases that indicate the question includes a negative event query. Examples of words and phrases are listed in the following box. In addition, examples of negative event queries and sample questions that indicate the question includes a negative event query are listed next.

### Study Tip

### **Scope of Practice**

Negative event query type questions may ask about what you, as a nurse, need to follow up on in the care of your assigned clients. In other words, the question asks about what nursing actions need to be further implemented to ensure delivery of quality client care.

# Sample Question 1

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is reviewing the nursing care plan of a hospitalized client with sickle cell crisis.

### **Negative Event Query:**

Which client problem is the least priority?

- 1. Generalized pain
- 2. Signs of dehydration
- 3. Inability to cope with the disease
- 4. Lack of perfusion to peripheral tissues

#### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Focus on the words *least priority*. According to **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory**, physiological needs are the priority, followed by safety needs, and then psychosocial needs. Using **Maslow's theory** will direct you to option 3 because this is the only option that addresses a psychosocial need. Remember to focus on the words *least priority*. These words indicate a **negative event query**.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Sickle cell disease is a genetic disorder that results in chronic anemia, pain, organ damage, and disability. The client also has an increased risk for infection. In sickle cell disease, the hemoglobin contains an abnormal beta chain known as *hemoglobin S*. The hemoglobin S is sensitive to oxygen changes occurring on the red blood cells; when decreased oxygen states occur, the abnormal cells pile together, distorting its shape, and these cells form a sickle shape, become rigid, and block blood flow. The client with sickle cell disease can have episodes of crises that occur in response to conditions that cause hypoxemia. This causes acute pain. The primary treatment for crisis consists of hydration, comfort measures with analgesics, and oxygen administration. You will learn about sickle cell disease when you study hematological problems. Be sure to learn about the causes of crisis and its treatment measures.



# Sample Question 2

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse has collected data from four clients examined in the health care clinic.

### **Negative Event Query:**

Which client is least likely to develop coronary artery disease?

- 1. A client who is obese, is inactive, and has a stressful lifestyle
- 2. A client with a blood cholesterol level of 289 mg/dL (7.47 mmol/L)
- 3. A client who has been smoking 2 packs of cigarettes daily for the past 20 years
- 4. A client with hypertension whose blood pressure has been maintained at 118/78 mm Hg

#### **Answer:**

4

### **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Focus on the **data in the question** and note the words *least likely*. Recalling the risk factors associated with coronary artery disease will direct you to option 4. Option 4 is the only option that identifies a risk factor (hypertension) that has been modified and controlled. Remember to focus on the words *least likely*. These words indicate a **negative event query**.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Coronary artery disease affects the arteries that supply blood to the myocardium. When blood flow to the myocardium is partially or completely blocked, ischemia or infarction of the myocardium can occur and the client suffers a heart attack. Coronary artery disease is a major concern because it is a life-threatening disease; this is why great emphasis is placed on reducing or eliminating the modifiable risk factors such as obesity, high blood pressure, stress, smoking, and high cholesterol. You will learn about coronary artery disease when you study the cardiovascular system in medical-surgical nursing. Be sure to learn the associated risk factors and measures to reduce or eliminate them.



# Sample Question 3

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is caring for a client with aphasia.

### **Negative Event Query:**

Which nursing action will be **ineffective** when communicating with the client?

- 1. Increasing environmental stimuli
- 2. Speaking with a normal volume or tone
- 3. Presenting 1 thought or idea at a time
- 4. Asking questions that can be answered "yes" or "no"

### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Focus on the **data** in the **question** and the client's diagnosis and note the word *ineffective*. Recalling that the client with aphasia may need extra time to comprehend and respond to communication will direct you to option 1. Increased environmental stimuli may be distracting and disrupting to communication efforts. Remember to focus on the word *ineffective*! This word indicates a **negative event query**.



### **Tip for the Nursing Student**

Aphasia is an abnormal neurological condition in which language function is disordered or absent

because of injury to certain areas of the cerebral cortex. This condition is most often seen in a client with a stroke (brain attack). The aphasic client needs repetitive directions to understand and complete a task, and each task needs to be broken down into parts, with directions given one step at a time. The client needs time to process the information. This is why increased environmental stimuli can be disruptive to the communication process. You will learn about aphasia when you study the neurological system in your medical-surgical nursing course. Be sure to learn about the nursing interventions for a client with aphasia.

### Study Tip

#### Student-to-Student

Negative event queries are one of the hardest types of questions to answer correctly. Be on the lookout for the words or phrases that indicate the question contains a negative event query, and be sure to reread the question before submitting your answer!



# Sample Question 4

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is collecting data from a client who has been taking omeprazole as prescribed.

### **Negative Event Query:**

The nurse determines that the medication is **ineffective** if the client continues to experience which symptom?

- 1. Dizziness
- 2. Heartburn
- 3. Headaches
- 4. Muscle pains

#### **Answer:**

2

### **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Focus on the **data in the question** and note the name of the medication and the word *ineffective*. Recalling that omeprazole is a gastric acid pump inhibitor (most medication names that end with the letters *-zole* are gastric acid pump inhibitors) will direct you to option 2. Remember to focus on the word *ineffective!* This word indicates a **negative event query**.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Omeprazole is a gastric acid pump inhibitor that is most often used to treat gastrointestinal disorders, such as esophagitis, gastroesophageal reflux disease, and certain stomach ulcers. Therefore, this medication will assist in relieving heartburn. You will learn about this medication when you study pharmacology and when you study gastrointestinal disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course. Be sure to learn the action, intended effect, contraindications, and client teaching points for this medication.



## Sample Question 5

#### **Case Event:**

A client treated for an episode of hyperthermia is being discharged to home from the emergency department, and the nurse provides discharge instructions.

### **Negative Event Query:**

The nurse determines that the client **needs additional instructions** if the client states intentions to implement which measure?

- 1. Resume full activity level immediately
- 2. Increase fluid intake for the next 24 hours
- 3. Stay in a cool environment when possible
- 4. Monitor voiding for adequacy of urine output

### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Focus on the **strategic words** *needs additional instructions*. Select the client statement that indicates that the nurse needs to provide further instructions. Resumption of full activity immediately is not helpful; rather, rest periods are indicated. Remember to focus on the **strategic words** *needs additional instructions*. These words indicate a **negative event query**.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Hyperthermia is a condition in which the client's body temperature is elevated above his or her normal range. It can be caused by various factors, such as a hot environment, vigorous activity, medications or anesthesia, increased metabolic rate, illness or trauma, dehydration, or the inability to perspire. Treatment involves lowering the body temperature and treating and eliminating its cause. You will learn about hyperthermia during your nursing program in many of your courses. Be sure to focus on the causes of the hyperthermia and its treatment.



### Sample Question 6

### **Case Event:**

Malnutrition has been diagnosed for an unconscious client.

#### **Negative Event Query:**

Which outcome indicates to the nurse that the goals for this client have not yet been met?

- 1. Stable weight
- 2. Intake equaling output
- 3. Total protein 4.5 g/dL (45 g/L)
- 4. Blood urea nitrogen (BUN) 12 mg/dL (4.28 mmol/L)

#### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy:**

Focus on the **subject**, *goals have not yet been met*. Because stable weight and equal intake and output are satisfactory indicators and the BUN is a normal value, option 3 is the answer to the question. Also recall that the total protein reference range is 6.4 to 8.3 g/dL (64 to 83 g/L). Remember to focus on the **subject**, *goals have not yet been met!* These words indicate a **negative event query**.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Malnutrition indicates that the client's intake of nutrients is insufficient to meet the client's metabolic needs. This can be due to various causes such as, but not limited to, disease, injury, malabsorption, social factors, or cultural factors. Nursing interventions focus on addressing the nutritional deficits. You will learn about malnutrition in your nutrition or fundamentals of nursing course.

# **CHAPTER 8**

# **Questions Requiring Prioritization**




Many test questions in the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX®) require you to use the skill of prioritizing nursing actions. Most prioritizing questions are presented in the multiple-choice format; however, you may also be presented with a question in the prioritizing (ordered-response) format. Prioritizing questions address content in any nursing area. These types of questions can be difficult because when a question requires prioritization, all options may be correct, but you need to determine the correct order of action. Some test-taking strategies that you can use to assist in answering these questions correctly include noting the strategic words or strategic phrases that indicate the need to prioritize; the ABCs—airway, breathing, and circulation; Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory; and the steps of the nursing process. Let's review the definition of prioritizing and these test-taking strategies.

### **Guides for Prioritizing**

Strategic words or phrases
The ABCs
Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory
The steps of the nursing process (clinical problem-solving process)



### What Does Prioritizing Mean?



*Prioritizing* means that you need to rank the client's problems in order of importance. It is important to read a question carefully and focus on the information in the question because the order of importance may vary depending on the subject of the question, the clinical setting, the client's condition, and the client's needs. It also is important to consider what the client deems a priority, which may be quite different from what the nurse thinks is most important. Remember to always consider what the client believes is the priority when planning care.

When you prioritize, you are deciding which client needs or problems require immediate action and which ones could be delayed until a later time because they are not urgent. As you read a question and are trying to determine which option identifies the nurse's priority, use the priority classification system to rank nursing actions as a high, intermediate (middle), or low priority. The description of these three types of classifications is listed next.

### Study Tip

### Lifestyle Planning

The guidelines for prioritizing should be applied to your lifestyle and your academic life. Determine what priorities you have at given times and attend to these first. The ability to prioritize will really help you succeed in nursing school!



### **Priority Classification System**

High Priority: a client need that is life threatening or, if untreated, could result in harm to the client Intermediate (Middle) Priority: a nonemergency and non–life-threatening client need that does not require immediate attention

*Low Priority:* a client need that is not directly related to the client's illness or prognosis, is not urgent, and does not require immediate attention



### When Is It a Priority to Select the Option "Call the Primary

### **Health Care Provider"?**



An important point to remember is that the NCLEX exam tests your competence and ability to care for a client and to implement necessary measures in a particular situation. It is critically important to read the question carefully, note the information in the question, and read all available options. If the question describes a client situation that is not life threatening and there is an option

that directly relates to a nursing action relevant to the situation, then it is best to select that option and not the option that indicates to "call the primary health care provider." Remember that there is usually an action that the nurse would take in a non–life-threatening situation before calling the primary health care provider. *Note:* For those nursing students who are studying to become licensed practical/vocational nurses rather than registered nurses, it is very important to report immediately any changes in a client's condition to the registered nurse.

If the question presents a client situation that is life threatening, then the correct option *may* be to call the primary health care provider. Unfortunately, this is not always clear-cut and can present a dilemma in your efforts to answer a question correctly. That is why it is so important to carefully read the question and all the options. Let us review some sample questions that illustrate when to and when not to select the option "call the primary health care provider."



# Sample Question:

# When TO Select the Option "Call the Primary Health Care Provider" as the Priority Action

### **Case Event:**

The nurse is caring for a client who just returned from the recovery room after a tonsillectomy and adenoidectomy. The client is restless, and the pulse rate is increased. The nurse continues to assess the client, but the client begins to vomit large amounts of bright red blood.

### **Question Query:**

What is the **immediate** nursing action?

- 1. Call the surgeon
- 2. Continue to assess the client
- 3. Obtain a flashlight and gauze
- 4. Check the client's blood pressure

### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Read the question carefully, noting the **strategic word** *immediate*. Several other noteworthy words in this question include *restless*, *pulse rate is increased*, *large amounts*, and *bright red blood*. The **subject** of the question is that the client is actively bleeding and is exhibiting signs of shock (restlessness and increased pulse rate), indicating a life-threatening situation. Remember to always read each option carefully. In this situation and from the options provided, the nurse would contact the primary health care provider, and in this question, it is the surgeon. Options 2, 3, and 4 would delay necessary interventions needed in this life-threatening situation.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Whenever you note that a client is bleeding and the amount is large and bright red, you would become concerned because this indicates active bleeding. Active bleeding is a concern after any type of surgery, including a tonsillectomy and adenoidectomy, and indicates a potential lifethreatening situation. You will learn about postoperative complications in your fundamentals of nursing course, and you will learn specifically about tonsillectomy and adenoidectomy in your pediatrics nursing course. Be sure to learn the postoperative complications and the immediate nursing interventions.

### Study Tip

### **Preparing for Clinical**

When caring for a pediatric client, family-centered care is always a focus. Although the child is your primary client, the child's family is an additional client whose needs you must be sensitive to and address while caring for the child.



### Sample Question:

# When NOT TO Select the Option "Call the Primary Health Care Provider" as the Priority Action

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse enters a client's room and finds the client slumped over in bed. The nurse quickly assesses the client and discovers that the client is not breathing and there is no pulse.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse should take which immediate action?

- 1. Sit the client upright in bed
- 2. Call the primary health care provider
- 3. Begin cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR)
- 4. Place oxygen via a nasal cannula on the client

### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Read the question carefully, note the **strategic word** *immediate*, and focus on the **subject**—the client is not breathing and there is no pulse. Although the information in the question indicates a lifethreatening situation, you need to read all options carefully. In this situation and based on the options provided, the nurse needs to intervene *immediately*. Although the primary health care provider needs to be called, the *immediate* nursing action would be to begin CPR. Options 1 and 4 are incorrect because neither of these options will provide immediate assistance to this client.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

It is important to read all the information in the question and focus on every word. Note that the client is not breathing and there is no pulse. Therefore, you need to begin CPR. You were most likely required to obtain health care certification in basic life support and CPR before entering nursing school. Be sure to review these procedures, especially because you will be caring for clients during your clinical experiences in your nursing program.



# Sample Question:

# When NOT TO Select the Option "Call the Primary Health Care Provider" as the Priority Action

#### **Case Event:**

A nurse is caring for a postoperative client who suddenly becomes restless.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse should take which most appropriate action?

- 1. Notify the surgeon
- 2. Medicate the client for pain
- 3. Check the client's vital signs
- 4. Talk to the client in a calm voice

#### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Read the question carefully, note the **strategic words** *most appropriate*, and focus on the **subject**—a postoperative client who becomes restless. Additionally, focus on the **data in the question**. No data in the question indicate that the client has pain; therefore, eliminate option 2. Because option 4 is a psychosocial action rather than a physiological one (physiological needs are the priority), eliminate that option using **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory**.

Recall that restlessness can be an early sign of shock. However, no data in the question indicate a life-threatening condition. Therefore, the nurse would gather more data about the client's condition and should *most appropriately* check the client's vital signs.



### **Tip for the Nursing Student**

One complication after surgery is the development of shock, which is usually due to bleeding or an excessive loss of blood during the surgical procedure. The nurse monitors the postoperative client for signs of shock. One of the earliest signs of shock is restlessness. If restlessness is noted, the nurse would check the client's vital signs next. In shock, the nurse would note that the blood pressure decreases and the pulse rate increases. You will learn about shock as a postoperative complication in your fundamentals of nursing course. Be sure to focus on the signs of shock and the immediate nursing interventions.

### Study Tip

### **Scope of Practice**

As a nurse, it is your responsibility to determine when a nursing action needs to be taken before calling the primary health care provider. Remember that most often, a nursing action is usually taken before notifying the primary health care provider.



## **Strategic Words or Strategic Phrases**

# What Strategic Words or Strategic Phrases Indicate the Need to Prioritize Nursing Actions?



Remember that when a question requires prioritization, all options may be correct; therefore, you need to determine the correct order of nursing action(s). Read the question carefully, and look for the strategic words or strategic phrases in the question that indicate the need to prioritize. Some common strategic words or strategic phrases that indicate the need to prioritize are listed next and are followed by sample questions to illustrate how some of these words or phrases are used in a question.

# Common Strategic Words That Indicate the Need to Prioritize

Best	Initial	Next
Essential	Most	Order of priority
First	Most appropriate	Primary
Highest priority	Most important	Priority
Immediately	Most likely	Vital

### NCLEX® Exam Tip

Remember that many, if not most, questions on the NCLEX exam will require you to prioritize. This means that you can expect the options presented for the question will all be correct options and you will need to use prioritizing skills to answer correctly. Remember to look for the strategic words in the event query to assist in answering correctly!



### Sample Question:

### **Prioritizing and Strategic Words**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is caring for a hospitalized client with angina pectoris who begins to experience chest pain. The nurse administers a sublingual nitroglycerin tablet as prescribed, but the pain is

unrelieved. The nurse checks the client's blood pressure and notes that it is stable.

### **Ouestion Ouery:**

Which action should the nurse take **next**?

- 1. Reposition the client
- 2. Call the client's family
- 3. Administer another nitroglycerin tablet
- 4. Contact the primary health care provider

#### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *next*, and focus on the **subject**—the client is experiencing chest pain. Recalling that for a hospitalized client the nurse would administer 3 nitroglycerin tablets 5 minutes apart from each other to relieve chest pain will assist in directing you to option 3. Repositioning the client will not alleviate pain associated with angina pectoris. The nurse would call the primary health care provider if 3 nitroglycerin tablets administered 5 minutes apart from each other did not alleviate the pain. There is no useful reason to call the client's family at this time.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Angina pectoris refers to chest pain that is most often caused by a lack of oxygen to myocardial tissue and occurs as a result of atherosclerosis (clogged blood vessels) or spasm of the coronary arteries. The pain may be relieved by rest and vasodilation of the coronary arteries by medication such as nitroglycerin. The usual protocol for administering nitroglycerin to a hospitalized client is to administer a total of 3 tablets, 5 minutes apart each, to relieve the chest pain. In other words, a nitroglycerin tablet is administered, and if the pain is not relieved in 5 minutes, another is administered. This is repeated in 5 minutes, 1 more time, if the pain is not relieved by the second nitroglycerin tablet. After administering 3 nitroglycerin tablets, if the pain is still unrelieved, the primary health care provider is called. It is also important for the nurse to monitor the client's blood pressure because nitroglycerin causes a drop in blood pressure. You will learn about angina pectoris and nitroglycerin during your medical-surgical nursing course. Because this is a major, life-threatening disorder, it is critical that you learn about its signs and symptoms and immediate treatment.

### Study Tip

### Lifestyle Planning

Allowing time for yourself and fun time with family and friends is a priority in your success in nursing school. Don't forget to include this important aspect of your life in your schedule on a regular basis! Planning ahead and setting realistic daily goals for yourself will ensure you are able to build this into your busy schedule.



# Sample Question:

### **Prioritizing and Strategic Words**

### **Case Event:**

An infant with tetralogy of Fallot experiences a hypercyanotic spell during a blood draw.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse should take which action first?

- 1. Place the infant in a knee-chest position
- 2. Administer intravenous (IV) fluids as prescribed
- 3. Administer 100% oxygen by face mask as prescribed
- 4. Administer morphine sulfate subcutaneously as prescribed

#### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *first*, and focus on the **subject** of the question—a hypercyanotic spell. In questions that require you to determine the first nursing action, if one of the options indicates client positioning, that option may be the correct one. Positioning a client can relieve a symptom and is an intervention that takes only seconds to implement. Placing the infant in the knee—chest position reduces the venous return from the legs (which is desaturated) and increases systemic vascular resistance, which diverts more blood flow into the pulmonary artery. Note that the remaining options all require a primary health care provider's prescription. Your next action would be to administer oxygen to the infant. Remembering that morphine sulfate reduces spasm that occurs with these spells and that IV fluids are not always needed to treat these spells will assist in determining the order of priority for the remaining 2 interventions.




### Tip for the Nursing Student

Tetralogy of Fallot is a congenital cardiac anomaly that consists of 4 defects in the heart: pulmonary stenosis, ventricular septal defect, malposition of the aorta so that it arises from the septal defect or the right ventricle, and right ventricular hypertrophy. The treatment consists primarily of supportive measures and palliative surgical procedures until the child is old enough to tolerate total corrective surgery. It would be helpful to review the anatomy and physiology of the heart. In addition, you will learn about tetralogy of Fallot when you take your pediatrics nursing course.



# What Are the ABCs, and How Will They Help Answer a Prioritizing Question?



The ABCs—airway, breathing, and circulation—direct the order of priority of nursing actions. Airway is always the first priority in caring for any client. When a question requires prioritization, use the ABCs to help determine the correct option. If an option addresses maintenance of a patent airway, that will be the correct option. If none of the options address the airway, move to B (breathing), followed by C (circulation). One exception is if the question asks about cardiopulmonary resuscitation. In these questions, remember to follow CAB—circulation, airway, and breathing—to prioritize. Some sample questions of how the ABC—airway, breathing, and circulation—strategy works are provided next.

### Use the ABCs to prioritize!



## Sample Question:

### The ABCs

### **Case Event:**

A client with a diagnosis of cancer is receiving morphine sulfate for pain.

### **Question Query:**

When preparing the plan of care for the client, the nurse should include which priority action?

- 1. Monitor stools
- 2. Monitor urine output
- 3. Encourage fluid intake
- 4. Encourage the client to cough and deep breathe

#### **Answer:**

4

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *priority*, and focus on the **subject**—morphine sulfate. Use the **ABCs**—**airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**—as a guide to direct you to the correct option. Recall that morphine sulfate suppresses the cough reflex and the respiratory reflex. Although options 1, 2, and 3 are components of the plan of care, the correct option addresses airway. Remember to use the **ABCs** to prioritize.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Morphine sulfate is an opioid analgesic that is used to alleviate pain. One of the primary concerns when a client receives morphine sulfate is that the medication depresses the respiratory and cough reflex. Therefore, the nurse focuses primarily on the client's respiratory status when administering morphine sulfate. You will learn about morphine sulfate in your medical-surgical nursing courses and in your pharmacology course.



# Sample Question:

### The ABCs

### **Case Event:**

The nurse is assessing the client's condition after cardioversion.

### **Question Query:**

Which observation would be of highest priority?

- 1. Blood pressure
- 2. Status of airway
- 3. Oxygen flow rate
- 4. Level of consciousness

#### **Answer:**

2

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic words** *highest priority,* and focus on the **subject**—monitoring a client after cardioversion. Nursing responsibilities after cardioversion include maintenance of a patent airway, oxygen administration, assessment of vital signs and level of consciousness, and dysrhythmia detection. Airway, however, is always the highest priority. Use the **ABCs—airway, breathing, and circulation** to direct you to option 2.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Cardioversion is a procedure in which an electrical shock is delivered to the heart with the use of a defibrillator. Cardioversion is used to slow the heart or to restore the heart to a normal sinus rhythm when medication therapy is ineffective. You will learn about cardioversion when you

study cardiac disorders and dysrhythmias in your medical-surgical nursing course.



# Sample Question:

### The ABCs

#### Case Event:

The nurse is providing preoperative teaching to a client scheduled for a cholecystectomy.

### **Question Query:**

Which intervention would be of **highest priority** in the preoperative teaching plan?

- 1. Teaching leg exercises
- 2. Providing instructions regarding fluid intake
- 3. Teaching coughing and deep-breathing exercises
- 4. Assessing the client's understanding of the surgical procedure

### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic words** *highest priority*, and note the **subject**—preoperative plan of care. Use the **ABCs**—**airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**—to answer the question. Option 3 relates to airway. After cholecystectomy, breathing tends to be shallow because deep breathing is painful as a result of the location of the surgical procedure. Although all options are a component of the preoperative teaching plan, teaching the importance of performing coughing and deep-breathing exercises is the priority in the preoperative plan of care.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

A cholecystectomy is the removal of the gallbladder. You can use medical terminology skills to determine what cholecystectomy refers to: *cholecyst*- means gallbladder, and *-ectomy* means removal of. Next, using your knowledge of anatomy, think about the anatomical location of the gallbladder. Because of its close anatomical location to the diaphragm, it makes sense that the client would have difficulty coughing and deep breathing after surgery.



# **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs Theory**

# What Is Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs Theory, and How Will It Help Answer Prioritizing Questions?

Abraham Maslow theorized that human needs are satisfied in a particular order, and he arranged human needs in a pyramid or hierarchy. According to Maslow, basic physiological needs, such as airway, breathing, circulation, water, food, and elimination, are the priority. These basic physiological needs are followed by safety and then the psychosocial needs, including security, love and belonging, self-esteem, and self-actualization, in that order.

Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory is a helpful guide when prioritizing client needs. When you are answering a question that requires you to prioritize, select an option that relates to a physiological need, remembering that physiological needs are the first priority.


### Study Tip

### **Preparing for Clinical**

Apply Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory while you are in clinical, especially if you are assigned to more than one client. This will impress your clinical instructor and ensure delivery of quality client care!

Use Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory to prioritize!

If a physiological need is not addressed in the question or noted in one of the options, then continue to use Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory as a guide and look for the option that addresses safety. If neither physiological nor safety needs are addressed, look for the option that addresses the client's psychosocial need. See the illustration of Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory for a full list of needs. The sample questions that follow point out how Maslow's theory can be used as a guide when answering questions that require prioritizing.

# Sample Question:

### Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs

### **Case Event:**

The nurse is admitting a client with a diagnosis of posttraumatic stress disorder to the mental health unit. The client is confused and disoriented.

### **Question Query:**

During the assessment, what is the nurse's **primary** goal for this client?

- 1. Explain the unit rules
- 2. Orient the client to the unit
- 3. Stabilize the client's psychiatric needs
- 4. Accept the client and make the client feel safe

#### **Answer:**

4

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *primary*, and focus on the **subject**—a client being admitted to the mental health unit. Using **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory**, remember that when a physiological need does not exist, safety needs take precedence. It is important to accept a client and make a confused and disoriented client feel safe. Orientation and explaining the unit rules are part of any admission process and are not specific to this client. Stabilizing psychiatric needs is a long-term goal.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Posttraumatic stress disorder is a mental health disorder characterized by an acute emotional response to a traumatic event that involved severe environmental stress. This event could include situations such as a natural disaster, a terrorist attack, military combat, physical torture, rape, experiencing or witnessing an automobile crash or other type of accident, or witnessing a shooting or murder. You will learn about posttraumatic stress disorder in your psychiatric/mental health nursing course.



### Sample Question:

### Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs

### **Case Event:**

The nurse has developed a plan of care for a client diagnosed with anorexia nervosa.

#### **Question Query:**

Which client problem should the nurse select as the **priority** in the plan of care?

- 1. Malnutrition
- 2. Inability to cope
- 3. Concern about body appearance
- 4. Lack of knowledge about nutrition

#### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *priority*, and focus on the **subject**—the priority problem for a client with anorexia nervosa. Use **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory** to recall that physiological needs are the priority. This will assist in directing you to option 1. Options 2, 3, and 4 are psychosocial needs and are of a lesser priority.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Anorexia nervosa is a disorder characterized by a prolonged refusal to eat. The client believes that he or she is obese, although the body weight is well below the individual's normal expected weight. It results in emaciation, amenorrhea, an emotional disturbance concerning body image, and the fear of becoming obese. The condition is primarily seen in adolescent girls and is usually associated with emotional stress or conflict such as anger, fear, or anxiety. Treatment includes measures to improve nutritional status and therapy to overcome the emotional conflicts associated with the disorder. You will learn about anorexia nervosa in your psychiatric/mental health nursing course.



### Sample Question:

### Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is preparing to teach a client how to use crutches. Before initiating the lesson, the nurse performs an assessment on the client.

### **Ouestion Ouery:**

The priority nursing assessment should include which focus?

- 1. The client's feelings about the restricted mobility
- 2. The client's fear related to the use of the crutches
- 3. The client's muscle strength and previous activity level
- 4. The client's understanding of the need for increased mobility

#### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *priority*, and focus on the **subject**—teaching a client how to use crutches. Using **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory**, remember that physiological needs take precedence over psychosocial needs. This should direct you to option 3. Assessing muscle strength will help determine whether the client has enough strength for crutch walking and if muscle-strengthening exercises are necessary. Previous activity level will provide information related to the tolerance of activity. Options 1, 2, and 4 are also components of the assessment but relate to psychosocial needs.




### Tip for the Nursing Student


Crutches are devices that are usually made of wood or metal and that aid a person in walking. Crutches require the use of some upper and lower body muscle strength; otherwise injury, such as a fall, can occur. It is also important for the nurse to determine the client's previous activity level to determine if crutches would be an appropriate assistive device. If the client's previous activity level was minimal and muscle strength is poor, crutches would not be an appropriate ambulatory device, and the client would be at risk for injury with their use. It is also important for the crutches to be fitted properly and for the individual to be taught how to safely walk using them to achieve a stable gait. You will learn about the use of crutches and other assistive devices for ambulation in your fundamentals of nursing course.



How Will the Nursing Process (Clinical Problem-Solving Process) Help Answer Prioritizing Questions?

The Test Plan for the NCLEX exam identifies the nursing process (clinical problem-solving process) as an Integrated Process. The nursing process provides a systematic method for providing care to a client. For the student studying to become a registered nurse, these steps include assessment, analysis, planning, implementation, and evaluation. For the student studying to become a licensed practical/vocational nurse, these steps include data collection, planning, implementation, and evaluation. These steps are usually followed in sequence, with assessment/data collection being the first step and evaluation being the last step. However, once the nursing process begins, it becomes a cyclical process. The steps of the nursing process can be used as a guide to help you when answering questions that require prioritization. Remember that it is always important to read the question carefully to determine what the question is asking. When a question asks for the first or initial nursing action, use these steps and look for an assessment/data collection action in one of the options. If an assessment/data collection action is not addressed in one of the options, then continue to use the nursing process in a systematic order. See the accompanying illustration of the steps of the nursing process for the student studying to become a registered nurse, and the illustration of the steps of the nursing process (clinical problem-solving process) for the student studying to become a licensed practical/vocational nurse. A description for each step follows.

Use the steps of the nursing process (clinical problem-solving process) to prioritize!

### Study Tip

### Student-to-Student

Use of the nursing process is a really effective way to prioritize on nursing exams, in clinical, and when writing care plans. With enough practice, you will implement this process without even knowing it, so keep practicing!

#### **Assessment/Data Collection**

Assessment/data collection questions address the process of gathering subjective and objective data relative to the client, confirming that data, and communicating and documenting the data.

Remember that assessment/data collection is the first step in the nursing process. When you are asked to select your first or initial nursing action, look for an option that addresses assessment/data collection. If an option contains the concept of assessment or the collection of client data, it is best to select that option. Some strategic words to look for in the options that indicate an assessment/data collection action are listed next. A sample question follows.

# Strategic Words in Options That Indicate Assessment/Data Collection

If an assessment/data collection action is not noted in one of the options, follow the steps of the nursing process (clinical problem-solving process) as your guide in selecting your initial or first action. *Possible exception to this guideline for prioritizing:* If the question presents an emergency situation, read carefully; in an emergency situation, an intervention may be the priority!



# Sample Question:

### Assessment/Data Collection

#### **Case Event:**

A nurse is teaching a client with coronary artery disease about dietary measures that should be followed.

### **Question Query:**

During the session the client expresses frustration in learning the dietary regimen. The nurse should take which **initial** action?

- 1. Continue with the dietary teaching
- 2. Identify the cause of the frustration
- 3. Notify the primary health care provider

4. Tell the client that the diet needs to be followed

#### **Answer:**

2

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *initial*, and focus on the **subject**—a nursing action. Use the **steps of the nursing process**.

Of the options presented, the only assessment/data collection action is option 2. Options 1, 3, and 4 identify the implementation step of the nursing process. The initial action is to identify the cause of the frustration. Remember that assessment/data collection is the first step of the nursing process.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Coronary artery disease affects the arteries that supply blood to the myocardium. When blood flow to the myocardium is partially or completely blocked, ischemia or infarction of the myocardium can occur, and the client experiences a heart attack. Because coronary artery disease is life threatening, great emphasis is placed on reducing or eliminating the modifiable risk factors, such as obesity, high blood pressure, stress, smoking, and high cholesterol. Dietary measures include limiting foods high in cholesterol. High-fat foods, such as fried foods, are high in cholesterol. Because cholesterol is also found in foods of animal origin, meats such as organ meats, beef, bacon, and sausage are high in cholesterol. You will learn about coronary artery disease when you study the cardiovascular system in medical-surgical nursing, and you will learn about the foods high in cholesterol when you study nutrition related to cardiovascular disorders. Be sure to learn about these foods that are high in cholesterol because you will need to teach your client with cardiovascular disease about limiting them in the diet.

### **Analysis**

Beware! For the student studying to become a registered nurse, analysis questions are the most difficult because they require understanding of the principles of physiological responses and require interpretation of the data on the basis of assessment. Analysis questions also require critical thinking and determining the rationale for therapeutic interventions that may be addressed in the question; therefore, many questions on the NCLEX-RN exam are analysis-type questions. Questions that address this step of the nursing process also may address the formulation of a plan of care and the communication and documentation of the results of the process of analysis. Remember to read the question carefully, identify the strategic words and the subject, and use the process of elimination to select the correct option. An example of an analysis-type question is provided next.

### Study Tip

### Student-to-Student

Analysis questions are higher-level questions and require analysis and application of learned knowledge, as well as determining the priority nursing action. In addition to basic knowledge, these questions require practice to perfect your ability to answer them correctly.



# Sample Question:

### **Analysis**

**Case Event:** 

The nurse is reviewing the laboratory results of an infant suspected of having pyloric stenosis.

### **Ouestion Ouery:**

Which laboratory finding should the nurse most likely expect to note in this infant?

- 1. A blood pH of 7.50
- 2. A blood pH of 7.30
- 3. A blood bicarbonate of 21 mEg/L (21 mmol/L)
- 4. A blood bicarbonate of 28 mEq/L (28 mmol/L)

#### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic words** *most likely*, and focus on the **subject**—laboratory results. It is necessary to understand the physiology associated with pyloric stenosis and that metabolic alkalosis is likely to occur as a result of vomiting. Next, it is necessary to know which laboratory findings would be noted in this acid—base condition. The normal pH ranges from 7.35 to 7.45. In an alkalotic condition the pH is elevated. In an acidotic condition the pH is lower than normal. Options 3 and 4 identify normal bicarbonate levels. Analysis of these data will direct you to the correct option.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Pyloric stenosis is a condition in which a narrowing of the pyloric sphincter at the outlet of the stomach occurs. This results in an obstruction that blocks the flow of food into the small intestine. The condition primarily occurs as a congenital defect in newborns. The infant experiences forceful projectile vomiting, causing the loss of hydrochloric acid, which results in metabolic alkalosis in the infant. The condition is treated by surgical correction. You will learn about acid—base disorders in your fundamentals of nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course. You will also learn about pyloric stenosis in your maternity and newborn course and in your pediatrics nursing course.

### **Planning**

Planning questions frequently address creating a client plan of care. These questions require prioritizing client problems, determining goals and outcome criteria for goals of care, developing interventions, and communicating and documenting the plan of care. With regard to questions that address the planning step of the nursing process, keep two important points in mind. First, remember that this is a nursing examination, and the answer to the question most likely involves something related to the nursing plan rather than to the medical plan, unless the question asks what you anticipate the primary health care provider will prescribe. The second point to remember relates to questions that contain options listing client problems and require you to prioritize them or to select the client problem of highest priority. In these questions, it is important to remember that actual client problems rather than potential or at-risk client problems will most likely be the priority. Read the information in the question carefully; this information will guide you to select the correct option in this type of question. An example of a planning type of question is provided next.





### Sample Question:

### **Planning**

### **Case Event:**

The nurse is reviewing the plan of care for a client with a diagnosis of sickle cell anemia.

### **Question Query:**

Which client problem, if stated on the plan of care, should the nurse select as receiving the **highest priority?** 

- 1. Dehydration
- 2. Nervousness about the disease
- 3. Embarrassment about appearance
- 4. Inability to cope with lifestyle limitations imposed as a result of the disease

#### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-taking strategy**

Note the **strategic words** *highest priority*, and focus on the **subject**—a client problem in the plan of care. To correctly answer this question, use **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory** to prioritize, remembering that physiological needs come first. Using this guideline will direct you to option 1. *Dehydration* is a physiological need and is the priority client problem. Options 2, 3, and 4 are psychosocial needs and may or may not be a concern for the client, but remember that physiological needs are the priority.



Tip for the Nursing Student

Sickle cell anemia is a severe and chronic incurable anemic condition in which the abnormal hemoglobin called *hemoglobin S* (Hb S) results in distortion and fragility of the erythrocytes. It is characterized by crises in which the sickled cells clump and cause obstruction of the blood vessels. Joint pain, thrombosis, fever, lethargy, weakness, and splenomegaly occur. You may have learned about sickle cell anemia in your anatomy and physiology course. You will also learn more about this type of anemia in your medical-surgical nursing course and pediatrics course. Sickle cell anemia also may be discussed in your maternity nursing course because this type of anemia in a pregnant client places the client at risk for complications during the pregnancy.

### Implementation

Implementation questions address the process of organizing and managing care, counseling and teaching, providing care to achieve established goals, supervising and coordinating care, and communicating and documenting nursing interventions. Because the NCLEX exam tests your competence and ability to function as a professional nurse, many questions on the examination are implementation-type questions.

When you are presented with a question on NCLEX that requires you to determine what the nurse will do, there are two important points to keep in mind. The first point is that the only client that you need to be concerned about is the client in the question; remember that the client in the question is your only assigned client. This is an important point to bear in mind as you are trying to select the correct option.

You have only one client to be concerned about!

Answer the question from an ideal and textbook perspective!

The second important point to keep in mind when you are answering NCLEX questions is that you need to answer the question from an ideal and textbook perspective, not a reality perspective; you also need to answer the question as if the nurse has all the time available to care for the client and all the needed resources available at the client's bedside.

To illustrate these important points, let us look at the following sample questions.

Answer the question as if the nurse had all the time available to care for the client and all the resources needed at the client's bedside!



## Sample Question:

### **Implementation**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is caring for a preoperative client who verbalizes a great deal of anxiety about the surgical procedure scheduled in 2 hours.

### **Question Query:**

Which action by the nurse would **best** alleviate the client's anxiety?

- 1. Stay with the client until he is brought to the operating room
- 2. Call the client's wife, and ask her to visit the client before surgery
- 3. Talk to the client for 15 minutes, and return shortly thereafter to check on the client
- 4. Tell the client that you will spend some time answering his questions as soon as you get your other tasks completed

#### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *best*, and focus on the **subject**—alleviating the client's anxiety. As you are reading the options, you may hesitate to select option 1 and may say to yourself, "I could never stay with a client for 2 hours. I would never get any of my other clients taken care of." Stop right there and remember that on the NCLEX exam, the only client you are caring for is the client in the question. Therefore, option 1 is the *best* option.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

A preoperative client is a client who is either preparing for surgery or is waiting to be transferred to the operating room. Often these clients are anxious about the surgery, and the nurse is responsible for alleviating the anxiety. You will learn about the many ways to alleviate a client's anxiety, but one way is to be present and available for the client to answer questions if necessary and to provide comfort. Many times just the nurse's presence provides comfort to a client. You will learn about caring for the client having surgery in your fundamentals of nursing course, and you will also learn about the many measures that you can implement to alleviate a client's anxiety.



# Sample Question:

### **Implementation**

#### Case Event:

The nurse is caring for a client after a cardiac catheterization. The client suddenly reports a feeling of wetness in the groin at the catheter insertion site.

#### **Ouestion Ouerv:**

The nurse checks the site, notes that the client is actively bleeding, and should take which **best** action?

- 1. Contact the primary health care provider
- 2. Check the client's peripheral pulse in the affected extremity
- 3. Don a sterile glove and place pressure on the insertion site using sterile gauze
- 4. Don a clean glove and place pressure on the insertion site with the gloved hand

### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *best*, and focus on the **subject**—a nursing action for a client who is bleeding. Active bleeding indicates the need for intervention and the application of pressure at the site of bleeding. This directs you to options 3 and 4 as the possible correct options. You may hesitate to select option 3 because you may say to yourself, "I would not use the sterile gloves or gauze, because by the time I went to the treatment room, obtained these sterile items, and returned to the room, the client would have lost a critically large amount of blood." Stop right there, and remember that on the NCLEX exam, you have all the resources needed and readily available at the client's bedside. Because the catheter insertion site is an open area, the best option is to don a sterile glove and place pressure on the insertion site using sterile gauze.



Tip for the Nursing Student

A cardiac catheterization is a diagnostic procedure in which a catheter is introduced through an incision into a large blood vessel and threaded through the circulatory system of the heart. This procedure is primarily done to assess the status of the coronary arteries in the heart and to determine if any blockage is present and, if so, the extent of the blockage. After the procedure the client is at risk for bleeding, infection, thrombophlebitis, and dysrhythmias (irregular heartbeat patterns). You will learn about this important cardiac diagnostic procedure when you study cardiovascular disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

#### **Evaluation**

Evaluation questions focus on comparing the actual outcomes of care with the expected outcomes and on how the nurse should monitor or make a judgment concerning a client's response to therapy or to a nursing action. These questions also address evaluating the client's ability to implement self-care, health care team members' ability to implement care, and the process of communicating and documenting evaluation findings.

In an evaluation question, it is important to note if the question includes a negative event query. Look for the words or phrases that indicate a negative event query because they may be used in evaluation-type questions and ask for inaccurate information related to the subject of the question. (Words or phrases used in a negative event query are listed in Chapter 7.) Following is an example of an evaluation-type question.

### Study Tip

### **Scope of Practice**

Evaluation is performed by both registered nurses (RNs) and licensed practical nurses (LPNs) or licensed vocational nurses (LVNs). These types of questions ask about outcomes for care administered and teaching. In addition, when answering questions that differentiate between the role of RNs and LPNs/LVNs, remember that LPNs/LVNs do not assess or analyze data (they collect data and report the data to the RN). They also reinforce teaching initiated by the RN.



# Sample Question:

### **Evaluation**

#### **Case Event:**

A client recovering from an exacerbation of left-sided heart failure had a problem with tolerating activity.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse determines that the client **best** tolerates mild exercise if the client exhibits which change in vital signs during activity?

- 1. Pulse rate increased from 80 to 104 beats/min
- 2. Oxygen saturation decreased from 96% to 91%
- 3. Respiratory rate increased from 16 to 19 breaths/min
- 4. Blood pressure decreased from 140/86 to 110/68 mm Hg

### Answer:

3

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *best*, and focus on the **subject**—the client's ability to tolerate exercise. Use the process of elimination and nursing knowledge regarding normal vital sign values. Options 1

and 2 are incorrect because they represent changes from normal to abnormal values. A decrease in blood pressure of more than 10 mm Hg could indicate an orthostatic hypotensive change and that the client is not tolerating the exercise. The only option that identifies values that remain within the normal range is option 3.




### Tip for the Nursing Student

Heart failure is an inability of the heart to maintain adequate circulation to meet the metabolic needs of the body because of an impaired pumping ability. Because of the imbalance of the oxygen supply and demand that occurs in this disorder, activity intolerance can be a problem for the client. In the case of a client with heart failure, activity intolerance refers to an insufficient amount of physiological energy necessary to tolerate or complete the desired activity or exercise. You will learn about heart failure when you learn about cardiac disorders. One important thing to remember is that with all clients, airway is the priority.

# **CHAPTER 9**

# Leading and Managing, Delegating, and Assignment-Making Questions

The nurse is both a leader and a manager. As a leader and a manager, the nurse needs to assume many roles and responsibilities. Some of these roles include managing, organizing, and prioritizing care; making client care or related task assignments and delegating care; supervising care delivered by other health care providers; and managing time efficiently. The National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX®) Test Plan identifies the content related to these roles and responsibilities in the Safe and Effective Care Environment Client Needs category. The Test Plan can be obtained at www.ncsbn.org. It is important to review the information related to this content area to ensure that you are well prepared for questions regarding the roles and responsibilities of the nurse as a leader and a manager. In addition, new graduates are more commonly being transitioned to supervisory or management roles early on in their career. This chapter reviews these roles and responsibilities of the nurse and other health care providers, including the licensed practical or vocational nurse and the unlicensed assistive personnel. This chapter also reviews the guidelines and principles related to delegating and assignment-making, which are two important roles of the nurse. In addition, this chapter identifies guidelines for time management because managing time efficiently is a key factor for completing activities and tasks within a defined time period.



# NCLEX® Exam Tip

Many test questions on the NCLEX exam in the Safe and Effective Care Environment Client Needs category relate to the nurse's responsibilities regarding delegating care and assignment-making, and the supervisory role of these responsibilities. You may also be presented with questions that require you to determine the priority of care for a client and for a group of clients. These questions could be found in the Management of Care subcategory.



# **Delegation and Assignment-Making**

### What Is Delegation?

Delegation is the process of transferring a selected nursing task in a client situation to an individual who is competent to perform that specific task. It involves sharing activities and achieving outcomes with other individuals who have the competency to accomplish the task. The nurse practice act and any other practice limitations, such as agency policies and procedures, define the aspects of care that can be delegated and the tasks and activities that need to be performed by the registered nurse, those that can be performed by the licensed practical nurse or licensed vocational nurse, and those that can be performed by an unlicensed, assistive personnel. When delegating an activity, the nurse needs to determine the degree of supervision that the delegatee may require and provide supervision as appropriate.

Delegation: Transferring a nursing task to an individual who is competent to perform the task.


### Study Tip

### **Scope of Practice**

When answering test questions related to delegation, remember that you must understand the scope of practice, experience level, and level of understanding of the person you are delegating to. Also remember that the nurse holds ultimate accountability for delegated tasks.

### What Is Assignment-Making?

Assignment-making is a specific activity that involves planning care activities for a client or a group of clients and determining specifically who will provide the care or perform certain activities. As with delegating, the nurse practice act and any other practice limitations, such as agency policies and procedures, which define the aspects of care, need to be used as a guide when planning assignments for activities and client care. Supervision of performance of the activity as appropriate also is important.



Assignment-Making: Planning care activities for a client or a group of clients and determining who will provide the care or perform certain activities.



# What Are the Important Points to Keep in Mind When

# **Delegating or Making Assignments?**

When you are answering questions related to either delegating or assignment-making, keep two important points in mind. First, even though a task or activity may be delegated to someone, the nurse who delegates the task or activity maintains accountability for the overall nursing care of the client. Remember that only the task, not the ultimate accountability, may be delegated to another.

The second point to keep in mind is that the NCLEX exam is a national examination. Therefore, use general guidelines, such as the nurse practice act, regarding what a health care provider can competently and legally perform to answer the question correctly. On NCLEX, avoid using agency policies and procedures and agency position descriptions to answer the question, unless the question provides information to do so, because they are specific to the agency.

# Study Tip

### **Preparing for Clinical**

When in clinical, be sure you understand the policies and procedures specific to where you are practicing. There are certain guidelines that vary agency to agency, so when in doubt, check the agency policy and procedure manual. Apply this concept to the exams you take as well. An NCLEX exam question will not ask you something about a specific agency policy or procedure, because they may vary across institutions.

Let us review two sample questions: one that illustrates the use of general guidelines related to

delegating and assignment-making and one that relates to specific agency policies and procedures.





# Sample Question:

### **General Guidelines**

### **Case Event:**

The nurse is planning client assignments for the day and has a licensed practical nurse (LPN) and an unlicensed assistive personnel (UAP) on the nursing team.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse **most appropriately** assigns which client to the LPN?

- 1. A client with a tracheostomy who requires frequent suctioning
- 2. A client who requires the collection of urine for a 24-hour period
- 3. A client recovering from pneumonia who requires ambulation every 3 hours
- 4. A client who requires turning and repositioning every 2 hours and range-of-motion exercises every 4 hours

### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic words** *most appropriately*. This question requires that you determine which client should most appropriately be assigned to the LPN. No information in the question indicates the need to use agency policies, procedures, or position descriptions to determine the most appropriate assignment; therefore, use general guidelines such as the nurse practice act. As you read each option, think about and visualize the client's needs. The client described in option 1 has needs that cannot be met by the UAP. Remember that the health care provider needs to be competent and skilled to perform the assigned task or client activity.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

You will learn about the specific roles and responsibilities of various health care providers in your fundamentals of nursing course. You will also learn more specific content about these roles and responsibilities when you discuss leadership and management roles of the nurse. The important thing to remember is that the registered nurse is educationally prepared to assume the highest level of responsibility. The licensed practical or vocational nurse can assume some responsibilities that are invasive, and the UAP can assume responsibilities that are noninvasive. A tracheostomy is a surgically created opening into the neck that provides an airway for a client who is unable to breathe through the upper airway. A client with a tracheostomy requires suctioning, which involves, as needed, the insertion of a tube that provides suction to remove secretions to maintain a clear airway. This is an invasive procedure, and thus a licensed nurse needs to be assigned to this client. The collection of urine, ambulating a client, and turning and repositioning and range-of-motion exercises are noninvasive procedures and thus can be assigned to UAP.



# Sample Question:

### **Specific Agency Policies and Procedures**

#### **Case Event:**

The licensed nurse employed in a hospital is assigning client care activities to an unlicensed assistive personnel (UAP). The UAP is a senior nursing student and works at the hospital as a UAP part-time on weekends. The hospital position description for a nursing student who is employed as a UAP indicates that he or she may perform basic procedures learned in nursing school if supervised by a licensed nurse.

#### **Ouestion Ouerv:**

Based on the hospital's position description, the licensed nurse assigns which **most appropriate** activity to this UAP?

- 1. Change a sterile abdominal dressing
- 2. Hang a unit of red blood cells on a client
- 3. Insert an intravenous catheter into an infant
- 4. Administer digoxin by intravenous (IV) push

#### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

In this question, information is provided that directs you to use the hospital's position description to determine the most appropriate activity to assign to the UAP. The **strategic words** in the question are *most appropriate*. Based on the **data in the question** and in the options, it is best to select the least invasive activity. Also, recall that blood administration and medication

administration must be performed by a licensed health care provider. Inserting an IV catheter into an infant is an invasive procedure that needs to be performed by a health care provider specially trained to perform it. Remember that the health care provider needs to be competent and skilled to perform the assigned task or client activity.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

When answering assignment-making questions, remember to focus on who the task is being assigned to and remember to select the least invasive task if the health care provider is not licensed. Hanging red blood cells means that the client will receive blood by the IV route, and this is a highly invasive procedure. Inserting an IV catheter and administering digoxin (a cardiac medication) intravenously are also highly invasive procedures that need to be performed by licensed personnel. Changing a sterile dressing is also invasive to some degree and requires education in its performance to maintain sterility. You will learn about the specific roles and responsibilities of various health care providers in your fundamentals of nursing course. You will also learn more specific content about these roles and responsibilities when you discuss leadership and management roles of the nurse.

### Study Tip

### Lifestyle Planning

Many nursing students choose to do nursing internships or externships while in nursing school. This is an excellent opportunity and provides valuable experience for nursing students and for graduates. If your schedule permits, you should explore the availability of these positions!



# What Principles and Guidelines Can Be Used to Delegate

# and Make Assignments?

If you are presented with a question on an examination that requires you to delegate or plan assignments for a group of clients, certain principles and guidelines can be used to assist in answering the question correctly. As you are using the process of elimination to determine the correct option, keep these principles and guidelines in mind. Also, read each option carefully. Think about and visualize the client's needs to determine which health care provider could best meet the client's needs. Following is a review of these principles and guidelines for delegating and assignment-making.



### **Principles and Guidelines for Delegating and Assignment-Making**

- 1. Always ensure client safety—never select an option that could potentially harm the client.
- 2. Focus on the subject of the question and what the question is asking; for example, is the question asking you to delegate to another registered nurse, a licensed practical or vocational nurse, or unlicensed assistive personnel?
- 3. Determine which tasks or client care activities can be delegated and to whom, and match the task to the delegatee on the basis of the nurse practice act, agency policies and procedures, or position descriptions as appropriate; that is, think about the activities that the delegatee can safely and legally perform.
- 4. Think about individual variations in work abilities, and determine the degree of supervision that may be required; for example, if the question asks you to delegate or assign a client care activity to a new graduate, you must think about the need for providing adequate supervision and the need to teach the new graduate about the assigned activity.
- 5. Always provide directions to the delegatee that are clear, concise, accurate, and complete and that validate the person's understanding of the directions and expectations; that is, ask the delegatee to verbalize the procedure for performing the task or activity that was delegated.
- 6. Communicate a feeling of confidence to the delegatee, and provide feedback promptly after the task or activity is performed regarding his or her performance; ensure that the delegatee completed the task, and evaluate the outcome of the care provided.
- 7. Provide the delegatee with a timeline for completion of the task or activity; for example, if a client is scheduled for a diagnostic test and an activity or task needs to be completed before the test, it is important to identify this timeline to the delegatee.
- 8. Maintain continuity of care as much as possible when assigning client care; for example, it is best for the client to be cared for by the nurse with whom the client has developed a therapeutic relationship. However, it is also important to remember that in some client situations, maintaining continuity of care would be unfavorable with regard to ensuring a safe environment for a health care provider, such as with the client with an infectious disease or the client with a radiation

implant.

### Study Tip

#### Student-to-Student

As a nursing student, when you are in clinical, be sure that if client care activities are delegated to you, you are comfortable and experienced with performing the task safely and effectively. Even after graduation, this concept is important to keep in mind. If you are unfamiliar with an assigned task, be certain to ask an experienced nurse. Remember, client safety is the priority!



# Sample Question:

### **Assignment-Making**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is planning the client assignments for the day and is reviewing client data and the needs of the clients on the nursing team.

### **Question Query:**

To maintain continuity of care, the nurse should ensure that which client is cared for by the nurse who cared for the client on the previous day?

- 1. A client with active tuberculosis
- 2. A client with herpes zoster (chickenpox)
- 3. A client with a cervical radiation implant
- 4. A client recently diagnosed with inoperable cancer

### **Answer:**

4

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Focus on the **subject** of the question—to maintain continuity of care. Read each option carefully, keeping two points in mind: the client's needs and ensuring a safe environment for the health care provider. The clients described in options 1, 2, and 3 can potentially present a risk to the health care provider. The client in option 4 will likely have psychosocial needs that can best be met if the client is cared for by a health care provider with whom the client has developed a therapeutic relationship.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Tuberculosis is an infection caused by an acid-fast bacillus known as *Mycobacterium tuberculosis* and usually affects the lungs, although infection of multiple organ systems can occur. In its active stage it is highly contagious and is transmitted by the inhalation of infected droplets. Herpes zoster (chickenpox) is an acute and highly contagious viral disease caused by the varicella zoster virus. This disease is transmitted by direct contact with skin lesions or by droplet spread from the respiratory tract of an infected person. A radiation implant is a device that is placed internally into a client to treat cancer. This type of therapy is also known as *brachytherapy*. When a radiation implant is in place, the client is strictly isolated because the implant emits radiation and can affect and be harmful to other individuals. Cancer, also known as *a neoplasm*, is an abnormal growth. It is characterized by the uncontrolled growth of cells that invades surrounding tissue and spreads (metastasizes) to other parts of the body. Cancer is not a contagious disorder. You will learn about the spread of infectious diseases in your fundamentals of nursing course. You will also learn about

tuberculosis and radiation implants in your medical-surgical nursing course and about herpes zoster (chickenpox) in your pediatrics course.



### Who Can Do What?

There are some general guidelines to follow when answering a question that requires determining what tasks and client care activities should be assigned to which health care provider. Remember that these are general guidelines, and the general guidelines are the ones that you need to follow when taking a national examination. These guidelines (listed next) are followed by sample questions in both multiple response and multiple choice formats.



# Study Tip

### **Preparing for Clinical**

As a student in clinical, other health care providers on the nursing unit can be very valuable resources to you during your rotations. Ask questions and ask them to assist with tasks, and you will learn a lot about client care.

### **Unlicensed Assistive Personnel (UAP)**

Generally, noninvasive tasks and basic client care activities can be assigned to an unlicensed assistive personnel. Some of these tasks and activities include:

Ambulation

Basic skin care

Bathing

Client transport

Grooming

Hygiene measures

Positioning

Range-of-motion exercises Some specimen collections, such as urine or stool

### **Licensed Practical or Vocational Nurse**

In addition to the tasks that the UAP can perform, a licensed practical or vocational nurse can perform certain invasive tasks and client care activities. Some of these additional tasks include:

Administering oral medications

Administering intramuscular injections

Administering subcutaneous injections

Administering intradermal medications

Administering medications by the rectal, vaginal, eye, ear, nose, or topical routes

Administering medications by a gastrointestinal tube

Administering some selected IV piggyback medications

Changing dressings

Irrigating wounds

Monitoring an IV flow rate

Suctioning

Teaching about basic hygienic and nutritional measures

Urinary catheterization

Using the nursing process (clinical problem-solving process): data collection, planning, implementing, and evaluating

### **Registered Nurse**

The registered nurse is competent to perform many tasks and client care activities. In addition to the tasks and client care activities that a licensed practical or vocational nurse can perform, the registered nurse can perform numerous other procedures. To assist you in differentiating the role of the registered nurse and the licensed practical or vocational nurse, some tasks and client care activities that only the registered nurse can perform are:

Administering IV medications by continuous IV, by piggyback, and by IV push Initiating client teaching

Using the nursing process: assessment, analyzing data, planning, implementing, and evaluating



# Sample Question:

The nurse is planning the client assignments for the day and has a registered nurse, a licensed practical nurse, and unlicensed assistive personnel on the nursing team.

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Focus on the **subject** of the question—a client assignment to a licensed practical nurse. Use general principles and guidelines to assist in answering the question correctly. Think about and visualize the client's needs, and determine whether the licensed practical nurse can competently and legally perform activities to meet these needs. Initial teaching about insulin administration needs to be done by a registered nurse. Client assessment is done by the registered nurse; however, the licensed practical nurse can collect data. A client with a central IV line who needs to receive blood transfusions needs to be cared for initially by a registered nurse. In addition, this client has complex needs with regard to the central IV line because the client is also receiving parenteral nutrition and lipids and has a prescription to receive a blood transfusion. Remember that the health care provider needs to be competent and skilled to perform the assigned task or client activity.



# Tip for the Nursing Student

An ultrasound of the heart is a noninvasive procedure in which the heart chambers and valves are visualized and examined for abnormalities. There is no client preparation for the procedure, and the procedure is painless for the client. Wound irrigations may be prescribed for certain clients who have wound infections or are at risk for a wound infection. This procedure requires sterile technique and cleansing of the wound with a sterile solution, such as normal saline, or another type of solution as prescribed by the primary health care provider. A spinal cord injury occurs as a result of a traumatic disruption of the spinal cord, such as from a car or other type of accident or from some sort of violent impact. Such trauma can cause varying degrees of paralysis; depending on the level of injury in the spinal cord, some individuals lose the ability to urinate on their own. As a result, these individuals require urinary catheterization (insertion of a tube to drain the bladder), an invasive procedure. Diabetes mellitus is a disorder of carbohydrate, fat, and protein metabolism that occurs primarily as a result of a deficiency or complete lack of insulin secretion by the beta cells of the pancreas or resistance to insulin. Many clients with diabetes mellitus require insulin (although some may be controlled with oral medications). Insulin needs to be administered by subcutaneous injection, and these clients need to learn how to properly administer it. In addition to insulin, diet, and exercise are important components of management of the disease. Heart failure is an inability of the heart to maintain adequate circulation to meet the metabolic needs of the body because of an impaired pumping ability. Pulmonary edema is a serious complication of heart failure in which fluid accumulates in the pulmonary system as a result of the impaired pumping ability of the heart. A client with pulmonary edema requires frequent respiratory assessments. The registered nurse is the health care provider who is responsible for client assessment. A central IV line is one that is inserted into a central vein, usually the subclavian vein. Clients with this type of IV line can receive solutions such as parenteral nutrition (a solution containing a high concentration of nutrients and glucose) and lipids (fat emulsion to prevent fatty acid deficiency) through the line. Red blood cells, usually administered to a client with anemia, can also be administered through a central IV line, and a registered nurse is responsible for administering the blood transfusion. You will learn about these client conditions in your fundamentals of nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Note the **strategic words** *most appropriately,* and focus on the **subject** of the question—a client assignment to a registered nurse. Use general principles and guidelines to assist in answering the question correctly. Think about and visualize the client's needs. The client who was admitted to the hospital during the night after experiencing an acute asthma attack should most appropriately be assigned to the registered nurse because this client would require frequent respiratory assessments. The unlicensed assistive personnel can most appropriately give a bed bath and ambulate a client. The licensed practical nurse can perform dressing changes. Remember that the health care provider needs to be competent and skilled to perform the assigned task or client activity.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Asthma is a respiratory disorder that is characterized by recurring episodes of difficulty breathing (dyspnea), wheezing lung sounds, constriction of the bronchi, coughing, and the production of mucoid bronchial secretions. Acute attacks can occur that require aggressive treatment to maintain a patent airway. These clients require frequent respiratory assessment that needs to be done by a registered nurse. You will learn about asthma in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study respiratory problems. You will also learn about asthma in your pediatrics nursing course. You will learn about the procedure for giving a client a bed bath (bathing a client while the client is in bed) and will learn about the safe procedure for ambulating a client during your fundamentals of nursing course. These are noninvasive procedures and can therefore be assigned to unlicensed assistive personnel because these health care providers are trained to perform these procedures safely. A right above-the-knee amputation means that the client underwent a surgical procedure in which the right limb to the level above the knee was surgically removed. This client requires dressing changes, which are an invasive procedure that requires sterile technique. The licensed practical or vocational nurse is trained to perform sterile dressing changes. You will also learn about the procedure for changing sterile dressings in your fundamentals of nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course.

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic words** *most appropriate*, and focus on the **subject** of the question—a client assignment to an unlicensed, assistive personnel. Use general principles and guidelines to assist in answering the question correctly. Think about and visualize the client's needs, and determine whether the unlicensed assistive personnel can competently and legally perform activities to meet these needs. In this situation the most appropriate assignment for an unlicensed, assistive personnel would be to care for the client who requires stool specimen collections. Colostomy irrigations and tube feedings are not performed by unlicensed assistive personnel. The client with difficulty swallowing food and fluids is at risk for aspiration. Remember that the health care provider needs to be competent and skilled to perform the assigned task or client activity.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

A colostomy is the surgical creation of a stoma (an artificial anus) on the abdominal wall that allows for the elimination of feces (bowel contents). This is created for the client with a bowel tumor who is experiencing bowel obstruction or for the client with a tumor or other disorder who requires removal of part of the colon. The colostomy may require irrigations to empty the content of the colon. This is an invasive procedure that can be performed by the licensed practical or vocational nurse or the registered nurse. Tube feedings involve the administration of liquid food to a client through a tube placed in the client's stomach or other area of the client's gastrointestinal tract. Because this procedure places that client at risk for aspiration (breathing in fluid or food into the lungs, resulting in a blocked airway), a licensed nurse needs to perform this procedure. Likewise, a client having difficulty swallowing food and fluids is at risk for aspiration and requires care from a licensed nurse. The collection of stool specimens is a noninvasive procedure, and therefore unlicensed assistive personnel can perform this procedure. You will learn about caring for these types of clients in your fundamentals of nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course.



# What Is Time Management, and Why Is It Important?



Time management is a technique used by the nurse to assist in completing tasks within a defined period. It involves learning how, when, and where to use one's time and involves establishing personal goals and time frames. Time management requires an ability to anticipate the day's activities, to combine activities when possible, and to avoid being interrupted by nonessential activities. It also involves efficiency in completing tasks quickly and thoroughly and effectiveness in deciding on the most important task to do and doing it correctly. The ability to manage time efficiently is important to complete tasks and client care activities within a reasonable time frame. In many client care situations, time management requires prioritizing. The nurse needs to be skilled in planning time resourcefully and needs to assist other health care providers with time management. Some principles and guidelines to use to assist in managing time efficiently are listed next.

# Study Tip

### Lifestyle Planning

Time management techniques can be applied to your study habits as well. Look at your class schedule and map out when you have to be in class and any other obligations you have that you know are times you will be unable to study. From here, set specific time schedules that you plan to use to study. This will help you stay organized and will ensure success in nursing school!

Time Management: The ability to manage time efficiently in order to complete tasks and client care activities within a reasonable time frame.



# **Principles and Guidelines of Time Management**

Following is a list of the principles and guidelines of time management:

- 1. Identify tasks, obligations, and client care activities and write them down.
- 2. Organize the workday; identify which tasks and client care activities must be completed in specified time frames.
- 3. Prioritize client needs.
- 4. Anticipate the needs of the day, and provide time for unexpected and unplanned tasks or client care activities that may arise.
- 5. Focus on beginning the daily tasks by working on the most important first, while keeping goals in mind; look at the final goal for the day, which will help break down tasks into manageable parts.
- 6. Begin client rounds at the beginning of the shift, assessing/collecting data on each assigned client.
- 7. Delegate tasks when appropriate.
- 8. Keep a daily hour-by-hour log to assist in providing structure to the tasks that must be accomplished, and cross tasks off the list as they are accomplished.
- 9. Use hospital and agency resources efficiently, anticipating resource needs and gathering the necessary supplies before beginning the task.
- 10. Organize paperwork, and continuously document task completion and necessary client data throughout the day.
- 11. At the end of the day, evaluate the effectiveness of time management.

# Sample Question:

### **Prioritizing and Time Management**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse on the day shift is assigned to care for 4 clients.

### **Question Query:**

After the report from the night shift, which client should the nurse plan to assess/collect data from first?

- 1. Client scheduled for a cardiac catheterization at 10:00 am
- 2. Client scheduled to have an electrocardiogram (ECG) at 11:00 am
- 3. Client with pulmonary edema who was treated with furosemide at 5:00 am
- 4. Client newly diagnosed with diabetes mellitus who is scheduled for discharge to home

#### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *first*, and focus on the **subject**—which client the nurse plans to assess/collect data from first. This question describes a situation in which the nurse needs to prioritize and manage his or her time with regard to the assigned clients. Use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**—to answer the question. Airway is always a high priority; therefore,

the nurse should assess and collect data from the client with pulmonary edema who was treated with furosemide at 5:00 am first. The nurse should next assess/collect data from the client scheduled for the cardiac catheterization because this client will require preprocedural preparation. The client scheduled for discharge should be attended to next because there may be discharge needs that require attention. The client scheduled for an ECG can be checked last.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Heart failure is an inability of the heart to maintain adequate circulation to meet the metabolic needs of the body because of an impaired pumping ability. Pulmonary edema is a serious complication of heart failure in which fluid accumulates in the pulmonary system as a result of the impaired pumping ability of the heart. The client is treated with a diuretic, which is a medication that will result in an increased urine output, thus ridding the body of the excess fluid that accumulated in the pulmonary system. Furosemide is a diuretic. A major concern for the client with pulmonary edema is airway and breathing, so this is the reason why assessing/collecting data from this client is the priority. A cardiac catheterization is a diagnostic procedure in which a catheter is introduced through an incision into a large blood vessel and threaded through the circulatory system of the heart. This procedure is primarily done to assess the status of the coronary arteries in the heart and to determine if any blockage is present and if so, the extent of the blockage. The client requires some preprocedural preparation, such as ensuring informed consent has been obtained, checking for client allergies, obtaining height and weight and vital signs and noting the quality and presence of peripheral pulses, ensuring that an IV line is inserted, client teaching, and administering prescribed medications. Because this procedure is scheduled for 10:00 am, this client can be assessed second. Diabetes mellitus is a disorder of carbohydrate, fat, and protein metabolism that occurs primarily as a result of a deficiency or complete lack of insulin secretion by the beta cells of the pancreas or resistance to insulin. Insulin therapy or oral medications, diet therapy, and an exercise regimen are important components for management of the disease to prevent complications, and the nurse needs to ensure that the client has been taught about management and understands the treatment prescribed for the disorder. Because the client is scheduled for discharge, it is important that the nurse ensure that the client's needs are met and that the client understands the prescribed treatment. Therefore, in this situation, this client is the nurse's third priority. An ECG is a diagnostic test that is performed using a device that records the electrical activity of the myocardium (heart) and detects the transmission of the cardiac impulse through the tissues of the heart muscle. This test can diagnose specific abnormalities of the heart. It is a noninvasive test that requires no specific preparation except for explaining the procedure to the client. Therefore, in this situation, this client would be the nurse's last priority. You will learn about time management in your fundamentals of nursing course and about caring for these types of clients in your medical-surgical nursing course.

# **CHAPTER 10**

# **Communication Questions**

Communication is a process in which information is exchanged, either verbally or nonverbally, between two or more individuals. According to the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN), an Integrated Process of the Test Plan is a process that is fundamental to the practice of nursing and is incorporated throughout the Client Needs categories of the Test Plan. In the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX®) Test Plan, the NCSBN identifies the concept of communication as a component of one of the Integrated Processes. In addition, in the Psychosocial Integrity category of Client Needs, therapeutic communication and cultural awareness/cultural influences on health are listed as content that is tested on the NCLEX exam. Therefore, it is likely that you will be presented with questions related to the communication process. This chapter reviews the guidelines to follow when answering communication questions and points out the importance of cultural and spiritual aspects when communicating and caring for clients. Several sample questions are included to illustrate how communication guidelines are used.



# Study Tip

### **Preparing for Clinical**

As a nursing student, one thing your instructor will expect is that you have the ability to communicate with your assigned clients. Become very familiar with therapeutic and nontherapeutic communication techniques before your first clinical experience!




# **How Are Communication Concepts Tested in a**

### **Question?**

Communication is an important characteristic of the nurse–client relationship. Therefore, test questions that refer to the concept of communication may address a client situation in any clinical setting and any nursing care area.

When we think about communication concepts and the nurse–client relationship, we usually visualize an interaction between the nurse and the client. Although this is an accurate visualization, it is important to broaden our thinking with regard to the communication process and the concepts that are tested on the examination. Test questions address not only the communication process between the nurse and the client but also the process between the nurse and a client's family member or significant other, or the nurse and another member of the health care team, such as another nurse, unlicensed assistive personnel, or health care provider. For example, you may be asked about how you would respond to a staff member who makes an inappropriate statement or how you would respond to a health care provider who is demanding. Therefore, most questions that test the concept of communication relate to how the nurse should respond to the person with whom he or she is communicating.

# NCLEX® Exam Tip

Communication questions may address client situations in the adult health area, the maternity area, the pediatric area, or the mental health area in settings such as the hospital, clinic, primary health care provider's office, or other health care setting. In addition, these questions may identify a client from a culture different from your own, and you will need to consider cultural and spiritual differences in order to answer the question correctly.

# What Guidelines Can Be Used to Answer Communication Questions?



The five primary guidelines to use when answering communication questions are as follows:

1. Use therapeutic communication techniques to answer communication questions because of their effectiveness in the communication process. As you read the question and each option, find the option that is client focused and indicates the use of a therapeutic communication technique.

- 2. Nontherapeutic communication techniques are ineffective and should be avoided when responding to a client, a client's family member or significant other, or another member of the interprofessional health care team. As you read the question and each option, eliminate the options that indicate the use of a nontherapeutic communication technique.
- 3. Note the client of the question. The client could be the person with the health care problem, a client's family member or significant other, or another member of the interprofessional health care team. Look for the client-focused option because this will reflect a therapeutic technique.
- 4. Focus on feelings, concerns, anxieties, or fears. As you read the question and each option, look for the option that indicates the use of a therapeutic communication technique and focuses on the feelings, concerns, anxieties, or fears of the client of the question.
- 5. Consider cultural and spiritual differences as you answer the question. If you note that a question contains information that identifies a specific cultural group, think about specific cultural and spiritual characteristics to answer the question correctly. Remember that each culture is unique with

regard to characteristics related to the process of communication.

# Study Tip

### Student-to-Student

When answering test questions related to therapeutic and nontherapeutic communication techniques, envision yourself actually saying the words presented in the options to an assigned client. This will help you answer the question correctly!

### Guidelines for Communication

Note the client of the question.

Use therapeutic communication techniques.

Avoid nontherapeutic communication techniques.

Focus on the client's feelings, concerns, anxieties, or fears.

Select a client-focused option.

Consider cultural and spiritual differences.

### What Are the Therapeutic Communication Techniques?

Using therapeutic communication techniques encourages the client, or other individual with whom the nurse is communicating, to express his or her thoughts and feelings. Many therapeutic communication techniques can be used to promote verbalization. The following table provides a brief review of these techniques.

### **Therapeutic Communication Techniques**

Technique	Description
Active listening	Carefully noting what the client is saying and observing the client's nonverbal behavior
Broad openings	Encouraging the client to select topics for discussion
Clarifying	Providing a means for making the message clearer, correcting any misunderstandings, and promoting mutual understanding
Focusing	Directing the conversation on the topic being discussed
Informing	Giving information to the client
Offering self to help	Includes staying with the client, talking to the client, and offering to help the client
Open-ended	Encouraging conversation because these questions require more than one-word answers
questions	
Paraphrasing	Restating in different words what the client said
Reflecting	Directing the client's question or statement back to the client for consideration
Restating	Repeating what the client has said and directing the statement back to the client to provide the client the opportunity to agree or disagree or to clarify the message

Silence	Allowing time for formulating thoughts
Summarizing	Stating briefly what was discussed during the conversation
Validating	Verifying that both the nurse and the client are interpreting the topic or message in the same way

# What Are the Nontherapeutic Communication Techniques?



Nontherapeutic communication techniques impair or block the flow of a conversation. They are also known as the barriers to an effective communication process. The many nontherapeutic communication techniques need to be avoided when communicating because of their ineffectiveness. The following table briefly reviews some nontherapeutic communication techniques.

### **Nontherapeutic Communication Techniques**

Technique	Description
Approval	Implying that the client is thinking or doing the right thing and is not thinking or doing what is wrong; this may direct the client to focus on thinking or behavior that pleases the nurse
Asking excessive questions	Demanding information from the client without respect for the client's willingness or readiness to respond
Changing the subject	Avoiding addressing the client's thoughts, feelings, or concerns; implying that the client's statement is not important
Closed-ended questions	Questions that ask for specific information such as a "yes" or "no" answer and therefore inhibit communication
Disagreeing	Opposing the client's thinking or opinions, implying that the client is wrong
Disapproving	Indicating a negative value judgment about the client's behavior or thoughts

Giving advice	Assuming that the client cannot think for himself or herself, which inhibits problem-solving and fosters dependence
Minimizing the client's feelings	Making a statement that implies that the client's feelings are not important
Parroting	Repeating the client's words before determining what the client has said
	Avoiding addressing the client's thoughts, feelings, or concerns; making a statement that places the responsibility of addressing the client's thoughts, feelings, or concerns elsewhere or on another person
Value judgments	Making a comment that addresses the client's morals; this can make the client feel angry or guilty or as though he or she is not being supported
"Why?" questions	Cause the client to feel defensive because many times he or she does not know the reason "why"; these types of questions also often imply criticism

# Study Tip

### **Scope of Practice**

It is within the scope of nursing practice and is also the responsibility of the nurse to communicate with clients in a way that makes them feel comfortable and in a caring environment. Therapeutic communication is also very important for the client with a mental health disorder.



# **Why Are Cultural Considerations Important?**



Communication involves three cultural characteristics: communication style, use of eye contact, and the meaning of touch. The nurse needs to be aware of certain cultural characteristics that relate to the communication process and other aspects of care that may differ from his or her own cultural uniqueness. Questions on the NCLEX exam may address the concept of communication with a client from a specific cultural group. If you note that a question contains information identifying a specific cultural group, think about specific cultural and spiritual characteristics to answer the question correctly.

# Study Tip

### Lifestyle Planning

When caring for clients from a culture different from your own, consider their lifestyle choices when planning care. Never impose your lifestyle choices or cultural beliefs on a client.

# **Dietary Preferences**

Being knowledgeable of ethnic dietary preferences is an important nursing responsibility. The nurse needs to incorporate the client's dietary preferences into the plan of care; otherwise, the client may not comply with health care recommendations. In addition, the nurse needs to ensure that the client receives an adequate nutritional intake to prevent nutritional deficiencies.

Food may have a symbolic meaning in some religious groups, and these beliefs need to be acknowledged by the nurse when planning care. Awareness of and recognizing the value and importance of these religious and spiritual beliefs will prevent imposition and guide the nurse's actions and decision-making to ensure culturally competent care.

### **End-of-Life Care Practices**

End-of-life care practices may vary among religious groups, and it is important for the nurse to understand and incorporate these practices in the plan of care. For the dying client, maintaining the integrity of religious and spiritual rituals promotes a peaceful death. For the family members or significant others, maintaining religious and spiritual practices helps provide a sense of fulfilling obligations and helps promote acceptance of their loved one's death.

# **Sample Communication Questions**

Following are sample communication questions that illustrate the use of therapeutic and nontherapeutic communication techniques. Remember to use therapeutic communication techniques; focus on the client of the question; focus on the client's feelings, concerns, anxieties, and fears; and select the client-focused option.



# Sample Question 1

#### Case Event:

A mother says to the nurse in the primary health care provider's office, "I am afraid that my child might have another seizure."

### **Question Query:**

Which response by the nurse is **most** therapeutic?

- 1. "Tell me what frightens you the most about seizures."
- 2. "Why worry about something that you cannot control?"
- 3. "Most children will never experience a second seizure."
- 4. "Phenytoin can prevent another seizure from occurring."

#### Answer:

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *most* and use **therapeutic communication techniques**.

Note that the **client of the question** is the mother. Option 1 is the only option that addresses the client's fears. Option 2 is a nontherapeutic response, because it states that the mother should not worry. Options 3 and 4 are incorrect because the nurse is giving false reassurance to the mother that a seizure will not recur or can be prevented in this child. Remember to focus on the client's feelings, concerns, and fears and select the client-focused option.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

A seizure is a hyperexcitation of the neurons in the brain leading to a sudden, violent involuntary series of contractions of a group of muscles. There are different types of seizures. The most important nursing measures when a client experiences a seizure are to maintain a patent airway and to ensure safety for the client. You will learn about caring for a client with seizures when you study neurological disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.



# Sample Question 2

### **Case Event:**

A client examined in the health care clinic has been diagnosed with hypertension and has been

taking a prescribed antihypertensive medication. On a follow-up visit, the client says to the nurse, "I don't understand why I have to take this medication. It makes me feel awful."

### **Question Query:**

What is the most appropriate nursing response?

- 1. "You will need to ask your doctor about that."
- 2. "Everyone who takes that medication says the same thing."
- 3. "You have to take this medication if you want to prevent a stroke."
- 4. "Describe what you mean when you say that the medication makes you feel awful."

#### **Answer:**

4

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic words** *most appropriate*. Focus on the client's feelings, concerns, and fears and select the client-focused option. Option 1 avoids the client's concern and places the client's feelings on hold. Option 2 minimizes the client's feelings and implies that the client's complaint is not important. In option 3 the nurse gives advice and also provides false reassurance that the medication will prevent a stroke. In this option, the nurse also avoids the client's complaint, is somewhat threatening, and may induce fear in the client. In option 4 the nurse uses the therapeutic communication technique of restating. In this technique, the nurse explores by repeating what the client has said and directing the statement back to the client to provide the client the opportunity to clarify the message further.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Hypertension is a condition characterized by an elevated blood pressure above the normal value and is a known cardiovascular risk factor. Many times clients with hypertension do not even know that they are experiencing the disorder and are without signs and symptoms. This is why the disorder is sometimes called a *silent disease* and may not be discovered until a routine physical exam is performed. Antihypertensive medications are prescribed to lower the blood pressure, but unpleasant side effects of the medication can occur. This is why noncompliance can be a concern for clients with hypertension taking antihypertensive medications. You will learn about hypertension in your medical-surgical nursing course.



# Sample Question 3

### **Case Event:**

A client with a history of cardiac disease is brought to the emergency department because of an episode of chest pain while mowing the lawn. During the assessment, the client tells the nurse that he stopped taking his cardiac medication.

#### **Ouestion Ouerv:**

What is the **most appropriate** nursing response?

- 1. "Why did you stop taking your medication?"
- 2. "Tell me some of the reasons that led you to stop taking your medication."
- 3. "Everything is going to be just fine. We will get you started on those medications right away."
- 4. "You stopped the medication! Don't you know that you are never supposed to do that with cardiac medications?"

### **Answer:**

2

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic words** *most appropriate* and use **therapeutic communication techniques.** 

Remember to focus on the client's feelings, concerns, and fears and select the client-focused option. Option 2 is an open-ended and broad opening question that will promote and encourage the client to communicate. The statement in option 1 uses the word *why*. Use of this word implies criticism and often makes the client feel defensive; in addition, many times the client does not know why he or she stopped the medication. In option 3 the nurse provides false reassurance by telling the client that everything is going to be fine. Also, the nurse avoids exploring the reason(s) that led the client to stop the medication. In option 4 the nurse demoralizes, belittles, and lectures the client, which is nontherapeutic.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Cardiac disease can result from a variety of causes, including, but not limited to, angina pectoris (chest pain), myocardial infarction (heart attack), heart failure, or valvular disorders. If a client experiences chest pain, this could result from a lack of oxygen to the myocardial tissue and needs to be attended to immediately to prevent myocardial tissue death. You will learn about cardiac disease during your medical-surgical nursing course; because heart disease is a major health concern, focus on the ways to teach a client to prevent it.



# Sample Question 4

### **Case Event:**

A client recently diagnosed with ovarian cancer says to the nurse, "I cannot believe this has happened to me. I wish that I were dead!"

### **Question Query:**

Which nursing response is **most** therapeutic?

- 1. "Every client diagnosed with this type of cancer says the same thing."
- 2. "You must be feeling very upset. Are you thinking of hurting yourself?"
- 3. "I know what you mean, but there are a lot of treatments available for ovarian cancer."
- 4. "Why are you talking that way? Your children would not want to hear you say that, would they?"

### **Answer:**

2

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *most* and use **therapeutic communication techniques.** 

Remember to focus on the client's feelings, concerns, and fears and select the client-focused option. In option 2 the nurse focuses on the client's statement and addresses the client's feelings in the response. In options 1 and 3 the nurse minimizes the client's feelings. In addition, option 3 provides false reassurances. In option 4 the nurse uses the word *why*, which implies criticism and often makes the client feel defensive. In addition, option 4 focuses on the client's children and their feelings rather than on the client's feelings.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Ovarian cancer is a malignant tumor of the ovary or ovaries. It is rarely detected in its early stages and is usually far advanced when diagnosed. Regularly scheduled pelvic examinations contribute significantly to early diagnosis; thus, it is important to teach clients about the importance of these

pelvic examinations. You will learn about ovarian cancer and other types of cancer in your medical-surgical nursing course.



### Sample Question 5

### **Case Event:**

Which nursing responses indicate the use of therapeutic communication techniques?

### **Ouestion Ouery:**

### Select all that apply.

- 1. "I know how you feel."
- 2. "You will do just fine, just wait and see."
- 3. "Don't worry about anything. You are in good hands!"
- 4. "Why do you still smoke when you know that you have cancer?"
- 5. "Let's talk more about the reasons you are not following your diet."
- 6. "You are feeling anxious because of the conversation that you had with your boss yesterday."

#### **Answer:**

5, 6

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Focus on the **subject**—the use of **therapeutic communication techniques**.

Remember to focus on the client's feelings, concerns, and fears and select the client-focused option. Review the following nursing responses:

- 1. "I know how you feel." nontherapeutic and minimizes the client's feelings
- 2. "You will do just fine, just wait and see."—nontherapeutic and minimizes and avoids the client's feelings and provides false reassurance
- 3. "Don't worry about anything. You are in good hands!"—nontherapeutic; avoids the client's feelings and provides false reassurance
- 4. "Why do you still smoke when you know that you have cancer?"—nontherapeutic; demoralizes the client and also can make the client feel guilty, angry, anxious, or unsupported
- 5. "Let's talk more about why you are not following your diet."—therapeutic and uses the technique of focusing and exploring feelings
- 6. "You are feeling anxious because of the conversation that you had with your boss yesterday." therapeutic and indicates the use of reflection; also encourages the client to verbalize feelings




### Tip for the Nursing Student

This question asks you to select the statements that reflect the use of therapeutic communication techniques. The use of therapeutic communication techniques promotes the communication process between the nurse and client. So think about these therapeutic techniques. You will learn about therapeutic and nontherapeutic techniques in your fundamentals of nursing course.

# **CHAPTER 11**

# Pharmacology, Medication, and Intravenous Calculation Questions



Pharmacology is one of the most difficult nursing content areas to master. One reason it is so difficult is because of the enormous number of medications available. Another reason is the vast amount of information to know about each medication. The National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) Test Plan addresses pharmacological and parenteral therapies in the Physiological Integrity Client Needs category. The registered nurse (RN) Test Plan identifies 12% to 18% as the percentage of this type of test question that will possibly appear on the examination, and the licensed practical/vocational nurse (LPN/LVN) Test Plan identifies pharmacological therapies as 10% to 16%. This means that if you took a 100-question examination, 12 to 18 of the questions (RN Test Plan) or 10 to 16 of the questions (LPN/LVN Test Plan) would relate to pharmacology and parenteral therapies. Therefore, it is important to spend ample time reviewing pharmacology in preparation for the NCLEX exam, and it is best to do your review from a question-and-answer perspective.

### NCLEX® Exam Tip

When a pharmacology question appears on the exam, note the name of the medication. The NCLEX exam will only identify the generic name of a medication. Focus on the medication name to determine the medication classification and its intended use. Also, use other pharmacology strategies and guidelines to answer the question.

This chapter provides the strategies for preparing to answer pharmacology questions and various general guidelines to use when attempting to answer the questions correctly. The pharmacology strategies are listed in the following box. In addition, remember to read the question carefully, noting the strategic words, the data in the question, and the subject of the question, and always use the process of elimination to select the correct option. As with any type of question, it is best to use your nursing knowledge to answer the question. However, a question may appear on your examination that contains a medication name with which you are unfamiliar. When this occurs, the guidelines and the strategies to answer a pharmacology question correctly will be valuable. After you read this chapter, practice answering as many pharmacology questions as you can. Several resources are available that contain hundreds of pharmacology practice questions.

### Study Tip

### Student-to-Student

When answering questions about medications, look at the case event and the query very closely. If a disease process is mentioned, this information can help you answer the question correctly. Remember, that on the NCLEX a diagnosis is not likely to be mentioned in a pharmacology question.

### **Pharmacology: General Guidelines to Follow**

Some general guidelines to keep in mind as you are trying to select the correct option are given in the following list:

- 1. Medication absorption, distribution, metabolism, and excretion are affected by age and physiological processes; the older client and the neonate and infant are at greater risk for toxicity than an adult is.
- 2. Many medications are contraindicated in pregnancy and during breastfeeding.
- 3. Antacids are not usually administered with medication because the antacid will affect the absorption of the medication.
- 4. Grapefruit juice is not usually administered with medication because it contains a substance that will impede the absorption of the medication.
- 5. Enteric-coated and sustained-release tablets should not be crushed; also, capsules should not be opened.
- 6. Nursing interventions always include monitoring for intended effects, side effects, adverse effects, or toxic effects of the medication.
- 7. Nursing interventions sometimes include monitoring therapeutic serum medication levels and monitoring for signs and symptoms of toxicity.
- 8. Nursing interventions always include client education, and specifically the client should understand dosages, timing, diet modifications, safety considerations, and potential medication interactions
- 9. The nurse or client should never adjust or change a medication dose, abruptly stop taking a medication, or discontinue a medication.
- 10. The nurse may withhold a medication if he or she suspects that the client is experiencing an adverse or toxic effect of a medication; the nurse must immediately contact the primary health care provider if either of these effects occurs. The nurse may also withhold the medication if specific parameters are prescribed and withholding the medication is indicated based on these parameters.
- 11. The client needs to avoid taking any over-the-counter medications or any other medications, such as herbal preparations, unless they are approved for use by the primary health care provider.
- 12. The client needs to know how to correctly administer the medication.
- 13. The client needs to be aware of the side effects and adverse effects of medications and how to check his or her own temperature, pulse, and blood pressure.
- 14. The client needs to take the prescribed dose for the prescribed length of therapy and understand the necessity of compliance.
- 15. The client needs to avoid consuming alcohol and to avoid smoking.
- 16. The client should wear a Medic-Alert bracelet if he or she is taking medications such as, but not limited to, anticoagulants, oral hypoglycemics or insulin, certain cardiac medications, corticosteroids and glucocorticoids, antimyasthenic medications, anticonvulsants, and monoamine oxidase inhibitors.
- 17. The client needs to follow up with a primary health care provider as prescribed.
- The following sample pharmacology question illustrates how these general pharmacology guidelines may be helpful.

### Study Tip

### **Preparing for Clinical**

Be sure to bring your medication or drug handbook with you to clinical. Research your client's medications and discuss them with your clinical instructor before administering them. Make sure to check the seven rights of medication administration and understand the effects of the medications you are administering.

### NCLEX® Exam Tip

The NCLEX examination will only identify the generic name in a pharmacology question. Focus on

learning the generic names of medications when they are presented during your nursing program. Then, you will be well prepared for the NCLEX examination!



# Sample Question:

### **General Pharmacology Guidelines**

### **Case Event:**

A client taking amitriptyline hydrochloride calls the nurse at the primary health care provider's office and reports that he has an upset stomach whenever he takes the medication.

### **Ouestion Ouery:**

What information should the nurse provide to the client?

- 1. Take the medication with food.
- 2. Take the medication with an antacid.
- 3. Take the medication on an empty stomach.
- 4. Stop the medication for 2 days and then resume the medication schedule.

#### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Remember to read the question carefully, focusing on the **data in the question**, the client's complaint of an upset stomach. Recalling that antacids are not usually administered with medication and that the nurse would not tell a client to discontinue a medication will assist in eliminating options 2 and 4. From the remaining options, focusing on the **data in the question** will assist in eliminating option 3.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Amitriptyline hydrochloride is a medication that is called a *tricyclic antidepressant*. It affects chemicals in the brain that may become unbalanced and is used to treat symptoms of depression. You will learn about this medication in your pharmacology nursing course and in your mental health nursing course.

# Pharmacology: Assessment/Data Collection Guidelines

What Are the Pharmacology Assessment/Data Collection Guidelines, and How Will They Help in Answering a Pharmacology Question?



There are some specific assessment/data collection guidelines to follow when you administer medication to a client. In addition to using the seven rights when administering medications, these guidelines include client assessment and assessment of other factors related to the medication, such as checking certain laboratory values or vital signs; checking for potential interactions or contraindications related to the medication; client teaching; monitoring for intended effects, side effects, adverse effects, or toxic effects; and evaluating the client's response to the medication therapy. When you are presented with a pharmacology question and are trying to select the correct option, using the pharmacology assessment/data collection guidelines will assist you in eliminating incorrect options. Some of these guidelines are listed in the following box.

### Seven Medication Rights

Right client
Right medication
Right dose
Right time and frequency
Right route
Right indication
Right documentation

### Study Tip

### **Scope of Practice**

Remember that as a nurse, if you are questioning anything about a medication prescription, you can use the pharmacy as your resource to answer your questions. If you feel that the prescription requires further clarification, be sure to contact the primary health care provider before administering it.



# Pharmacology: Assessment/Data Collection

### **Guidelines to Follow**

The following list gives pharmacology assessment/data collection guidelines to use when administering medication to a client:

- 1. Always assess for client allergies or hypersensitivity to a medication.
- 2. Always assess the client for existing medical disorders that are contraindicated with the administration of a prescribed medication.
- 3. Always assess for potential interactions related to the medication.
- 4. Always check pertinent laboratory results.
- 5. Always check the client's vital signs, particularly if medications such as antihypertensive or cardiac medications are being administered.
- 6. Always assess the client for intended effects, side effects, adverse effects, or toxic effects of the medication.
- 7. Always assess the client's response to the medication.

These guidelines are particularly helpful if the question asks for the priority nursing action when administering a medication. The following is a sample pharmacology question illustrating how these assessment/data collection guidelines may be helpful.



# Sample Question:

### **Pharmacology**

### **Case Event:**

The nurse notes that the primary health care provider has prescribed sulfamethoxazole and trimethoprim for a client.

#### **Question Query:**

Which priority action should the nurse take before administering this medication?

- 1. Ask the client about an allergy.
- 2. Call the pharmacy to obtain the medication.
- 3. Inform the client about the need to increase fluid intake.
- 4. Check the medication supply room to find out whether the medication needs to be obtained from the pharmacy.

#### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Remember to read the question carefully, noting the **subject** and the **strategic word**. In this question the **strategic word** is *priority*, and the **subject** is the action that the nurse will take. Using the pharmacology assessment/data collection guidelines will direct you to option 1. In addition, use of the **steps of the nursing process** will direct you to the correct option because option 1 is the only one that addresses client assessment/data collection.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Sulfamethoxazole and trimethoprim is a combination antibiotic that treats different types of

infection caused by bacteria. It is used to treat ear infections, urinary tract infections, bronchitis, *Pneumocystis jiroveci* pneumonia, and other types of infection. You will learn about this medication in your pharmacology nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study the immune system.



# What Are the Differences Among an Intended Effect, a Side Effect, an Adverse Effect, and a Toxic Effect of a Medication?

It is important to understand the differences among an intended effect, a side effect, an adverse effect, and a toxic effect; understanding them will assist in eliminating the incorrect options in a pharmacology question that asks about one of these effects. When you are presented with a question on the examination that asks about an effect of a medication, note the specific subject—is the subject of the question an intended effect, a side effect, an adverse effect, or a toxic effect? The differences are described in the following sections, and each section has a sample question related to the specific effect discussed in that section.

### **Intended Effect**

An intended effect is the desired and expected effect of a medication. For example, the intended effect of morphine sulfate is pain relief. A sample question that asks about an intended effect is provided.

### Study Tip

### Lifestyle Planning

Pharmacology is a difficult content area to study and retain information. When you know that you have an exam that includes pharmacology, or you are studying pharmacology for the NCLEX exam, it may be best to study this content area first when you begin your study session, when your mind is brightest.

#### INTENDED EFFECT: A desired effect



### Sample Question:

### **Intended Effect**

#### **Case Event:**

Ibuprofen is prescribed for a client.

#### **Question Query:**

On a follow-up visit to the primary health care provider's office, the nurse should ask the client whether the medication has provided relief from which symptom?

- 1. Diarrhea
- 2. Joint pain
- 3. Dyspepsia
- 4. Flatulence

### **Answer:**

2

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Read the question carefully, noting the **subject** of the question. In this question, the **subject** is an intended effect of ibuprofen and the noteworthy words are *provided relief from*. Also note that options 1, 3, and 4 are **comparable or alike** in that they all address gastrointestinal symptoms. When options are **comparable or alike**, it is best to eliminate those options because they are unlikely to be correct. In addition, options 1, 3, and 4 are side effects of ibuprofen, not intended effects.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Ibuprofen is in a group of medications called *nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs)*. It works by reducing hormones that cause inflammation and pain in the body. It is used to reduce fever and treat pain or inflammation caused by many conditions, such as headache, toothache, back pain, arthritis, menstrual cramps, or minor injury. You will learn about this medication in your pharmacology course and in your medical-surgical nursing course.

### Side Effect

A side effect is a physiological effect of a medication that is unrelated to the intended medication effects. For example, a side effect of an antihistamine medication is drowsiness. A side effect of a medication is not usually life threatening, and normally there are measures that will either eliminate the side effect or alleviate the discomfort associated with it. A sample question that asks about a side effect is provided.

SIDE EFFECT: Not a desired effect, not usually life threatening, and can often be alleviated with specific measures



# Sample Question:

### Side Effect

### **Case Event:**

Erythromycin has been prescribed for a client.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse should tell the client that which frequent side effect can occur from this medication?

- 1. Severe diarrhea
- 2. Yellow-colored skin
- 3. Abdominal cramping
- 4. Yellow discoloration to the white part of the eye

#### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Remember to read the question carefully, noting the **subject** of the question. In this question the **subject** is a side effect of the medication. Eliminate options 2 and 4 first because they are **comparable or alike** and both indicate the presence of hepatitis, an adverse effect of the medication. From the remaining options, eliminate option 1 because of the word *severe*. Remember that the question asks about a side effect, not an adverse effect.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Erythromycin is in a group of medications called *macrolide antibiotics*. Macrolide antibiotics slow the growth of, or sometimes kill, sensitive bacteria by reducing the production of important proteins needed by the bacteria to survive. Erythromycin is used to treat many different types of infections caused by bacteria. You will learn about this medication in your pharmacology course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study the immune system.

#### **Adverse Effect**

An adverse effect is more severe than a side effect and is always an undesirable effect. For example, an adverse effect of a sulfonamide is hypersensitivity that may be evidenced by a rash, fever, and shortness of breath. An adverse effect can range from a mild effect to a severe effect, such as anaphylaxis. Adverse effects are always reported to the primary health care provider. A sample question that asks about an adverse effect is provided.

ADVERSE EFFECT: More severe than a side effect, always an undesirable effect, and always reported to the primary health care provider



### Sample Question:

### **Adverse Effect**

### **Case Event:**

A client is receiving furosemide.

#### **Ouestion Ouerv:**

The nurse should monitor the client for which adverse effect of the medication?

- 1. Nausea
- 2. Gastric upset
- 3. Muscle weakness
- 4. Increase in urinary output

#### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Read the question carefully, noting the **subject** of the question. In this question the **subject** is an adverse effect of the medication. Eliminate options 1 and 2 first because they are **comparable or alike** and both relate to the gastrointestinal system. From the remaining options, eliminate option 4 because it is an intended effect of the medication. Also, recall that furosemide is a diuretic and can cause electrolyte imbalances and that muscle weakness is an indication of hypokalemia. Remember that the question asks about an adverse effect.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Furosemide is a potent diuretic (water pill) that works by blocking the absorption of salt and fluid in the kidney tubules, causing a profound increase in urine output (diuresis). The diuretic effect of furosemide can cause body water and electrolyte depletion. It is used to treat excessive fluid accumulation and swelling (edema) of the body caused by heart failure, cirrhosis, chronic kidney disease, and nephrotic syndrome. It is sometimes used in conjunction with other blood pressure

pills to treat high blood pressure. You will learn about this medication in your pharmacology course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study the cardiovascular system.

#### **Toxic Effect**

A toxic effect (toxicity) of a medication occurs when the medication level in the body exceeds the therapeutic level either from overdosing or medication accumulation. Always report toxic effects to the primary health care provider. Toxic effects are most often identified by monitoring the plasma (serum) therapeutic range of the medication. For example, some resources indicate the optimal therapeutic blood level range of digoxin is 0.5 to 0.8 ng/mL (1 to 1.6 nmol/L). Thus, if the blood level is greater than 0.8 ng/mL (1.6 nmol/L), the client experiences toxicity. The client will normally exhibit certain signs and symptoms (depending on the medication) that indicate toxicity, and the nurse needs to monitor for these. For example, in digoxin toxicity, the client may experience gastrointestinal disturbances, such as anorexia, nausea, and vomiting; or ocular disturbances, such as photophobia, light flashes, or halos around bright objects.

TOXIC EFFECT: The medication level in the body exceeds the therapeutic level.



# Sample Question:

### **Toxic Effect**

### **Case Event:**

The nurse reviews the results of a therapeutic blood level that was drawn from a client taking theophylline and notes that the level is 22 mcg/mL (122 mcmol/L).

### **Question Query:**

The nurse should take which most appropriate action?

- 1. Report the result to the primary health care provider.
- 2. Administer the next scheduled dose of theophylline.
- 3. Ask the laboratory to draw another blood specimen to verify the result.
- 4. Place these normal results of the blood test in the client's medical record.

#### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Remember to read the question carefully, noting the **subject** of the question and the **strategic words**.

In this question, the **strategic words** are *most appropriate*, and the **subject** is a toxic effect of the medication. Recalling that the therapeutic blood level range of theophylline is 10 to 20 mcg/mL (55.50 to 111.00 mcmol/L) will assist in determining that the client is experiencing toxicity. Remember that toxic effects are always reported to the primary health care provider.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Theophylline is an oral bronchodilator medication used to treat symptoms of asthma, chronic bronchitis, and emphysema. It opens the airways by relaxing the smooth muscle of the airways and blood vessels in the lungs. It is indicated for the treatment of the symptoms of reversible airflow obstruction associated with chronic asthma and other chronic lung diseases, such as emphysema and chronic bronchitis. You will learn about this medication in your pharmacology course and in

your medical-surgical nursing course when you study the respiratory system.



### What Do You Need to Know About Medication Names?



During your nursing courses, you may learn both the generic name and the trade/brand name of a medication. Generic names do not change for medications. This is the name that is the most reliable. However, there can be multiple trade/brand names for one medication. For example, a generic name is epoetin alfa, and two common trade/brand names used are Epogen and Procrit.

Nursing exams administered during nursing school may identify both names in a pharmacology question. The NCLEX examination will only identify the generic name in a pharmacology question. For example, a nursing school exam may present a question about furosemide (Lasix), a diuretic. The NCLEX examination testing the same medication will present the question using the generic name, furosemide, only. This is important information for you to know now as a nursing student. Focus on learning the generic names of medications when they are presented during your nursing program. Then you will be well prepared for the NCLEX examination!



# How Will It Help to Identify a Medication by Its Classification?

Medications that belong to a particular classification have similar medication actions and usually have commonalities in their side effects and nursing interventions related to administration. It is nearly impossible to learn every feature about every individual medication. Learning medications by a "classification system method" groups several medications with similar properties together and makes the amount of information that needs to be learned condensed and manageable.

With regard to side, adverse, and toxic effects and nursing interventions, do not try to memorize every effect and every nursing intervention for every medication. It is best if you associate these effects with nursing interventions. Learn to recognize the common effects associated with each medication classification, and then relate the appropriate nursing interventions to each effect. For example, if a side effect is hypertension, then the associated nursing intervention would be to monitor blood pressure; if a side effect is hypokalemia, then the associated nursing interventions are to monitor the client for signs of hypokalemia and to monitor the client's potassium blood level. Again, this makes the vast amount of information that you need to remember manageable.

Relate nursing interventions to the side effects and potential adverse or toxic effects of a medication!



### **Commonalities in Medication Names**

Learning commonalities in medication names that belong to a particular classification will also help in answering a question. If you note a medication name in a test question and are unfamiliar with the medication, if you can at least associate the medication with a classification, you will be able to determine the medication's action, side effects, and nursing interventions. Note the letters in the medication name, and look for those letters that identify a particular medication classification.

Sample questions follow.

- 1. Androgens: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-terone*, such as testosterone.
- 2. Angiotensin-converting enzyme (ACE) inhibitors: *Most* medication names end with the letters *pril*, such as enalapril.
- 3. Antidiuretic hormones: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-pressin*, such as desmopressin.
- 4. Antilipemic medications: *Some* medication names end with the letters *-statin*, such as atorvastatin. Others have *-chole* or *-cole* such as colestipol, and, *-fib* such as gemfibrozil.
- 5. Antiviral medications: *Most* antiviral medications contain *vir* in their names, such as ritonavir.
- 6. Benzodiazepines: Benzodiazepines include alprazolam, chlordiazepoxide, clorazepate, and triazolam; *most* other benzodiazepine names end with the letters *-pam*, such as diazepam.
- 7. β-Adrenergic blockers: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-lol*, such as atenolol.
- 8. Calcium channel blockers: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-pine*, such as amlodipine; some exceptions include diltiazem and verapamil.
- 9. Carbonic anhydrase inhibitors: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-mide*, such as acetazolamide.
- 10. Estrogens: *Most* estrogen medications contain *est* in their names, such as conjugated estrogen.
- 11. Glucocorticoids and corticosteroids: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-sone*, such as prednisone.
- 12. Histamine  $H_2$  receptor antagonists: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-dine*, such as cimetidine.
- 13. Nitrates: *Most* medications contain *nitr* in their names, such as nitroglycerin.
- 14. Pancreatic enzyme replacements: *Most* medications contain *pancre* in their names, such as pancrelipase.
- 15. Phenothiazines: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-zine*, such as chlorpromazine.
- 16. Proton pump inhibitors: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-zole*, such as lansoprazole.
- 17. Sulfonamides: *Most* medications include *sulf* in their names, such as sulfamethoxazole.
- 18. Sulfonylureas: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-mide*, such as chlorpropamide, or *-ide*, such as glimepiride.
- 19. Thiazide diuretics: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-zide*, such as hydrochlorothiazide.
- 20. Thrombolytic medications: *Most* medication names end with the letters -ase, such as alteplase.
- 21. Thyroid hormones: *Most* medications contain *thy* in their names, such as levothyroxine.
- 22. Xanthine bronchodilators: *Most* medication names end with the letters *-line*, such as theophylline.



# Sample Question:

**Commonalities in Medication Names** 

**Case Event:** 

A nurse is collecting data from a client who is taking pantoprazole.

### **Ouestion Ouery:**

The nurse determines that the medication is **effective** if the client states relief of which symptom?

- 1. Heartburn
- 2. Constipation
- 3. A nighttime cough
- 4. Migraine headaches

#### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Remember to read the question carefully, noting the **subject** of the question and the **strategic word**. In this question the **strategic word** is *effective*, and the **subject** is an intended effect. Remembering that most proton pump inhibitor medication names end with the suffix *-zole* will direct you to option 1.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Pantoprazole is in a group of medications called *proton pump inhibitors* that decrease the amount of acid produced in the stomach. It is used to treat erosive esophagitis (damage to the esophagus from stomach acid) and other conditions involving excess stomach acid, such as a condition known as *Zollinger-Ellison syndrome*. You will learn about this medication in your pharmacology course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study gastrointestinal disorders.



### Sample Question:

### Commonalities in Medication Names

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is collecting a health history on a client seen at the primary health care clinic for the first time. When the nurse asks the client about current prescribed medications, the client tells the nurse that he takes indinavir twice daily.

### **Question Query:**

Based on this finding, the nurse should suspect the presence of which condition?

- 1. Diverticulitis
- 2. Peptic ulcer disease
- 3. Inflammatory bowel disease
- 4. Human immunodeficiency virus (HIV)

#### **Answer:**

4

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Remember to read the question carefully, focusing on the data in the question.

Note the nurse's health history finding. Remembering that many antiviral medication names contain the letters *vir* will direct you to option 4. Also note that options 1, 2, and 3 are **comparable or alike** and relate to a gastrointestinal disorder.



Tip for the Nursing Student

Indinavir is a protease inhibitor. Protease inhibitors block the part of HIV called *protease*. When protease is blocked or inhibited, HIV is unable to infect new cells. Protease inhibitors are almost always used in combination with at least two other anti-HIV medications. You will learn about this medication in your pharmacology course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study immune disorders.



# Sample Question:

### **Commonalities in Medication Names**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is preparing to administer atenolol to a client.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse should check which item before administering the medication?

- 1. Temperature
- 2. Blood pressure
- 3. Potassium level
- 4. Blood glucose level

#### **Answer:**

2

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Remember to read the question carefully, noting the **subject** of the question. In this question the **subject** is an assessment before administration of the medication. Note the name of the medication, *atenolol*. Recalling that most  $\beta$ -blocker medication names end with the letters *-lol* and that these medications are used to control blood pressure will direct you to option 2.




### Tip for the Nursing Student

Atenolol is a  $\beta$ -adrenergic blocking agent that is used for treating high blood pressure, heart pain (angina pectoris), abnormal rhythms of the heart, and some neurological conditions. It blocks the action of the sympathetic nervous system by blocking beta receptors on sympathetic nervoes. Because the sympathetic nervous system is responsible for increasing the heart rate, by blocking the action of these nerves, atenolol reduces the heart rate and is useful in treating abnormally rapid heart rhythms. Atenolol also reduces the force of contraction of heart muscle and thereby lowers blood pressure. You will learn about this medication in your pharmacology course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study the cardiovascular system.



# What Strategies Will Help When Answering

### **Medication and Intravenous Calculation Questions?**



When a medication or IV calculation question is presented, always use the appropriate formula to solve the problem. Shortcuts should not be used in making these calculations. The problem and the answer should be expressed in the correct units of measure. Always be careful with decimal points. It is important to place the decimal points in the correct places, or the answer will be incorrect. When solving a medication calculation problem, always determine whether the answer is within reason and makes sense. Always use a calculator to confirm your answer. Following are two sample questions related to medication and IV calculations.

### NCLEX® Exam Tip

On the NCLEX exam, medication and IV calculation questions will most likely be in a fill-in-the-blank format. You are provided with an on-screen calculator for these medication and IV problems. Even if you use the calculator to calculate dosages and flow rates, it is important to recheck the calculation before typing the answer. Follow the formula, place the decimal points in the correct places, and check the accuracy of the calculation. Read the question carefully, because many of these questions will ask you to record your answer using one decimal place or to record your

answer to the nearest whole number. Always follow the directions accompanying the question. In addition, if you are asked to round numbers, always round at the end of performing the calculation.

### Medication and Intravenous Calculations

Follow the directions accompanying the question.

Use the on-screen calculator.

Convert the unit of measure if necessary.

Follow the formula.

Place the decimal point in the correct place.

Recheck the accuracy of the calculation.

If rounding is necessary, perform at the end of the calculation.



# Sample Question:

### **Medication Calculation**

#### **Case Event:**

A prescription reads phenytoin 0.2 g orally twice daily. The medication label states 100-mg capsules.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse prepares how many capsule(s) to administer one dose? Fill in the blank.

#### **Answer:**

2 capsules

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

#### Focus on the **data in the question**.

Use the medication calculation formula. In this medication calculation problem, it is necessary to first convert grams to milligrams. In the metric system, to convert a larger unit to a smaller unit multiply by 1000 or move the decimal 3 places to the right; therefore, 0.2 g=200 mg.

#### Formula:

$$\frac{D(desired)}{A(available)} \times Q(quantity) = tablet(s)$$

$$\frac{200 \text{ mg}}{100 \text{ mg}} \times 1 \text{ tablet} = 2 \text{ tablets}$$

Use the on-screen calculator to perform the calculation, and then recheck your work, making sure that the answer makes sense before typing it!



### Tip for the Nursing Student

You will learn about nursing math in your fundamentals of nursing course or in another course specifically designed to teach you about nursing math. You will be using nursing math to perform calculations when you prepare medications in the clinical setting. Be sure to learn the formulas and how to perform the calculations because the formulas are critical steps in the process of preparing a safe dose of a medication.





### Sample Question:

### **Intravenous Calculation**

### **Case Event:**

An intravenous solution of 1000~mL of 0.45% normal saline is prescribed to infuse over 8 hours. The drop factor is 15~gtt/mL.

Question Query:

The nurse should set the flow rate at how many drops per minute (gtt/min)? **Fill in the blank. Round answer to the nearest whole number**.

### **Answer:**

31 gtt/min

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

This question is in the fill-in-the-blank format. Use the formula for calculating IV flow rates when answering the question. Focus on the **data in the question** and note that the question asks you to round the answer to the nearest whole number. Also, be sure to change 8 hours to minutes.

#### Formula:

$$\frac{\text{Total volume to infuse} \times \text{Drop(gtt) factor}}{\text{Time in minutes}} = \text{Drops/minute}$$

$$\frac{1000\times15}{480(8 \text{ hours}\times60 \text{ minutes})} = 31.25 \text{ or } 31 \text{ gtt /min}$$

Use the on-screen calculator. Remember to follow the formula, recheck your answer, and make sure that the answer makes sense before typing it. Also remember to round to the nearest whole number if asked to do so.




### Tip for the Nursing Student

You will learn about calculating IV flow rates in your fundamentals of nursing course or in another course specifically designed to teach you about IV therapy. You will be using this formula for calculating an IV flow rate in the clinical setting when you care for a client receiving IV therapy. Be sure to learn this formula and how to determine the accurate flow rate because it is critical for the safe administration of IV fluids to a client.

# **CHAPTER 12**

# **Additional Pyramid Strategies**



In addition to all the test-taking strategies you have reviewed so far in this book, you can use other helpful strategies to assist in the process of elimination and answering questions correctly. This chapter reviews these helpful strategies and provides sample questions to illustrate how these strategies are used. Also included in this chapter are useful strategies for answering questions that relate to medication and intravenous (IV) calculations, laboratory values, client positioning, and disaster planning. Some additional pyramid strategies include:

- 1. Eliminating options that contain closed-ended words
- 2. Eliminating options that contain medical rather than nursing interventions
- 3. Eliminating comparable or alike options
- 4. Ensuring that all components of an option are correct
- 5. Selecting the umbrella option
- 6. Visualizing the information in the case event, question query, and options
- 7. Looking for concepts in the question that are comparable or alike to a concept in one of the options

### Study Tip

### Lifestyle Planning

In addition to all of the strategies you have learned about so far in this text, remember that self-care is one of the most important factors that will lead to your success. Take the time to care for your own needs, and you will notice that you are able to focus much better on your schoolwork!



# **Eliminating Options That Contain Closed-Ended**

# Words: How Will This Help?

In most situations, if an option contains a closed-ended word, it is incorrect. As you read each option, if you note a word that is closed-ended, eliminate that option. Conversely, as you read an option and note an open-ended word, then that may be the correct option. A list of closed-ended and open-ended words follows.

### **Closed-Ended Words**

Closed-ended words may indicate an incorrect option!

### **Open-Ended Words**

Following are sample questions that illustrate the strategy of closed-ended versus open-ended words.



# Sample Question:

### **Eliminating Options That Contain Closed-Ended Words**

### **Case Event:**

The nurse is providing dietary instructions to a client about a low-fat diet.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse should make which statement to the client?

- 1. "Never use butter for cooking."
- 2. "Drink fluids only if they are fat free."
- 3. "Eat foods that have less than 1% fat content only."

4. "Read the labels on food items to determine the fat content."

#### **Answer:**

4

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Read every word in each option carefully. Note the **closed-ended words** *never* in option 1 and *only* in options 2 and 3. Remember that the use of a **closed-ended word** in an option will most likely make the option incorrect!



### Tip for the Nursing Student

For a regular healthy diet it is usually recommended that of the total calories eaten, no more than 30% should come from fat. A low-fat diet may require even greater restriction. Low-fat diets may be prescribed for a variety of conditions, including gastrointestinal disorders such as liver disease or gallbladder disease, cardiovascular disorders, or obesity. You will learn about the various types of diets in your fundamentals of nursing course or nutrition course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study nutrition.



## Sample Question:

### **Selecting Options That Contain Open-Ended Words**

#### **Case Event:**

A client scheduled for a computerized tomography (CT) scan of the abdomen asks the nurse when the results of the test will be available.

### **Ouestion Ouery:**

The nurse should make which most appropriate response to the client?

- 1. "Your doctor may have the results in about 3 days."
- 2. "The results will not be available for at least 1 week."
- 3. "You must ask the CT technician for that information."
- 4. "Every scan is read by a radiologist, and this process always takes 1 week."

### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Read every word in each option carefully, and note the **strategic words** *most appropriate*. If you were unable to answer this question using nursing knowledge, note the use of the open-ended word *may* in option 1. Also, note the **closed-ended words** *will not* in option 2, *must* in option 3, and *every* and *always* in option 4. Remember that the use of a **closed-ended word** in an option will most likely make the option incorrect, and the use of an open-ended word in an option tends to make the option correct.



### Tip for the Nursing Student

A CT scan is a procedure that combines x-ray images with the aid of a computer to generate cross-sectional views and, if needed, three-dimensional images of the internal organs and structures of the body. A CT scan is used to define normal and abnormal structures in the body and/or assist in procedures by helping accurately guide the placement of instruments or treatments. You will learn about this diagnostic procedure during your nursing education, most likely in your medical-

surgical nursing course.

### Study Tip


### **Preparing for Clinical**

When in clinical, you should be aware of any diagnostic procedures your assigned client(s) have recently undergone, what the results of these procedures are if they are available, and any related postprocedure care that needs to be followed. Additionally, you should be aware of any procedures your assigned client(s) are scheduled to undergo while you are caring for them, and ensure implementation of any specific preprocedure indications, such as diet prescriptions, withholding or administering certain medications, ensuring intravenous access, ensuring consent has been obtained, completing screening forms, reviewing laboratory results, or any other specific indications needed.



# **Eliminating Options That Contain Medical Rather**

### Than Nursing Interventions: How Will This Help?



An important point to remember is that the NCLEX® exam is a nursing examination, not a medical one. Therefore, focus on nursing and select the option that relates to a nursing intervention rather than a medical one. The only situation in which you may need to select a medical intervention is if the question indicates to do so. For example, if the question query states, "Which intervention does the nurse anticipate to be prescribed?" then you may need to select the option that contains a medical action or prescription. Following is a review with sample questions that illustrate this strategy.

Focus on nursing rather than medical interventions!



# Sample Question:

Eliminating Options That Contain Medical Rather Than Nursing Interventions Case Event:

The nurse is caring for a client with a diagnosis of heart failure who suddenly experiences severe

dyspnea and suspects that pulmonary edema has developed.

### **Ouestion Ouery:**

What is the **immediate** nursing action?

- 1. Insert a Foley catheter
- 2. Place the client in high-Fowler's position
- 3. Obtain a vial of furosemide and a syringe
- 4. Obtain a dose of morphine sulfate from the opioid medication drawer

#### **Answer:**

2

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *immediate*, and note the **subject** of the question—a nursing action. Although options 1, 3, and 4 are interventions that would be done in this situation, they all require a medical prescription from the primary health care provider; therefore, the nurse needs to ensure a current prescription exists or if one needs to be obtained. Option 2 is a nursing action that does not require a medical prescription and will assist to alleviate dyspnea. Remember, your exams are nursing examinations, not medical examinations!



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Heart failure is an inability of the heart to maintain adequate circulation to meet the metabolic needs of the body because of an impaired pumping ability. Heart failure can progress to pulmonary edema, a condition in which fluid accumulates in lung tissue and the lung tissue becomes swollen. This is detectable on radiology of the chest. This is a medical emergency. If this occurs, the immediate action of the nurse is to place the client in an upright (high-Fowler's) position. Other actions, such as administration of oxygen, administration of diuretics, and insertion of a Foley catheter, are important, and frequent monitoring of vital signs and urine output is important. You will learn about heart failure and pulmonary edema when you learn about cardiac disorders. One important thing to remember is that with all clients, airway is the priority.

### Study Tip

### **Scope of Practice**

Be sure to be familiar with the scope of nursing practice with regard to various aspects of client care. Knowing this information will help you with questions that relate to scope of practice and require you to differentiate between medical actions and nursing actions.



# Sample Question:

### Selecting an Option That Indicates a Medical Intervention

### **Case Event:**

The nurse is admitting an infant to the pediatric unit with a diagnosis of respiratory syncytial virus (RSV).

### **Ouestion Ouery:**

The nurse anticipates that the primary health care provider will prescribe which measure?

- 1. Ribavirin
- 2. A private room
- 3. Contact precautions

### 4. Strict handwashing procedures

### **Answer:**

1

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **subject** of the question—the intervention that the primary health care provider will prescribe. Although the primary health care provider may document options 2, 3, and 4 on the medical prescription sheet, these are interventions that the nurse can implement for an infant with RSV. That is, a primary health care provider's prescription is not required for these interventions. In contrast, option 1 requires a prescription. Remember that your exam is a nursing examination, not a medical examination, and the only situation in which you may need to select a medical intervention is if the question indicates to do so!



### Tip for the Nursing Student

RSV is a viral infection that is a common cause of acute bronchiolitis, bronchopneumonia, and the common cold in infants and young children. Symptoms include fever, cough, and severe malaise. Treatment includes rest, humidity, adequate fluid intake, oxygen, and the administration of ribavirin. You will learn about this virus when you study respiratory infections in your pediatrics course.



# **Eliminating Comparable or Alike Options: How**

### Will This Help?

An important point for you to remember is that multiple-choice questions have only one correct option. As you read the options, if you note ones that are comparable or alike with regard to their context, eliminate these options. The correct answer to the question will be the option that is different. Following is a sample question that illustrates this strategy of eliminating comparable or alike options.

Eliminate comparable or alike options!



# Sample Question:

### **Eliminating Comparable or Alike Options**

### **Case Event:**

The nurse is creating a plan of care for a client who will be receiving a blood transfusion.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse should write which intervention in the plan that relates to monitoring for a transfusion reaction?

- 1. Weigh the client before and after the transfusion
- 2. Check the client's lung sounds hourly for crackles
- 3. Monitor the client's temperature during the transfusion
- 4. Monitor the client's intake and output during the transfusion

#### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **subject** of the question—a transfusion reaction. If you know the signs of a transfusion reaction, you can answer this question easily. If you do not know these signs, read the options carefully. Note that options 1, 2, and 4 are **comparable or alike** in that they relate to the complication of fluid overload. Because they are all **comparable or alike**, they are incorrect and need to be eliminated. Remember that the correct answer to the question will be the option that is different!



### Tip for the Nursing Student

A blood transfusion involves the IV administration of a component of blood, such as packed red blood cells, to replace blood or one of its components lost as a result of trauma, surgery, or a disease. One complication that can occur when administering blood is a blood transfusion reaction. Some signs and symptoms of this complication include fever; facial flushing; rapid, thready pulse; cold, clammy skin; itching; dizziness; difficulty breathing; or low back or chest pain. You will learn about blood transfusions, the complications, and the nursing care involved with the administration of blood during your medical-surgical nursing course when you study hematological disorders.

# Study Tip


### Student-to-Student

Watch for comparable or alike options when answering exam questions, and if you encounter them, eliminate them because it is not possible for both of them to be correct. Additionally, look for options that are opposite. It is likely that one of the opposite options is the correct one!



# **Ensuring That All Parts of an Option Are Correct:**

# **How Will This Help?**



Some questions on exams or on the NCLEX exam may contain options that include two parts, and each part of the option is separated by the word *and*. Read the question carefully, note the strategic words, and focus on the subject. As you read the options, read both parts of the option. If you note that one part of the option is incorrect, then the entire option is incorrect; therefore, eliminate that option. In these types of questions, it is important to ensure that both parts of the option are correct. Following is a sample question that illustrates this strategy of ensuring that all parts of an option are correct.

Ensure that all parts of an option are correct!



# Sample Question:

### **Ensuring That All Parts of an Option Are Correct**

### **Case Event:**

The nurse is collecting data from a client diagnosed with a cataract of the right eye.

### **Question Query:**

The nurse should expect to obtain which finding on data collection?

- 1. Reports of eye pain and a cloudy white pupil
- 2. Reports of a frontal headache and photophobia
- 3. Reports of a gradual loss of vision and photophobia
- 4. Reports of blurred vision and excessive tearing of the eye

#### **Answer:**

3

### **Test-Taking Strategy**

The options in this question contain two parts, and each part of the option is separated by the word and. Noteworthy words are expect to obtain, and the **subject** of the question is data noted in a client with a cataract. In this question, knowledge regarding the differences between the signs and symptoms of a cataract versus glaucoma will assist in answering the question correctly. Although a cloudy white pupil and photophobia occur in a client with a cataract, eye pain and frontal headaches do not. Therefore, options 1 and 2 are not entirely correct and need to be eliminated. Eye pain and frontal headaches occur in the client with glaucoma. From the remaining two options, recalling that excessive tearing occurs in the client with glaucoma, not the client with a cataract, will assist in eliminating option 4. Remember that all parts of the option need to be correct for the option to be correct!



### Tip for the Nursing Student

Cataract is a condition that affects the lens of the eye. On data collection the nurse would note a cloudy white pupil. Symptoms include a gradual loss of vision, photophobia, painless blurring and distortion of objects, and glare from bright lights. You will learn about cataracts, their treatment, and the nursing care involved during your medical-surgical nursing course when you study eye disorders.

### Study Tip

### Student-to-Student

When preparing for nursing exams, remember that many questions will be related to nursing assessment/data collection. When studying certain conditions, it may be helpful for you to look at images or animations of expected findings associated with these conditions, especially if you are a visual learner!



# **Selecting the Umbrella Option: How Will This**

The umbrella option is a general statement that may incorporate the content of the other options within it. When you are answering a question and note that more than one option appears to be correct, look for the umbrella option. The umbrella option will be the correct answer. Following is a sample question that illustrates this strategy.

Look for the umbrella option!



### Sample Question:

#### Selecting the Umbrella Option

#### **Case Event:**

In a telephone call from emergency medical services, the nurse in the emergency department is told that several victims who survived a plane crash and are suffering from cold exposure will be transported to the hospital.

#### **Question Query:**

What is the **initial** nursing action by the emergency department nurse?

- 1. Call the nursing supervisor to activate the agency disaster plan.
- 2. Supply the trauma rooms with bottles of sterile water and normal saline.
- 3. Call the intensive care unit to request that nurses be sent to the emergency department.
- 4. Call the laundry department to request as many warm blankets as possible for the emergency department.

#### **Answer:**

1

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *initial*, and focus on the **subject**—the nursing action in the event of a disaster. As you read each option, you will note that all options are correct. In this type of question, look for the **umbrella option**.

#### Option 1 is the **umbrella option**.

Activating the agency disaster plan will ensure that the interventions in options 2, 3, and 4 will occur. Remember that the **umbrella option** incorporates the ideas of the other options within it.




#### Tip for the Nursing Student

A disaster preparedness plan is a structured and formal plan of action that is implemented when a disaster occurs in the health care agency or external to the agency, such as in the community. The plan provides a coordinated plan of action for all members of the health care team. You will learn about disasters and disaster preparedness plans during your community nursing course.



# What Strategies Will Help When Answering

### **Questions Related to Laboratory Values?**



The questions on a nursing exam or the NCLEX exam related to laboratory values require you to identify whether the laboratory value is normal or abnormal and then to think critically about the effects of the laboratory value in terms of the client. If you know the normal values, you will be able to determine if an abnormality exists when a laboratory value is presented in a question.

Refer to the detailed NCLEX Test Plan for the laboratory tests most likely appear on the NCLEX exam. Create your own flash cards for learning about these laboratory tests. Points to note are the normal values for the most common laboratory tests and determination of the need to implement specific actions based on the findings. Remember that most blood specimens should not be drawn during hemodialysis or from an extremity that has an IV solution running.

When a question is presented on your exams regarding a specific laboratory value, note the disorder presented in the question and the associated body organ that is affected. This will help you determine the correct option. For example, if the question asks you about the immune status of a client receiving chemotherapy, assessment of laboratory values will focus on the white blood cell count. You will need to analyze the results as possibly being low and determine the specific client need, which in this case would be the risk for infection. In the client receiving chemotherapy who has a low white blood cell count, your plan should center on the immune system, specifically protecting that client from infection. Interventions focus on preventive actions related to infection, perhaps even protective isolation measures, such as neutropenic precautions. Evaluation may focus on maintaining a normal temperature in the client. Following is a sample question that relates to a laboratory test.

### Laboratory Values

Note the disorder presented in the question.

Identify whether the laboratory value is normal or abnormal.

Identify the associated body organ that is affected as a result of the disorder.

### Sample Question:

#### **Laboratory Values**

#### **Case Event:**

A client with a diagnosis of sepsis is receiving antibiotics by the intravenous (IV) route.

#### **Question Query:**

The nurse checks for nephrotoxicity by monitoring which laboratory value most closely?

- 1. Lipase level
- 2. Platelet count
- 3. Creatinine level
- 4. White blood cell count

#### **Answer:**

3

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *most*. Focus on the **data in the question**, and note that the **subject** is nephrotoxicity. Read each option carefully, and note that option 3 is the only option that relates to kidney function. Option 1 relates to pancreatic function. Option 2 relates to the hematological system. Option 4 relates to the immune system. Remember to note the disorder presented in the question and the associated body organ that is affected as a result!



#### Tip for the Nursing Student

Sepsis refers to a systemic infection that can occur as a result of a localized or other type of infection in the body. This serious infection needs to be treated aggressively with antibiotics, and usually blood cultures are done to determine the antibiotic of choice. Nephrotoxicity, which refers to the destruction of kidney cells, is a complication that can occur with the use of antibiotics. To monitor for nephrotoxicity, the nurse would check the results of the blood urea nitrogen and creatinine levels, which are kidney function tests. You will learn about antibiotics in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study infections and immune disorders.



# Visualizing the Information in the Case Event,

# **Question Query, and Options: How Will This Help?**



As you read the question, it is helpful to visualize the case event. Forming a mental image of the situation places you as the nurse into the scenario. This may be useful because as you create the mental image, you may recall a similar situation that you experienced in the actual clinical area and recall what the nurse did in the situation. In addition, visualize each option as you read it. Visualizing and relating the case event to a similar clinical experience can be a valuable strategy as you attempt to eliminate incorrect options. Following is a sample question that illustrates this strategy of visualizing the information.

# Sample Question:

# Visualizing the Information in the Case Event, Question Query, and Options Case Event:

The nurse prepares to perform a sterile dressing change on an abdominal incision.

#### **Question Query:**

The nurse explains the procedure to the client, washes her hands, and sets up the sterile field. The nurse should take which action **next?** 

- 1. Don sterile gloves.
- 2. Assess the integrity of the abdominal incision.
- 3. Don clean gloves and remove the old dressing.
- 4. Clean the wound with povidone–iodine solution as prescribed.

#### **Answer:**

3

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *next*. Form a mental image of this procedure and visualize the steps that you would take. You cannot clean the wound or assess the wound unless you remove the old dressing; therefore, eliminate options 2 and 4. From the remaining options, recall that sterile gloves are necessary for cleaning and dressing the incision once the old dressing is removed. This will direct you to option 3. Remember that visualizing and relating the case event to a similar clinical experience can be a valuable strategy as you attempt to eliminate incorrect options!



### Tip for the Nursing Student

A sterile procedure, such as a sterile dressing change, is one that involves taking measures so that no microorganisms come in contact with the wound or anything that is used to perform the procedure. A special technique is used to maintain sterility when performing this procedure; you will learn this technique and how to perform sterile dressing changes during your fundamentals of nursing course.



### **Looking for Concepts in the Question That Are**

# Comparable or Alike to a Concept in One of the Options: How Will This Help?

Read the question carefully, noting the strategic words and the subject of the question. As you read each option, look for the one that contains comparable or alike concepts or has a relationship to those identified in the question. This strategy may help as you are eliminating the incorrect options. Following is a sample question that illustrates this strategy of looking for comparable or alike concepts.

Look for a concept in the question that is comparable or alike to a concept in one of the options!



# Sample Question:

#### Looking for Comparable or Alike Concepts in the Question and in One of the Options

#### **Case Event:**

A client is admitted to the hospital with a diagnosis of pericarditis.

#### **Ouestion Ouery:**

The nurse assesses the client for which manifestation that differentiates pericarditis from other cardiopulmonary problems?

- 1. Anterior chest pain
- 2. Pericardial friction rub
- 3. Weakness and irritability
- 4. Chest pain that worsens on inspiration

#### **Answer:**

2

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the word *differentiates*, and focus on the **subject**—a manifestation that differentiates pericarditis from other cardiopulmonary problems. This tells you that the correct option will be one that is unique to this health problem. Note the relationship between the word *pericarditis* in the question and the word *pericardial* in the correct option. Also recall that a pericardial friction rub is heard when there is inflammation of the pericardial sac during the inflammatory phase of pericarditis. Remember to look for the option that contains a **comparable or alike** concept or has a relationship to the information in the question!



#### Tip for the Nursing Student

Pericarditis is an inflammation of the pericardium (the sac that surrounds the heart) and can be associated with trauma, infection, myocardial infarction, malignant disease, or other disorders. The client exhibits fever, substernal chest pain, difficulty breathing, a dry nonproductive cough, and a rapid pulse rate. On auscultation of the lungs and chest, a pericardial friction rub and a muffled heartbeat over the apex of the heart would be heard. You will learn about auscultation of the lungs and chest during your physical assessment course and about pericarditis during your medical-

surgical nursing course when you study cardiac disorders.



### What Strategies Will Help When Answering

### **Questions Related to Client Positioning?**



Nursing responsibility includes positioning clients in a safe and appropriate manner to provide safety and comfort. Knowledge regarding the client position required for a certain procedure or condition is expected. It is the nurse's responsibility to reduce the likelihood and prevent the development of complications related to an existing condition, prescribed treatment, or medical or surgical procedure. It is imperative that the nurse review the health care provider's prescriptions after treatments or procedures and take note of instructions regarding positioning and mobility.

When you are presented with a question that relates to positioning a client, focus on the data in the question, the client's diagnosis, and the anatomical location of the client's diagnosis, and consider the pathophysiology of the disorder and the goals of care. That is, think about what complications you want to prevent. Some guidelines to remember when answering questions related to positioning are listed next.

### Client Positioning

Always review the primary health care provider's prescriptions.

Focus on the client's diagnosis.

Identify the anatomical location of the client's disorder.

Consider the pathophysiology of the disorder and the goals of care.

Think about what complications you want to prevent.

### **Guidelines Related to Positioning**

■ Elevation of an affected body part reduces edema.

- Clients who have had neck or head surgery are placed in semi-Fowler's or Fowler's position.
- After a liver biopsy, the client is placed in a right lateral (side-lying) position to provide pressure to the site and prevent bleeding.
- Clients receiving irrigations or feedings through a nasogastric, gastrostomy, or jejunostomy tube are placed in semi-Fowler's or Fowler's position to prevent aspiration.
- The left Sims' position is used to administer a rectal enema or irrigation to allow the solution to flow by gravity in the natural direction of the colon.
- Clients with a respiratory disorder or cardiovascular disorder are placed in semi-Fowler's or Fowler's position.
- Clients with peripheral arterial disease may be advised to elevate their feet and legs at rest, because swelling can prevent arterial blood flow, but they should not raise their legs above the level of the heart because extreme elevation slows arterial blood flow; some clients may be advised to maintain a slightly dependent position to promote perfusion.
- Clients with peripheral venous disease are usually advised to elevate their feet and legs above heart level.
- Clients with a head injury are placed in semi-Fowler's or Fowler's position.
- If a client develops autonomic dysreflexia, the head of the bed is elevated.
- In clients with hemorrhagic strokes, the head of the bed is usually elevated to 30 degrees to reduce intracranial pressure and to facilitate venous drainage.
- For clients with ischemic strokes, the head of the bed is usually kept flat.
- After craniotomy the client should NOT be positioned on the operated site, especially if the bone flap has been removed, because the brain has no bony covering on the affected site; semi-Fowler's to Fowler's position is maintained with the head in a midline, neutral position to facilitate venous drainage from the head, and extreme hip and neck flexion is avoided.
- With increased intracranial pressure, the client is placed in semi-Fowler's to Fowler's position; the head is maintained in a midline, neutral position to facilitate venous drainage from the head; and extreme hip and neck flexion is avoided.
- In a spinal cord injury the client is immobilized on a spinal backboard, with the head in a neutral position, to prevent incomplete injury from becoming complete; head flexion, rotation, or extension is avoided; and the client is logrolled.
- In the client who underwent a total hip arthroplasty, positioning will depend on the surgical techniques used, the method of implantation, the prosthesis, and the surgeon's preference; extreme internal and external rotation and adduction are avoided; and side-lying on the operative side is usually not allowed (unless specifically prescribed by the surgeon). The following question relates to positioning a client.



# Sample Question:

#### **Client Positioning**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse assists a health care provider in performing a liver biopsy.

#### **Ouestion Ouery:**

After the biopsy, the nurse plans to place the client in which position?

- 1. Prone
- 2. Supine
- 3. A left side-lying position with a small pillow or folded towel under the puncture site
- 4. A right side-lying position with a small pillow or folded towel under the puncture site

#### **Answer:**

4

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Focus on the **subject**, positioning after liver biopsy, and think about the anatomical location of the procedure and what complication you want to prevent. In this situation you want to prevent bleeding. Remember that the liver is on the right side of the body and that the application of pressure on the right side will minimize the escape of blood or bile through the puncture site, because this position compresses the liver against the chest wall at the biopsy site. Also, note that options 3 and 4 are opposite positions (left or right side), indicating that one of these options may be the correct one. Remember to focus on the **subject** of the question, the client's diagnosis, and the anatomical location of the client's diagnosis, and consider the pathophysiology of the disorder and the goals of care!




### Tip for the Nursing Student

A liver biopsy is a diagnostic procedure in which local anesthesia is administered followed by the introduction of a special needle into the liver to obtain a specimen for pathological examination. Bleeding is a concern after the procedure, and this is the reason why the client will be placed on the right side. This position provides pressure at the biopsy site by compressing the liver against the chest wall. You will learn about a liver biopsy in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study gastrointestinal disorders.



### What Strategies Will Help When Answering

### **Questions Related to Therapeutic Diets?**



On nursing examinations, you may be asked questions about diet therapy and certain food items that are allowed with certain diets. You may also be asked about a particular diet that may be prescribed for a client with a certain disorder. Therefore, nutritional therapy and knowing the nutritional components of various food items are essential. Some strategies that you can use to help you answer these questions are noted next.

### **Strategies for Answering Questions Related to Therapeutic Diets**

- 1. Focus on the data in the question.
- 2. Note the subject of the question: Is the question asking about a specific diet or a specific food item?
- 3. Note the diagnosis of the client, and think about the organ system that is affected.
- 4. Think about the pathophysiology associated with the client's disorder.
- 5. Look at the options that are provided, and try to relate the client's disorder to the correct option.



# Sample Question:

#### **Therapeutic Diet**

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is providing dietary instructions to a client who is immobile and experiencing frequent episodes of constipation. The client complains that the constipation is uncomfortable.

#### **Question Query:**

The nurse should tell the client that which food item would be **most** helpful to include in the diet?

- 1. Pasta
- 2. Cabbage
- 3. White bread
- 4. Whole-grain bread

#### **Answer:**

4

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *most*. Focus on the **data in the question**, and note the client complains of constipation. Think about the body organ affected in this condition and the associated pathophysiology. A client with constipation needs to include high-fiber foods in the diet. The only food item that is high in fiber is whole grains. Also note that options 1 and 3 are **comparable or alike** in that they are low-fiber foods. Option 2 is a gas-forming food and needs to be avoided because it will increase any discomfort that the client may be experiencing. Remember to focus on the **data in the question**, note the client's diagnosis or complaint, and think about the body organ affected and the associated pathophysiology.



### Tip for the Beginning Nursing Student

Constipation is a condition in which the client is having difficulty passing stool or is experiencing the incomplete or infrequent passage of hard stool. If immobility is the cause, one intervention is to include adequate amounts of fiber and fluids in the diet. You will learn about constipation in your fundamentals of nursing course when you study elimination patterns and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study gastrointestinal disorders.



# What Strategies Will Help When Answering

### **Questions Related to Disasters?**

A disaster is any human-made or natural event that causes destruction and devastation and requires assistance from others. For a health care agency, a disaster can be external or internal. External disasters include those that occur outside the health care agency, and internal disasters include those that occur inside the health care agency. If a disaster or mass casualty event occurs, the agency disaster preparedness plan (emergency response plan) is immediately activated by the health care agency, and the nurse responds by following the directions identified in the plan. In the community setting, if the nurse is the first responder to a disaster, the nurse cares for the victims by attending to those with life-threatening problems first; once rescue workers arrive at the scene, immediate plans for triage should begin.

#### Human-Made Disasters

Dam failures resulting in flooding

Hazardous substance accidents, such as pollution, chemical spills, or toxic gas leaks

Accidents that result in the release of radiological materials

Resource shortages, such as food, water, and electricity

Structural collapse, fire, or explosions

Terrorist attacks, such as bombings, riots, and bioterrorism

Transportation accidents

#### Natural Disasters

Blizzards

Communicable disease epidemics

Cyclones

Droughts

Earthquakes

Floods

Forest fires

Hailstorms

Hurricanes

Landslides

Mudslides

Tornadoes

Tsunamis (tidal waves)

Volcanic eruptions

The NCLEX exam may contain questions about disasters and mass casualty events that focus on nursing interventions. A question may identify the nurse as the first responder to a disaster site and ask you to identify the victim that the nurse should attend to first. If the question identifies a site outside the hospital environment, select the option that identifies a victim that the nurse could realistically save. Think about survivability and ask yourself, "Who can I save?" Also use prioritizing skills. Ask yourself, "Which victims sustained injuries that are not critical or life threatening and could wait to be cared for?"

### Study Tip

#### **Scope of Practice**

When working outside of a health care facility, such as at the scene of an accident, it is necessary to remain mindful of what treatment you can provide as a nurse.

An NCLEX question may also identify the nurse as the leader of a nursing unit and ask which clients in the unit could be discharged to free up beds for victims of a mass casualty event brought to the emergency department who need to be admitted to the hospital. In this situation, read each client's description carefully and determine if the client can safely return home and if there are home care and community resources that could care for the client and meet the client's needs. These types of questions require the use of prioritizing skills.

When triaging victims of a disaster at a disaster site, think survivability. Determine which victims sustained life-threatening injuries and need immediate treatment to sustain life.



### Sample Question:

#### Human-Made Disaster

#### **Case Event:**

The nurse is the first responder to the site of a disaster in which several people were injured in a train crash.

#### **Question Query:**

Which victim of the crash should the nurse attend to first?

- 1. A victim with a fractured arm
- 2. A victim with multiple bruises on the legs
- 3. A victim with a severe head injury who is not breathing
- 4. A victim with an upper leg injury who is bleeding profusely

#### **Answer:**

4

#### **Test-Taking Strategy**

Note the **strategic word** *first*. Focus on the **data in the question**, and note that the disaster site is outside the hospital environment. Therefore, determine which victim has a life-threatening injury and requires immediate treatment to sustain life. Think survivability. The victims described in options 1 and 2 sustained injuries that are not critical or life threatening and could wait for care. Outside the hospital environment, resources are limited. Therefore, it is unlikely that the nurse could help the victim with a severe head injury who is not breathing. The nurse could apply pressure to the leg of the victim who is bleeding profusely and could save this victim's life.



#### Tip for the Nursing Student

Disaster management is an important role of the nurse. An important point to remember is that the nurse needs to use prioritizing skills to determine how best to proceed in a disaster situation. Many types of disasters can occur, but the principles of care remain the same. The immediate priority of the nurse is to attend to the victim who has immediate and life-threatening needs and who could be saved. You will learn about mass casualty events and disaster management and the nurse's roles and responsibilities in your community nursing course.

# **CHAPTER 13**

# **Fundamentals of Care Questions**

- 1. The nurse creates a plan of care for a newly hospitalized client who reports difficulty sleeping. The nurse plans to implement which **best** intervention?
  - 1 Offer the client a sleeping pill at night.
  - 2 Provide the client with a snack at bedtime.
  - 3 Ask the client what he or she does to prepare for sleep.
  - 4 Leave the television on in the client's room at a very low volume.

Answer: 3

**Rationale:** The best intervention is to ask what the client does to prepare for sleep. The nurse needs to assess habits that are beneficial to the client compared with those that disturb sleep. Options 1, 2, and 4 provide interventions without initially assessing what measures would be helpful to the client.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *best*. Use the **steps of the nursing process** when determining the best answer. The only option that addresses assessment is option 3. **Review:** care of the client experiencing difficulty **sleeping**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** You will learn about sleep patterns and measures to promote sleep in your fundamentals of nursing course. An important point to remember is that you always want to determine what measures the client takes at home to sleep and incorporate these measures into the plan of care during hospitalization.

2. The nurse notes documentation in a client's medical record that the client is experiencing anuria. The nurse plans care based on which interpretation?

- 1 The client is unable to produce urine.
- 2 The client has a diminished capacity to form urine.
- 3 The client has difficulty having a bowel movement.
- 4 The client has episodes of alternating constipation and diarrhea.

Answer: 1

**Rationale:** *Anuria* is the term used to describe an inability to produce urine. Oliguria is a diminished capacity to produce urine and is most likely the result of a decrease in renal perfusion. Options 3 and 4 do not relate to urinary tract dysfunction.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, the definition of anuria. Use medical terminology skills to answer the question. Recalling that the prefix *an*- refers to absence and the suffix *-uria* refers to urine will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the definition of **anuria**.

**Level of Cognitive Ability:** Applying **Client Needs:** Physiological Integrity

**Integrated Process:** Nursing Process/Planning

**Content Area:** Fundamentals of Care

**Priority Concepts:** Elimination; Fluid and Electrolytes

**Level of Nursing Student:** Beginning

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** You will learn about the terminology used to describe conditions related to the renal system in your fundamentals of nursing course and your medical-surgical nursing course when you study renal disorders. It is important to remember that the client should maintain a urinary output of at least 30 mL/hour, and the nurse should monitor for this occurrence. A decline in urine output could indicate kidney dysfunction or failure, hypovolemia, or an obstruction in the renal system. This occurrence needs to be reported.

- 3. The nurse is caring for a client who has a fever and is diaphoretic. The nurse monitors the client's intake and output and expects to note which finding?
  - 1 The client's urine is diluted.
  - 2 The client's output is decreased.
  - 3 The client's urine production is increased.
  - 4 The client's majority of fluid loss is through the skin.

Answer: 2

**Rationale:** Febrile conditions affect urine production. The client who is diaphoretic loses fluids through insensible water loss, which decreases urine production. However, the increased body temperature associated with fever increases accumulation of body wastes. Although urine volume may be reduced, it is highly concentrated. Some fluid (not the majority) will be lost through the skin.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, care of the client experiencing a fever and diaphoresis. Think about the physiological response of the body to fever and diaphoresis. This will direct you to the correct option. Also remember that although some fluid is lost through the skin, the majority of fluid loss is not lost through this system. **Review:** conditions that affect **fluid imbalance.**

Most fluid is lost through the kidneys; if the client has a fever and is diaphoretic (sweating), the normal daily amount of fluid loss through the skin will be increased.

The client should begin the flow of urine, collecting the sample after starting the flow. The specimen should be sent to the laboratory as soon as possible and not allowed to stand. Improper specimen handling can yield inaccurate test results. It is not normal procedure to douche before collecting the specimen.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, urine collection for laboratory analysis. Noting the name of the type of sample—*midstream*—will assist in eliminating option 3. Recalling that the specimen should be sent or brought to the laboratory immediately after collection will assist in eliminating option 4. From the remaining options, use basic principles related to hygiene and infection control to assist in directing you to the correct option. **Review:** the procedure for collecting a **midstream urine collection**.

could result in a urinary tract infection. Additionally, the male client is instructed to cleanse the penis with the towelettes, cleansing from the meatus outward, and gently retracting foreskin, if present, for cleansing.

**Rationale:** The client with iron-deficiency anemia should increase intake of foods that are naturally high in iron, including kidney beans, soybeans, chickpeas, lima beans, cooked Swiss chard, red meat, liver and other organ meats, blackstrap molasses, lentils, egg yolk, spinach, kale, turnip tops, beet greens, carrots, raisins, and apricots. The food items in options 1, 2, and 3 are not high in iron.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, a food high in iron. Eliminate options 1 and 2 first because they are **comparable or alike** and are fruit items. From the remaining options, recall either that beans are high in iron or that egg yolk (not egg white) is high in iron. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review: iron-rich foods.**

You will also learn about the foods high in iron when you study nutrition. These food items are important to know because you will be teaching your client about a high-iron diet.

Rationale: A simple relaxation technique, such as muscle relaxation, can help reduce anxiety and promote sleep. Herbal therapy involves the use of herbs (plant or a plant part). Some herbs have been determined to be safe, but other herbs, even in small amounts, can be toxic, and the nurse would not recommend their use to a client. The client who is taking prescription medications should consult the primary health care provider regarding the use of herbs because serious herb-medication interactions can occur. Acupuncture is an invasive procedure that stimulates certain points on the body by the insertion of special needles to modify the perception of pain, normalize physiological functions, or treat or prevent disease. Traditional Chinese medicine focuses on restoring and maintaining a balanced flow of vital energy; interventions include acupressure, acupuncture, herbal therapies, diet, meditation, and tai chi and qi gong (exercise that focuses on breathing, visualization, and movement). Any invasive therapy requires a prescription from the primary health care provider.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** The **subject** of the question is promoting relaxation and sleep. Note that options 1, 2, and 4 are **comparable or alike** in that they include invasive measures. **Review: complementary and alternative therapies.**

Celery is a vegetable that is low in potassium.

Eliminate options 1, 3, and 4 because they are **comparable or alike** and are fruit items. **Review:** high- and low-**potassium foods.**

A potassium-retaining diuretic does not, and the client tends to retain potassium rather than lose it. The client is taught about diet and the foods that are high and low in potassium. Both a low potassium level and a high potassium level can cause serious problems for the client; therefore, potassium imbalances are important to learn. You will learn about potassium imbalances and nutrition in your fundamentals of nursing course, and you will learn about diuretics in your pharmacology course.

to prevent and treat dryness. The nurse should also instruct the client and family regarding the
purpose of the oxygen. It is not necessary to instruct a client to breathe only through the nose. It is
unnecessary and potentially harmful to increase the oxygen flow; this action requires a primary
health care provider's prescription. Additionally, increasing the flow of oxygen will contribute
further to dryness of the nares.
<b>Test-Taking Strategy:</b> Focus on the <b>subject</b> , care of the client receiving oxygen via nasal cannula.

At lunchtime the client consumed 8 oz of iced tea and 6 oz of water. This totals 14 oz and equals 420 mL. At dinnertime the client consumed 8 oz of coffee and 6 oz of lemonade. This totals 14 oz and equals 420 mL. The client also consumed 4 oz of water at 10:00 am, at 2:00 pm, and again at 6:00 pm when he received his oral medications. This totals 12 oz and equals 360 mL. At 8:00 am and 2:00 pm, the client received an intravenous antibiotic diluted in 50 mL of normal saline. This totals 100 mL. Therefore, adding 540 mL, 420 mL, 420 mL, 360 mL, and 100 mL equals 1840 mL.

HIV is transmitted through anal or oral sexual contact with infected semen or vaginal secretions, through contact with infected blood or blood products, by transmission of the virus from mother to fetus during childbirth, through breastfeeding, or from other infected body fluids. Standard precautions, which include blood and body fluid precautions, will prevent contact with infectious matter and protect a primary health care provider from contracting the virus when providing care. Droplet, contact, and airborne precautions are more specific types of precautions and are known as *transmission-based precautions*. Droplet precautions require the use of a mask and are used when organisms can be spread by respiratory droplets but are unable to remain in the air farther than 3 feet (1 meter) (e.g., influenza). Contact precautions are used when caring for clients who have an infection that can be spread by direct or indirect contact (e.g., draining wounds, splashes). Airborne precautions require the use of a special particulate filter mask. These precautions are used to prevent infection when infectious organisms remain in the air for prolonged periods of time and can be transported in the air for distances greater than 3 feet (1 meter) (e.g., tuberculosis). No data in the question indicate that these types of precautions alone are necessary.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word**, *best*. Read each option carefully. Think about the pathophysiology of HIV and its transmission. Also, note that option 3 is the **umbrella option**.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Use **therapeutic communication techniques.** Option 4 is the only option that addresses the client's concern. **Review: therapeutic communication techniques.**

Focus on the **data in the question**, and note the words *long-term*, *continuous*, and *at home*. Eliminate options 1, 3, and 4 because no **data in the question** support these options.

Review: care of the client receiving total parenteral nutrition.

The client should also avoid yeast and any products made with yeast, such as pizza and homemade bread. Most fruits and vegetables are acceptable. The fruits and vegetables that should be avoided are bananas, figs, broad leaf beans and pea pods, eggplant, and mixed Chinese vegetables.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, foods acceptable to consume in a tyramine-restricted

diet. Eliminate options 1 and 5 because they are foods that contain yeast. **Review:** food items that contain **tyramine.**

Tip for the Nursing Student: A healthy and balanced diet is important for all individuals. In the clinical setting, a major responsibility will be to ensure that your clients are receiving adequate nutrition to heal and to maintain health. Many times specific diets are prescribed for clients, and you will be responsible for teaching the client about the diet, what can be eaten, and what food items should be restricted. Tyramine is an amino acid that stimulates the release of the catecholamines epinephrine and norepinephrine. Tyramine may be restricted in certain disorders, but it is very important that individuals taking monoamine oxidase inhibitors avoid the ingestion of foods and beverages containing tyramine. Monoamine oxidase inhibitors are antidepressants that you will learn about in your pharmacology course and in your mental health or psychiatric nursing course. You will learn about other various therapeutic diets in your fundamentals of nursing course or in a nutrition course.

**Rationale:** Basic procedure for drawing up medication from an ampule involves tapping the top chamber until the medication lies in the lower area, placing an alcohol wipe around the neck of the ampule, snapping the top so that it opens away from the nurse, and withdrawing the medication without injecting air into the ampule. Snapping the ampule so that it opens away from the nurse prevents injury from possible shattered glass fragments. The neck is not wiped with the gauze after it is opened because first, it is unnecessary and could contaminate the contents of the ampule, and second, it could injure the nurse's fingers from sharp glass edges.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, medication preparation from an ampule. Visualize this procedure and each of the options. Eliminate option 1 because of the word *shake*. Next eliminate option 2 because it is unsafe and could harm the nurse. From the remaining options, use principles of both asepsis and safety to direct you to the correct option. **Review:** preparing medication from an **ampule**.

Answer: 3

**Rationale:** The client with a low platelet count is at risk for bleeding. Therefore, the nurse institutes measures that will minimize the risk of injury or bleeding. The nurse should avoid vigorous washing or rubbing of the skin to avoid causing ecchymosis, and would use lotions to prevent dryness and cracking of the skin. The nurse should avoid the use of razors or firm-bristle toothbrushes, which could also cause bleeding. In addition, the nurse should measure the temperature using a temporal thermometer. Rectal thermometers are avoided because of the risk of bleeding, and oral thermometers are avoided if there is oral soreness or bleeding.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, a platelet count of  $60,000 \text{ mm}^3$  ( $60 \times 10^9/\text{L}$ ). Recalling the normal platelet count and determining that a platelet count of  $60,000 \text{ mm}^3$  ( $60 \times 10^9/\text{L}$ ) is low, placing the client at risk for bleeding, will assist in eliminating options 1, 2, and 4. Also noting the words *razor*, *vigorous*, and *firm* in these options, respectively, will assist in eliminating them.

The normal platelet count is 150,000 to 400,000 mm³ (150 to 400×10°/L). If the count is low, then the nurse institutes measures to protect the client from injury and resultant bleeding. You will be learning about normal and abnormal laboratory values in your fundamentals of nursing course. You will also learn about the platelet count when you study hematological disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Answer: 1

**Rationale:** The nurse observes the client for dyspnea (difficulty breathing), excessive pain, pallor, or diaphoresis (profuse sweating) after pleural biopsy. These signs could indicate the presence of complications, such as pneumothorax, hemothorax, or intercostal nerve injury. Options 2 and 4 are normal findings. Mild pain is expected, because the procedure itself is painful. Abnormal signs and symptoms should be reported to the primary health care provider.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, a complication associated with pleural biopsy. Eliminate options 2 and 4 because they are **comparable or alike** and are normal findings. From the remaining options noting the word *mild* in option 3 will assist in eliminating this option. **Review:** the complications associated with a **pleural biopsy**.

You will learn about care of the client after pleural biopsy and the important client assessments in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study respiratory disorders.

The nurse takes the client's vital signs and notes that the client's pulse rate has increased and that the blood pressure has dropped significantly since the previous readings. The nurse suspects that the client is going into shock and should take which **immediate** action?

- 1 Check the client's oxygen saturation level.
- 2 Recheck the vital signs to verify the findings.
- 3 Raise the client's legs above the level of the heart.

#### Answer: 1

**Rationale:** In addition to hypotension, manifestations of shock include tachycardia; restlessness and apprehension; and cold, moist, pale, or cyanotic skin. If a client develops signs of shock, the nurse should also check the oxygen saturation, because as a result of decreased circulating volume, oxygenation may be inadequate and supplemental oxygenation may be required. The nurse should also increase the rate of IV fluids (unless contraindicated), administer medications as prescribed, and continue to monitor the client and the client's response to interventions. It is not recommended to place client in Trendelenburg position (legs above the level of the heart) any longer, because there is no definitive research that supports placing the client in this position. Additionally, they may also have compromised pulmonary function and increased intracranial pressure, so this position would be potentially detrimental.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *immediate*. Use the **ABCs—airway-breathing—circulation**—to answer the question. This will direct you to the correct option. Raising the client's legs above the level of the heart should not be used to treat hypotension. **Review:** interventions for **shock.**



**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Shock is an abnormal condition of inadequate blood flow to the body's tissues resulting in an inadequate delivery of oxygen and nutrients to the tissues. There are different types of shock, but the most common is hypovolemic shock. It is caused by any condition that results in hypovolemia, such as with hemorrhage. Fluid volume must be restored immediately to oxygenate perfusion-deprived tissues. This condition can be life threatening if not immediately treated. You will learn about shock as a postoperative complication in your fundamentals of nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course.

The nurse is performing an assessment on a client with a diagnosis of a brain tumor that is located in the brainstem and notes that the client is assuming the posture in the figure. The nurse contacts the primary health care provider and reports that the client is exhibiting which assessment finding? **Refer to figure.** 



- 1 Opisthotonos
- 2 Flaccid quadriplegia
- 3 Decorticate posturing
- 4 Decerebrate posturing

Answer: 4

**Rationale:** In decerebrate posturing the upper extremities are stiffly extended and adducted with internal rotation and pronation of the palms. The lower extremities are stiffly extended with plantar flexion. The teeth are clenched, and the back is hyperextended. Decerebrate posturing indicates a lesion in the brainstem at the midbrain or upper pons. Opisthotonos is a prolonged arching of the back with the head and heels bent backward. It indicates meningeal irritation. Flaccid quadriplegia is complete loss of muscle tone and paralysis of all 4 extremities, indicating a completely nonfunctional brainstem. In decorticate posturing the upper extremities (arms, wrists, and fingers) are flexed with adduction of the arms. The lower extremities are extended with internal rotation and plantar flexion. Decorticate posturing indicates a hemispheric lesion of the cerebral cortex.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, assessment findings in the client with a brain tumor. Note the position of the client and that the extremities are stiffly extended. Also, noting the client's diagnosis and recalling that this posture indicates a lesion in the brainstem at the midbrain or upper pons will assist in answering the question. **Review: decerebrate posturing.**

Another concern is deterioration in the client's condition as a result of the tumor pressing on structures in the brain. The nurse needs to monitor the neurological status of the client closely. If the nurse notes

posturing, this indicates deterioration in the client's condition and needs to be reported immediately. You will learn about brain tumors, the signs of increased intracranial pressure, and posturing in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study neurological disorders.

**Rationale:** The client taking an intermediate-acting insulin would experience peak effects of the medication from approximately 4 to 12 hours after administration. At this time, the client is at risk for hypoglycemia if food intake is insufficient. The nurse should teach the client to watch for signs and symptoms of hypoglycemia during this time frame, which include hunger, shakiness, cold sweating, headache, anxiety, increased pulse, blurred vision, confusion, and difficulty concentrating. The other options list various manifestations of hyperglycemia.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, that the client is taking an intermediate-acting insulin at 0700. Also note the words *signs and symptoms in the late afternoon*. Recall that hypoglycemic reactions can occur at peak insulin times. Recall that an intermediate-acting insulin peaks during the afternoon. Therefore, you are looking for the option that identifies signs and symptoms of a hypoglycemic reaction. Also, eliminate options 1, 3, and 4 because they are **comparable or alike** and identify signs and symptoms of hyperglycemia. Remember the 3 *Ps* of hyperglycemia: polyuria, polydipsia, and polyphagia. **Review:** the signs and symptoms of **hypoglycemia**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Both injectable and oral insulins are used to treat the client with diabetes mellitus, and these medications can cause hypoglycemia. Two important complications of diabetes mellitus are hypoglycemia and hyperglycemia. It is important to know the signs and symptoms of each and the interventions needed if either occurs and to teach this information to the client. You will learn about these complications and the other complications of diabetes mellitus when you study endocrine disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, care of the client with viral hepatitis. Eliminate option 4 first using general principles related to client teaching. Next focus on the client's diagnosis, and

recall that the liver needs rest during the healing process. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** care of the client with **hepatitis.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Viral hepatitis is a viral inflammatory disease of the liver caused by one of the hepatitis viruses. It can be transmitted orally, sexually, through contaminated water or food, or through exposure to infected blood; the mode of transmission varies depending on the type of hepatitis virus. You will learn about viral hepatitis when you study gastrointestinal disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

More than 5 mm of induration is considered a positive result for clients with known or suspected human immunodeficiency infection, intravenous drug users, people in close contact with a known case of tuberculosis, or clients with a chest radiograph suggestive of previous tuberculosis.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Eliminate options 1, 2, and 4 because they are **comparable or alike** and indicate that tuberculosis is present. **Review**: the **tuberculin skin test.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Tuberculosis is an infection caused by an acid-fast bacillus known as *Mycobacterium tuberculosis*. It is usually transmitted by the inhalation or ingestion of infected droplets and usually affects the lungs. The tuberculin skin test is a test that consists of an intradermal injection of a purified protein derivative of the tubercle bacillus. This test is used to assist in establishing a diagnosis of tuberculosis. You will learn about this test and tuberculosis when you study respiratory disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Ideally, additional personnel should be available to assist in resuscitative efforts. "Look, listen, and feel" is no longer part of CPR procedures. Cardiac arrest is determined based on unresponsiveness and absence of a heartbeat and breathing.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, guidelines of CPR. Begin by eliminating option 4, noting the **closed-ended word** *only*. From the remaining options, recall that the current guidelines implement CAB. **Review: cardiopulmonary resuscitation** guidelines.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Review the guidelines for performing CPR to ensure that you are ready to perform the procedure if an emergency situation arises. Remember that CAB—compressions—airway—breathing—is the sequence to follow, and that if the client is a victim of injury, such as from a motor vehicle crash or a fall from a ladder, and you suspect a neck injury, the jaw thrust maneuver is used to open the airway. As a nurse, you will be required to remain current with your CPR certification. You will also review the CPR guidelines in your fundamentals or medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiac disorders.

The client may complain of a headache, but this is not a specific assessment finding in polycystic kidney disease.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *most*. Note the relationship between the word *kidney* in the name of the disorder and the word *flank* in the correct option. **Review:** the manifestations of **polycystic kidney disease.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Polycystic kidney disease is an abnormal condition in which the kidneys are enlarged and contain many cysts. The 3 forms of the disease are childhood polycystic disease, congenital polycystic disease, and adult polycystic disease. Kidney failure can result that can progress to uremia and death. Treatment is symptomatic or may include dialysis or renal transplant. You will learn about this disease in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study renal disorders.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Use **therapeutic communication techniques** to eliminate options 1 and 3. Next, careful reading of option 4 will assist in eliminating this option. Remember that if testing is performed too early in the initial infection period, a false-negative result may occur. **Review:** interpretations of results of an **enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay (ELISA)** test.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** HIV is a retrovirus that causes acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS). The HIV virus is transmitted through anal or oral sexual contact with infected semen or vaginal secretions, through contact with infected blood or blood products, by transmission of the virus from mother to fetus during childbirth, through breastfeeding, or through other infected body fluids. Various blood tests done to confirm the diagnosis include the ELISA and the Western blot. You will learn about these blood tests and HIV when you study immune disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

The client with an ileostomy is not at risk for developing the acid-base disorders identified in the other options.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, acid-base disorders. Note that the client has an ileostomy. Because the client does not have a respiratory condition, eliminate options 3 and 4. Next, recall that intestinal fluids are alkaline; therefore, alkaline secretions are lost in a client with an ileostomy, resulting in an acidotic condition. **Review:** causes of **metabolic acidosis.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** An ileostomy is a surgical formation of an opening of the ileum onto the surface of the abdomen, through which fecal matter is emptied. This surgical procedure is performed for conditions such as advanced or recurrent ulcerative colitis, Crohn's disease, or cancer of the large bowel. You will learn about an ileostomy when you study gastrointestinal disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A percutaneous renal biopsy is performed by the insertion of a needle through the skin into the kidney to obtain a piece of tissue for pathological analysis. Infection and bleeding are concerns after this procedure, and the nurse monitors the client closely for these complications. You will learn about a percutaneous renal biopsy when you study renal disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

The normal  $Paco_3$  is 22 to

27 mm Hg. Metabolic acidosis is present when the  $^{\text{HCO}_3^-}$  is less than 22 mEq/L and the pH is less than 7.35, whereas metabolic alkalosis is present when the  $^{\text{HCO}_3^-}$  is greater than 27 mEq/L and the pH is greater than 7.45. This client's ABG results are consistent with respiratory acidosis.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, interpretation of arterial blood gas values. Focus on the client's diagnosis, and recall that this client will have difficulty exchanging oxygen and carbon dioxide. This will assist in eliminating options 1 and 2. From the remaining options, remember that the pH is decreased with acidosis. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the steps related to reading **arterial blood gas values.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Respiratory failure is the inability of the cardiovascular and pulmonary system to maintain an adequate exchange of oxygen and carbon dioxide in the lungs. Respiratory failure can be caused by various conditions that affect oxygenation or ventilation, such as emphysema, infection, pneumonia, or lung cancer. You will learn about respiratory failure and ABG values when you study respiratory disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

This test is usually done annually and permits early diagnosis of cervical cancer. You will learn about this screening test when you study oncological disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Also, recalling the pathophysiology of multiple myeloma and the effects it produces on the body will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the manifestations associated with **multiple myeloma**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Multiple myeloma is a malignant tumor of the bone marrow. The tumor disrupts normal bone marrow function, destroys osseous tissue, and causes pain, fractures, hypercalcemia, and skeletal deformities. You will learn about multiple myeloma when you study oncologic disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

These words indicate a **negative event query** and the need to select the option that is an incorrect client statement. Recall what this test entails. Because the test requires physical activity, not eating for 24 hours before the procedure could be harmful to the client. **Review:** client teaching related to a **stress test.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** An exercise ECG (stress test) measures the function of the cardiopulmonary system as the body is subjected to carefully controlled amounts of physiological stress. In this test, a cardiac monitoring device is attached to the client and the cardiopulmonary system is monitored while the client performs some type of exercise, such as walking on a treadmill. The results of this test provide valuable information for the primary health care provider to determine cardiopulmonary problems or the effectiveness of medications or other treatments. You will learn about this type of stress test when you study cardiovascular disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Hypotension, tachycardia, jugular vein distension, cyanosis of the lips and nails, dyspnea, muffled heart sounds, diaphoresis, and paradoxical pulse (a decrease in systolic arterial pressure greater than 10 mm Hg during inspiration) are indications of this emergency situation. The emergency intervention of choice is pericardiocentesis, a procedure in which fluid is aspirated from the pericardial sac. Options 1, 2, and 4 are not indications of cardiac tamponade.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, signs of cardiac tamponade. Note the word *recurring*. This tells you that the correct option is a symptom of the original problem, which is cardiac tamponade. Recalling the pathophysiology associated with cardiac tamponade will direct you to option 3. **Review:** signs of **cardiac tamponade**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** When cardiac tamponade occurs, the heart becomes compressed by the accumulation of fluid in the pericardium. To sustain life, this fluid needs to be removed. Pericardiocentesis involves a surgical puncture into the pericardial space between the serous membranes for aspiration of the fluid from the pericardial sac. You will learn about cardiac tamponade and pericardiocentesis when you study cardiovascular disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Options 1, 2, and 4 are normal findings.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the words *experiencing a complication*. This tells you that the correct option is an abnormal piece of assessment data. Eliminate options 1, 2, and 4 because they are **comparable or alike** and are normal findings. Pallor and coolness indicate thrombosis or hematoma and should be further assessed and reported. **Review:** the signs of complications after a **cardiac catheterization.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A cardiac catheterization is a diagnostic procedure in which a catheter is introduced through an incision into a large blood vessel and threaded through the circulatory system of the heart. This procedure is primarily done to assess the status of the coronary arteries in the heart and to determine if any blockage is present and, if so, the extent of the blockage. Postprocedure monitoring for complications is a primary nursing responsibility. You will learn about cardiac catheterization and important nursing interventions when you study cardiovascular disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Although options 1 and 4 may be components of the assessment, these questions are not the priority. Option 2 is unrelated to the data in the question.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *priority*. Focusing on the data in the question will assist in eliminating option 2. From the remaining options noting the word *laceration* will direct you to option 3. **Review:** emergency care for the client who sustains a **laceration**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Tetanus toxoid is an active immunizing agent prepared from detoxified tetanus toxin that produces an antigenic response in the body. It provides immunity to

tetanus, an acute, potentially fatal infection of the central nervous system caused by an anaerobic bacillus, *Clostridium tetani*. The bacillus may enter the body through a wound, such as a laceration. If a client sustains an injury that involves a laceration or other type of wound, a booster shot of tetanus toxoid is given if the client was previously immunized. People known to have been adequately immunized within 5 years of the injury (or a time period determined by the primary health care provider) do not usually require immunization. You will learn about treatment of skin injuries when you study integumentary disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Pain is an expected finding. Although infection is also a complication (indicated by a fever), it is not generally noted in the early posttrauma period.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *early*. Focus on the **subject**, complications after this type of injury. Noting the **strategic word** will assist in eliminating option 2. Next, focus on the anatomical location of the injury to direct you to the correct option from the remaining options. **Review:** the complications after **pelvic fracture.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Pelvic fractures usually occur as a result of motor vehicle crashes, falls, and crush injuries. Hemorrhage is a primary concern, because the force from the impact can rupture blood vessels surrounding the pelvic ring. You will learn about pelvic fractures, the complications, and the nursing interventions in the care of the client when you study musculoskeletal disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Eliminate option 3 first because of the word *vigorously*. Next eliminate options 1 and 4 because they are **comparable or alike** and would lead to excessive skin softening that could result in skin breakdown. Also noting the word *gently* will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** client instructions regarding skin care after removal of a **cast.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A plaster cast is a solid and stiff dressing formed with plaster of Paris around a limb or other body part to immobilize it. You will learn about casts and the nursing interventions in the care of the client when you study musculoskeletal disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

The complaint of anorexia is too vague to indicate peritonitis. Some mild abdominal discomfort may occur initially with peritoneal dialysis. The very slight temperature elevation in option 4 is not the clearest indicator of infection. Peritonitis would cause cloudy dialysate output.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, peritonitis. Use medical terminology to recall that the suffix *-itis* indicates inflammation or infection. Eliminate option 1 first because it is a vague symptom. Next eliminate option 3 because of the word *mild*. From the remaining options, note that the temperature is only slightly elevated, and recall that infection would cause white blood cells to be present in the dialysate output, which would yield cloudiness. **Review:** the signs of **peritonitis** in the client receiving **peritoneal dialysis**.

Tip for the Nursing Student: Peritoneal dialysis is a procedure used for clients with acute kidney injury or chronic kidney disease to remove toxins and other wastes that are normally removed by the kidneys from the body. It is a procedure that uses the peritoneum (membrane that lines the abdominal cavity) as the membrane to filter out these toxins and wastes. Fluid (dialysate) flows into the abdominal cavity, filters out these toxins and wastes, and flows out. One complication of peritoneal dialysis is peritonitis, an inflammation and infection of the peritoneum. One indication of peritonitis is cloudy output because output should be clear. You will learn about peritoneal dialysis and its complications in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study renal (kidney) disorders.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A cataract is an abnormal progressive clouding of the lens of the eye that leads to visual loss if untreated. Surgical removal of the lens is done only after vision is compromised. Lens implants may be inserted to restore vision. After surgery, teaching focuses on proper use and administration of eye medications, protecting the eye, activity restrictions, and preventing infection. You will learn about cataract surgery in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study eye disorders.

Exposure to an irritant would result in an eye irrigation. **Review:** initial treatment after an **eye contusion.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** An eye contusion is an injury caused by a blow to the eye area. A contusion does not disrupt the integrity of the skin but causes swelling, pain, and bruising. Ice is immediately applied to limit swelling, pain, and bruising. You will learn about eye injuries in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study eye disorders.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Otosclerosis is a condition in which ossification occurs in the ossicles of the middle ear (especially the stapes), leading to hearing loss. Stapedectomy is the removal of the fixed stapes. Insertion of a graft and prosthesis is done to restore hearing. You will learn about otosclerosis and stapedectomy in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study ear disorders.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Eliminate option 2 because of the **closed-ended word** *only*. Also option 2 is limited by description. Next eliminate option 4 because of the **closed-ended words** *totally eliminates*. From the remaining options visualize this device to assist in eliminating option 3. **Review:** the advantages of the use of the **spacer** with inhaled medications.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Some medications, particularly respiratory medications, are administered by the inhalation route. To accomplish administration by this route, special inhalation devices are used. A spacer device is a small piece of equipment that can be attached to the inhalation device to make the administration of the medication easier for the client. Teaching the client how to use these devices is an important nursing intervention. You will learn about these devices and how to use them in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study respiratory disorders.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** AIDS is a syndrome that is caused by the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), a retrovirus that attacks and kills CD4<sup>+</sup> lymphocytes (T helper cells). This results in a weakening of the immune system's ability to prevent infection. You will learn about AIDS in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study immune disorders. **References:**

Water goes into cerebral cells because of the osmotic gradient, causing brain swelling and onset of symptoms. It is prevented by dialyzing for shorter times or at reduced blood flow rates. The signs in options 1, 2, and 3 are not associated with disequilibrium syndrome.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, signs of disequilibrium syndrome. Focusing on the name of the syndrome will direct you to the correct option. This is the only option that addresses a neurological sign. Review: the signs of disequilibrium syndrome.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Chronic kidney disease is a condition in which the kidneys are unable to excrete wastes, concentrate urine, and conserve electrolytes. A component of treatment is hemodialysis. Hemodialysis requires the use of a dialyzer that is connected to a shunt, fistula, or other device that allows access to the client's bloodstream. The client's blood is transported from the body through the dialyzer, which removes wastes and excess fluids from the blood. The cleaned blood is then returned to the client's body. Disequilibrium syndrome is one complication that can occur as a result of hemodialysis. You will learn about chronic kidney disease and disequilibrium syndrome in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study renal disorders.

It is characterized by resting tremor, pill rolling of the fingers, shuffling gait, masklike facies, forward flexion of the trunk, muscle rigidity and weakness, and loss of postural reflexes. **Rationale:** A lead container and a pair of long-handled forceps should be kept in the client's room at all times during internal radiation therapy. If the implant becomes dislodged, the nurse should pick up the implant with long-handled forceps and place it in the lead container. The radiation therapist and radiation safety officer are notified immediately of the situation so that they can retrieve and secure the radiation source. The primary health care provider is also called after taking action to maintain the safety of the client and others. The nurse does not reinsert a radiation implant device. Options 3 and 4 are incorrect and can expose individuals to the radiation.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *next*. Option 1 can be eliminated first because inserting a radiation device is not a nursing activity. Recalling that the nurse needs to protect himself or herself and others from exposure to the radiation will help eliminate options 3 and 4. Also, these options are **comparable or alike. Review:** the measures related to a dislodged **radiation implant.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A cervical radiation implant is a device that is placed in the area of the cervix and emits radiation to the body area. It is a treatment measure for cervical cancer. Because exposure to radiation can be harmful, special precautions are taken to prevent exposure to other individuals. You will learn about cancer and its treatment and about radiation implants in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study oncologic disorders.

**Rationale:** Correct positioning will assist in providing comfort to the client with acute pancreatitis. These positions include a side-lying position with the knees curled up to the chest and a pillow pressed against the abdomen or upright in a sitting position with the trunk flexed. Options 1, 2, and 3 are incorrect positions and will not alleviate discomfort.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the client's diagnosis, and evaluate each option in terms of the amount of stretching or flexing of the abdominal wall that the action will cause. Also note that options 1, 2, and 3 are **comparable or alike** in that they are flat positions. **Review:** the positions that will reduce pain in the client with **acute pancreatitis.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Pancreatitis is an inflammatory condition of the pancreas and can be acute or chronic. It is characterized by severe epigastric or upper-left-quadrant abdominal pain radiating to the back, fever, anorexia, nausea, and vomiting. You will learn about pancreatitis in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study gastrointestinal disorders.

**Rationale:** Fatigue is a normal response to hepatic cellular damage. During the acute stage, rest is an essential intervention to reduce the liver's metabolic demands and increase its blood supply, but bed rest for 6 weeks is unnecessary. The client needs to avoid all alcohol consumption because of hepatotoxicity. The client should avoid taking all medications, including acetaminophen (which is hepatotoxic), unless prescribed by the primary health care provider. The client should consume small frequent meals that are low in fat and protein to reduce the workload of the liver.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, care of the client with viral hepatitis. Eliminate option 1 first, recalling that the client needs to avoid (not limit) alcohol intake. Next eliminate option 2 because of the words *next* 6 *weeks*. From the remaining options, recalling that acetaminophen is hepatotoxic will assist in eliminating option 3. **Review:** instructions for the client with **viral hepatitis.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Viral hepatitis is an inflammatory disease of the liver caused by one of the hepatitis viruses. It is characterized by jaundice, anorexia, abdominal and gastric discomfort, hepatomegaly, clay-colored stools, and tea-colored urine. The liver is usually able to regenerate its tissue, and rest is an essential component of therapy. You will learn about viral hepatitis when you study gastrointestinal disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

**Rationale:** After hemodialysis the client's vital signs are monitored to determine whether the client is remaining hemodynamically stable and for comparison to predialysis measurements. The client's blood pressure and weight are expected to be reduced as a result of fluid removal. Laboratory studies are done as per protocol, but are not necessarily done after the hemodialysis treatment has ended.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *effectiveness* and focus on the **subject**, determining the effectiveness of hemodialysis. Note that this is an evaluation-type question. Also remember that when options contain 2 parts, both parts need to be correct in order for the option to be the correct one. Knowing that weight is an important variable allows you to eliminate options 3 and 4. From the remaining options, recalling that vital signs reflect hemodynamic stability will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the parameters that will determine the effectiveness of **hemodialysis**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Chronic kidney disease is a condition in which the kidneys are unable to excrete wastes, concentrate urine, and conserve electrolytes. A component of treatment is hemodialysis. Hemodialysis requires the use of a dialyzer that is connected to a shunt, fistula, or other device that allows access to the client's bloodstream. The client's blood is transported from the body through the dialyzer, which removes wastes and excess fluids from the blood. The cleaned blood is then returned to the client's body. You will learn about chronic kidney disease and hemodialysis in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study renal disorders.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, homonymous hemianopsia. Use medical terminology, noting that *hemi*- means half and *-op*- refers to the eye. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** care for the client with **homonymous hemianopsia.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A stroke (brain attack) is an abnormal condition of the brain that is caused by an occlusion from a thrombus, embolus, vasospasm, or hemorrhage. Homonymous hemianopsia is a visual loss in the same half of the visual field of each eye, so the client has only half of normal vision. This disorder can occur as a result of the stroke and places the client at risk for injury. You will learn about a stroke (brain attack) and homonymous hemianopsia in your

medical-surgical nursing course when you study neurological disorders. **References:**

**Rationale:** The most appropriate nursing action is to sit and talk if the client is expressing anxiety. Antianxiety medication may be necessary, but this is not the most appropriate nursing action. A UAP may not be able to alleviate the client's anxiety. Option 4 is an inappropriate action and places the client's feelings on hold.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words** *most appropriate,* and use **therapeutic communication techniques.** Recalling that it is best to address the client's feelings assists in directing you to the correct option. **Review:** care of the client with **obsessive-compulsive disorder.**

Therapeutic communication techniques, which promote and encourage the client to communicate and share his or her feelings with the nurse, should be used when caring for a client. You will learn about therapeutic and nontherapeutic communication techniques in your fundamentals of nursing course and about obsessive-compulsive disorder in your mental health nursing course.

**Rationale:** The priority intervention is to check the client for any physiological cause of the paralysis. Although the client may be referred to group therapy, this is not the priority. Although a component of the plan of care is to encourage the client to discuss feelings, this also is not the priority. It is not appropriate to encourage the client to use the arm without ruling out a physiological cause of the paralysis.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *priority*. Use **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory** to remember that physiological needs are the first priority. Also use the **steps of the nursing process.** The correct option is the only one that addresses a physiological need and assessment/data collection, the first step in the nursing process. **Review: conversion disorder.**

Noting that options 2, 3, and 4 are **comparable or alike**, addressing the time of discharge will assist in eliminating these options. Also, use **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory.** The correct option addresses a physiological need.

This will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** care of the client experiencing **delusions.**

**Rationale:** Restraints or seclusion require a written prescription from a primary health care provider and must be reviewed and renewed every 24 hours or per agency or state protocols. This treatment should be used only when less restrictive methods are insufficient (such as distraction or one-to-one supervision) and the client still presents a risk for harm to self or others. This treatment should not be used for the convenience of the health care staff. A sedative is also a form of restraint (chemical) and should not be used without a primary health care provider's prescription. Seclusion should not be used as a form of punishment and can be considered a legal tort and violation of client rights if not used in the appropriate situation. Nursing measures include documenting the behavior leading to the restraint or seclusion; ensuring a prescription is in place for this treatment; ensuring the client in restraints or seclusion is protected from harm by having a staff member on one-to-one supervision within arm's length of the client; and assessing physical, safety, and comfort needs every 15 to 30 minutes, such as the need for food, fluids, range-of-motion exercises, and ambulation or the need to use the bathroom.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, indications for seclusion. Note that options 1 and 4 are **comparable or alike** and indicate violation of client rights; this will assist in eliminating these options. Noting that option 3 is also a form of restraint will assist in eliminating this option.

Physical restraints include any manual method or mechanical device, material, or equipment that inhibits free movement. Chemical restraints include the administration of medications for the specific purpose of inhibiting a specific behavior or movement. The important point to remember is that these methods should be used as a last resort, and they require a written prescription from a primary health care provider. You will learn about the use of restraints and seclusion in your fundamentals of nursing course and mental health and psychiatric nursing course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **strategic word** *initially*. Note that options 2, 3, and 4 are **comparable or alike** in that they all involve activities with another individual. The correct option is the only solitary activity that will minimize stimuli. **Review:** care of the **manic client.**

Eliminate options 1 and 2 first because the client's statements are **comparable or alike.** From the remaining options use **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory.** The correct option indicates planning with a concern for safety. **Review:** care of the **rape victim.**

Aripiprazole may be administered with or without food and is well absorbed both in the presence or absence of food. It is not necessary for the client to increase his or her usual exercise pattern to assist in absorption of the medication. Alcohol is avoided, not limited.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Noting that the client has schizophrenia will assist in determining that the medication is an antipsychotic. Eliminate option 1 because of the **closed-ended word** *only*. Eliminate option 2 by recalling that alcohol intake is avoided, not limited. From the remaining options, eliminate option 4 because of the words *increase his usual exercise pattern threefold*. **Review: aripiprazole.**

Answer: 1, 4, 5

Rationale: If the uterus feels soft and spongy (boggy), it should be massaged gently, observing for increased vaginal bleeding or clots. Option 2 is inappropriate at this time and could be harmful. The nurse should document fundal position, consistency, and height and the need to perform fundal massage, along with the client's response to the intervention. Notifying the primary health care provider before beginning fundal massage is not appropriate.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words** *most appropriate initially*. Note the relationship of the data in the question (soft and spongy) and the data in the correct options. Also recall that actions need to be taken if the top of the uterus (fundus) is soft and spongy. Review: nursing interventions related to fundal assessment.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** The postpartum period is the time after delivery of a newborn. During this time, the nurse needs to check the new mother's fundus for firmness. If the fundus is soft and spongy (and not firm as it should be), the nurse should gently massage the fundus. You will learn about the postpartum period and associated nursing interventions in your maternity nursing course when you study postpartum assessments.

Rationale: Accurate use of Nägele's rule requires that the woman have a regular 28-day menstrual cycle. Subtract 3 months from the first day of the LMP, add 7 days, and then add 1 year to that date if it is appropriate to change it to the next year. First day of the LMP is August 19, 2018; subtract 3 months: May 19, 2018; add 7 days: May 26, 2018; add 1 year: May 26, 2019.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, accurate use of this rule. Use Nägele's rule to answer this question, but use caution when following the steps to determine the estimated date of delivery. Read all options carefully, noting the dates and years in each before selecting an option. Review: Nägele's rule.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Nägele's rule is a method of determining the date of delivery for a client who is pregnant. Determining the date of delivery requires knowing the date of the LMP and then using the rule to determine the delivery date. This is a simple way to determine the date, and memorizing the rule will assist you in determining a client's delivery date. You will learn about Nägele's rule and how to use it to determine the delivery date in your maternity nursing course when you study prenatal assessment procedures.

**Rationale:** Magnesium sulfate depresses the respiratory rate. If the rate is less than 12 breaths/minute, continuation of the medication needs to be reassessed. The acceptable criterion for urine output is at least 30 mL/hour. The amount of urine output identified in option 1 is adequate (20 mL of urine in 30 minutes). Deep tendon reflexes of 2+ are normal. The FHR is within normal limits for a resting fetus.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *immediately*. **Determine if an abnormality exists**. Select the option that indicates an abnormal finding that requires further intervention. Recalling the normal respiratory rate will direct you to option 3. **Review:** the findings in **preeclampsia.** 

Tip for the Nursing Student: Preeclampsia is an abnormal condition of pregnancy characterized by the onset of acute hypertension after week 24 of pregnancy. The classic signs include hypertension and proteinuria (protein in the urine). One concern is that preeclampsia can progress to eclampsia (seizures). Preeclampsia may be treated with magnesium sulfate to prevent its progression to eclampsia. The nurse needs to monitor closely the client receiving this medication because of its many adverse effects and the risk of toxicity. One primary concern is that magnesium sulfate depresses respirations; therefore, the nurse monitors the client's respiratory status closely. You will learn about this medication and important nursing interventions when it is administered in a pharmacology course or in your maternity nursing course when you study high-risk conditions in pregnancy.

**Rationale:** Symptoms of a fetal demise include decreased fetal movement, unchanged or decreased fundal height, and absent fetal heart tones. In addition, many symptoms of the pregnancy may diminish, such as breast size and tenderness. Option 1 is associated with

hyperemesis gravidarum. Option 2 is associated with preeclampsia. Option 3 is unrelated to intrauterine fetal demise and can be associated with a *hydatidiform mole* (*molar pregnancy*).

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, intrauterine fetal demise. Note the relationship between the **subject** and option 4. Recalling that fetal demise means fetal death will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the signs associated with **intrauterine fetal demise.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Fetal demise refers to the intrauterine death of a fetus. If this occurs, fetal movement and heart tones would be absent. Hyperemesis gravidarum is an abnormal condition of pregnancy characterized by protracted vomiting, weight loss, and fluid and electrolyte imbalance. Preeclampsia is an abnormal condition of pregnancy characterized by the onset of acute hypertension after week 24 of pregnancy. The classic signs include hypertension and proteinuria (protein in the urine). *Hydatidiform mole* is a rare mass or growth that grows inside the uterus at the beginning of a pregnancy. It is a form of gestational trophoblastic disease. You will learn about these complications of pregnancy in your maternity nursing course.

The placenta is not separated from the uterine wall using forceps. This may result in bleeding.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, actions to assist in the delivery of a placenta. Eliminate option 1 because of the word *pull* and option 3 because of the word *traction*. From the remaining options, eliminate option 4 by recalling that the placenta is attached to the uterine wall, and unnatural separation will result in bleeding. **Review:** the procedure for **placental delivery.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** The placenta is a fetal structure that provides nourishment to and removes wastes from the developing fetus. After the delivery of the baby, the placenta separates from the uterine wall and is delivered. You will learn about the purpose of the placenta and its delivery in your maternity nursing course.

Inability to cope implies that the person is unable to manage stressors adequately. Ineffective grieving implies prolonged unresolved grief leading to detrimental activities. Lowered self-esteem represents temporary negative feelings about self in response to an event.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *priority*. When a question asks to identify a priority client problem, focus on the **data in the question**. Option 2 will focus on the mother's concern about *knowing how to care for her firstborn child*. **Review: psychosocial concerns of a new mother**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Teaching is an important nursing responsibility. It is common for a new mother to be concerned about how to care for her newborn. The nurse needs to alleviate fears and concerns by providing the mother with opportunities to care for the newborn after delivery while hospitalized. You will learn about therapeutic measures to alleviate these concerns and fears and the important points to teach the mother about caring for her newborn in your maternity nursing course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, characteristics of hypotonic uterine dysfunction. Noting that options 1, 2, and 5 are **comparable or alike** and noting the word *hypotonic* in the question will direct you to the correct options. **Review:** manifestations of **hypotonic uterine dysfunction.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A contraction is a rhythmic tightening of the musculature of the upper uterus that begins as mild tightening and progresses to strong tightening late in labor. Contractions decrease the size of the uterus and push the fetus through the birth canal. Normal labor contractions are coordinated, involuntary, and intermittent. You will learn about contractions and the labor process in your maternity nursing course.

**Rationale:** Precipitate labor is defined as labor that lasts less than 3 hours from the onset of contractions to the time of birth. After a precipitate labor, the mother may need help to process what has happened and time to assimilate it all. The mother may be exhausted, in pain, stunned by the rapid nature of the delivery, or simply following cultural norms. Providing support to the mother is the most appropriate and therapeutic action by the nurse. Options 1 and 3 do not enhance the therapeutic relationship. Option 4 is an appropriate nursing intervention, but the question does not indicate whether the mother is going to be breastfeeding.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words** *most appropriate*. Eliminate options 1 and 3 first because they are **comparable or alike**. From the remaining options, note that no data indicate that the mother is going to breast-feed. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** care of the client after **precipitate labor.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** The total duration of normal labor differs for women who have never given birth and for those who have previously given birth by the vaginal route. Normal labor consists of 4 stages. In the first stage, which normally lasts 6 to 10 hours (but can be longer), effacement and dilation occur. The second stage involves expulsion of the fetus and normally lasts 20 to 60 minutes. Stage 3 involves separation of the placenta and usually takes 5 to 30 minutes. Stage 4, which lasts 1 to 4 hours after delivery, is the time for physical recovery and newborn bonding. You will learn about the normal labor process and the stages of labor in your maternity nursing course.

Option 1 avoids the subject, and option 3 deals with a subject the client may not be ready to face. Option 4 may be helpful, but not as a first step.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *first*. Use the **steps of the nursing process**, remembering that assessment/data collection comes first. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** care of the mother psychosocially after a **fetal demise**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Uterine rupture results when a tear in the wall of the uterus occurs because the uterine wall cannot stand the pressure placed against it from the growing fetus. Uterine rupture is a rare condition associated with previous uterine surgery, such as a cesarean birth or surgery to remove fibroids. If the placenta is involved, the fetus is often dead. You will learn about the complications of pregnancy and uterine rupture in your maternity nursing course.

Recalling that in this condition the placenta is implanted low in the uterus and that the client is at risk for hemorrhage will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** nursing care of the client with **placenta previa.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** The placenta is a fetal structure that provides nourishment to and removes wastes from the developing fetus. It is normally implanted in the upper uterine area. In placenta previa, the placenta is implanted low in the uterus near the cervix. Disruption of the placenta can cause severe hemorrhage and compromise fetal status. Therefore, any activity or procedure that could disrupt the placenta is avoided. You will learn about placenta previa and the risks associated with it in your maternity nursing course.

A primary concern when a client has placenta previa is disruption of the placenta, leading to severe hemorrhage and a compromised fetal status. Both the mother and fetus are monitored closely. Any activity or procedure that could disrupt the placenta, such as a vaginal examination, is avoided. You will learn about placenta previa and the risks associated with it in your maternity nursing course.

**Rationale:** When performing fundal massage, 1 hand is placed just above the symphysis pubis to support the lower uterine segment while the fundus is gently but firmly massaged in a circular motion. Pushing on an uncontracted uterus could invert the uterus and cause massive hemorrhage.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, the procedure to perform fundal massage. Eliminate option 1 first because of the word *pushing* and recalling that pushing on an uncontracted uterus could invert the uterus and cause massive hemorrhage. Next visualize the anatomy of the uterus. Eliminate options 2 and 3 because the hand is not placed below the symphysis pubis. **Review:** the procedure for **fundal massage.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Uterine atony refers to a lack of uterine muscle tone and can result in bleeding. Bleeding occurs because the uterine muscle fibers fail to contract firmly around the blood vessels when the placenta separates. A soft or "boggy" feel on locating the uterine fundus is one manifestation of uterine atony. Fundal massage is performed to contract the uterus when uterine atony is present. You will learn about uterine atony, its manifestations, and uterine massage in your maternity nursing course.

It most often occurs on arising, although a few women experience it throughout the day. Several self-care measures can be implemented to prevent or alleviate morning sickness. These include avoiding an empty or overloaded stomach; eating a dry carbohydrate food item such as a dry cracker or toast before getting out of bed; eating 5 or 6 small meals per day; and avoiding fried, odorous, greasy, gas-forming, or spicy foods.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, measures to prevent or alleviate morning sickness. Eliminate options 2 and 4 first because of the **closed-ended word** *only*. From the remaining options eliminate option 3 because of the words *high-fat*. **Review:** measures to prevent or alleviate **morning sickness.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Morning sickness is nausea and vomiting that occurs during pregnancy. It is called *morning sickness* because the symptoms are usually more acute in the morning (although it can occur at any time of the day). This is a common discomfort of pregnancy and is usually temporary. You will learn about morning sickness and the measures to alleviate it in your maternity nursing course.

Self-care measures for urinary frequency include emptying the bladder frequently (every 2 hours), drinking at least 2000 mL of fluid per day, limiting fluid intake before bedtime (not avoiding fluid intake), performing Kegel exercises to strengthen the perineal muscles, and wearing a perineal pad. Options 2, 3, and 4 are incorrect and could lead to urinary stasis (option 3) or fluid volume deficit (options 2 and 4).

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Eliminate options 2 and 4 first because they are **comparable or alike** and could lead to fluid volume deficit. Eliminate option 3 next because it does not make sense to avoid emptying the bladder frequently. This action could lead to urinary stasis and cause discomfort. **Review:** measures that will assist with the discomfort of **urinary frequency.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Urinary frequency is a common discomfort of pregnancy and usually occurs during the first trimester of pregnancy and near term. This is a temporary condition, and Kegel exercises help maintain bladder control. Kegel exercises involve contracting muscles around the vagina, holding tightly for 10 seconds, and then relaxing for 10 seconds. Thirty contraction–relaxation cycles should be done each day. You will learn about urinary frequency as a common discomfort of pregnancy and about Kegel exercises in your maternity nursing course.

It is a minor discomfort, and as long as the edema is nonpitting and hypertension and proteinuria are not present, it is not a cause for concern. Self-care measures include resting periodically with the legs and hips elevated, wearing supportive stockings or hose as prescribed, drinking ample amounts of fluid, partaking in moderate exercise, and avoiding standing in 1 position or place for long periods.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, measures to relieve edema. Eliminate option 1 first because of the word *restrict*. Restricting fluids can be detrimental to the fetus. Next eliminate option 4 because the nurse should not tell a client to ignore the obstetrician's prescription. From the remaining options, use principles related to the effects of gravity to direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the measures to alleviate ankle **edema.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Edema refers to swelling from the accumulation of excess fluid in body tissues. Edema can occur during pregnancy because the weight of the uterus compresses the

veins of the pelvis, delaying venous return. Edema of the feet and ankles is most noticeable at the end of the day. Dependent edema is insignificant, but if edema of the face or hands occurs, the client should be further assessed for developing complications of pregnancy. You will learn about dependent edema that occurs during pregnancy in your maternity nursing course.

**Rationale:** Heartburn is associated with regurgitation of gastric acid contents into the esophagus. Self-care measures for heartburn include eating small, frequent meals; remaining upright for 30 minutes after eating; avoiding fatty or spicy foods; and drinking approximately 2000 mL of fluid per day.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words** *need for further instruction*. These words indicate a **negative event query** and the need to select the option that indicates an incorrect client statement. Recalling that heartburn is associated with regurgitation of gastric acid contents into the esophagus will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** measures to relieve or prevent **heartburn.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Heartburn is described as an acute burning sensation in the epigastric and sternal regions. During pregnancy it normally occurs as a result of diminished gastric motility, displacement of the stomach by the enlarging uterus, and relaxation of the lower esophageal sphincter. You will learn about heartburn as a discomfort of pregnancy and the measures to prevent or alleviate it in your maternity nursing course.

**Rationale:** The FHR should be 110 to 160 beats/minute at term. Because the FHR is elevated from the normal range, the nurse should notify the primary health care provider. The FHR should be documented, but option 4 is the most appropriate action. Options 2 and 3 are inappropriate actions based on the data in the question.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words** *most appropriate*. Focus on the **data in the question** and note the FHR. Recalling that the normal FHR should be 110 to 160 beats/minute at term will direct you to the correct option. Remember that an abnormal finding noted in the pregnant client needs to be reported to the primary health care provider. **Review:** the normal **fetal heart rate.** 

Tip for the Nursing Student: FHR monitoring is an important part of maternal assessment

during pregnancy. The nurse usually uses a Doppler device to auscultate the FHR, which creates an electronic sound based on movements. You will learn about the procedures for monitoring the FHR in your maternity nursing course.

Answer: 1

**Rationale:** In the postpartum period the nurse checks for uterine atony and checks the consistency and location of the uterine fundus. The uterine fundus should be firmly contracted, at or near the level of the umbilicus, and midline. Therefore, the nurse should record the findings. Because the finding is normal, options 2, 3, and 4 are not necessary. The nurse should massage the uterine fundus if it was soft and boggy. A full bladder may cause a displaced fundus and one that is above the level of the umbilicus. The primary health care provider should be contacted if the client experienced excessive bleeding.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words** *most appropriate* and focus on the **data in the question.** Recalling the normal location and consistency of the fundus will direct you to the correct option. **Review**: the expected **uterine postpartum findings**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Involution is a retrogressive change in the uterus to its nonpregnant size. In the fourth stage of labor (1 to 4 hours after delivery), the nurse monitors the location of the uterine fundus to determine whether involution is progressing normally. Immediately after delivery the fundus can be palpated midway between the symphysis pubis and the umbilicus. Within a few hours the fundus rises to the level of the umbilicus and should remain at this level for 24 hours. After 24 hours the fundus descends by approximately 1 cm/day. You will learn about involution and determining the location of the uterine fundus in your maternity nursing course.

Answer: 2

**Rationale:** Fever on the third or fourth day postpartum should raise concerns about possible endometritis until proven otherwise. The woman with endometritis normally presents with a temperature over 100.4°F (38°C). Breast engorgement is a normal response and is not associated with endometritis. The white blood cell count of a postpartum woman is normally increased; thus, this method of detecting infection is not of great value in the postpartum period. Lochia rubra on

the second day postpartum is a normal finding.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, suspected endometritis. Use medical terminology to recall that *-itis* indicates inflammation or infection. This will assist in eliminating options 1 and 4. From the remaining options, noting the word *slightly* in option 3 will assist in eliminating this option. Also note that options 1, 3, and 4 are **comparable or alike** in that they are normal postpartum findings. **Review:** the signs of **endometritis.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Endometritis is an inflammation of the endometrium or decidua and is usually caused by a bacterial infection. It occurs most frequently after childbirth or abortion and is associated with the use of an intrauterine device. Conservative treatment includes rest, antibiotics, pain medication, and adequate fluid intake. You will learn about endometritis in your maternity nursing course when you study postpartum disorders.

Answer: 2

**Rationale:** In abruptio placentae, abdominal pain, uterine tenderness, and uterine hypertonicity are present. Uterine tenderness accompanies placental abruption, especially with a central abruption in which blood becomes trapped behind the placenta. The abdomen will feel hard and boardlike on palpation as the blood penetrates the myometrium and causes uterine irritability. Excessive uterine activity with poor relaxation between contractions is present. A nontender uterus, painless vaginal bleeding, and a soft, relaxed uterus with normal tone are signs of placenta previa.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Eliminate options 1 and 3 first because they are **comparable or alike** and indicate an absence of pain. From the remaining options note that option 2 indicates a sign opposite to the sign in option 4. This provides a clue that one of these options is the correct one. Recalling the signs of abruptio placentae will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** signs of **abruptio placentae.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** In abruptio placentae the normally implanted placenta separates before the fetus is born. The major concerns for the mother are bleeding, shock, and clotting abnormalities. The major concerns for the fetus are blood loss, anoxia, preterm birth, and fetal death. Placenta previa is an abnormal condition in which the placenta is implanted low in the uterus near the cervix. A primary concern when a client has placenta previa is disruption of the placenta leading to severe hemorrhage and a compromised fetal status. You will learn about these complications of pregnancy in your maternity nursing course.

**Rationale:** Preeclampsia is considered mild when the diastolic blood pressure does not exceed 100 mm Hg; proteinuria is no more than 500 mg/day (trace to 1+); and symptoms such as headache, visual disturbances, or abdominal pain are absent. In addition, signs of kidney or liver involvement are absent. An elevated blood urea nitrogen level indicates the presence of kidney damage as a result of preeclampsia.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, an improvement in the client's condition, noting the words *severe preeclampsia* and *improvement in the client's condition*. Note the word *trace* in option 1. This is the only option that does not indicate severe preeclampsia. **Review:** the signs of mild and severe **preeclampsia** and the signs that indicate improvement.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Preeclampsia is an abnormal condition of pregnancy characterized by the onset of acute hypertension after week 24 of gestation. Manifestations include hypertension and proteinuria. If preeclampsia is untreated, it can lead to serious complications, such as premature separation of the placenta or eclampsia (seizures). You will learn about preeclampsia, its manifestations, and its treatment in your maternity nursing course.

104. Artificial rupture of the membranes is done to induce labor in a client. After this procedure, what is the **immediate** nursing action?

Answer: 2

**Rationale:** Artificial rupture of the membranes may be done to augment or induce labor or to facilitate placement of internal monitors when fetal status indicates the need for some form of direct monitoring. Because the umbilical cord can prolapse when the membranes rupture, the FHR and fetal pattern should be monitored immediately and for several minutes after the procedure to ascertain fetal well-being. Although options 1, 3, and 4 are appropriate, they are not the priority concern. In addition, in the preprocedure period (rather than postprocedure period), the client should be told that a wet feeling in the perineal area is normal and expected.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *immediate*. Use the **ABCs—airway-breathing-circulation—**to direct you to the correct option. Also use of the **steps of the nursing process** will direct you to that option because it is the only option that addresses assessment/data collection. **Review:** care of the client after **artificial rupture of the membranes.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Artificial rupture of the membranes is also known as *amniotomy* and is done to stimulate labor. In this procedure, performed by the primary health care provider or nurse-midwife, a disposable plastic hook is inserted through the cervix to the amniotic membranes and a hole is made to allow the amniotic fluid to drain. Major risks associated with amniotomy include prolapse of the umbilical cord, infection, and abruptio placentae (abnormal separation of the placenta from the uterine wall). You will learn about the procedure for performing amniotomy in your maternity nursing course.

105. A client in labor tells the nurse that she suddenly has a wet feeling in the vaginal area. The nurse quickly checks the client and notes a large amount of bright red blood. What is the **immediate** nursing action?

Answer: 1

**Rationale:** Vaginal bleeding (bright red, dark red, or in an amount in excess of that expected during normal cervical dilation) requires immediate notification of the obstetrician. This finding indicates an emergency situation and could have occurred as a result of placenta previa or placental separation. Although the nurse will prepare the client for an emergency cesarean delivery and insert an intravenous catheter, these are not the immediate actions. A vaginal examination is not performed on a pregnant client who is bleeding vaginally.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *immediate*, and focus on the **data in the question.** Noting the words *large amount of bright red blood* will direct you to the correct option. Remember that when an emergency situation is presented in the question, it is likely that the correct option will be to notify the primary health care provider. **Review:** care of the **pregnant client who is bleeding vaginally.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Vaginal bleeding during pregnancy is always a concern. Two conditions that can cause vaginal bleeding are abruptio placentae and placenta previa. In abruptio placentae, the normally implanted placenta separates before the fetus is born. Placenta previa is an abnormal condition in which the placenta is implanted low in the uterus near the cervix. You will learn about the causes of bleeding during pregnancy and the immediate interventions if bleeding occurs in your maternity nursing course.

106. While caring for a client in labor, the nurse suspects an umbilical cord prolapse. What is the **immediate** nursing action?

Answer: 2

**Rationale:** Adjusting the bed into Trendelenburg's position (mattress flat, foot of bed elevated) uses gravity to reverse the direction of the pressure, keeping the presenting part off the umbilical cord. In addition, the knee—chest or modified Sims' position can be used. Pushing with contractions is contraindicated because it will push the presenting part against the cord. Not all prolapsed cords require a cesarean delivery. The nurse should reassure the woman and her partner after placing the woman in Trendelenburg's position.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *immediate*, and visualize the situation. Eliminate option 4 first using **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory** because it does not address a physiological need. From the remaining options, select the option that addresses the physiological safety of the primary client (the fetus). Also remember that in a prioritizing question, if repositioning is indicated in one of the options, that option may be the correct one. **Review:** immediate interventions for **umbilical cord prolapse.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A prolapsed umbilical cord refers to a condition in which the umbilical cord slips down after the amniotic membranes rupture, subjecting it to compression between the fetus and pelvis. This is a serious occurrence because it causes interruption in blood flow, and thus oxygenation, through the cord to the fetus and is potentially fatal. You will learn about prolapsed umbilical cord and the immediate interventions in your maternity nursing course. **References:**

107. The nurse at a playground witnesses a child fall off a swing. The nurse rushes to the child and suspects that the child has a broken right leg. The nurse should take which **priority** action?

**Integrated Process:** Nursing Process/Implementation

**Priority Concepts:** Clinical Judgment; Safety **Level of Nursing Student:** Intermediate

Answer: 1

**Rationale:** When a fracture is suspected, the area is immobilized and splinted before the victim is moved. Emergency help is called, and the nurse should remain with the child and provide realistic reassurance. Shoes are not removed because this action can cause increased trauma. Telling the child that everything will be fine is nontherapeutic.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *priority*. Focusing on the **subject**, a broken right leg, will direct you to the correct option. When a fracture is suspected, remember to immobilize and splint that area. **Review:** care of the victim with a **fracture.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A fracture is a break or disruption in a bone's continuity and generally occurs when traumatic or excessive force is placed on a bone. The signs and symptoms will vary depending on the location, type, and cause of injury but generally include pain at the site of injury, immobility or decreased range of motion, deformity, and edema. You will learn about fractures and the immediate interventions in your pediatrics nursing course when you study musculoskeletal disorders.

108. A newborn with a diagnosis of subdural hematoma is admitted to the newborn nursery. The nurse should perform which action to check for the major symptom associated with subdural hematoma?

Answer: 4

**Rationale:** A subdural hematoma can cause pressure on a specific area of the cerebral tissue. If the newborn is actively bleeding, changes in the stimuli responses in the extremities on the opposite side of the body can occur. Options 1 and 2 are incorrect. Blood in the urine would indicate abdominal trauma and not be a result of the subdural hematoma. After delivery an infant would normally be incontinent of urine. Option 3 is incorrect because contractures would not occur this soon after delivery.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the words *major symptom*. Eliminate options 1 and 2 first because they are **comparable or alike**. Next focus on the infant's condition—subdural hematoma—and recall that this condition is a neurological disorder. Remember that the method of checking for complications and active bleeding into the cranial cavity would be a neurological assessment. Checking newborn reflexes is a neurological assessment. Although contractures of extremities could

occur as residual effects, they would not occur immediately; therefore, eliminate option 3. **Review:** the signs of **subdural hematoma**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A subdural hematoma is an accumulation of blood in the subdural space and is usually caused by an injury. It can be acute with rapid bleeding or subacute with the accumulation of blood occurring over a longer period. Because the accumulation of blood is in the cranial cavity, neurological assessment and monitoring for signs of increased intracranial pressure are priorities. You will learn about subdural hematomas in your medical-surgical nursing course and in your pediatrics nursing course when you study neurological disorders.

**Rationale:** Bladder exstrophy is a congenital anomaly characterized by the extrusion of the urinary bladder to the outside of the body through a defect in the lower abdominal wall. Option 1 describes cryptorchidism, option 3 describes epispadias, and option 4 describes hypospadias.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, findings associated with bladder exstrophy. Note the relationship between the prefix in the name of the disorder, *ex-*, and the word *outside* in option 2. **Review: bladder exstrophy.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Bladder exstrophy is a congenital anomaly. In the newborn, the nurse would note the extrusion of the urinary bladder to the outside of the body. This occurs as a result of a defect in the lower abdominal wall. The nurse should institute measures as prescribed to protect the urinary bladder and prevent injury to the bladder mucosa. Surgical intervention will be planned to correct the condition. You will learn about this congenital anomaly in your maternity nursing course when you study newborn disorders.

**Rationale:** A child with inadequate fluid volume is stabilized with intravenous fluids and electrolytes before surgical management of the aganglionic portion of the bowel. Measurement of daily weight and intake and output assesses hydration status. Tap water enemas will alter the child's hydration status further.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, stabilizing the child's hydration status. Eliminate options 1 and 2 because they are assessments rather than interventions. Eliminate option 3 because

it will further cause a decreased fluid volume. The correct option addresses stabilization. **Review:** care of the child with **Hirschsprung's disease.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Hirschsprung disease is also known as *congenital aganglionosis* or *megacolon* and is the result of an absence of ganglion cells in the rectum and, to varying degrees, upward in the colon. Constipation, signs of bowel obstruction, abdominal pain and distention, vomiting, and failure to thrive are manifestations. Neither aspirin nor aspirin-containing compounds should be used, primarily because of their antiplatelet properties; their use can result in bleeding. Acetaminophen can be used for discomfort if needed.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words** *need for further instruction*. These words indicate a **negative event query** and the need to find the option that indicates an incorrect parental statement. Recalling that bleeding is the priority concern and that aspirin has antiplatelet properties will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** discharge teaching points for a child with **hemophilia.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Hemophilia is a hereditary bleeding disorder characterized by a deficiency of one of the factors necessary for the coagulation of blood. The severity of the disorder varies with the extent of the deficiency. Nursing care focuses on preventing bleeding and providing a safe environment. A small-bore catheter and a microdrip infusion set, rather than a macrodrip set, are used in the

pediatric client.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, preventing fluid overload. The only item in the options that will accomplish this is an infusion pump. Use of an infusion pump will assist in preventing fluid overload. Review: care of the **pediatric client** receiving an **intravenous infusion**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** When a child (or adult) is receiving fluids by the intravenous route (through a vein), the nurse needs to monitor the client and infusion closely to ensure that the fluid is infusing at the prescribed rate. If the fluid infuses too rapidly, serious complications can occur from the excess fluid. An infusion pump, which controls the amount of fluid infusing, should be used to administer intravenous fluids to a pediatric client. An important point to remember, however, is that the infusion pump (as with any device or machine) can fail or work improperly, so the nurse needs to monitor the child closely during intravenous infusion even if an infusion pump is used. You will learn about the administration of intravenous fluids to the child in your pediatrics nursing course.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** An immunization is a procedure in which resistance to an infectious disease is induced. A schedule of various types of immunizations needs to be followed to prevent infectious childhood diseases. In addition, all states require immunizations for children enrolled in licensed child care programs and school. You will learn about the administration of immunizations and the immunization schedule in your pediatrics nursing course when you study communicable diseases.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Hospitalization can be a stressful experience for the child, who can experience separation anxiety. How a child reacts to the experience depends on a number of factors, including age, cognitive development, preparation for the experience, coping skills, cultural influences, and previous experience with the health care system. You will learn about the stressors associated with hospitalization of the child in your pediatrics nursing course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *priority*. Use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**. The correct option addresses circulation. **Review:** care of the child in a **hip spica cast**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A hip spica cast is an orthopedic cast that is applied to immobilize part or all of the body trunk and part or all of the lower extremities. It is used to treat various fractures, such as fractures of the hip or femur, and to correct a hip deformity. It may be used to treat developmental dysplasia of the hip, a condition in which the head of the femur is improperly seated in the acetabulum of the pelvis. You will learn about a hip spica cast and other types of casts in your pediatrics nursing course when you study musculoskeletal disorders.

Some manifestations of the disorder include excessive oral secretions, abdominal distention, and vomiting. Surgical repair will need to be done to correct the condition. You will learn about esophageal atresia in your pediatrics nursing course when you study gastrointestinal disorders.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Interventions to treat an eye injury are based on the type of injury that occurred. If a contusion (blow) to the eye occurred, the nurse should immediately place ice on the eye. If a chemical substance splashed into the eye, the immediate intervention is to flush (irrigate) the eye. If dirt flew into the eye, the nurse should assess vision and check for the presence of the dirt substances and corneal abrasions before irrigating the eye. You will learn about interventions for treating various eye injuries in your pediatrics nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study eye disorders.

From the remaining options, recalling the significance of decerebrate posturing will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the significance of **posturing**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Posture is the position of the body and is determined and maintained by coordination of the muscles that move the limbs and a sense of balance. Abnormal postures occur in neurological disorders, such as head injuries, and in conditions that cause increased intracranial pressure. These types of posturing include decorticate, decerebrate, and flaccid. The presence of abnormal posturing needs to be reported to the primary health care provider. You will learn about posturing when you study neurological disorders in your pediatrics nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Recalling that the creatinine level is elevated only when there is an 80% decrease in glomerular filtration rate will assist in eliminating option 4. Next eliminate options 1 and 3, knowing that hypertension, rather than hypotension, and hyperkalemia, rather than hypokalemia, will occur in this renal disorder. **Review:** the clinical manifestations associated with **glomerulonephritis.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Glomerulonephritis is a kidney disorder characterized by an inflammatory injury in the glomerulus. It is characterized by proteinuria, hematuria, decreased urine production, and edema (swelling). Acute poststreptococcal glomerulonephritis is the most common type and occurs as an immune reaction to a group A beta-hemolytic streptococcal infection of the throat. You will learn about glomerulonephritis when you study renal disorders in your pediatrics nursing course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *immediately*. Eliminate options 3 and 4 first because they are **comparable or alike**. From the remaining options, select option 2 because a diet cola does not contain the amount of carbohydrate needed to treat hypoglycemia. **Review:** the treatment measures for **hypoglycemia**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Diabetes mellitus is a disorder of carbohydrate, fat, and protein metabolism that is primarily the result of a deficiency or complete lack of insulin secretion by the beta cells of the pancreas or resistance to insulin. Hypoglycemia (a low blood glucose level) is a complication and is characterized by symptoms such as weakness, headache, hunger, and visual disturbances. It is immediately treated with 15 g of carbohydrate. It is important to recognize the signs and symptoms of hypoglycemia and how to treat it. You will learn about diabetes mellitus and its complications in your pediatrics nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study endocrine disorders.

Careful reading of the options and applying principles related to prevention of urinary tract infections will direct you to options 4 and 5 as incorrect actions. Also, note the **closed-ended word**, *only*, in option 4. **Review:** client instructions related to a **urinary tract infection**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A urinary tract infection is an infection of one or more structures in the urinary system. The infection is usually characterized by urinary frequency, burning pain with urinating, fever, back pain, and possible blood or pus in the urine. A sterile urine specimen is collected to check for the bacteria causing the infection and to determine treatment. Several measures can be taken to prevent and treat a urinary tract infection. You will learn about urinary tract infections in your pediatrics nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study renal disorders.

**Rationale:** The primary developmental need of the hospitalized adolescent is maintenance of privacy, modesty, and control. The correct option strives to meet these needs. Options 1 and 2 do not address the client's concerns, and option 3 contains a threat.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *best* and the words *16-year-old client*. Think about the developmental needs of the adolescent when answering this question. Also use **therapeutic communication techniques**. The correct option is the only one that focuses on the client's feelings and needs. **Review: therapeutic communication techniques** and psychosocial needs of the **adolescent**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Adolescence is a time of transition from childhood to adulthood and is characterized by biological and psychological changes, including the appearance of secondary sex characteristics. The adolescent is very aware of the body changes that are taking place, and the nurse needs to respect the adolescent's need for body privacy. Many other growth and development changes also take place during the adolescent period, which you will learn about in your pediatrics nursing course.

**Rationale:** A child with a head injury is at risk for increased intracranial pressure (ICP). Fluids may be restricted to reduce the chance of fluid overload and resultant increased ICP. Elevating the head of the bed decreases fluid retention in cerebral tissue and promotes drainage. Neurological assessments should be performed to monitor for increased ICP. Hypoxia and the Valsalva

maneuver associated with coughing both acutely elevate ICP. Additionally, the flat position can elevate ICP and should be avoided.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, nursing actions in the care of the child with a head injury. Recall that a head injury places the child at risk for increased ICP. From this point, identify the options that would cause an increase in the ICP; this will assist in answering correctly. **Review:** care of the child who sustained a **head injury.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A head injury results from trauma to the head from any mechanical force to the scalp, skull, meninges, or brain. A primary concern when a child sustains a head injury is resultant pressure in the brain from swelling. This is known as *increased ICP*. If this occurs, structures within the cranium are compressed, which can result in serious neurological complications. You will learn about head injuries and increased ICP in your pediatrics nursing course when you study neurological disorders.

**Rationale:** Quinapril hydrochloride is an angiotensin-converting enzyme (ACE) inhibitor used in the treatment of hypertension. The client should be instructed to rise slowly from a lying to a sitting position and to permit the legs to dangle from the bed momentarily before standing to reduce the hypotensive effect. The medication may be given without regard to food. The client should be instructed to drink a noncaffeinated carbonated beverage and eat crackers or dry toast if nauseated. A full therapeutic effect may occur in 1 to 2 weeks.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Eliminate option 1 because of the **closed-ended word** *only* and option 4 because of the word *immediately*. Next focus on the name of the medication, and recall that most ACE inhibitor medication names end with the letters *-pril* and that these medications are used to treat hypertension. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review: quinapril hydrochloride.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Hypertension refers to an elevated blood pressure and is a known cardiovascular risk factor. ACE inhibitor medications are one class of medications used to treat hypertension. Because medication used to treat hypertension lowers the blood pressure, lightheadedness and dizziness can occur. Therefore, it is important for the nurse to teach the client safety measures. You will learn about ACE inhibitors in your pharmacology course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiovascular disorders.

It is not used to treat pancreatitis, urolithiasis, or nephrotic syndrome.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, the intended effect of ganciclovir sodium. Focus on the name of the medication. Recalling that most antiviral medication names contain the letters *vir* will direct you to the correct option. **Review: ganciclovir sodium.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** CMV retinitis is an infection of the retina caused by a herpes type of virus. Pancreatitis is an inflammatory condition of the pancreas that can be acute or chronic.

Urolithiasis refers to the presence of calculi (stones) in the urinary system. Nephrotic syndrome is an abnormal condition of the kidney characterized by marked proteinuria, hypoalbuminemia, and edema. You will learn about CMV retinitis, pancreatitis, and urolithiasis in your medical-surgical nursing course and about nephrotic syndrome in your pediatric nursing course.

**Rationale:** Before mixing different types of insulin, the bottle should be rotated for at least 1 minute between both hands. This resuspends the insulin and helps warm the medication. The nurse should not shake the bottles. Shaking causes foaming and bubbles to form, which may trap particles of insulin and alter the dosage. Insulin may be maintained at room temperature. Additional bottles of insulin should be stored in the refrigerator for future use. Humulin R is drawn up before Humulin N. Air does not need to be removed from the insulin bottle.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, the procedure for mixing Humulin R and Humulin N in the same syringe. Visualize the procedure as you carefully read each option. When answering questions that relate to mixing insulin remember the letters *RN*—draw Humulin *R* into the syringe before Humulin *N*. **Review:** the procedures for administering **insulin**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Insulin is a medication used to treat diabetes mellitus, a disorder of fat, carbohydrate, and protein metabolism. Humulin R is a short-acting insulin, and Humulin N is an intermediate-acting insulin. When both types of insulin are prescribed, they can be mixed together in 1 syringe so that only 1 injection is necessary. There is a specific procedure for mixing these types of insulin, which you will learn when you study the procedures for administering injections in your fundamentals course and when you study pharmacology.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, intended effect of lansoprazole. Focus on the words *relief of.* Note the name of the medication, and recall that most proton pump inhibitor medication names end with the letters *-zole*. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review: lansoprazole.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Heartburn is a painful burning sensation in the esophagus. It is usually caused by the reflux of gastric acid into the esophagus. Proton pump inhibitors are one type

of medication used to treat heartburn. You will learn about heartburn when you study gastrointestinal disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course and about proton pump inhibitors when you study pharmacology.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Eliminate options 1, 2, and 3 because they are **comparable or alike** in that they all indicate taking the medication dose without food. **Review: amiloride hydrochloride.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Edema is the abnormal accumulation of fluid in body tissues. Hypertension refers to an elevated blood pressure and is a known cardiovascular risk factor. Potassium-sparing diuretics are one class of medications used to treat edema or hypertension. Only a few medications are potassium sparing, and amiloride is one of them. A concern with potassium-sparing diuretics is that the client retains potassium, which can lead to hyperkalemia (a high potassium level). Therefore, the nurse monitors the client for signs of hyperkalemia. You will learn about potassium-sparing diuretics when you study pharmacology.

**Rationale:** Aspirin is a nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory medication. Adverse effects include gastrointestinal bleeding or gastric mucosal lesions, ringing in the ears (tinnitus), or generalized pruritus. Headache, dizziness, flushing, tachycardia, hyperventilation, sweating, and thirst are also adverse effects. Options 2, 3, and 4 are not adverse effects. In addition, aspirin is administered to the client with rheumatoid arthritis to relieve joint pain.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, an adverse effect of aspirin. Eliminate options 3 and 4 first because they are **comparable or alike**. Next eliminate option 2 because aspirin is administered to relieve joint pain. Last, remembering that aspirin can cause gastrointestinal disturbances and ototoxicity will direct you to the correct option. **Review: aspirin.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Arthritis is an inflammatory condition of the joints characterized by pain, swelling, heat, redness, and limitation of movement. It can affect the client's ability to perform activities of daily living and result in debilitation. Arthritis can occur in childhood or adulthood. Large doses of aspirin may be administered to alleviate the joint pain. However, aspirin

can cause gastrointestinal bleeding, ringing in the ears (tinnitus), or generalized pruritus. You will learn about the effects of aspirin when you study pharmacology, and you will learn about arthritis in your pediatrics and medical-surgical nursing courses.

**Rationale:** Frequent side effects of this medication include sedation, decreased blood pressure, diaphoresis, flushed face, dizziness, nausea, vomiting, and constipation. Adverse effects include respiratory depression; skeletal muscle flaccidity; cold and clammy skin; cyanosis; and extreme somnolence progressing to seizures, stupor, and coma.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, an adverse effect, and recall that meperidine hydrochloride is an opioid analgesic. Recalling that an adverse effect is more severe than a side effect and is always an undesirable effect will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the adverse effects of **meperidine hydrochloride.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Meperidine hydrochloride is an opioid analgesic that has been used to alleviate pain that occurs in many types of disorders. This medication is not prescribed as frequently as it has been in the past because a metabolite of meperidine can be toxic, and the buildup of toxin in the blood can cause seizures and other mental status changes such as acute confusion. The nurse should monitor closely the client who is receiving this medication. Because meperidine hydrochloride is an opioid analgesic, it will cause skeletal muscle flaccidity, which can place the client at risk for injury. Another critical adverse effect of opioid analgesics is that they cause respiratory depression, so assessment of respiratory status is an important part of your nursing interventions. You will learn about meperidine hydrochloride and other opioid analgesics in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course.

The items in options 2, 3, and 4 are acceptable to consume.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Recall that medication names that end with the letters *-line* are xanthine bronchodilators and that these medications can cause cardiovascular and central nervous system side/adverse effects. Also, eliminate options 2, 3, and 4 because they are **comparable or alike** in that

they are fruit drinks. **Review**: the items to be avoided by a client taking a **xanthine bronchodilator**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Theophylline is a xanthine bronchodilator that dilates bronchial airways and pulmonary blood vessels and is used to treat respiratory disorders, such as bronchial asthma, bronchitis, emphysema, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, or bronchospasm. An important point to remember is that these medications can cause cardiovascular and central nervous system side/adverse effects, particularly if taken with caffeine-containing products. Therefore, an important teaching point is to tell the client to avoid caffeine-containing products. In addition, another important intervention is to monitor the client for changes in the cardiovascular or central nervous system. You will learn about theophylline in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study respiratory disorders.

**Rationale:** Because therapeutic and toxic dosage ranges are so close, lithium blood levels must be monitored closely (every 3 or 4 days at the initiation of therapy and then every 1 to 2 months). The client should be instructed to notify the primary health care provider if excessive diarrhea, vomiting, blurred vision, or other signs of toxicity occur. A normal diet and normal salt and fluid intake (1500 to 2500 mL per day of fluid) should be maintained because lithium decreases sodium reabsorption in the renal tubules, which could cause sodium depletion. A low sodium intake causes an increase in lithium retention and could lead to toxicity.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, client instructions regarding lithium carbonate. Recall the action of this medication and that toxicity is a concern with its use. This will direct you to the correct option. Also eliminate options 1, 2, and 3 because of the words *avoided*, *yearly*, and *are expected*, respectively, in these options. **Review:** the client teaching points related to the administration of **lithium carbonate**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Lithium carbonate is an antimanic and antidepressant medication used to treat the manic phase of bipolar disease, which is a manic-depressive disorder. A primary concern when administering this medication is the risk for toxicity. Therefore, monitoring blood levels for toxicity is important. For long-term control, a therapeutic maintenance serum lithium level ranges between approximately 0.6 and 1 mEq/L. The client is taught about the importance of monitoring follow-up blood levels, diet and fluid requirements, and the signs and symptoms of toxicity. You will learn about lithium carbonate in a pharmacology course or in your psychiatric/mental health nursing course.

Clients taking allopurinol are encouraged to drink at least 10 to 12 eight-oz glasses of water per day to aid in uric acid excretion. Although the urine may become dilute as a result of increased fluid intake, dilute urine is not an action of the medication. This medication does not relieve pain.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, the therapeutic action of allopurinol. Note that the question identifies the client's diagnosis. Recalling the pathophysiology associated with gout will direct you to option 3. **Review:** the action of **allopurinol**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Gout is a disease associated with an inborn error of metabolism that increases the production or interferes with excretion of uric acid. The excess uric acid is converted to urate crystals and deposits in joints and other tissues. The great toe is a common site for the accumulation of urate crystals. This condition can cause exceedingly painful swelling of the joint. Medication to reduce uric acid production is an important component of treatment. It is important to remind clients who take allopurinol that periodic liver function testing is needed because the medication can be hepatotoxic. You will learn about allopurinol in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Although nausea may be a sign of toxicity (overdosage), this client has only been taking the medication for 3 days, and overdosage is not likely to occur in this short period. Therefore, it is not necessary to contact the primary health care provider. Lying down for 30 minutes after taking the medication is not the best measure to alleviate the client's complaint. The nurse should not instruct a client to alter a medication dose or stop a medication.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, client instructions regarding fluoxetine hydrochloride. Eliminate option 4 using general guidelines related to medication administration. Focus on the information in the question and note that the client has been taking the medication for 3 days. This will assist in directing you to the correct option. **Review: fluoxetine hydrochloride.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Bulimia nervosa is an eating disorder that is characterized by craving for food, often resulting in episodes of continuous eating followed by purging, depression, and self-deprivation. Treatment consists of measures to improve nourishment and therapy to overcome the underlying emotional conflicts leading to the disorder. You will learn about fluoxetine hydrochloride and bulimia nervosa in a pharmacology course or in your psychiatric/mental health course when you study eating disorders.

**Rationale:** The client who receives heparin sodium is at risk for bleeding. The nurse monitors for signs of bleeding, which include bleeding from the gums, ecchymoses on the skin, red or dark urine, black or red stools, and body fluids that test positive for occult blood. Tenderness is likely to be noted in the area of the thrombosis. Nausea and increased blood pressure are not signs of an adverse effect of the medication.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, an adverse effect. Focus on the name of the medication and the client's diagnosis. Recalling the manifestations of venous thrombosis will assist in eliminating option 3. Next, recalling that this medication is an anticoagulant will direct you to option 2 from the remaining options. **Review: heparin sodium.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Venous thrombosis is also known as *phlebothrombosis* and is an abnormal condition in which a clot forms within a vein. It is usually caused by hemostasis, hypercoagulability, or occlusion. A concern with this disorder is that the clot will break free from the vein and travel to the lungs causing a pulmonary embolus, which can be life threatening. Therefore, heparin sodium is administered to prevent further extension of the existing clot or new clot formation. You will learn about heparin sodium and venous thrombus in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiovascular disorders.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, an intended medication effect. Noting the word *postoperative* in the question will assist in eliminating options 2 and 3. From the remaining options, recalling that this medication is an anticoagulant will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** intended effects of **enoxaparin**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Deep vein thrombosis is a disorder involving a thrombus in one of the deep veins in the body. Thromboembolism is a condition in which a blood vessel is obstructed by a clot carried in the bloodstream from its site of formation. These are potentially life-threatening disorders, and treatment may include bed rest and the use of anticoagulant medications. Enoxaparin is a medication that will prevent deep vein thrombosis and thromboembolism and is prescribed for clients at risk for the development of these disorders. You will learn about enoxaparin in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiovascular disorders.

Recalling that medication names that end with the letters *-lol* are  $\beta$ -blockers and that  $\beta$ -blockers are used to treat hypertension will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** intended effects of **metoprolol**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Metoprolol is a medication that is primarily used to treat hypertension. A priority nursing intervention when a medication with antihypertensive effects is administered is to monitor the client's blood pressure. Additional important interventions include client teaching related to safety because of the hypotensive effects of the medication. One important point to teach the client is to rise slowly from a lying to sitting position and to permit the legs to dangle from the bed momentarily before standing. You will learn about metoprolol in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiovascular disorders.

Nursing interventions include monitoring the blood pressure for hypotension and assessing the pulse for strength, weakness, irregularities, and bradycardia. This medication may mask the symptoms of hypoglycemia and prolong the hypoglycemic effect in the client taking insulin or oral hypoglycemics. The presence of Trousseau's sign is unrelated to the use of this medication. A positive Trousseau's sign indicates a calcium imbalance. Redness and warmth in the calf area may be indicative of deep vein thrombosis; however, this assessment is not specifically related to this medication.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Remember that  $\beta$ -blocker medication names end with the letters *-lol*, and recall that  $\beta$ -blockers are used to treat hypertension. Also use the **ABCs-airway-breathing-and circulation**—to direct you to the correct option. **Review: betaxolol.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Glaucoma is an abnormal eye disorder characterized by elevated

pressure within the eye. It is caused by the obstruction of the outflow of aqueous humor. If untreated, it will result in complete and permanent blindness. Medication therapy is extremely important to keep the intraocular pressure within the normal range of 10 to 21 mm Hg, and the client needs to be instructed about the importance of the medication. You will learn about betaxolol and eye disorders in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study eye disorders.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Anxiety is the anticipation of danger or dread accompanied by restlessness, tension, tachycardia, and breathing difficulty. In an anxiety disorder, the anxiety the client experiences can range from a mild to a severe state. Antianxiety medications are usually a component of therapy for anxiety disorders. You will learn about antianxiety medications and anxiety disorders in a pharmacology course or in your psychiatric/mental health nursing course when you study anxiety disorders.

Options 2, 3, and 4 are not specifically related to the administration of this medication.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, an adverse effect. Recalling that nephrotoxicity can occur with the use of this medication will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the adverse effects **amphotericin B.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Candidiasis is an infection caused by a species of *Candida*, usually *Candida albicans*. It usually occurs in a local area, such as the oral cavity, but can also occur in other areas. Treatment includes oral and topical administration of antifungal infections if candidiasis occurs locally. If it becomes a systemic infection, IV antifungal medications are prescribed. One adverse effect of antifungal medications administered intravenously is nephrotoxicity (destruction to the kidney cells). You will learn about antifungal medications and candidiasis in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study infectious disorders.

**Rationale:** The normal WBC count is 5000 to 10,000 mm<sup>3</sup> (5 to 10×10<sup>9</sup>/L). When the WBC count drops, neutropenic precautions need to be implemented. These include protective isolation measures to protect the client from infection. Bleeding precautions need to be initiated when the platelet count drops. Bleeding precautions include avoiding all trauma, such as rectal temperatures or injections. The normal clotting time is 8 to 15 minutes. The normal ammonia value is 10 to 80 mcg/dL (6 to 47 mcmol/L). The normal platelet count is 150,000 to 450,000 mm<sup>3</sup> (150 to 450×10<sup>9</sup>/L).

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Eliminate options 1 and 2 first because they are **comparable or alike** and identify normal laboratory values. To select between the remaining options, note that the client is receiving chemotherapy and focus on the words *neutropenic precautions*. Correlate a low WBC count with the need for neutropenic precautions and a low platelet count with the need for bleeding precautions. **Review:** the interventions associated with caring for the client receiving **chemotherapy.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Neutropenia is an abnormal decrease in the number of neutrophils in the blood. This can occur in conditions such as acute leukemia, infection, and chronic splenomegaly and in the client receiving chemotherapy because chemotherapy destroys normal cells in addition to cancer cells. When neutropenia occurs, the client is at risk for developing an infection, and the nurse needs to implement measures to protect the client from infection, such as strict handwashing, wearing protective clothing when caring for the client, and keeping fresh fruits and flowers and standing water out of the client's room because these items harbor bacteria. The nurse should also restrict visits with the client from anyone who is ill. You will learn about chemotherapy and neutropenic precautions in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study oncologic disorders.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Codeine sulfate is an opioid analgesic that is used primarily to treat pain. Opioid analgesics can cause many side effects, including drowsiness, lightheadedness, and hypotension. Therefore, client safety is a concern with the use of opioid analgesics. Because of this concern, nursing interventions with the use of opioid analgesics focus on implementing measures that protect the client from injury and teaching the client measures to prevent injury. You will learn about codeine sulfate in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study pain management.

Recalling that some benzodiazepine medication names end with the letters *-pam* will assist in answering the question. Also noting that the medication is used for muscle spasms will direct you to think that this medication relaxes muscles. The correct option is the only one that directly relates to this medication action. **Review:** the action and side effects of **diazepam.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Muscle spasms are involuntary contractions or twitching that occurs in a muscle. These can be quite painful for the client, and one component of therapy is to treat the spasms with a centrally acting skeletal muscle relaxant. Because the medication is centrally acting, it can cause incoordination. This places the client at risk for injury, so nursing interventions focus on implementing measures to protect the client from injury. You will learn about diazepam in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study musculoskeletal disorders.

Recalling that the overall normal therapeutic range for digoxin is from 0.8 to 2.0 ng/mL (1.02 to 2.56 nmol/L) will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the therapeutic serum **digoxin** level.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Digoxin is a cardiac glycoside used to manage and treat heart failure, control atrial fibrillation, and treat and prevent atrial tachycardia. A concern with the medication is that it can cause toxicity, and an important nursing responsibility is to monitor for signs of toxicity. Before administering this medication, the nurse checks the client's apical heart rate; if the rate is below 60 beats/min, the nurse withholds the medication, collects additional client data, and contacts the primary health care provider for further prescriptions. Some manifestations of digoxin toxicity include gastrointestinal disturbances and ocular disturbances. You will learn about digoxin when you study pharmacology and when you study cardiovascular disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Acute kidney injury is the inability of the kidneys to excrete wastes, concentrate urine, and maintain electrolyte balance. Acute kidney injury is characterized by the rapid accumulation of wastes in the blood. Many electrolyte imbalances can occur in acute kidney injury because the kidneys are unable to maintain electrolyte balance. Sodium polystyrene sulfonate is an antihyperkalemic medication used to treat high potassium levels. You will learn about sodium polystyrene sulfonate in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study kidney disorders.

This serious infection needs to be treated aggressively with antibiotics, and usually blood cultures are done to determine the antibiotic of choice. Tobramycin is an antibiotic (aminoglycoside) that may be used to treat sepsis. As with many antibiotics, it causes nephrotoxicity and ototoxicity. The normal WBC count ranges from 5000 to 10,000 mm³ (5 to  $10 \times 10^9$ /L). The normal creatinine level ranges from 0.5 to 1.2 mg/dL (44 to 106 mcmol/L) depending on gender. The normal blood urea nitrogen ranges from 10 to 20 mg/dL (3.6 to 7.1 mmol/L). The normal potassium level ranges from 3.5 to 5.0 mEq/L (3.5 to 5.0 mmol/L). The normal sodium level ranges from 135 to 145 mEq/L (135 to 145 mmol/L). The normal chloride level ranges from 98 to 106 mEq/L (98 to 106 mmol/L). You will learn about antibiotics in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study infections and immune disorders.

Answer: 1

**Rationale:** Because compromise of respiration is a leading cause of death in cervical cord injury, collecting data on the respiratory system is the highest priority. Checking the peripheral pulses and muscle strength can be done after adequate oxygenation is ensured.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *first*. Eliminate options 3 and 4 first because they are **comparable or alike**. Next use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**—to direct you to the correct option. Remember that a cord injury, particularly at the level of C4, can affect respiratory status. Breath sounds will be diminished if respiratory muscles are weakened or paralyzed. **Review:** priority care of the client with a **C4 spinal cord injury**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A spinal cord injury is caused by a traumatic disruption of the spinal cord occurring from a car crash or another type of violent impact. It is often associated with extensive musculoskeletal injury. Where the injury occurred in the spinal cord (level of injury) determines the effect on the client. A major concern with a cervical spinal cord injury is respiratory status. You will learn about spinal cord injuries and the important nursing interventions in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study neurological disorders.

**Rationale:** Redness, warmth, and purulent drainage are signs of an infection. Infections of a central venous catheter site can lead to septicemia; therefore, the primary health care provider needs to be notified. Although the nurse may change the intravenous tubing and hang a new bag of TPN solution, these are not priority actions. The nurse should not adjust the rate of an intravenous solution without a specific prescription to do so. In addition, this action is unrelated to the client's complication.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *priority*. Also note the words *redness*, *warmth*, *and a purulent drainage*, and recall that these signs indicate infection. Recalling that infections of a central venous catheter site can lead to septicemia (a life-threatening condition) will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** nursing interventions related to complications associated with **total** 

## parenteral nutrition via a central venous catheter.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** TPN involves the administration of nutrients by a route other than orally and is usually administered intravenously. It is administered by means of an intravenous catheter through a central vein, such as the subclavian vein. The tip of the catheter normally rests in the superior vena cava. This type of catheter is known as a *central venous catheter*, and meticulous nursing care is required in the care of the catheter and catheter site to prevent infection. You will learn about TPN and central venous catheters in your medical-surgical nursing course.

**Rationale:** The initial action when a client has attempted suicide is to assess and treat any injuries. Although options 2, 3, and 4 may be appropriate at some point, the initial action would be to treat the wounds.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *first*. Use **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory** to prioritize. Physiological needs come first. The correct option is the only one that addresses a physiological need. Options 2, 3, and 4 address psychosocial needs. **Review:** initial care to the client who has attempted **suicide.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A suicide attempt is an act taken by a client to intentionally take one's own life. If a client has attempted suicide, it is extremely important to collect data on the injuries as a result of the suicide attempt. Other very important interventions include one-to-one supervision of the client and other therapy. You will learn about the concepts related to suicide and the important nursing interventions for a client at risk for self-harm in your psychiatric/mental health nursing course.

**Rationale:** Bleomycin sulfate, an antineoplastic medication, can cause interstitial pneumonitis that can progress to pulmonary fibrosis. The nurse needs to monitor for dyspnea and monitor lung sounds for adventitious sounds that indicate pulmonary toxicity. Pulmonary function studies along with hematological, hepatic, and renal function tests need to be monitored. Also, the nurse needs to notify the primary health care provider immediately if pulmonary toxicity occurs. Alopecia (hair loss) can occur, but monitoring for it is not a priority intervention. Monitoring for anorexia and bowel pattern changes are important but are not the priority.

Test-Taking Strategy: Note the strategic word *priority* and use the ABCs—airway, breathing, and circulation. Select the option that relates to airway. Review: the interventions associated with caring for the client receiving bleomycin sulfate.

Tip for the Nursing Student: Chemotherapy is the use of medications in the treatment of cancer that kill cancer cells. A concern with the use of chemotherapy is that it also affects and destroys normal cells. This is what causes the side and adverse effects of the medications. Many chemotherapeutic agents cause nausea, vomiting, and alopecia (hair loss), among other effects. Also, some chemotherapeutic medications affect specific cells in certain organs. Bleomycin sulfate is one of these medications and can cause interstitial pneumonitis that can progress to pulmonary fibrosis. Pneumonitis refers to inflammation of the lungs, and pulmonary fibrosis refers to the formation of scar tissue in the connective tissue of the lungs. You will learn about bleomycin sulfate and other chemotherapeutic medications in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study oncologic disorders.

**Rationale:** Quinapril hydrochloride is an angiotensin-converting enzyme (ACE) inhibitor. It is used in the treatment of hypertension and as adjunctive therapy in the treatment of heart failure. Excessive hypotension ("first-dose syncope") can occur in clients with heart failure or in clients who are severely salt or volume depleted. Although respirations, urine output, and lung sounds should be monitored, the nurse should specifically monitor the client's blood pressure.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the name of the medication, and note the **strategic word** *priority*. This tells you that all options may be correct and that you must prioritize. Options 1 and 3 are **comparable or alike** and can be eliminated. Noting that the question is referring to a first dose of a medication and recalling that this medication is an ACE inhibitor will assist in answering correctly. **Review:** the side, adverse, and toxic effects of **quinapril hydrochloride.** 

Tip for the Nursing Student: Quinapril hydrochloride is a medication that is primarily used to treat hypertension and manage heart failure. This medication is classified as an ACE inhibitor and antihypertensive. A priority nursing intervention when a medication with antihypertensive effects is administered is to monitor the client's blood pressure. Additional important interventions include client teaching related to safety because of the hypotensive effects of the medication. One important point to teach the client is to rise slowly from a lying to sitting position and to permit the legs to dangle from the bed momentarily before standing. You will learn about this medication in a pharmacology course or in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiovascular disorders.

Although monitoring of options 1, 2, and 3 may be a component of the plan of care for this client, option 4 identifies the priority nursing action.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *priority*. Use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**—to direct you to the correct option. Monitoring blood pressure determines the circulatory status of the client. **Review:** the effects of **morphine sulfate**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Morphine sulfate is an opioid analgesic that is used to alleviate pain in a client. It is used to treat pain that occurs in many types of disorders and is frequently used to alleviate pain in the postoperative client or the client with cancer. Because it is an opioid analgesic, it will cause a decrease in vital signs, specifically respirations and blood pressure. Monitoring vital signs, specifically respirations and blood pressure, is a critical nursing intervention. You will learn about morphine sulfate and other opioid analgesics in a pharmacology course or in your medical- surgical nursing course.

Some clients may require endotracheal intubation to maintain an adequate  $Pao_2$ . A perfusion scan, among other tests, may be performed, and the electrocardiogram (ECG) is monitored for the presence of dysrhythmias. In addition, a urinary catheter may be inserted. However, the first nursing action is to administer oxygen.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *first*. Use of the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation—will** direct you to the correct option. **Review:** the immediate nursing actions when **pulmonary embolism** occurs.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Pulmonary embolism is characterized by the blockage of a pulmonary artery by fat, air, tumor tissue, or a thrombus that usually arises from a peripheral vein. It is characterized by dyspnea, tachycardia, anxiety, sudden chest pain, shock, and cyanosis. It is a life-threatening condition and requires immediate and aggressive treatment. Airway, however, is the priority. You will learn about pulmonary embolism in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study respiratory and cardiovascular disorders.

The nurse then checks cardiovascular function, the condition of the surgical site, the tubes or drains for patency and drainage, and function of the central nervous system. The PACU nurse normally provides a verbal report. Even so, reading the nursing notes would not be the first action.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *first*. Use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, and **circulation**. This will direct you to the correct option. Airway patency and respirations are the priorities. **Review:** priority data collection measures in the **postoperative client**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A transurethral resection of the prostate is a surgical procedure in which a cystoscope (an instrument used for examining and treating lesions of the urinary tract) is passed through the urethra to resect (remove tissue from) the prostate. An important point to remember is that airway is always the priority in the care of a client. You will learn about this surgical procedure when you study renal and urinary disorders in your medical-surgical nursing course, and you will learn about perioperative care in your fundamentals of nursing course.

An antibiotic may be prescribed, but the child's airway status needs to be checked first.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *first*. Focus on the child's diagnosis, and use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** care of the child with **pertussis**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Pertussis is an acute, highly contagious respiratory disease that occurs primarily in infants and children and is characterized by coughing and a loud whooping inspiration. Pulse oximetry uses a cliplike device that measures the amount of saturated hemoglobin in the tissue capillaries and thus the percentage of oxygen saturation in the blood. An important point to remember is that airway is always the priority in the care of a client. You will learn about pertussis in your pediatrics nursing course when you study respiratory disorders, and you will learn about measuring oxygenation using pulse oximetry in your fundamentals of nursing course.

Rationale: The nurse always washes the hands before performing any procedure, applies a face shield because suctioning may cause splashing of body fluids, and then dons a clean glove to each hand or dominant hand for oropharyngeal suctioning. A clean rather than a sterile glove can be used in this procedure because the oral cavity is not sterile. The nurse then completes preparation by attaching the suction catheter to the connecting suction tubing. The nurse removes the oxygen mask just before implementing the procedure so that the client is oxygenated as much as possible (remember that suctioning can deplete oxygen). The catheter is then inserted into the client's mouth until secretions are cleared. If the client is not tolerating the procedure, then the catheter is removed and the oxygen mask is reapplied. The nurse next encourages the client to cough because coughing moves secretions from the lower to upper airways into the mouth. At this point, suctioning is repeated if necessary. The oxygen mask is then reapplied.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, the procedure for oral suctioning. The best strategy to use to answer this question is to first **focus on the data** in the question and then to visualize the procedure. Read each option carefully and remember that coughing is important to move secretions from the airways to the mouth. **Review:** the procedure for **oral suctioning.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Suctioning is a procedure that is used to remove accumulated secretions from the oral cavity or respiratory tract when the client is unable to effectively cough them out. It is a sterile procedure when done to remove secretions from the respiratory tract and is a nonsterile procedure when suctioning secretions from the oral cavity. It requires specific actions to prevent trauma to the mucosa of the oral cavity or respiratory tract and to prevent hypoxia. You will learn about the procedure for suctioning in your fundamentals of nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study respiratory disorders.

However, checking for unresponsiveness determines if the client is affected by the decreased cardiac output. If the client is unresponsive, the nurse proceeds through CAB—compressions—airway—breathing—of the cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) sequence, remembering that the nurse should collect data before taking an action.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, actions to take in performing CPR, and note the **strategic word** *first*. Use the steps of basic life support to answer the question. Remember that determining unresponsiveness is the first action, followed by CAB. Also, use the **steps of the nursing process** and remember that data collection comes before implementation. **Review:** the priority nursing actions if a client experiences **ventricular tachycardia**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Ventricular tachycardia means that the ventricles are beating at a rate greater than 100 beats/min. If the client experiencing ventricular tachycardia is unresponsive, CPR may need to be initiated because ventricular tachycardia can progress to ventricular fibrillation, another life-threatening situation. You will learn about cardiac dysrhythmias and their treatment in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiac disorders.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Bulimia nervosa is a disorder characterized by a craving for food and continuous eating followed by purging. It is also known as *binge eating*. The condition can lead to severe nutritional deficiencies, self-deprivation, and depression. You will learn about bulimia when you study eating disorders in a medical-surgical nursing course or in a psychiatric/mental health nursing course.

**Rationale:** Attending to people's basic needs of food, shelter, and clothing is the priority. Options 1, 2, and 4 may or may not be needed at a later time.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *first*, and use **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory.** The correct option addresses basic physiological needs. Options 1, 2, and 4 address psychosocial needs and may be appropriate at a later time. **Review:** the nurse's role in the event of a **disaster.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A disaster is any human-made or natural event that causes destruction and devastation that require assistance from others. In regard to a health care agency, a disaster can be external or internal. External disasters include those that occur outside the agency, and internal disasters include those that occur inside the agency. A disaster preparedness plan is a formal plan of action for coordinating the response of a health care agency's staff in the event of a disaster in the health care agency or surrounding community. You will learn about disasters and a disaster preparedness plan in many of your nursing courses, including fundamentals, medical-surgical, leadership and management, and community.

**Rationale:** Lying supine (on the back) applies additional gravity pressure on the abdominal blood vessels (iliac vessels, inferior vena cava, and ascending aorta), increasing compression and impeding blood flow and cardiac output. This results in hypotension, dizziness, nausea, pallor, clammy (cool, damp) skin, and sweating. Raising one hip higher than the other reduces the pressure on the vena cava, restoring the circulation and relieving the symptoms. Although an emesis basin and a cool cloth placed on the forehead may be helpful, these are not the immediate actions. It is not necessary to call the obstetrician immediately unless the client's complaints are unrelieved after repositioning.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *immediate*. Focus on the **data in the question** and the goals of care. In other words, think about what complications you want to prevent. Remember that if a question requires you to prioritize and one of the options relates to positioning a client, that option may be the correct one. **Review:** care of the client experiencing **vena cava syndrome.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Vena cava syndrome, also known as *supine hypotension*, is a condition in which a fall in blood pressure occurs when a pregnant woman is lying on her back. It is caused by impaired venous return that results from pressure of the large uterus on the vena cava. Therefore, raising one hip higher than the other reduces the pressure on the vena cava, restoring the circulation and relieving the symptoms. You will learn about vena cava syndrome in your maternity nursing course.

Answer: 2

**Rationale:** In the hospitalized client, nitroglycerin tablets are usually administered 1 every 5 minutes, not exceeding 3 tablets, for chest pain as long as the client maintains a systolic blood pressure of 100 mm Hg or above (primary health care provider's [PHCP's] prescriptions are always followed). The nurse should check the client's blood pressure before administering a second nitroglycerin tablet. The PHCP is notified if the chest pain is not relieved after administering 3 tablets. If there is a sudden drop in blood pressure, the client is placed in a flat position and the PHCP is notified. Deep breathing will not relieve the chest pain that occurs as a result of myocardial infarction.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *next*. Use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**. This will direct you to the correct option. Checking the blood pressure is a means of collecting data on the client's circulatory status. **Review:** care of the client experiencing **chest pain**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A myocardial infarction is also known as a *heart attack* and results in necrosis of cardiac muscle caused by an obstruction in a coronary artery. When a client experiences chest pain and a cardiac problem is suspected, nitroglycerin is administered. Nitroglycerin is a coronary vasodilator that acts by dilating the coronary vessels and thus increased blood flow and oxygenation ensue. You will learn about myocardial infarction and nitroglycerin in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiovascular disorders.

**Rationale:** If a transfusion reaction is suspected, the transfusion is stopped and then normal saline is infused with new IV tubing pending further primary health care provider prescriptions. This maintains a patent IV access line and aids in maintaining the client's intravascular volume. The nurse should next check the client's vital signs and notify the primary health care provider and the blood bank about the reaction. The nurse should obtain a urine specimen for analysis to check for hemolysis of red blood cells. The nurse then sends the blood bag and tubing to the blood bank for examination and documents the occurrence on the transfusion report and in the client's chart.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word**, *next*, and visualize the occurrence. Stopping the blood is the first action, and because the IV line needs to remain patent, normal saline solution needs to be infused. Next use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation—**to determine that the client's vital signs need to be monitored. Then monitoring urine output and obtaining a urine specimen is done. Documentation is done last because all interventions, including that the nurse

sent the blood bag and tubing to the blood bank for examination, need to be documented. **Review:** interventions if a **transfusion reaction** occurs.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A blood transfusion involves the administration of whole blood or a component of blood, such as packed red blood cells. It is prescribed to replace blood lost as a result of trauma, surgery, or disease. A major concern associated with the administration of blood is a blood transfusion reaction, and the nurse monitors the client very closely for this life-threatening complication. It is important to know the signs of a transfusion reaction and the nursing interventions if a transfusion reaction occurs. You will learn about the administration of blood transfusions and the associated complications in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study hematological disorders.

**Rationale:** Oxygen, intravenous fluids, pain medication, and red blood cell transfusions are the priority interventions for treating sickle cell crisis. Laboratory studies may also be prescribed, but are not the priority in the care of the client. Genetic counseling is recommended, but not during the acute phase of illness. Electrolyte replacement therapy may be necessary, but this treatment would be based on the results of laboratory studies.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *priority*. Option 2 can be eliminated first using **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory** because this option addresses a psychosocial need, not a physiological one. From the remaining options use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**—to direct you to the correct option. **Review:** care of the client in **sickle cell crisis**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Sickle cell anemia is a severe, chronic, and incurable anemic condition characterized by abnormal hemoglobin (Hgb S) that results in distortion and fragility of the erythrocytes (sickled shape). Sickle cell crisis is an acute episodic condition that can occur when an individual has sickle cell anemia and results in the aggregation and clumping of the distorted erythrocytes, leading to occlusion and ischemia of tissue. You will learn about sickle cell crisis in your pediatric nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study hematological disorders.

**Rationale:** The nurse is legally responsible for client assignments and must assign tasks based on the guidelines of nurse practice acts and the job descriptions of the employing agency. A client

scheduled for discharge to home, a client scheduled for a cardiac catheterization, or a postoperative client who had an emergency appendectomy has both physiological and psychosocial needs that require care by a licensed nurse. The UAP has been trained to care for a client on bed rest. The nurse provides instructions to the UAP, but the tasks required are within the role description of a UAP.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, principles of assignment-making. Note that the question asks for the assignment to be delegated to the UAP. When asked questions related to delegation, think about the role description of the employee and the needs of the client. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** principles of **assignment-making**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Delegating and assignment-making are responsibilities of the nurse, and it is important that you assign tasks and activities that are appropriate based on the individual's educational experience, nurse practice acts, and the health care agency's policies and procedures. When you need to assign a task or activity to a UAP, one strategy is to think about the word *noninvasive*. Select the task or activity that is a noninvasive one. You will learn about delegating and assignment-making in your leadership and management course or in another nursing course that addresses these guidelines and principles.

**Rationale:** Management of hypoglycemia depends on the severity of the reaction. To reverse mild hypoglycemia, a 15-g simple carbohydrate is given and works quickly to increase blood glucose levels. However, a blood glucose test (with a glucose meter) should be performed first as soon as manifestations begin. If a meter is not available, it is safest to treat the hypoglycemia. Fifty percent dextrose and glucagon hydrochloride are used to treat severe hypoglycemia, particularly in the unconscious client.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *first*, and note that the client is hospitalized. Use the **steps of the nursing process**, and note that the correct option is the only one that addresses assessment/data collection. **Review:** care of the client experiencing a **hypoglycemic reaction**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Diabetes mellitus is a disorder of carbohydrate, fat, and protein metabolism that is primarily the result of a deficiency or complete lack of insulin secretion by the beta cells of the pancreas or resistance to insulin. The client is treated with exogenous insulin, and both hypoglycemia (a low blood glucose level) and hyperglycemia (a high blood glucose level) are complications. It is important to know the signs of each complication and how to treat them. It is also important to teach the client these signs and their treatment. If a low blood glucose level occurs, the client is treated with a 15-g simple carbohydrate to increase blood glucose levels. You will learn about diabetes mellitus and its complications in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study endocrine disorders.

Vital signs are also measured and may be done just before obtaining the ECG or quickly thereafter. Nitroglycerin, a coronary artery vasodilator, may also be administered. The nurse should then obtain blood work because it can assist in determining the diagnosis and choice of treatment. Although the chest radiograph may show cardiac enlargement, it does not influence the immediate treatment. Notifying the coronary care unit to inform them that the client will need admission should be done once the diagnosis is confirmed and admission is deemed necessary.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *next*. Remember that the immediate goal of therapy is to prevent myocardial ischemia. Use knowledge regarding the procedures for determining treatment and visualize the situation to answer this question. **Review:** care of the client with **chest pain.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A myocardial infarction is also known as a *heart attack* and results in necrosis of cardiac muscle caused by an obstruction in a coronary artery. Chest pain is a significant characteristic of a heart attack. In fact, whenever a client complains of chest pain, the nurse should suspect the presence of a heart attack and act quickly until this diagnosis can be ruled out. You will learn about myocardial infarction and its immediate treatment in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiovascular disorders.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** The brainstem is made up of several structures, including the midbrain, pons, and medulla oblongata. The vital centers of cardiac, respiratory, and vasomotor control are located in the medulla oblongata. If injury occurs to the brainstem, the nurse should monitor the respiratory status as a priority, followed by the cardiac status and vasomotor status. You will learn about brain and brainstem injuries and their complications in your medical- surgical nursing course when you study neurological disorders.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words** *most important*. Use the **ABCs—airway**, **breathing**, **and circulation**. The risk for an allergic reaction and anaphylaxis is the correct option. **Review:** the complications associated with injection of a **radiopaque dye**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Many diagnostic tests may require injection of a radiopaque dye. This type of dye, which contains properties of iodine, is used for diagnosis to provide better visualization of body structures. Whenever a radiopaque dye is used, the nurse needs to check the client for an allergy to both iodine and shellfish. You will learn about diagnostic tests and the important associated nursing responsibilities in preparing the client for these tests in your fundamentals of nursing course and in other nursing courses.

Options 1, 2, and 3 may be problems for the client in Buck's extension traction, but redness around the edges of the boot appliance presents the greatest risk for skin breakdown.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *priority*. Use **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs theory.** The only option that indicates a physiological need is option 4. Options 1, 2, and 3 indicate psychosocial needs. Review: care for the client in **Buck's extension traction.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Traction may be used to treat fractures; it provides immobilization to hold the broken bone fragments in contact with each other or in very close approximation until healing takes place. The 2 types of traction are skin and skeletal. Skin traction is achieved by applying a boot, wrap, or commercially prepared device directly to the skin, which is then attached to weights. Skeletal traction is attached directly to bone. You will learn about the various types of traction and the associated nursing care in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study musculoskeletal disorders.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Arthritis is an inflammatory condition of the joints characterized by pain, swelling, heat, redness, and limitation of movement. It can affect the client's ability to perform activities of daily living. It can also result in debilitation. It can occur in childhood or adulthood. You will learn about arthritis and its complications in your pediatric nursing course and in your medical-surgical nursing course.

Treatment includes diet, medication, and exercise. The client needs to be taught about the disorder and needs to understand how to care for self to maintain normal blood glucose levels and to prevent complications of the disease. Teaching is a very important role of the nurse for all clients, and teaching and learning principles are used to guide the nurse. You will learn about teaching and learning principles in your fundamentals of nursing course, and you will learn about diabetes mellitus in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study endocrine disorders.

Too much force, and a flow directed toward the tympanic membrane could cause tympanic membrane rupture. After the irrigation, the client should lie on the affected side for a time to finish the drainage of the irrigating solution and to allow gravity to assist in the removal of the earwax and solution.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, an indication that the *nurse should intervene*. This indicates that you are looking for an incorrect nursing action. Visualizing this procedure will assist in directing you to the correct option. **Review: removal of cerumen** from the ear.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** An ear irrigation is the instillation of water or a saline solution into the ear and is usually done to remove excess cerumen from the ear. Ear irrigations are not done if a perforated tympanic membrane is suspected. It is important for the nurse to know the procedure for performing an ear irrigation to prevent complications of the procedure, such as rupture of the tympanic membrane. You will learn about the procedure for performing ear irrigations and the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

An emesis basin is placed underneath the mouth to collect the small volumes of fluids used to rinse the mouth.

A bite stick or a padded tongue blade is used to open the mouth, not a gloved finger, to prevent injury to the caregiver.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, an indication that the *nurse should intervene*. This indicates that you are looking for the option that is incorrect. Visualize this procedure, and remember that the nurse never places a finger into a client's mouth or places the client in a flat position. **Review:** the procedure for administering **mouth care** to the client who is unconscious.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Unconsciousness is a state of complete or partial unawareness or lack of response to stimuli. It can be caused by a variety of conditions, such as shock, hypoxia, or stroke (brain attack). The client who is unconscious requires complete care, including mouth care. Depending on the state of unawareness, the client may exhibit some responses to stimuli, such as bearing down with the teeth if an object is placed in the mouth. It is extremely important to remember that the flat position places the client at risk for aspiration and that you should never insert a finger into a client's mouth, regardless of the state of consciousness. You will learn about the procedure for performing mouth care and the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, an indication that the *nurse should intervene*. This indicates that you are looking for the option that identifies an incorrect action. Visualize each option, keeping the principles of sterile technique in mind. Noting the words without washing the hands and below the level of the waist will direct you to the correct options. Review: sterile technique for donning gloves.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Sterile technique, also known as aseptic technique, is the use of special procedures to prevent contamination of the nurse, object, or area by microorganisms. A sterile field is an area that the nurse prepares that is considered free of microorganisms. Sterile technique and a sterile field are used to perform various procedures, such as changing a wound dressing. Handwashing is always done before any procedure even if the nurse plans to don gloves. You will learn about sterile technique, the procedure for donning sterile gloves and setting up a sterile field, and the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words** *need to review*. These words indicate a **negative event query** and that you are looking for the action that is incorrect. Recall that neutropenic precautions are implemented when a client is at high risk for contracting an infection. Next, look for the action that places the client at risk for infection. This will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** interventions for the client on **neutropenic precautions**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Neutropenia is an abnormal decrease in the number of neutrophils in the blood that places the client at risk for infection. Therefore, neutropenic precautions are instituted. This type of precaution focuses on protecting the client from infection, and any potential source of infection is avoided in the client's environment or in the care of the client. You will learn about neutropenic precautions and the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

Visualizing this procedure will assist in eliminating options 2, 3, and 5 because they are correct actions. **Review: suctioning** procedures.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Suctioning is a procedure that is used to remove accumulated secretions from the respiratory tract when the client is unable to effectively cough them out. It is a sterile procedure and requires specific actions to prevent trauma to the mucosa of the respiratory tract and to prevent hypoxia. You will learn about the procedure for suctioning and the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

Calling the pharmacy is a resource action that will confirm that the dose of medication prescribed is inappropriate, but this action will not resolve the problem facing the nurse. Option 4 is a premature action.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, nursing responsibilities related to prescriptions requiring clarification. Eliminate option 3 first because this is an unsafe action. Option 4 is a premature action and should be eliminated next. Eliminate option 1 next because this action will not resolve the problem. Also recall that the nurse should follow the organizational chain of command and seek assistance from the nursing supervisor. **Review:** nursing responsibilities related to a discrepancy in primary health care providers' prescriptions and the associated **ethical and legal responsibilities.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** The client's primary health care provider (PHCP) will document specific prescriptions regarding the client's care in the medical record, and the nurse needs to follow the prescriptions unless the nurse deems that a prescription may harm the client. If the prescription can cause harm to the client, the nurse needs to contact the PHCP to change the prescription. If the PHCP does not change the prescription or if the nurse is unable to locate the PHCP, the nurse should follow the chain of command in the health care organization. In this situation, the nurse should contact the nursing supervisor. Under no circumstances should the nurse implement a prescription that could cause harm to the client. You will learn about primary health care providers' prescriptions and the associated legal responsibilities in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, an indication that the *nurse should intervene*. This tells you that you are looking for the options that identify incorrect actions by the new nursing graduate. Visualizing this procedure and reading each option carefully will direct you to options 2, 3, and 5. **Review**: the procedure for inserting an **indwelling urinary (Foley) catheter.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A Foley catheter is a rubber tube with a balloon tip that is filled with a sterile liquid after it is inserted in the bladder. It is connected to a bag that collects urine draining from the bladder. Sterile technique is used to insert this catheter. This type of catheter is used when continuous drainage of the bladder is needed, such as during a surgical procedure. You will learn about this type of catheter and the procedure for its insertion in your fundamentals of nursing course. You will learn about the role of the nurse as a supervisor and teacher in your leadership/management course.

Paralysis, weakness, sensory changes, speech defects, or even death can occur. The client who experiences a stroke will require rehabilitative services that will assist the client in relearning activities to promote independence. You will learn about strokes in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study neurological disorders, and you will learn about the roles of various health care team members in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

Learning involves acquiring knowledge about a skill and changing behavior as a result of the training. Teaching is a responsibility of the nurse, and you will learn about this role and the teaching and learning process in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A nasal trumpet is a tube that is inserted into one of the client's nostrils to provide assistance in maintaining the client's airway and to provide a route for suctioning secretions from the client. You will learn about a nasal trumpet and the procedure for its insertion and suctioning procedure in your fundamentals of nursing course. You will learn about the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your leadership/management course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, an indication that the *nurse should intervene*. This indicates that you need to select the option that indicates an incorrect action by the UAP. Visualizing this procedure will assist in eliminating options 1, 2, and 3. **Review:** the principles related to **blood pressure** measurement.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** BP is the amount of pressure exerted on the walls of the arteries

and veins and the heart chambers by the circulating volume of blood. This pressure is measured by taking the client's BP. To ensure accuracy of the measurement, a specific procedure is followed. You will learn about the procedure for taking the client's BP in your fundamentals of nursing course and about the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your leadership/management course.

It is commonly done at the bedside or on an outpatient basis. The client must lie quietly for 30 to 60 minutes while the procedure is being performed. Options 1, 3, and 4 are not preprocedure preparations.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **subject**, client instructions related to echocardiogram. Focus on the diagnostic test being performed. Recalling that echocardiography uses ultrasound and that ultrasound is noninvasive will assist in eliminating options 1, 3, and 4. **Review:** client instructions related to **echocardiogram.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Diagnostic uses of an echocardiogram include the detection of atrial or other tumors, measurement of the heart chambers, and evaluation of valve and chamber function. You will learn about various diagnostic tests in your fundamentals of nursing course; an important point to remember is that an informed consent is needed if the test is invasive. Another important point is that the nurse must ensure that the client understands the test to be done and its purpose and teaches the client about the test. You will also learn about the role of the nurse as a client teacher in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

The preprocedure preparation and the procedure may take approximately 1 to 3 hours, during which the client may feel various sensations, such as a feeling of warmth or flushing, with catheter passage and dye injection.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words**, needs further instruction. These words indicate a

**negative event query** and that you need to select the incorrect statement by the nursing student. Recalling the purpose of the procedure will assist in eliminating option 3. Next, recalling that a dye is injected will assist in eliminating options 2 and 4. Also noting the words *5 hours* in option 1 will direct you to this option. **Review:** the procedure for a **cardiac catheterization.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Cardiac catheterization is a test performed to examine the status of the coronary arteries or the presence of congenital heart disease, stenosis, or valvular disease. Risks associated with the procedure include dysrhythmias (irregular heartbeats), infection, and thrombosis, and the nurse needs to monitor the client closely after the procedure. You will learn about cardiac catheterization in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiovascular disorders. You will also learn about the role of the nurse as a client teacher in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, the procedure for collecting a 24-hour urine specimen. Note that options 2 and 4 are opposite, which is an indication that one of them is likely to be the correct option. Recalling that the 24-hour urine specimen is a timed quantitative determination will assist in directing you to the correct option. **Review:** the procedure for collecting a **24-hour urine specimen.** 

Tip for the Nursing Student: Urine specimens may be collected to diagnose various conditions. These specimens may be prescribed to be collected as a random specimen, a sterile specimen, or a 24-hour urine collection. An important point to remember is that the procedure for its collection needs to be followed to ensure accurate results. You will learn about collecting urine specimens in your fundamentals of nursing course. You will also learn about the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

In addition, the manual pressure could interfere with the flow of blood to the brain. The remaining options are unrelated to the reason for measuring the pulse on only one side of the client's neck.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic word** *primary*. Note that option 2 describes the greatest danger to the client. **Review:** the function and location of **baroreceptors** in the carotid vessels.


**Tip for the Nursing Student:** The carotid artery is located in the neck region and is one of the major arteries supplying blood to the head. It is one of the pulse points in the body that can be palpated to check a client's pulse. You will learn about palpation of this artery in your fundamentals of nursing course or in a physical assessment course. You will also learn about the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.



**Rationale:** If the client has peripheral vascular disease, the pulse oximetry probe would be placed on the earlobe or bridge of the nose because peripheral vasoconstriction or inadequate blood flow to the peripheral areas of the body will interfere with the oxygen saturation measurement. It is also important to note that the probe should not be attached to a finger, ear, or bridge of the nose if the area is edematous or the skin integrity is compromised, or if the area is hypothermic. Additionally, the sensor should not be placed on the same extremity as an electronic blood pressure cuff because blood flow is temporarily interrupted when the cuff inflates. Placing the probe on the anatomical areas noted in options 1, 2, and 3 will not provide an accurate measurement of the oxygen saturation.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the client's diagnosis—peripheral vascular disease—and recall the pathophysiology associated with the disease. Note that options 1, 2, and 3 are **comparable or alike** in that they indicate using a peripheral body area. **Review:** the procedure for **pulse oximetry** measurement

Tip for the Nursing Student: Peripheral vascular disease is an abnormal condition that affects the blood vessels leading to decreased blood flow to the body part. Pulse oximetry uses a cliplike device that measures the amount of saturated hemoglobin in the tissue capillaries and thus the percentage of oxygen saturation in the blood. You will learn about peripheral vascular disease in your medical-surgical nursing course when you study cardiovascular disorders and about measuring oxygenation using pulse oximetry in your fundamentals of nursing course. You will also learn about the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

When the client's function returns, the preoperative weakness or impairment will not be misinterpreted as a complication of anesthesia. Options 1, 2, and 3 may be documented and reported, but they are not the highest priority.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Note the **strategic words** *highest priority*. Note the relationship between the words *spinal anesthesia* and the correct option. Also note that the data in options 1, 2, and 3 are normal findings. **Review:** care of the **preoperative client.** 

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Spinal anesthesia is done by an injection into the subarachnoid cerebrospinal fluid space. It produces a state of lack of sensation in the lower part of the body. An important nursing responsibility in the postoperative period is to monitor for the return of sensation in the lower body. If sensation does not return or is altered in any way, the surgeon is notified. You will learn about spinal anesthesia in your fundamentals of nursing course and about the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing or in your leadership/management course.

**Test-Taking Strategy:** Focus on the **subject**, legal implications in the care of the client without insurance. Note the words *does not have any health insurance* and the word *legally*. Noting that the situation presented is an emergency will direct you to the correct option, which addresses the legal scope of providing emergency care. **Review:** the **legal issues** related to providing **emergency care.** 

Tip for the Nursing Student: You will learn about various types of health insurance plans and the issues associated with health insurance in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course. An important point to remember is that the client is the priority. If an emergency condition exists, the health care agency must provide care, regardless of the client's insurance status. Appendicitis is an acute inflammation of the appendix that, if left untreated, can lead to perforation and peritonitis, which is life threatening. You will learn about appendicitis in your pediatrics course and your medical-surgical nursing course when you study gastrointestinal disorders.

Focusing on the words *complete bed bath* will direct you to the correct option because in this option the nurse asks the client to participate in the bathing process. **Review:** the procedure for giving a **complete bed bath**.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** Bathing a client is an important role of the nurse and is necessary for hygienic purposes and to prevent infection, maintain skin integrity, stimulate circulation, and provide comfort. Several types of baths may be given, including a bed bath, tub bath, shower, complete bath, or partial bath. You will learn about bathing a client in your fundamentals of nursing course. You will also learn about the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your leadership/management course.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A breath sound is the sound of air passing in and out of the lungs as heard with a stethoscope. Normal breath sounds include vesicular, bronchovesicular, and bronchial sounds. Auscultating breath sounds is a part of data collection, and you will learn about this procedure and evaluating breath sounds in your fundamentals of nursing course or in a physical assessment course. You will also learn about the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

Noting the words *directly into the impaired ear* will direct you to the correct option. **Review:** care of the **hearing-impaired client.** 

Tip for the Nursing Student: Special communication techniques are needed when caring for a hearing-impaired client. Some of these include facing the client when speaking; enunciating words slowly, clearly, and in a normal voice; avoiding placing the hands over the mouth when speaking so that the client can lip-read; and avoiding speaking into the impaired ear. It is important for the nurse to know these techniques because the nurse needs to use them to communicate with the hearing-impaired client to prevent social isolation. In addition, teaching and supervising others are roles of the nurse, and the nurse needs to intervene if he or she observes incorrect communication techniques performed by another health care team member. You will learn about communication techniques for clients with hearing impairment and the role of the nurse as a teacher and supervisor in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.

**Tip for the Nursing Student:** A nurse practice act is a statute enacted by the legislation of a state. Nurse practice acts may vary from state to state, but generally include educational requirements of the nurse, distinguishing between nursing practice and medical practice, and defining the scope of

practice for the nurse. Additional issues that may be covered in the act include grounds for disciplinary action and the rights of the nurse if disciplinary action is taken. All nurses are responsible for knowing the provisions of the act in the state in which they work. You will learn about the nurse practice act in your fundamentals of nursing course or in your leadership/management course.
